They fought with distinction throughout the war taking part in the seizure of Rangoon and the later campaign to the north, often being called upon to take well-defended enemy stockades. Naval General Service 1793-1840, 1 clasp, Syria (Geo. Gooding.), a few minor edge knocks, otherwise about very fineGeorge Gooding served as a Stoker aboard the 6-gun steam paddle-sloop H.M.S. Gorgon. Interestingly, Gorgon was the first vessel to be fitted with direct-acting engines and as such they were known for their compactness, strength and lightness. Fitted with four copper boilers, as a stoker Gooding would have been one of those men responsible for raising steam and ensuring her engines were fully-functional at all times. Participating in the bombardment of Acre (4 November 1840). it was possibly a shell from Gorgon which hit the Egyptian magazine, causing it to explode with huge loss of life and bringing about the conclusion of the battle. In 1843 Gorgon was stationed off the River Plate, during the Uruguayan Civil War (where she saw action at the Battle of Vuelta de Obligado) and in 1858 assisted in the laying of the first transatlantic telegraph cable by taking soundings for the cable-laying exwarship H.M.S. Hawke, 5th Foot.). attempted erasure of surname, a few small edge knocks and scratches, otherwise good very fineOne of four awards with this combination of clasps to the 5th Foot, of whom two are officers.Richard Hawke served with the 5th (Northumberland) Regiment of Foot during the Peninsula War and is confirmed on the roll with entitlement to this Medal and clasps. The unit saw a great deal of service in Spain and Portugal, earning themselves nicknames including "The Old and Bold": "The Fighting Fifth"; and "Lord Wellington's Bodyguard" along the way. They played a particularly prominent part in the Battle of El Bodon (25 September 1811) when, as part of a rearguard they defended a position against repeated attacks by the French - at one stage even carrying out a bayonet charge against French cavalry which had captured a battery of Portuguese artillery. The battalion commander, Major Henry Ridge, left an account of the action and was praised by Wellington himself on the dispositions he had made to resist their foe, later being mentioned by name in a General Order.Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. A: A: Shaw. 2nd Madras N: I:), fitted with replacement silver suspension, very fineAlfred Abraham Shaw was born in West Bengal in November 1820 and joined the Madras Army as an Ensign with the 16th Native Infantry in 1838. Promoted Lieutenant on 3 October 1840, he saw varied active service during the China operations (Medal) with the 2nd Madras Native Infantry, one of just four units of the Indian Army to participate. He married Anne Frances Fawcett, daughter of Lieutenant-Colonel L. Fawcett, C.B. at the British Embassy. Florence in 1847, whose father had died in a duel with his brother-in-law some years earlier, Shaw was promoted Captain on 28 June 1854 and Major on 11 February 1862. He retired to 4 St. Luke's Villa, Beech Road, St. Helier, Jersey, and died on 1 October 1908. Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. Noted as stationed in Burma in 1852 and later Moulmein & Rangoon. He was transferred to the 53rd Regiment in 1853 and was still serving with this unit at Fort William, Calcutta on the outbreak of the Indian Mutiny (Medal). Wounded in the left leg at Khuewa on 1 November 1857 while the regiment was escorting a supply train to Khuewa. He was discharged as a result of his wounds; sold together with copied medal rolls and typed research. Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. H.Ms, 81st, Regt.), minor contact marks, edge bruise, suspension loose, nearly very finePatrick Dillon was born at Longford, Ireland in 1844 and attested for the 81st (Loyal Lincoln Volunteers) Regiment of Foot on 7 December 1862. He saw almost three years' service at Gibraltar before being posted to India. Here the 81st Regiment was part of the Sittana Field Force which saw service in the Panjtar and Lower Sittana areas between April-May 1858. They fought in the Battle of Sittana on 4 May 1858 against a mixed force of local tribes and rebel Sepoys from the 55th Bengal Infantry. The British force under Major-General Sir Sydney Cotton caught the rebels in a crossfire before closing to engage them in hand-tohand combat with the rebels defeated by the end of the engagement. Dillon was discharged at Portsea, Hampshire on 17 October 1873; sold together with copied research including medal rolls, service and discharge papers as well as typed research.Further entitled to the Indian Mutiny Medal 1857-59 with no clasp. Attending the School of Mounted Infantry in India in August 1888 he was discharged on 23 August 1889; sold together with copied research including service papers, medal rolls and an extract from The King's (Liverpool Regiment). Brig.), suspension loose overall good very fine John West was born in 1857, at Boylstone Derbyshire and enlisted with the Rifle Brigade on 15 October 1879. Posted first to the 1st Battalion on 30 December 1879 until 3rd Battalion on 30 August 1880. Embarking for India on 27 September 1881 aboard the Jumna with the 4th Battalion, Rifle Brigade. West served here until 5 December 1888 when he was posted to Burma for service against the Burmese resistance movements causing unrest throughout the country. His character at this time was noted as 'very good', despite the difficulties of the climate which saw him hospitalised on more than one occasion for 'debility' and 'ague'. It is notable that on one occasion the hospital he attended was at Mandalay, suggesting that he was posted in the north of the country. Returning to India upon the end of the conflict on 21 October 1889 West served a further two years in the country with the 3rd Battalion, before travelling home on 22 February 1892. Serving with the 4th Battalion, East Surrey Regiment prior to re-enlisting with the Rifle Brigade on 17 January 1883 he served first with the 3rd Battalion. Posted to the 4th Battalion in India on 28 December 1833 Guy was to serve with them until 5 December 1888 when the unit moved to Burma. They remained here for over a year, helping to guell the resistance movements in Upper Burma before leaving on 28 January 1890. Returning to Britain that same month Guy served for almost five more years, being discharged on 16 Jnaury 1895 having served twelve years; sold together with copied service records and medal rolls. Bord.), suspension loose, edge bruising, minor contact marks, nearly very fine John Edwin Leach was born at London in 1886, the son of James and Elizabeth Leach of Jardene Street, Westminster. Posted first to India on 2 October 1895 he served here for four years before heading to Burma on 3 November 1889. Serving on the Chin-Lushai expedition for a little over a year Leach left on 6 January 1891. Remaining with the Army for another five years before finally being discharged on 27 February 1896.Re-joining on 2 June of that year Leach served at home until 5 January 1900 when he was posted to South Africa for service in the Boer War (Medal). Remaining there until February he returned to Britain on 20 February 1901 being discharged again on 21 Iune.Rallving to the Colours one final time on the outbreak of the Great War on 18 December 1914, Leach was posted to 3rd Battalion, King's Own Scottish Borderers. Transferred to 2/7th Battalion, Black Watch on 26 May 1917 he was invalided from service on 4 June 1918. Regt.), a little worn, nearly very fineThe 1st Battalion, 4th Gurkha (Rifle) Regiment was one of two Gurkha Battalions to take part in the Second Miranzai Expedition of 1891. During the Expedition it served as part of the Kohat Garrison and thereafter helped to garrison the Samana Range. The First Miranzai Expedition took place in January and February 1891, to punish the Orakzai tribe for raids into British territory. Encountering little opposition, the Expedition traversed the mountainous country in the depth of winter in heavy rain and snow to destroy fortified towers and impose fines. At the conclusion of the Expedition, work was begun along the Samana Ridge, which overlooked Orakzai Territory, to construct a series of fortified posts linked by a road to protect the Miranzai Valley from future raids. On 4 April 1891, the Orakzais attacked the troops protecting the working parties on the Samana Ridge. Fighting guickly spread along the whole of the Ridge resulting in all the posts having to be evacuated. As a consequence, reinforcements were moved up to Kohat and operations to clear the Samana Ridge of rebel tribesmen began on 17 April 1891.1st Battalion, 4th Gurkha (Rifle) Regiment, consisting of seven British Officers and 747 Gurkha Officers and rank and file, was ordered to reinforce Kohat and on 14 April 1891 assumed responsibilities for all Garrison duties and guards. It also deployed Companies to the outposts at Chilibagh, Hangu and Baliaman and furnished the escorts for most of the convoys supplying the forward troops. The Battalion did not take part in the operations to reoccupy the Samana Ridge and the subsequent advance into Orakzai territory. The Battalion's only engagement was on 23 April when a convoy it was escorting was attacked by rebel tribesmen near Darband Kotal. At the conclusion of operations against the Orakzais in mid May 1891, the Battalion was ordered, with three other native Battalions, to occupy the Samana Range. By December 1891, only this unit remained on the Ridge and it was relieved at the end of March 1892. The Medal & clasp was authorised for its service in support of the Second Miranzai Expedition. The Regimental History does not record the Battalion sustaining any battle casualties. It does, however, state that the Battalion suffered heavily from ill health as a result of the arduous duties undertaken at Kohat and along the lines of communication and when it initially moved to the Samana Range, of whom nineteen succumbed to fever, diarrhoea and dysentery. India General Service 1854-95, 1 clasp, Waziristan 1894-5 (3126 Rifleman Gangbir Rana, 1st Bn. 4th Gurkha, Rifles), very fineOn 3 November 1894, the Waziristan Delimitation Escort was attacked by Mahsud Waziris at Wana. As a result the Waziristan Field Force was formed to undertake a punitive expedition against the offending tribes in Mahsud Territory.On 29 November 1894, the 1st Battalion, 4th Gurkha Rifles was ordered to Dera Ismail Khan for garrison duty, but on arrival, was selected to serve with the Field Force. The Battalion was at this time on relief scale with strength of 7 British officers, 13 Gurkha officers, and 624 rank and file.Leaving Dera Ismail Khan on 6 December, the Battalion escorted a large convoy of stores to Tank, and arrived at Wana on 15 December, after a march of 120 miles, to complete the 1st Brigade of the Waziristan Field Force.On 18 December 1894, the Battalion, as a part of the 1st Brigade, left Wana for Kaniguram, On 20 December, after a most trying and difficult march over the Sherawangi Narai, the Brigade reached Camp Mogul Kot. The rear-guard consisting of two hundred men of the unit, had a slight brush with the enemy on the Narai, while the difficulties of the route for the baggage animals were so great that the rear-guard did not arrive in camp till after one in the morning.On Christmas Day, the Battalion formed part of the six flying columns sent out into the valleys north-west of Kaniguram to punish the tribes for their part in the Wana affair. Many towers and settlements were destroyed, and large quantities of grain and over a thousand head of cattle were carried off.On 2 January 1895 the Brigade left Kaniguram for Jandola, arriving on 9 January; it had completed a full circle of marching. On 12th January all three Brigades left Jandola, the 1st Brigade returning to Wana, where it arrived without incident on 19 January. It was now decided that the work of boundary delimitation should be continued. Accordingly, the Deputy Commissioner Dera Ismail Khan, accompanied by a survey party and a strong escort, left Wana for Domandi on 24th January. The escort included 6 British officers and 457 Gurkhas of the Battalion. The boundary was successfully demarcated up to 60 miles north of Domandi and the Deputy Commissioner and his escort returned to Wana on the 14 February. During the rest of February and the early part of March, the Battalion remained at Wana, engaged on the construction of a fortified post. They commenced their return to India on 11 March. The India General Medal & clasp was granted to the unit and the 1922 India Army List showed the Regiment with the Battle Honour 'Waziristan 1895', although there is no known authority for this Honour and it has not been awarded to any other Regiment. The same source notes that a number of men from the 10th Regiment were used as mounted infantry as the column was desperately short of cavalry. The push was successful and they managed to force their way into the city and rescue the garrison. Lyons continued to serve until 1861 when he was discharged having served for seven years and nine months in India. He was allowed to reattest with the 64th Regiment of Foot that same year on 24 May. He was finally discharged on 22 March 1870 at Parkhurst; sold together with copied research including medal rolls, discharge papers and an extract from a Battalion History relating to Lucknow. 