Much to his chagrin however, Solon named someone else. When pressed again Solon did not even rank Kroisos in his top three. Solon's scorn for his wealth clearly annoved Kroisos who subsequently dismissed him "thinking him a great fool". All Solon had pointed out was that his wealth did not mean a lot given the mutability of fate and the fickleness of the gods something that was to prove remarkably true a few years later when Kroisos' kingdom had fallen to the unstoppable expansion of Cyrus.Kroisos' name has always been synonymous with extreme wealth. Not only taking advantage of his father's wealth and bounteous tax revenues, Kroisos proceeded to expand his kingdom even capturing lucrative prizes such as Ephesus. Much of his wealth seems to have derived from the extensive natural resources of his territory not least the river Pactolus, the legendary river in which King Midas washed in to lose his powers. Electrum was abundant in the alluvial deposits of the silt in this river. Midas' legacy. With vast quantities of electrum so readily available, it is perhaps unsurprising that Lydia became the first place to produce a coinage. Herodotus, in his sketch of Lydian nomoi (customs) could claim "They were the first men whom we know who coined and used gold and silver currency; and they were the first to sell by retail". Herodotus was not entirely correct, not least because the original coins were first in electrum as they were unable to separate the silver and the gold. Striking most likely begun under Kroisos' father Alvattes, and by Kroisos' reign Staters and their fractions were produced in gold and silver. XRF analysis of the surface of this Stater reads at an impressive 97.3% gold with the silver content reduced to a mere impurity of a little over 1%. Bullion had long been used a convenient medium of exchange - however, it was the crucial involvement of the state and the stamping of bullion which made this currency truly innovative. The League was a federal state, a sympoliteia, with Olynthus seemingly being the dominant city as the largest town within the league. Herodotus claimed there existed a feeling of kinship and unity on the Chalcidian peninsula, and Olynthus, founded as a joint colonial venture from a number of related Chalcidian cities, no doubt strengthened this union