'Sir Henry knew it "My God, my God," he was heard to say. "And I brought them to this". Handing over command to Colonel Inglis, son of the Bishop of Nova Scotia and former commanding officer of the 32nd, Lawrence rode back to Lucknow to prepare the Residency for the force's reception. The words of Sir Henry Lawrence upon seeing the collapse of the British attack at Chinhut, The Indian Mutiny by Julian Spilsbury, refers. The Indian Mutiny Medal awarded to Corporal W. Simpson, 32nd (Cornwall) Light Infantry, who was wounded in action during the savage action at ChinhutOn that day the Army of Barkat Ahmed drove Henry Lawrence's troops back to Lucknow, the result being the start of the famous Siege of the ResidencyIndian Mutiny 1857-59, 1 clasp Defence of Lucknow (Corpl W. Simpson, 32nd L.I.), slight contact wear and edge knocks, overall very fine54 British soldiers wounded in the action at Chinhut.W. Simpson was stationed with the 32nd Light Infantry at Lucknow on the outbreak of the Indian Mutiny in 1857. The Battle of Chinhut - 30 June 1857 With the rising at Cawnpore and the massacre of the garrison, including a company of the 32nd, an army of mutineers led by Barkat Ahmed march on Lucknow. Sir Henry Lawrence, who had spent much of the build up to the mutiny fortifying the residency in preparation for a siege, marched the garrison out to confront the rebels. The two sides met at Chinhut, at the time a village not far outside Lucknow with the British unaware of the size of the force opposing them. This underestimation of the odds led Lawrence to order an attack upon the Mutineers well-fortified position. The 300 men of the 32nd present were pushed out ahead of the line as a skirmishing force, with the sepoys advancing to their right. Heavy fire from British guns pushed the rebels back and their advance gained momentum, meanwhile whilst- unknown to them- the enemy cavalry began to move about their flanks. At that moment the mutineers within the British army showed their colours with many of the horse artillery and the Native Police going over the enemy and many others withdrawing in panic toward Lucknow. The British- and those Sepoys who had remained true- were now fearfully exposed and at that pivotal moment Colonel Case, the commander of the 32nd was struck by a shot from the village. The Chronicle of Private Henry Metcalffe, refers: 'The first man that was killed was Colonel Case, as nice an officer and as good as ever drew a sword. He belonged to my regiment and was only after coming back from England where he had been to get married, so that his wife very soon became a widow, as so did a good many more before the struggle was over. Under a withering fire and with their Colonel dead the impetus left the advance of the 32nd and they moved to find cover rather than attack. The call to withdraw was made and in the confusion the rebel horsemen who had been infiltrating their flanks struck. The British would doubtless have been overwhelmed had it not been for the bravery of the much-outnumbered Volunteer Cavalry. As it was many still fell during the withdrawal, either overtaken by the sabres of rebel Sowers or dropping out through heat exhaustion. Simpson was wounded during the fighting but managed to survive the retreat, he may even have been one of the lucky soldiers seen being carried by the sepoys who had remained loyal. Their efforts to bring their British comrades out from under the swords of the rebels and back to Lucknow did a great deal to mend the mistrust sown by the defection of the Native Police and Artillery during the battle and during the siege they were to perform admirably on the walls. After a hellish retreat harried all the way by the enemy survivors of the column streamed over the Iron Bridge and back into Lucknow, there to prepare themselves for the arrival of their victorious enemy. Wounded during the Siege of LucknowSimpson was wounded during the siege and likely spent the majority of it in the hospital, this was not to say that he had an easy time of it. The diary of L. E. Ruutz Rees covers the appalling conditions faced by those wounded, stating: 'Many of the wounded were lying groaning upon mattresses and cloaks only. Everywhere cries of agony were heard, piteous exclamations for water or assistance. The fumigations to which recourse was had were not sufficient to remove the disagreeable, fetid smell which pervaded the long hall of the sick and the air in it was pestilential and oppressive. The hospital-like most places within the Residency- was also open to fire from enemy guns with both the wounded and those tending to them being killed by enemy fire whilst helpless. By the end of the siege the vast majority of the regiment was wounded with Metcalfe suggesting that of the 950 men who arrived at Lucknow only 250 were uninjured, he quotes Sir Colin Campbell saying: The General, on beholding what was left of the once gallant 32nd said, "On my honour, Brigadier, you have a motley crowd to command and more like an invalid Depot than the once fine regiment who fought with me on the Punjab and on the North-West Frontier' (The Chronicle of Private Henry Metcalffe, refers) Despite his wound and the savage fighting of the siege, Simpson survived to claim his Indian Mutiny Medal; sold together with a casualty roll. Clarke, Indian Political Department, who served on the Afghan Boundary Commission and was additionally rewarded for his distinguished service with the Companionship of both the Indian Empire and Star of India in later lifeAfghanistan 1878-80, no clasp (Mr. E. H. S. Clarke, Political Dept.), part officially renamed and claw refitted, very fine[C.I.E.] awarded 1904.[C.S.I.] awarded 1911.Edward Henry Scamander Clarke was born on 21 May 1856, and educated at Blackheath. He entered the service of the Gocernment of India in 1875. becoming Extra Assistant Commissioner in the Punjab. In 1880, he accompanied Mr Lepel Griffin, C.S.I., Chief Political Officer in Afghanistan, as his personal assistant on his special Political mission to Kabul. Griffin had been deputed, in February 1880, by H.E. the Viceroy of India to proceed on a special Political mission to Kabul, and from that date until the evacuation of Northern Afghanistan had entire and independent control of all political work in Northern and Eastern Afghanistan, conducting the negotiations and arrangements which resulted in the Amir Abdur Rahman Khan being placed on the throne (Medal). This was a master-stroke of diplomacy, for Abdur Rahman had for twelve years been under the protection of the Tsar of Russia and was regarded as their protégé in Afghanistan. In placing him on the throne, with the agreement that he would have no relations with any foreign power other than Britain, Abdur Rahman became a staunch ally of Britain against Russian interference in the coming years. Clarke subsequently served on the Afghan Boundary Commission at Herat, 1884-86, and the following year went to St Petersburg for special duties at a time when Britain and Russia were on the very brink of war. This was a period great political intrigue and it is worth noting that the 'Great Game' was not only played by household names like Pottinger, Burns and Younghusband, but also by many of the lower-ranked political officers like Clarke. Indeed, Clarke's 'master', now Sir Lepel Griffin, K.C.S.I., published his own version of events in 'The Great Game', in 1884.In 1893, Clarke was a Member of the Durand Commission to Kabul and was honoured with the gold Afghan Order of Hurmat. He joined the Indian Political Department in 1894, and served in the Foreign Department Secretariat of the Government of India until his retirement in 1912. He was created a Companion of the Indian Empire in 1903, and a Companion of the Star of India in 1911. Edward Clarke retired in February 1912 and lived thereafter at Kabul House, Bexhill-on-Sea, Sussex, where he died on 2 February 1947. Sold with some copied paperwork and research. Brownrigg, Royal Navy, C.B., K.B.E., D.S.O. who won his D.S.O. as Executive Officer aboard Barham at Jutland and as former Commander-in-Chief of the Nore was to become the highest ranked naval casualty of the Second World WarBritish War Medal 1914-20 (Commr H. J. S. Brownrigg. R.N.), slight edge bruise, very fine[C.B.] 1933[K.B.E.] 1937[D.S.O.][Order of St. Stanislas], 2nd Glass (with Swords), London Gazette 5 June 1917.London Gazette 15 September 1916, the original recommendation states: Commander Brownrigg took charge of and conducted the operations in connection with dealing with fires and repairs to damage by shell. He was continually in positions of greatest danger, and where the conditions were most trying to the nerves. His example inspired all those under him, and he was largely instrumental in keeping the ship in effective fighting condition to the end of the action, notwithstanding the severe damage from shell fire. Henry John Studholme Brownrigg was born at Muree, Bengal on 3 September 1882, the son of Colonel Henry and Alicia Brownrigg. The younger Brownrigg joined the Royal Navy as a Midshipman on 15 February 1898, soon seeing action in the Boxer Rebellion (Medal). The young officer was fast tracked for promotion to Sub-Lieutenant on 3 September 1901, his record stating 'did very good work when landed with adml. Seymour + Peking Relief expeditions'. He was further 'mentioned', a fine indication of what was to come from his career (London Gazette, September 1900 refers)Continuing to serve Brownrigg's rise was swift with many of his commander's giving glowing reviews of his conduct which called him 'Indefatigable', 'Exceptionally capable' and 'Zealous'. Promoted Commander on 31 December 1913 he was present aboard the King George V on the sinking of the Audacious on 27 October 1914. Soon posted to H.M.S. Barham Brownrigg was serving as executive officer aboard this Queen-Elizabeth class Battleship at the Battle of Jutland. As part of the 5th Battle Squadron Barham was a late arrival in the first part of the battle, the 'run to the south'. Admiral Hipper himself acknowledged that the arrival of the Squadron with its powerful weaponry and well trained gunners swung the action in favour of the British. Unfortunately for Beatty and his battlecruiser fleet the High Seas Fleet was fast approaching and they had no choice but to withdraw. Barham formed part of the rear-guard and saw heavy fighting, she received six hits and together with Valiant is thought to have landed between 23-24 of her own. Brownrigg was awarded the D.S.O. for his role in the Battle, having taken charge of repairs during the fighting, a role which placed him regularly in the line of fire. Remaining with Barham for much of the war he was promoted Captain on 31 December 1918 and again commended with a 'mention' for his role in the war (London Gazette 21 June 1919). Continuing to rise through the ranks after the war he became Chief of Staff to the Rear-Admiral commanding the Africa Station, a role he served in between 1922-24. Going ashore as Deputy Director, later Director, of the Gunnery Division, Naval Staff and didn't return to sea until April 1929 when he served aboard the aircraft carrier Courageous. Promoted Rear-Admiral on 15 May 1930 Brownrigg was given command of the Third Cruiser Squadron in 1933 a role he held throughout the Italian-Abyssinian war, with his flag aboard the Delhi. Further advanced Vice-Admiral on 20 July 1935 he was given command of the Reserves with a special concern for training officers of the Merchant Navy in anti-submarine tactics. Finally promoted Admiral on 15 May 1939 while Commander-in-Chief at the Nore, a role he was to hold until December that year. Brownrigg retired in 1940 and was engaged in other duties for the Admiralty, also beocming one of the first to enrol in the Home Guard, commanding the Chatham Division of that unit. Applying for sea-going employment he was given work commanding convoys with the temporary rank of Commodore (Admiral retired). Commanding the Ville de Tamatave an old French liner taken in 1941 from the Vichy Government with the convoy ON 16. Leaving Liverpool on 12 January 1943 heading for New York, Ville de Tamatave was an old ship and not in the shape needed to make the rough crossing in the North Atlantic. Her rudder was damaged, some newspaper articles suggesting a U-boat attack as the cause, and the Ville de Tamatave was last seen foundering on 24 January 1943. She sank with all hands including Brownrigg who is commemorated upon the Liverpool Naval Memorial; sold together with handwritten research and copied research including newspaper articles, service papers, Commonwealth War Graves Details and admiralty records relating to the loss of the Ville de Tamatave. He was educated at a boarding school in Lincolnshire and later at Newark. Commissioned first into the Militia on 1 April 1887 he was transferred into the Border Regiment with the rank of 2nd Lieutenant on 10 November 1888. Seeing brief service at Malta in 1889 he then proceeded to Chakrata where he was promoted Lieutenant on 9 July 1890. Jackson remained in India, transferring to the Indian Army on 28 August 1891. Promoted Captain on 10 November 1899 with the 5th Bengal Light Infantry, he was married at St. Thomas' Church, Calcutta with Beatrix Clara Grey. Seeing service in Afghanistan and Kashmir, Jackson then stationed at Allahabad to serve as Adjutant with the local levies. Promoted Major on 10 November 1906 he was still serving with this rank with the 110th Maharatta Light Infantry of the outbreak of the Great War. Jackson became Lieutenant-Colonel upon being seconded to assume command of the 103rd Maharatta Light Infantry. This unit was posted to Mesopotamia as part of Force 'D' arriving there on 5 December 1914. Captain Spink of the 103rd had fond memories of his new commander stating: I shall always remember this march as I rode with Colonel Jackson of the 11th Maharata's [SIC] and one of the best, who with his wife used to drive out from "Nagar to my dam on Sundays. The Colonel was one of the few who took an interest in the country and its prospects, and being a first class artist himself, spent all his spare time sketching. As we rode along he spoke eagerly of the Arch and other ancient monuments we hoped shortly to see and how pleasant a rambling tour of Baghdad would be, little realising that within three days he would be lying dead on the field of Ctesiphon. The British force marched on Kut-Al-Amara taking the city and moving further towards Damascus. However they ran up against a major Ottoman force in well prepared defensive positions at Ctesiphon. Over the course of two days General Townsend through his forces against the Ottoman Line. The attacks all failed with high losses, including Lieutenant-Colonel Jackson who was killed in action on 22 November 1915. 'We suffered severely on the bridge over the canal by rifle and artillery fire. The machine guns had a particularly trying time. Practically all the detachment were doing great. Lieut. Dease the machine oun officer was killed or wounded. Lieut. Dease and Pte Godley both displayed the most conspicuous bravery in working the guns, after they had been wounded. The guns having finally been disabled by artillery fire had to be abandoned. Saltmarsh, 4th Battalion. Royal Fusiliers, who was killed in action during the first V.C. winning action at Nemy Bridge, during the Battle of MonsBritish War Medal 1914-20 (L-11023 Pte C. E. Saltmarsh, R. Fus), good very fineChristopher Edward Saltmarsh was born at Chelmsford on 24 December 1887, the son of George Walter and Sarah Saltmarsh. Educated at Moulsham Infants School, Chelmsford and worked as an Errand Boy before enlisting with the Royal Fusiliers at Warley some time prior to the 1911 census. Present with the 3rd Battalion in Mauritius in 1911 Saltmarsh was transferred to the Army Reserve, going to work with the National Steam Car Company.Called up upon the outbreak of the Great War he was posted to the 4th Battalion at Parkhurst, Isle of Wight. Mobilised quickly the Battalion was one of the first to enter the war on 13 August 1914, Saltmarsh was to join them, one of 734 reservists embodied for service. The 4th Battalion was stationed along the edge of the Mons-Conde canal with the Nemy Bridge an integral part of 'C' Companies position and 'D' Company further south-east by Lock 5. These two companies were forced to hold their ground against six German Battalions. A German solider named August Niemayer managed to cross the Nemy Bridge and closed it allowing them to cross. The bridge was covered by 2 machine guns under Lieutenant Dease. Twice wounded Dease stuck to his guns, ensuring that one remained in action. He only withdrew from his post when carried away by Lieutenant Steele. Dease succumbed to his wounds minutes later. As the forward companies were forced back the last gun remained in action, manned by Private Godley. He remained under heavy attack until the bridge was stormed, putting the gun out of action and throwing it into the canal Godley. Both were awarded the Victoria Cross as the result of their efforts. Along with Lieutenant Dease the 4th Battalion lost 150 men at Mons with Saltmarsh losing his life in the fighting. The Essex County Chronicle wrote of his death stating: Pt. Christopher Saltmarsh, of the 3rd Royal Fusiliers, who was the main support of his aged parents, of Anchor Street, Chelmsford, was killed in action. Intimation of the sad event was received from the War Office on Saturday. The deceased, who was a Reservist, called up at the beginning of the war, saw all the fighting at Mons. He had been employed at the National Steam Car Works at Chelmsford, and was a popular man with his workmates. While with the colours he served seven years abroad, mostly in India. A brother of his went through the South African campaign in the Essex Regiment without a scratch, but died about six months ago. 'Saltmarsh has no known grave and is commemorated on the La Ferte-Sous-Jouarre Memorial, Seine-et-Marne and on the Civic Centre Memorial, Chelmsford; sold together with copied research including two battalion war diary extracts, an extract from a battalion history and typed research. CL. II. J. Weldon. North'd Fus.), nearly extremely fine[D.C.M.] London Gazette 13 February 1917, the original recommendation states: For conspicuous gallantry in action. He led his platoon with great courage and determination, himself accounting for many of the enemy. Later, he dressed 13 wounded men under heavy fire. John Weldon was born at Stannington, Northumberland in 1885, the son of John and Margret Weldon. His father was an Eastern Railways signalman and the family lived at 44 Chillingham Road, Heaton. The younger Weldon followed in his father's footsteps, working as a Railway Porter prior to the war. On the outbreak of the Great War he enlisted with the 16th Battalion (Newcastle Commercials), Northumberland Fusiliers and entered the war in France on 22 November 1915 as Company Sergeant-Major of 'B' Company. In this capacity he was with them during their first introduction to offensive battle, going over the top on the First Day of the Somme. The Battalion went over the top at 07:30 on 1 July 1916 into a hail of fire, the commander of 'B' Company Captain Percy Graham was killed almost immediately and in short order the other officers followed. Weldon took to the head of the Company and led them until finally orders came through to hold where they were. Finding what cover they could the number of dead and wounded mounted. Weldon was a pillar of strength in those moments, moving from crater to crater he bandaged the wounded and fought one man with the German snipers. Twice the rifle was shot from his hands yet on both coassions he found another and fought on, accounts of the number he killed vary from 'nearly a score' to '29 Germans'. Remaining on the

Parker entered the war with them a little over a week later on 15 January in France. He flew the first five months of the war as an observer, logging an impressive amount of flight time and clearly impressing his superiors with the clarity and detail of his reports. Parker was to win the M.C. here for his work with No. 4 Squadron. However all too soon he was sent to Hospital on 6 July 1915 an incident report notes the cause as a flying accident, stating: Lt Parker joined the Flying Corps on 5th Jany. [SIC] 1915; and met with an accident on 6th July last. The machine dived and was caught in the branches of a tree which it brought to the ground. Lt Parker's foot was pinned between a branch and the engine (weight 350 lbs)He met with a severe sprain & contusion of right ankle. It is probable that the lft. [SIC]: matteolus was crushed though not displaced. There were also several contusions & lacerations of legs, body, & face. He was in hospl. [SIC] in France for a few days, then moved to London where he remained in hospl. until 29th July. His injuries however refused to properly heal and soon Parker was deemed unfit for flying duties. He was not however to be counted out and was instead soon transferred to the 'Ballonatics' on 27 October 1915 and promoted Flight Commander on 18 December 1915. He soon began to do good work here, receiving his first 'mention' on 1 January 1916. Posted to No. 7 Kite Balloon section he received his second in a hair raising incident on 5 August 1916 which involved a parachute descent while under fire. The original recommendation by his Brigade Commander was for a Bar to his M.C. however this was downgraded to a 'mention' on 13 November 1916, the original recommendation states: 'Very skilful and consistent work commanding a Kite Balloon Section, from March to August 1916. Displayed great energy and trained his officers admirably. His work has been most valuable. On 5th August his balloon was brought down by shell fire and he displayed great coolness and resource in assisting his observer to make a parachute descent before he did so himself. The balloon descended 1,400 feet during this. Returning to Britain on 22 August 1916- possibly as a result of his parachute jump which can hardly of helped his damaged foot- Parker appointed Commandant of the Kite Balloon School of Instruction. While there he was promoted Balloon Company Commander from 1 December 1916. Three times more in this time, once in a dispatch by Field Marshall Haig on 4 January 1917 and once in a Press Communique on 3 March 1918, Parker received his last mention in despatches on 13 March 1918. Not long after this he was transferred for the final time on 22 March 1918 and appointed a Staff Officer, Class II with the Royal Flying Corps, in the process relinquishing his temporary rank of Major (Graded as Squadron Leader). Despite all that had happened throughout the war Parker's promotions had all been temporary and upon the end of hostilities he reverted to the rank of Lieutenant. This was clearly not satisfactory and he was promoted Captain on 21 March 1919 with the Acting rank of Major. Leaving the army that same year he worked as Secretary of the Air Board in the Commerce and Industry Department for the Indian Government, holding this role from 1919-1924. Sadly Parker was not done with war, his only son Reginald Hastings Parker joined the Royal Navy in the footsteps of his grandfather and great grandfather. He was killed in action during the Greco-Turkish war in the British attempt to seize Mudanya on 25 June 1920, he was shot in the back while withdrawing to the ships with his men. Retiring in January 1924 he lived for a while in Italy, returning in 1937 to escape the rise of fascism Parker was living in Harrow in 1939 but returned to Italy after the war. He died on 27 July 1959 at the Villa Belvedere, Via Michelangelo, Alassio; sold together with copied research including census data, London Gazette entries and newspaper records as well as service papers, recommendations for award and the recipients observation reports from February - July 1915 as well as M.I.C., accident reports and Government of India lists and a copy of the Old Cheltonian record of service. Serving on Gallipoli, MacWhirter was promoted Sergeant whilst there on 12 August 1915. He began to suffer with dysentery in November 1915. being taken to the hospital ship Galeka. He died here on 6 November 1915 and was buried at sea by the Ship's Chaplain. That same Chaplain wrote to MacWhirter's parents on 14 November stating: I saw him at frequent interval during the day. Almost always he seem to be resting patiently: & whatever I spoke, he answered in the same brave bright manner. His mates tell me that once or twice his mind wandered a little, and he was drilling his men. He was no doubt a real martyr to Duty in the highest sense. Tragically Hunt was not the only member of the family to die in the Great War with his brother Charles Herbert Hunt also dying of wounds the year previously on 21 July 1917. Undaunted had an eventful early war, seeing action at Heligoland Bight and later in the Action of Texel. In December 1914 she was also in action as part of the Cuxhaven Raid, screening ships carrying floatplanes to raid German Naval Bases. In early 1915 she was part of the Battle of Dogger Bank and on 24 March 1916 was damaged in a collision with another British ship while covering a German Naval Bases thought to house submarines. Bean was promoted Petty Officer Telegrapher on 1 October 1916 and remained with Undaunted until 26 July 1918. W. Hart. 1-D. Gds.), minor contact wear and polishing, very fineWilliam Hart was born in 1884 at Brixworth, Northamptonshire and lived at 6 Oak Villas, Tredegar Park, Newport, Monmouthshire. Enlisting prior to the Great War he was serving with the 11th Hussars when it began. Entering the war in France on 15 August 1914 as a Corporal with the service number 6863 he was still with this unit when it formed part of 1st Cavalry Brigade. Here they along with 'L' Battery, Royal Horse Artillery were cornered early in the morning of 1 September 1914 by the German 4th Cavalry Division. A patrol from the 11th Hussars found the advanced units of the Division and managed to warn the Brigade however they were soon under attack with all but one 'L' Battery's guns knocked out before they could mount a proper defence. The last gun, manned by Captain Bradbury, Sergeant Major Nelson and Sergeant Major Dorrell continues to fire for two and a half hours in the face of massed German artillery, all three were later awarded the Victoria Cross. The British Cavalrymen had dismounted to defend Nerv had held back the Division's advance as the last gun of 'L' Battery held the attention of the German Guns. Despite the disparity in numbers they managed to hold on, aided by a flanking attack from the 5th Dragoon Guards. At around 08:00 reinforcements arrived 'I' Battery, Royal Horse Artillery, 1st Battalion, Middlesex Regiment and 4th Cavalry Brigade arrived on the scene. A Squadron of the 11th Hussars mounted up and joined the 1st Middlesex in taking eight of the enemy guns while the scattered German forces were routed, suffering heavy losses. Hart was later posted to the Corps of Hussars, with the 13th Hussars, being given the service number 46230 but served attached to the 1st Dragoon Guards. He was promoted Sergeant and given the new service number D37201, later posted to India he was present for the Third Anglo-Afghan War (Medal and clasp). Further posted to Irag he appears in the role with the note that the medal should be named 13th Hussars attached 1st Dragoon Guards. Promoted Leading Stoker on 15 May 1916, Drummond was still with Marksman when she led the 12th Destroyer Flotilla into action at the Battle of Jutland. During the action two of the three divisions of 12th Destroyer Flotilla launched a massed torpedo attack on the German line, sinking the S.M.S. Pommern. Marksman however was not among them as the third Division was badly disrupted by the disrupted formations of the first two, now under heavy fire. Separated from the rest of the unit in the darkness she attached herself to the cruiser Champion and was present with her when she and Moresby sank a German destroyer. Marksman was also able to take on one of only two survivors from the Ardent, that being **Lieutenant-Commander Arthur Marsden.Promoted Stoker Petty** Officer not long after the Battle on 1 February 1917 Drummond was posted to Grafton that same year on 1 July, being aboard her when she was torpedoed by UB-43. The cruiser was only saved by her torpedo bulges which proved partially effective, allowing her to limp into port at Malta. Drummond remained with her for the rest of the war, being present when she provided fire support to the British Army at the Battle of Jaffa.Drummond saw some post-war service with the armed trawler Violette before being posted ashore again on 23 May 1922. He was pensioned ashore on 10 June 1922; sold together with an H.M.S. Pelorus cap tally, a photograph of Pelorus and an extract from A Cruiser on the Cape Station as well as copied service papers. With the onset of the Great War in 1914 he was a Lieutenant on the Territorial Force General List (Poplar Battalion, National Reserve) and he was appointed Temporary Captain in the 12th (Bermondsey) Battalion, East Surrey Regiment on 12 July 1915.St. John-Spencer served during the Great War on the Western Front in the rank of Temporary Major as second in command of the 9th (Service) Battalion, East Surrey Regiment from 28 August 1916, and was invalided to England on 18 November 1916. Admitted to Mill Bank Hospital, London with a head wound on 21 November 1916, he was discharged 1 month later with permanent injuries. Following his death in 1937, a number of newspaper articles and obituaries stated that Major St. John-Spencer had been aide-de-camp to H.M. King George VI when he was Duke of York and that he had been wounded eight times in all throughout his service in the Boer War, the Great War and on the North-West Frontier of India. His memory of the Great War was published in the 500 Best Cockney War Stories: 'The Colonel of the Regiment, gifted with the resonant voice of a dare-devil leader, was highly esteemed for his rigid sense of duty, especially in the presence of the enemy. The Germans had been troubling us a lot with gas, and this kept everyone on the qui vive. Accompanied by the Colonel, the Divisional Commander was making his usual inspection of the front line intent on the alertness of sentries. In one fire-bay the Colonel stopped to give instructions regarding a ventilating machine which had been used to keep the trench clear of gas after each attack. Meanwhile the General moved on towards the other end of the fire-bay, where the sentry, fresh out from the reserve battalion recruited in Bermondsey, stood with his eyes glued to the periscope. A natural impulse of the General as he noticed the weather-vane on the parapet was to test the sentry's intelligence on "gas attack by the enemy," so as he approached the soldier he addressed him in a genial and confiding manner: "Well, my lad, and how's the wind blowing this morning?"Welcoming a little respite, as he thought, from periscope strain, by way of a short "chin-wag" with one or other of his pals, the unsuspecting sentry rubbed his hands gleefully together as he turned round with the reply: "'Taint 'arf so dusty arter all." Then, suddenly through the corner of his eye he caught sight of his colonel at the other end of the fire-bay. His face instantly changed its cheerful aspect as he breathlessly whispered to his inquirer, "Lumme, the ole man! He had a very distinguished student career and was awarded a number of the chief prizes. He graduated in medicine in 1916. Following a period of three years war service with the R.A.M.C., he gained the M.A. and D.M. in 1919, and the F.R.C.S. in 1921. With such a remarkable academic record it is somewhat surprising that he did not seek a consultant post in one of the London hospitals. However he came to Caernarfon in 1926 to join Dr. Lloyd Roberts in general practice at 37 Castle Square. In 1931, as the result of publishing his book Essays on familial syphilis, he was awarded the gold medal of the Hunterian Society. He was appointed surgeon to the Caernarfon and Anglesey Infirmary at Bangor, but decided to retire from the post within a few years. His attempt to return to the staff as physician was not successful. During this period Evans was active in many spheres outside his practice. He had a good singing voice, he was an elder at Engedi chapel and a lay preacher. In 1942-43 he was president of the North Wales Branch of the B.M.A., and in the same year he was High Sheriff of the County of Caernarfon. He was a man of wide culture and was interested in philosophy and theology as well as the sciences. As the years went by Griffith Evans was increasingly attracted to the borderland between these disciplines and pure medicine. In time, and with the support of a number of friends, he established the Centre of Spiritual Healing at Caernarfon, and he was elected first chairman of the Healing Committee of his denomination. Thereafter his active interest extended to the London Healing Mission, and his support reached the stage that he decided to move to London, making his home at Melbury Road, Kensington, and becoming a member of Charing Cross Chapel in 1958.By this time his close association with Spiritual Healing had apparently weakened his relationship with orthodox medicine. It was in the sphere of Christian healing that he maintained his interest, and in this area he centred his theoretical studies. He enriched his mind by wide reading, and he wrote quite extensively, mainly in English, in an attempt to distil the observations of contemporary experts. These issues have always presented serious medical and ethical problems but it was generally admitted that the vagueness and imprecision of his contributions were such that the articles were almost incomprehensible to doctors and laymen alike. There is no doubt about the sincerity of his belief in the value of healing centres, nor in the thoroughness of his research, but it can scarcely be claimed that he succeeded in transmitting his enthusiasm to his professional colleagues, nor could their inherent conservatism be held entirely responsible for this lack of response. Without doubt the motivation for his work was the strength of his Christian belief, and the realisation of the effect of mind and emotion on the 'complete' health of the individual. Notwithstanding the distinction of the earlier years of his medical career, Evans could not avoid the influence of an obsessional element when analysing the results of his observations, and it is not improper to record that this tendency was recognised by his contemporaries long before he embarked on his work in the Healing Ministry. He married Dilys Eames of Bangor in 1916 and there were no children of the marriage. He died 20 September 1966 in London and was buried in Llanbeblig cemetery, Caernarfon. Between 1931-33 he served as Adjutant of the 2nd Battalion, East Indian Railway Regiment and from 1933-35 was Adjutant of The Rangoon Battalion, after which he returned to the 2nd Gurka Rifles in Dehra Dun. Promoted to Major on 15 April 1937, he commanded a Company during the Battalion's operations in Waziristan in 1937. Working as Cabin Boy with the Merchant Marine, his first ship was the St. Magnus in 1913 at Orkney. Promoted Cook and Officer's Steward in August 1914 with the T. W. Stewart a role he continued to serve in during the Great War. Entering the role of Able Seaman in 1916 Ross was aboard the S.S. Empress when she was torpedoed and sunk on the morning of 31 July 1917. The Empress struck a mine which had been laid by UC.63, a specialist mine-laying submarine. In a letter to his Grandson, Ross describes the scene:'I was in the water an hour and 5 minutes and only 5 minutes in the boat that picked me up when I got put aboard the destroyer. He goes on to note that the crew of the vessel were not aware of their destination but that they believed it to be Italy. Five men are noted as having been killed aboard the Empress however Ross' letter makes note of six names upon the memorial for the sinking, suggesting that another crewman may later have died of his wounds. Surviving the ordeal himself Ross was later recruited into the 74th Company, Inland Water Transport and Docks, Royal Engineers. After the war Ross was to see continued Merchant Marine service switching between the ranks of Bosun and Able Seaman depending on the ship he was aboard throughout the 20s and 30s. Bosun of the Kilorumy in October 1939 he was promoted Master with the Dundee Perth London Company in January 1940 he was to serve in this role throughout the war and after.Master of the Morton Corbett in October 1952 Ross later commanded the Anno and Deneside, and finally retiring 1958 as a result of ill health. Taking up residence of The Royal Alfred Seafarers Home, Belvedere, Kent he died there on 9 November 1975. In November 1911 he was posted to the armoured cruiser Antrim, and subsequently served in the battleships Prince George (4 May - 3 June 1912) and Thunderer (June 1912 - March 1915).RevengeIn February 1916 Westnutt joined the battleship Revenge, in which he served at the Battle of Jutland. Revenge gave her name to a class of five battleships laid down in the winter of 1913-14. She was built by Vickers and completed in March 1916. She displaced 28,000 tons, had a speed of twenty-two knots and her main armament consisted of eight 15-inch guns and fourteen 6-inch guns. She was commanded by Captain Kiddle and had a wartime complement of 997.On completion she was assigned to the 1st Battle Squadron of the Grand Fleet. At Jutland she was in the 6th Division commanded by Rear Admiral Burney, consisting of ships of miscellaneous classes. As the ship went to action stations a mysterious drumming sound was heard throughout the ship and the more romantically inclined referred to the legend of Drake's drum, which would be heard when England was in danger. (Revenge was the ninth ship to carry the name of Drake's old ship). When the twenty-four battleships of Jellicoe's fleet deployed into a single line at 19.00 hrs, Revenge was twenty-second in line. The fleet succeeded in 'crossing the T' - that is, most of the British ships could fire on the German ships with their full broadside, while the latter could return fire with their forward guns only. Revenge began an intermittent fire for about seventeen minutes, but visibility was poor and no hits were claimed. Her secondary armament fired on the disabled cruiser Wiesbaden. At 18.36hrs Scheer, the German commander, ordered his ships to disengage and each ship simultaneously executed a turn of 180 degrees. At the same time, a large number of torpedoes were launched at the rear of the British line. Revenge felt a heavy shock from a torpedo which struck her but didn't explode; next ahead, the Marlborough was struck by a torpedo which ripped a hole measuring thirty feet long in her hull below the waterline. Having skilfully extricated his fleet from Jellicoe's trap, only a quarter hour later Scheer led his ships right back into it; at 18.36 hrs he ordered his ships to reverse course a second time. The British fleet still stretched out before them in a great arc from north to south; as they came under increasingly intense fire, the German ships bunched up and began to lose their formation. German gunners saw nothing but smoke and mist and, in the words of historian John Irving, 'an almost continuous flickering orange light right round the horizon ahead, from port to starboard.' After only a few minutes Scheer realized that his fleet was faced with imminent destruction and, for the third time, ordered a 180 degree turnaway. However, in order to cover the retreat of the battleships, at 19.13hrs he issued a dramatic order to the much-battered battle-cruisers; 'Battle-cruisers at the enemy! Give it everything!'The charge of the German battle-cruisers towards the British line was later referred to as a death-ride. Derfflinger, which led the charge, came under fire from the Revenge's 15-inch guns with devastating effect. Derfflinger's Gunnery Officer recalled: The range fell from 12,000 to 8,000 ... Salvo after salvo fell around us, hit after hit struck our ship ... A 15-inch shell pierced the armour of 'Caesar' turret and exploded inside. The turret commander had both legs torn off and most of the gun crew was killed. The flames passed to the working chamber and then to the handling room and seventy-three of the seventy-eight men in the turret died ... Another 15-inch shell pierced the roof of 'Dora' turret. The same horrors followed. With the exception of one man who was thrown by the concussion through the turret entrance, the whole turret crew of eighty men was killed instantly. From both after turrets, great flames were spurting, mingled with clouds of yellow smoke ... Then, a terrific roar, a tremendous explosion, then darkness ... The whole conning tower seemed to be hurled in the air ... Poisonous greenish-yellow gases poured through the aperture into our control. I called out "Don gas masks!" and every man put his gas mask over his face ... We could scarcely see anything of the enemy who were dispersed in a great semi-circle around us. All we could see was the great reddish-gold flames spurting from their guns. Revenge hit the Derfflinger five times from 19.14-17hrs and then shifted her fire to Von Der Tann, obtaining a hit on the after conning tower at 19.19hrs. Shell splinters entered the conning tower through the sighting apertures, killing the Third Gunnery Officer and three others, and wounding everyone else in the tower. The effects of the explosion were equally serious outside - the upper deck and battery deck suffered from the blast and splinters and wreckage were blown down the ventilating shafts to the starboard engine room. All the lights went out and the fumes threatened to asphyxiate the engine room personnel. When the battleships had disengaged, Scheer authorised the battle-cruisers to retreat. At the same time, flotillas of destroyers launched waves of torpedoes at the British line. None struck, but they achieved their purpose by preventing Jellicoe from following up the enemy's retreat. When the action was over, the fleet went to night cruising stations, expecting to renew the battle the next morning. Shortly after midnight the crippled Seydlitz steamed slowly past Burney's squadron. Marlborough sighted her but did nothing; Revenge challenged her but accepted the wrong response, and Agincourt decided not to open fire in order not to give away their position. It was an astonishing but far from unique failure of initiative. At 03.00hrs on 1 June, Burney transferred his flag to Revenge from the torpedo-damaged Marlborough. Later that morning the British realised that the Germans had escaped in the night and, with great disappointment, they set course for Scapa.In the course of the battle Revenge fired 102 rounds of 15-inch and 87 rounds of 6-inch ammunition; she was not hit herself, and suffered no casualties.BattlecruisersWestnutt left the Revenge in May 1918; following some months at the shore base Vivid, and in Albion (then being used for accommodation at Devonport), from February 1919 to June 1920 he served aboard the battlecruiser New Zealand when she carried Admiral Sir John Jellicoe to New Zealand and the other dominions to draw up plans for imperial naval defence. He rounded off his naval service with a tour of duty in Hood, from December 1920-June 1922. Hood was first commissioned in March 1920; she was flagship of the Battle Cruiser Squadron, flying the flag of Vice Admiral Sir Roger Keyes, and her company was drawn from all three depots. However, it was then decided to return to the pre-war practice of manning ships with men from a single depot - in the Hood's case, men from Devonport. Also, soon after Westnutt joined her, Keyes was replaced by Vice Admiral Sir Walter Cowan, who soon turned the Hood into one of the most unhappy ships in the fleet. Westnutt was rated Ordinary Seaman when he attained the age of 18 in 1912, and thereafter was steadily promoted to Able Seaman (1914), Leading Seaman (1917) and Petty Officer (1920). On 23 June 1922 he was discharged and

Purdin, R.A.F.); Defence and War Medals 1939-45; Iraq War Service Medal, mounted as worn, all campaign medals named unofficially, heavy contact marks to first, minor contact marks overall, very fine (6) William Edward Purdin was born in London on 1896, the son of Thomas Purdin of 143 Kennington Street. Enlisting with the Royal Flying Corps on 3 November 1915 with the rank of Air Mechanic Class II while still only 16. Qualifying as an Air Gunner on 1 August 1917 by 17 April 1918 Purdin was posted to No. 35 Training Squadron. Commissioned on 13 August 1918 he was posted to India for service in the Third Afghan War with No. 52 Wing. While the logbooks relating to this period are missing those present do note 650 hours as Pilot and 150 as Gunner/Observer brought over from the period between April 1918-April 1922. Posted to Duxford as an instructor he remained there until December when he transferred to No. 4 Flying Training School in Egypt, remaining there until March 1925. Transferring to No. 6 Squadron in Iraq on 14 March 1925 he was part of several bombing raids on rebel camps through April and May. During these operations Purdin experienced his first prang, suffering engine trouble on 3 August 1925 he was forced to crash land in a Wadi. Fortunately he survived, though his logbooks note that the aircraft was a write-off. Back to flying soon Purdin took part in a raid on the French controlled Syrian Border on 2 April 1926. Returning to Britain later that year he was posted as an Instructor at No.1 Flying Training School at Netheravon. Later via a post as Flight Commander at the School of Photography he became a test Pilot with the Royal Aircraft Establishment. It was here that Purdin was to join the Caterpillar Club, while conducting an airscrew test on a Gorcock the wing collapsed and he was forced to bale out, making use of his parachute. In the process becoming the sixth of the 'Farnborough Caterpillars'. Remaining with the R.A.E. for several years he left on 6 November 1933, it was not to prove permanent however. Posted to No 8 (B) Squadron in Aiden as Officer Commanding 'C' Flight Purdin once again began to carry out bombing operations. His log books note raids in Upper Yaffa on 22-23 November as well as 'Active Operations' in Bakri on 5, 7 and 9 February 1934. Further actions continued in this vein, as well as co-operative operations with the Camel Corps in British Somaliland, until August 1935 when Purdin was posted to Cranwell. Here he commanded No. 2 Electrical Wing at the Wireless School, also being promoted Squadron Leader on 1 October. Returning to the R.A.E. experimental section in November 1938 he re-joined it as commanding officer and was still there on the outbreak of the Second World War the next year. Notably here the R.A.E. were not meant to be engaging the enemy but, as the Battle of Britain gained steam and Test Pilots being the breed they are, this did not stop all of them. On two occasions Purdin was forced to ground Squadron Leader (later Air Commodore) Arthur Clouston for getting into dogfights. Doing so even when the irrepressible Clouston managed to shoot down an He 111. During this time Purdin took an active part in several defence patrols himself starting in August of 1940.Posted to Canada Command in 1941 he was to form and command No. 31 Officer Training Unit and with with the posting came advancement as he was promoted Wing Commander that same year. Purdin was further advanced to the Temporary rank of Group Captain on 11 March 1941. While here the Governor General of Canada, the Earl of Athlone visited the unit's mess, with a number of photographs and a good deal of correspondence speaking to the success of the visit. Returning to Britain in May 1943 Purdin formed No. 1 Transport Officer Training Unit and later that same year became Senior Staff Officer for No. 44 Group. Finally retiring on 26 February 1946, he was confirmed in the rank of Group Captain (retired) as a final honour. Purdin died in 1973 in Durban, South Africa, with his obituary crediting him with a world record, in his lifetime, for the number of different aircraft flown, that number being 124. After a brief stint aboard Amazon Tomlinson joined H.M.S. Malaya on 30 October 1936. Not long after this she was stationed of Haifa, a key strategic port during the Arab Revolt. The role of the navy in the war was partly to ensure the British control of various ports as well as providing shore parties and expertise in manning heavy guns or other areas. Notably Malaya provided naval mines during the fighting which were used to demolish buildings. Tomlinson moved on from Malaya to Hereward on 10 October 1939 and remained with her until 1939 when he was posted to H.M.S. Revenge on 19 July. He received his pension the next month but the threat of war kept him from retirement, going on to serve with the rank of Leading Seaman (Pensioner). Opening the war in the Atlantic they were soon thrown into the thick of the fighting. Her first major action was Operation Medium, a spoiling attack intended to slow the construction of the German transport fleet being prepared for the invasion of Britain. Revenge led the Task Force which advanced on the port of Cherbourg on 15 September 1940 under cover of an air raid before opening fire. She fired over 800 shells during the attack and despite being under heavy fire from the shore defences suffered no hits, nevertheless the results of the British attempts to halt invasion preparations were not decisive. Tomlinson was promoted Acting Petty Officer on 11 November 1941 the month after Revenge was transferred to the Eastern Fleet. She was not part of the Battle of Ceylon, being too old to compete with the modern Japanese battlecruisers. She was finally recalled in mid-1943 and Tomlinson was posted to H.M.S. Collingwood. However when the German vessels returned fire a volley from Bismark struck Hood amidships, a point between x turret and the mainmast exploded, launching a pillar of smoke and flame into the sky. The ship split in two and sank in approximately three minutes, the speed and violence of the destruction leaving little room for survivors. Only three of the Hood's crew lived to be picked up, Mepham was not among them however, he perished with the Battleship. The Brigade (Brig H de R Morgan), consisting of the 8th Battalion, Sherwood Foresters (TA) (Lt Col T A Ford) and 5th Leicesters (TA), was at half strength on sailing for Norway with only two companies of Leicesters embarked and the third battalion (4th Lincolns) deployed with 146 Brigade for the direct assault on Namsos. The merchant ship Cederbank carrying the anti-tank artillery, communications equipment, Bren carriers, motor transport, and most of the ammunition and food was torpedoed and sunk during passage. The Brigade disembarked at Andalsnes on 18 April with the battle dress, rifles and personal ammunition they stood in and with no transport. During passage, Brigadier Morgan had received 3 signalled changes to his orders, the final one being to turn south at Dombas and assist the remnants of the Norwegian Army to stem the advance North from Oslo of the German army spearheaded by the Armoured Division "Pellengahr". Relying on Norwegian trains as a means of reaching the front, the Brigade moved south to Lillehammer in the Gudbrandsal valley. On 19 April, 148 Brigade made contact with German forces in the open valley south of Lillehammer and staged a fighting withdrawal north to allow the remnants of the Norwegian army to pass through their positions and regroup. After four days of constant fighting in Arctic conditions and with very little food or sleep, the brigade made a stand about a mile south of the village of Tretten, to prevent the road bridge falling into enemy hands and thus cutting off the Norwegian "Dahl Force" which was retreating on the opposite side of the valley. The Vardekampen Hights was chosen as a defensive position as it protruded into the valley at a farmhouse called Rindheim and descended steeply to the valley road which in turn had a steep gorge dropping away from it to the valley below. It was hoped this narrow front would prevent Austrian ski troops from turning the Brigade's left flank which had been a feature of all previous engagements further south. British troops, with help from Norwegian civilians, hastily prepared rock defensive positions in the pine forests, as it was impossible to dig trenches in the frozen grounds. The battle at Tretten commenced early on 23 April and lasted all day. Subjected to continuous mortar and machine gun fire (the Foresters mortar platoon only had smoke ammunition), the hungry and cold Territorial soldiers, armed only with rifles and limited ammunition, attempted to stem armoured and ski troops overrunning their positions and taking the strategically important bridge at Tretten. These forward positions were eventually overrun as tanks and supporting infantry passed through them and continued north to take the village of Tretten where hand to hand street fighting took place between the Germans and Brigade rear echelons/reserve companies. At about 2100hrs, after a day of constant fighting, detached Brigade staff volunteered to form a rearguard to the north of the village to allow the remnants of the Brigade to withdraw. Fisher first flew at 51 OTU on 15 October 1941, with Gibson on a rest having freshly added a Second Award Bar to his Distinguished Flying Cross. Fisher' period of 7 October 1941-6 January 1942 totalled 4hrs of Dual flying, 32hrs45mins Day flying and 24hrs35mins Night flying and being rated 'Average' as a Pilot by Gibson. Fisher then joined No. 64 Squadron, which would see him rub shoulders with 'Cat's Eyes' Cunningham soon after. Cunningham commanded No. 604 Squadron and took Fisher, Flying Officer Rawnsley and Sergeant Naylor up in Beaufighter T4625 for a Practice Flight on 17 January, with another flight on 6 February noted. Fisher was then let loose himself as Pilot from 7 February. Cunningham signed off his Log Book for April 1942 and also signed off his Flying Assessment, noting 46hrs55mins of Day flying and 16hrs15mins of Night flying. Passed fit for active flying, Fisher was shipped off to RAF Takoradi in British West Africa in July 1942 and joined No. 46 Squadron later that month. He flew his first patrol sortie on 7 August and his first 'scramble' on 12 August. By November, Fisher took part in a multi-stage flight, via Gambut, to Luqa, Malta, in order to deliver a 'rhubarb' on Sicily on 19 November in Beaufighter X7708.Transferred to No. 89 Squadron in December, he closed the year with some 414hrs in his Log Book. January 1943 saw Fisher again transferred, this time a flight of note, from West Africa to the Indian theatre, by way of air fields in Palestine, Iraq, Muharak Island, Oman, Karachi, Jodhpur, Allahabad and eventually finishing in Dum Dum, for his most notable posting with No. 176 Squadron, which would last until April 1944. Over the coming years, Fisher would notch up a most impressive score of Ops in all weathers and over all terrain. He found himself running patrols, co-ops with a myriad of units and scrambles when required. On 8 June 1943, a hair-raising flight earnt him a Commendation from his Wing Commander: 'On June 8th 1943, Pilot Officer (then Sergeant) H. Fisher, had the starboard engine of his Beaufighter fail completely, as a result of a connecting rod failure. He executed a single engine landing without damage. At the start 1944, he flew no less than 4 times on 10 February: 'Scramble - Ops Room Panic.NFT.Patrol. NAF Peninsula.Scramble. Visuals on 2 Bogeys. Both Dakotas at 120mph at 2,000! 'On 13 February he flew a 'rhubarb' on Mandalay, Anisakan and a scramble, but 'bandit, too far away' on Valentine's Day - clearly no love lost with the enemy. In April, young Fisher was given Command of a Detached Flight from his Squadron, which gained praise from Air Vice-Marshal S. F. Vincent, from HQ 221 Group, RAF India. Vincent was the only Pilot to have shot down an enemy aircraft in both World Wars and wrote to Fisher on 4 April 1944: Congratulations on the very satisfactory results obtained by shooting down the two Japs last night. I am particularly pleased that this has happened after the moving of the G.C.I. to what was expected to be not so good a site as before. This, however, is apparently good enough for you to get such a good night's score.'A telegram followed from Group Captain Boyd, the OC of No. 176 Squadron: CONGRATULATIONS KEEP IT UP. Fisher departed India on 6 June 1944, reaching home on 7 July, in order to go up to No. 3 Flying Instructor School and thence 54 OTU, Charterhall, Berwickshire. He passed on his skills and assessed the next generation of Pilots from September 1944-June 1945, being demobilised on 5 March 1946. His family recall:'Jim never spoke much about his time as a quest of the Japanese except to recount the odd tale. The only one I remember is having been caught stealing eggs from the kitchen. He faced down the Guard by suggesting that he would lose face if found to have been insufficiently vigilant! In doing so he escaped the most serious of punishments...We do know. however, that he was severely beaten particularly on the back and legs. He also said that from Funatsu he saw one of the Atom bombs explode. Having been liberated, Gardner returned to Malaya and forged a successful rubber business. He married Joan Marjorie Joseph - who was nearly two decades his junior the daughter of a wealthy Anglo-Indian tin mining family. Living at Rasa, Selangor, they lived a very comfortable life, owning racehorses and travelling widely. Whilst there, they became friends with the communist leader Chin Peng who had tried to convert them to his cause without luck. Indeed, it was upon his very estate that the infamous Batang Kali massacre took place on 12 December 1948. On independence, they elected to retire to England. More raids followed, often on German rail links although Coombes was present for the massive raid on Nuremburg on 2 January 1945. They did not always have things their own way with Coombes noting in his logbook after a raid over Wanne Eickel '48 flakholes cat a/c'He later flew during the bombing of Dresden on 13 February 1945, the first of several raids on that city. Coombes continued to serve flying on a number of raids, replacing the Mid-Upper gunner in several but largely flying in his accustomed 'Tail End Charlie' post. Raids in late March around Wessel were launched to aid in General Montgomery's crossing of the Rhine. A fortnight after the Wessel raid Coombes found himself over Kiel where he again tangled with a IU. 88. His final raid was the Kiel U-Boat vards on 13 April 1945 with a note in his logbook simply stating 'done a wizard shoot-up of groupies office'. Joining the Civil Air Guard Elliott was posted to the Air Transport Auxiliary during the war, qualifying with a rating of 4-plus which allowed him to fly with a wide range of aircraft. In this capacity he was to fly as a Ferry Pilot from June 1942, during which time he met a number of famous pilots including Jim Mollison, whose record breaking 1936 flight from New York to London was achieved in only 19 hours. When asked what he felt like by a reporter he was famously to respond 'A scotch and soda'. Notably Elliot was also acquainted with Stanley Orton Bradshaw, whose work as an aviation journalist and later paintings still survive today. Unlike many civilian pilots he was selected to fly aircraft over North-West Europe during the Allied campaign there with his first flight being to Brussels on 27 September 1944 flying freight for Transport Command. He continued to make such flights often delivering replacement aircraft including, in January 1945, Mosquito and a Spitfire to Ameins and Brussels respectively. As the armies advanced so did Elliot's range and by April 1945 he was making deliveries as far as Holland. By the closing of hostilities his flying hours came to over 800. With the closure of the A.T.A. in 1945 he was one of those chosen to keep flying with No. 41 Group as a continuity pilot, with his flying hours by the end of his career apparently reaching 2,000. Elliot notably had 61 different types of aircraft under his belt including a Vampire jet which he delivered to No. 247 Squadron on 21 March 1946. Eagle on 10 August 1940. He flew a number of missions with her most notably in November when he was engaged in attacking Italian shipping and submarines with torpedoes with No. 824 Squadron. Clarke shared in the sinking of the German blockade runner M.V. Elbe on 6 June 1941 and later spent time search for the Windhoek though it was not found. Regular sweeps for German and Italian Ships took the carrier through the coast of Africa and into the Atlantic although little was found. Posted to H.M.N.Z.S. Leander in early 1942 when that ship was stationed in the Pacific. Patrol throughout May 1942 proved successful if dangerous work with notes in Clarke's logbook referring to 45 minute duels with submarines and surface craft. Patrolling off Guadalcanal in September 1942 Clarke transferred to R.N.Z.A.F. Hobsonville on 15 November.Returning to sea on 19 February 1943 after service at Hobsonville Clarke was appointed Air Staff Officer with 772 Squadron aboard the Merchant Aircraft Carrier Ancylus. He sailed with this vessel from its launch until 22 August 1945 when he became Air Staff Officer with H.M.S. Nabthorpe.Clarke was the rest of the war out ashore, later serving as Operations Officer at the R.N.A.S. station at Eglinton on 5 May 1947. Promoted Lieutenant-Commander on 17 June 1949 he remained in the Royal Naval Air Service until 1954. While he was serving Austin trained as a pilot, being awarded his Aero Certificate on 14 June 1946 at Gosport. Posted to R.N.A.S. Lossiemouth at Fulmar with 766 Squadron he was promoted Lieutenant (Pilot) on 16 January 1948. While here he suffered his first prang, the dive hood disintegrating mid-flight causing injury to Austin who was forced to jettison. Joining 804 Squadron aboard H.M.S. Glory on 27 July 1950. Only two days later he suffered his second accident, a forced landing following a loss of power with brought him down at Derna. Austin was unhurt but the cab of his Sea-Fury was written off. Entering the Korean War with Glory, Austin served with them until 8 August 1950 when he transferred to 807 Squadron aboard H.M.S. Ocean. During this time Austin continued to fly Sea Fury's, notably he is pictured in a copy of Korea - From Prop to Jet with his aircraft, which had previously been flown by Lt. Peter Carmichael as is denoted by the MiG Kill marking on the aircraft's side. The air war over Korea was a difficult affair for the UN forces, attempting to intercept fast moving MiGs before they bought down the American B-29 bombers. Nevertheless Austin performed well, being 'mentioned' on 9 July 1951 and seeing service on Theseus. With the end of hostilities in 1953 Austin was posted back to Britain with R.N.A.S. Culdrose and served in a variety of postings with a number of units including 738 Squadron and 891 Squadron. Stationed at Yeovilton he learned to pilot Sea Vampires, suffering yet another accident while here when on 12 November 1954 he flew into a flock of starlings on take-off. Promoted Lieutenant-Commander on 16 January 1956 he was appointed commander of 1832 Squadron on 12 July 1956 flying Sea Vampires out of R.N.A.S. Ford. The Squadron was disbanded on 10 March 1957. Leaving the Navy Lists that year Austin appears to retire at that stage, later seeing service with the Sultan of Oman's Royal Air Force which formed two years later in March 1959; sold together with an 804 Squadron badge in silver-gilt and enamel with 'J. Commissioned Sub-Lieutenant on 15 January 1922 he was posted to H.M.S. Lowestoft before attending a promotion course at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich between September 1924- January 1925. Blandy, 2-9th Gurkha Rifles 23-2-17 3-12-17'; India General Service 1908-35, 2 clasps, North West Frontier 1908, Waziristan 1919-21 (2nd Lt. R. Blandy 1st Rl. M. Fus:); British War and Victory Medals, with M.I.D. oak leaves (Capt. R. Blandy.); Dehli Durbar 1911, mounted court-style as worn by Spink & Son, minor contact marks, good very fine (5)M.C. London Gazette 25 August 1917. Second Award Bar to M.C. London Gazette 11 January 1919: For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty [in early December 1917]. He commanded with great ability a patrol which, under the fire of the enemy, discovered after dark a ford over the [Diyala] river by which troops crossed on the following night. But for his intrepid action the troops would not have been able to cross. Raleigh Blandy was born on 22 May 1884 at Madeira, a scion of the famous Blandy family that controlled the Madeira Wine and Shipping trades. Commissioned into the Indian Army on 29 August 1906, he served with the 1st Battalion, Royal Munster Fusiliers during the Mohmand campaign 1908 before transferring to the 2nd Battalion, 9th Gurkha Rifles. In December 1911, his unit, as part of the Dehra Dun Brigade, took part in the Coronation Durbar in Delhi (Medal). From April-October 1913, he commanded a group of 11 Gurkhas who were signallers assigned to the Triangulation Survey Party in the Pamirs. Promoted Captain on 29 August 1915, during the Great War he served with his unit in Mesopotamia from late September 1916. The crossing of the River Tigris was to be the Battalion's first operation in the face of the enemy; they only arrived in the forward area a fortnight earlier and not previously been under fire. Additionally, a large proportion of the Gurkhas were young soldiers, in reality mere boys, who had only been enlisted since the outbreak of the Great War.For the 14th Division to force a crossing over the River Tigris, its 37th Brigade was tasked to deploy a covering force on the opposite bank to secure a bridge-head, so as to allow a pontoon bridge to be built across the River. Blandy and his comrades were one of three Battalions to undertake the crossing, along with the 2nd Battalion, Norfolk Regiment and the 1st Battalion, 2nd Gurkha Rifles. Each of the Battalions were to be ferried across in pontoons, approximately one Company lift at a time, to three separate landing points. The Tigris had an average width of 400 yards and at the time was swollen with flood water and a strong current. The 2nd Battalion began its first Company crossing in pontoons, crewed by soldiers of the 1/4th Battalion, Hampshire Regiment, under the command of a Major George Campbell Wheeler, just before first light. Halfway across, it started to come under enemy fire, which became more intense as the boats approached the shore. Having disembarked the Company, which now fought its way inland to establish a foothold, the pontoons returned for the next Company lift, to be commanded by Captain Blandy, However, because of enemy shell fire and the strong current, only six of the original thirteen pontoons were able to make the return to lift Blandy's Company for the second crossing. These again came under intense enemy fire as they crossed, during which Blandy was hit twice in the sleeve of his jacket. Just as he disembarked, he was wounded in the abdomen, but the bullet fortunately was deflected by his belt buckle. With only one and half Companies ashore, a loss of all its boats and the intensity of enemy fire, the remainder of the Battalion were now diverted to an alternative crossing route, which had been established by 2nd Norfolks virtually unopposed. By mid-afternoon all three Battalions were across the Tigris and digging-in, allowing the pontoon bridge to be laid for the remainder of the Division to cross. During the day the unit had captured some 200 prisoners, at a cost of 107 casualties to include seven British officers, two of whom were killed.For this action, Major Wheeler was awarded the Victoria Cross and Blandy added the M.C. to his laurels. It also became the 2nd Battalion's seminal Battle Honour for The Great War. The 2nd Battalion continued to serve in Mesopotamia until February 1919, when it returned to India. Besides the Bar to his M.C., Blandy was also twice 'mentioned' (London Gazette 15 August 1917 & 12 March 1918, refers). In May 1918, he transferred to the newly-raised 4th Battalion, 11th Gurkha Rifles as a Company Commander, which proceeded to take part in the final Palestine campaign, and continued to serve with them until their disbandment in India in late 1919. Returned to the 9th Gurkhas, Blandy was promoted Major on 29 August 1921 and by 1927 was serving with the Burma Military Police. He returned to his unit in 1928 and was appointed Second-in-Command, served with in the Malakand. Promoted Lieutenant-Colonel on 3 June 1932, he commanded the 2nd Battalion from 1932 until his retirement on 1 January 1935. This included a two-year tour in eastern Bengal in support of the civil authorities who were facing unrest, before returning to Dehra Dun to hand over command. In retirement, he returned to his home in Wales with his wife, Lorna (née Lloyd), whom he had married in 1922, where they lived in Carmarthen. After the Second World War, he joined the newly formed Regimental Association, but in later years resigned due to blindness. He carried out a difficult and important task with great coolness and judgment.'Gordon Harley was born at Cardiff, Glamorgan on 19 January 1892, the son of John and Clara Harley and nephew of the artist Henry Stephen 'Hal' Ludlow. He was working as an Assistant Chief Civil Engineer and living at Redlands Road, Penarth prior to enlisting on 13 August 1914 with the 13th (Kensington Rifles) Battalion, County of London Regiment. Later joining the Monmouth Regiment and being commissioned into the Royal Engineers with the rank of 2nd Lieutenant on 18 December 1915. Harley entered the war in France in May 1916 with 92 Field Company and committed his act of gallantry during the Battle of Passchendaele in October 1917. Remaining in action until the Battle of Albert 1918, he was wounded in the right foot by a gunshot and taken to 72 General Hospital on 5 June 1918. Returning to the front on 27 September Harley served with No. 439 Field Company until the end of the war. After the war he entered the Civil Service and began work for the Ministry of Labour and National Service. He was awarded the M.B.E. in the New Years Honours List 1954 for his work as Training Service Officer II. Harley died in January 1981 at London. John Alexander Wiseman was born at Newington, Edinburgh in 1895 and worked as a surveyor. He also joined the 5th (Territorial Force) Battalion, The Royal Scots on 9 October 1912. Embodied for service on 5 August 1914 he was appointed Lance-Corporal after the outbreak of war on 10 October 1914.Promoted Orderly Room Sergeant on 11 June 1915 Wiseman's service records states that he entered the war in France on 31 August 1916; unusually his M.I.C. tells a different story stating that his entry was in December 1916. Returning home for training as an Officer Cadet he was appointed 2nd Lieutenant with the Welsh Guards on 27 June 1917. Returning to France on 12 December 1917 with the 1st Battalion Welsh Guards, Wiseman was not quick to endear himself to the unit. A letter from his Battalion commander to the Officer Commanding 3rd Guards Brigade states:'[...] he is not only a bad example but a menace to his platoon.'A response from General Matheson, commanding the Guards Division at the time, states:'I consider that he is unfit to be an officer as he is absolutely unreliable. I do not recommend him to be employed as an officer in any capacity. Wiseman was dismissed from service although that did not end his entanglement with the War Office, as is displayed in a letter he wrote to them on 20 March 1919, in which he states that he would not agree to an interview on the ground that he had been demobilised. He further added that he had served ten weeks as an instructor to the newly-arrived American troops on the Front, and that he did not see how an incompetent officer would have been granted such a positon. The drama went no further however, as Wiseman was to resign his commission with the Special Reserve on 30 March 1920 in a telegram sent from Kejang, Selangor, Malaya signed '2nd Lieut. J. A. The Pipes of War offers further detail: 'During the fighting at Longueval in July 1916, although a man of sixty years of age, Pipe Major Aitken, at his own request, acted as Orderly to the Commanding Officer for the whole day; he was ultimately wounded. He was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal for conspicuous gallntry on this and many other occasions. Thomas Aitken was born on 10 December 1860 and his entry in The Thin Red Line of March 1934 perhaps gives the best account of his career: 'One of the most interesting and well known personalities in the piping world today, is this grand old veteran of 83 years of age. He holds a distinguished and wonderful record of service in the Army, and is one of the few pipers left to-day who sounded the onset of pipes at the famous charge of the Highland Brigade at the Battle of Tel-el-Kebir, in 1882. Pipe-Major Aitken joined the 57th Brigade at Perth in 1879, and later joined the Pipe Band of the 42nd Highlanders at Parkhurst, Isle of Wight, proceeding to Aldershot in 1880. The Band and Pipers of the 42nd and 71st were present at the 'Wet Review' in 1881, and played the Volunteers past the saluting base. In the same year Aitken was piper with the Guard of Honour of the 42nd at Ballater, and owing to trouble in Egypt, he was recalled from there to rejoin his Battalion for active service. He was present at all the battles in Egypt between the years 1882 to 1885, and holds Medals for Tel-el-Kebir, Elteb, Tania, Kirbican Medal and Star (5 clasps on Medal). In 1886 Aitken was transferred to the 93rd Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders as Pipe-Major, and later joined the Highland Borderers, Stirlingshire Militia. During the South African War he was Pipe-Major of the 3rd Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders. He went to France with the First Hundred Thousand, as Pipe-Major of the 10th Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders under Colonel MacKenzie of Ord. The gallant Pipe-Major pawkily remarked of the great change from the old system of warfare: In the old days we would march to meet the enemy, but in France he was always at the door.'At the Somme he was wounded three times in one day. At the end of 1916 he was invalided and received the D.C.M., in all he holds eight decorations; D.C.M., 3 Great War Medals, South African Medal (2 clasps), Egyptian Medal (5 clasps), Egyptian Star and Long Service Medal. Pipe-Major Aitken is an active member of the A. and S. H. Club in Glasgow.'During the Great War Aitken served in France with the 10th Battalion from 11 May 1915 and it was on 14 July 1916 at Longueval that the unit were thrown into the attack of the 26th Brigade. It was recalled: Where we were the brunt of the action fell on two New Army Battalions of historic Highland Regiments. Their advance was one of the most magnificent sights I have ever seen. They left their trenches at dawn, and a torrent of bullets met them. They answered immediately with the shrill music of the pipes, and, indifferent apparently to the chaos around them pushed steadily on towards their objective. 'Another observer with his unit recalled: 'We came under a blistering hot fire but the men never hesitated. In the middle of it all the pipes struck up "The Campbells are coming", and that made victory a certainty for us. We felt that whatever obstacles barred our path they had to be overcome...the last fight was the worst of all. It was at the extreme end of the village, where the enemy had possession of some ruined houses. They had a clear line of fire in all directions, and we were met with a murderous hail of fire. Then a piper sprang forward, and the strains broke out once more. The attacking line steadied and dashed at the last stronghold of the Huns. Their line snapped under our onslaught. 'Aitken himself was in the thick of the action and was wounded in the action. The War Diary recorded he was finally admitted to hospital on 27 July having been: '... continuously through the battle and previous operations attaching himself as personal Orderly to the CO, never leaving his side except to carry messages. By his gallant action Rifleman Lalbahadur Rai undoubtedly stopped the enemy from attacking his platoon at a time when their ammunition was very low.'Lalbahadur Rai was from Khoku in the No. 5 East Distict. 'Kevin' Walsh, 22nd Special Air Service Regiment, who saw service with both 'B' and 'D' Squadrons; formerly 1st Battalion, Parachute Regiment, Walsh completed a tour of Cyprus with Support Company of 1 PARA in 1958, before going on to forge a career which saw him become a Special Forces legend, despite being only just over 5 ft tall and 'advertising all those well known features that led him to being christened "the Airborne Wart" Oman, Peace Medal, with Sultan's Operational Award emblem upon riband; General Service 1918-62, 1 clasp, Cyprus; General Service 1962-2007, 4 clasps, Borneo, South Arabia, Dhofar, Northern Ireland; Army L.S. & G.C., E.II.R., Regular Army, mounted court-style as worn, some polishing and tarnishing otherwise good fine and better (4)As part of 18 Troop with 'D' Squadron in Borneo between July and September 1966, during the "Claret' operations, Walsh would go down in SAS history for his part in what became known as the Koemba Ambush, when as part of a four-man patrol under "Lofty" Large, and along with Pete Scholey and Paddy Millikin, he penetrated the furthest into enemy territory in order to attack shipping on the Koemba River which was supplying Indonesian forces. This was a mission accomplished by crossing extreme terrain through jungle and swamp, in the most hostile of environments - not even taking into account the armed enemy trying to thwart their every move.Later in Aden in 1967 - as part of 18 Troop with "Lofty" Large - his sense of humour came to the fore in a troop 'of which he was a character amongst a great bunch of characters'. Another member of the Troop, Keith Farnes, would later recount: 'Shooting came from the distant jebel. Patrol grovels in dust except for Lofty who stands there (all 6' 4" of him) saying that these guys couldn't hit a barn door from the inside and Kevin screeching: "We know Lofty, but in missing you they might hit me. Get down you fool". Too close for comfort it may have been, but on a tour of southern Oman during the 'Secret War' in Dhofar against the Adoo Rebels, with the imminent departure of his own 'B' Squadron, he was tasked with remaining on two weeks to help 'G' Squadron settle in. As such he was tasked with re-occupying a very high risk position known as 'Tawe a Tair', a position for which the Adoo would put up a fierce resistance. Walsh had previously spent two weeks at 'Tawe a Tair', and was tasked with the reoccupying of the position as he knew the area. To accompany him were two local Firquas, who were surrendered enemy soldiers subsequently retrained by the SAS to fight against the units they had left. As Farnes recalls: "Kevin had no problem with the two week extension of his tour; the problem arose when he was told that he'd have two Firquas with him. "Is that two platoons, Sir, or two companies?" he asked. "Neither," replied the squadron commander. "You'll have two leading scouts from the Firquas!" "Two blokes?" Kevin went berserk. "What do you mean, two blokes? No way! I wouldn't want to lead on that position with two brigades." Nevertheless he successfully did it and then beat off an enemy attack through his superb skill with a mortar. Farnes recalled: "Kevin took command of the mortar and, yelling fire instructions and adjustments, he directed a rain of deadly-accurate high explosives on his opposite number The exchange continued until the Adoo were seen to be withdrawing, carrying with them a number of wounded. 'G' Squadron retained possession of 'Tawe a Tair.'" However on his fourth tour of Oman in 1971, Walsh was wounded by machine-gun fire, in a painful yet also hilarious incident, in the defence of a position known as Pork Chop Hill'. Farnes again recalls: "Kevin's group was settling into a new position, going about the business of setting up its base camp, when suddenly the rocks and dust around their feet were spat into the air as their position was raked with machine-gun fire. The men dived for the cover of their sangars, getting their heads down and shouting to each other to establish from where the incoming rounds were being fired. Where were the Adoo? Kevin had a more immediate problem than finding out where the Adoo were. He needed to get himself under cover. He was nowhere near a sangar (although he later always maintained that he couldn't get into one because they were all full of officers), so dived behind a stack of jerry cans. Cover from view, howe as any infantryman will tell you, is not cover from fire. A jerry can full of water might be enough to stop a bullet. Unfortunately, the jerry cans Kevin was hiding behind were all empty. He was hit in the arse. Kevin was carried to a casevac helicopter, complaining bitterly not about his wound, but about the idiot medic who had left a morphine syringe sticking into his bum. Word quickly got around that the "airborne wart" had been wounded and exactly where that wound was situated. Kevin was far from pleased about that. When one ranking officer paid a visit to the hospital he commiserated with Kevin about having been shot in the arse. Kevin could stand it no more. "Listen, Sir." he hissed. "I've told everyone else and now I'm telling you - it's not my arse it's my upper thigh!" An SAS NCO who was on hand quickly stepped in to explain: "What you have to understand, Sir, is that Kevin's arse starts at the back of his neck and goes all the way down to his ankles..."A couple of tours in Northern Ireland followed during the early to mid 1970's, as well as a number of 'operations' in Germany with the 'Berlin Brigade' during the Cold War, and he ultimately ended up serving for a period on the permanent staff of 'C' Squadron 21 SAS (TA), where he rose to the rank of Squadron Sergeant Major, before joining the Sultan of Oman's Special Forces as a Training Captain with the Jebali unit in Dhofar and taking part in the final operations against the Aboos during 1984, those very same rebels who had wounded him back 1971. Known as much for his antics and humour as for his prowess as a solider, having taken part in the Rolexsponsored trans-Africa expedition to a Regimental Study Day and stepped on stage and into the spotlight to the dramatic music from "Lawrence of Arabia", his presentation Rolex watch dangling from his wrist. "The Airborne Wart" had come home covered in glory; he rated it as one of his greatest moments of triumph. The Regiment took five minutes to stop laughing... After his death in 1986, his obituarist wrote: 'I know only this, and I am sure that it is a thought shared by all those privileged to know him: he undoubtedly filled the unforgiving minute with 60 seconds worth of distance run and the world will be a smaller place without him. He was a soldier, a character, a man's man (amazingly when liked him too!), and a great friend. The United States Air Force Distinguished Service Cross group of three awarded to First Lieutenant C. B. Hux, 367th Fighter Group, 394th Fighter SquadronUnited States of America, Air Force Distinguished Service Cross (1st Lt. Charles B. Hux A.C.), in its case of issue; Air Medal, with two bronze oak leaf clusters, in its box of issue; Purple Heart (Charles S. [SIC] Hux), in its case of issue, note the incorrect middle initial, gilt and enamel, overall good very fine (3)A.F.D.C. General Orders 17 December 1944, the original citation states: 'Charles B. Hux, 0-759016, First Lieutenant, AG, 367th Fighter Group. For heroic and outstanding achievement while participating in aerial flight in the European Theater of Operations. On 12 September 1944 Lt Hux led his flight of p-38 type aircraft with indomitable courage and brilliant flying skill on an armed reconnaissance mission over enemy occupied territory when he discovered a train carrying a large number of hostile personnel through a winding canyon. Despite the extreme hazards of low level flight in a canyon he led his men in repented attacks at tree-top level which resulted in the complete destruction of the train. Lt Hux's aggressive leadership and devotion to duty on this occasion reflect great credit upon himself and the Army Air Forces. Entered military service from Texas.'A.M. General Orders 6 July 1944.Charles B. Hux was born in Texas in 1923. Working as an Actor in Jim Wells, Texas he enlisted as a Private with the Air Corps on 5 January 1923 at San Antonio. Stationed at the Third Army Air Forces Flying Training Detachment in King City, California, Hux's 'King's Log'- an annotated booklet covering this period-speaks to his experiences during this period. Entering the war with 367th Fighter Group, 394th Fighter Squadron, with their main roll being close air support for ground troops, though they were never shy about engaging enemy aircraft as A Hero's Tale by Jack T. Curtis makes clear: This proved to me that our planes and pilots were much better thanthe [SIC] Germans. I have two very good friends who were FW 190 pilots who engaged our Group on 25 August 1944. We lost 5 P38s and they lost 2/3 of their 40 FW190s on that day. A good friend of mine, Larry "Scrappy" Blumer got 5 plans in less than 15 minutes making hime [SIC] the fastest "Ace in a Day". 'Awarded the Oak Leaves for his Air Medal on 21 July while still a Second Lieutenant Hux was promoted before December when he was awarded his second Oak Leaves as well as the A.D.F.C. The 394th Squadron was engaged in the Battle of the Bulge, escorting supply drops around Bastogne and launching ground attack missions. At this time German air attacks became more common with one aircraft 'Bed-Check Charlie' regularly buzzing their airfield. Hux himself was almost caught out by this as The Dynamite Gang by Richard Groh makes clear, stating: Occupying one of the 394th's sheet metal outhouses one night, he heard the sound of engines, and guessed that Charlie was making his rounds again. The engines grew louder, but did not bother Hux. Why the hell would they want to bomb an outhouse? Just then a half dozen machine gun rounds whizzed through his corrugated castle miraculously missing him. "Good God! This is not place to die!" he thought, and scrambled outside to one of the shelters. By the time he reached it, Charlie was already miles away. Later while flying a bombing mission over Frankfurt the 394th were the target of enemy flak. Hux took a direct hit, which blew out the canopy of his aircraft and set fire to the cockpit. He managed to bail out but lost consciousness before opening his parachute. Due to go on leave, he had cancelled it rather than leave the squadron to see out the final months of the war. Notably many of the documents dealing with his death refer to him as 'Charles S Hux', several even have a handwritten correction to the initial. Hux's body was never found and he is commemorated at the Luxembourg American Cemetery, Luxembourg; sold together with an original pilots log book, King's Log and Army Air Force badge along with original photographs and General Order's relating to the recipient's awards with copied research including census data, articles on 394th Fighter Squadron and 367th Fighter Group and personal records. Posted to 801st Squadron- part of the 13th Army Air Force- in the Pacific. Here Ruggiero was served at Guadalcanal and New Guinea, evacuating casualties from war zones and flying with them to safe spots behind the lines. Her obituary relates a story told by her sister, stating: 'On one of her flights, Ms. Ruggiero's aircraft became disabled and had to be ditched in the Pacific, forcing occupants to climb into a lifeboat to reach safety'In spite of the dangers of this role Ruggiero excellent, reaching the rank of Captain in short order. Returning to America on 18 November 1945 she remained in service until 10 February 1946 before being demobilised at Fort Des Moines, Iowa. Ruggiero went on to work as a teacher and nurse, dying at Mercy Fitzgerald Hospital on 3 August 2000; sold together with a file of copied research including census data, pension records and a copy of the recipient's obituary as well as an original photograph album also containing a nursing badge, riband bar and patches for 9th Army Air Force and 13th Army Air Force.
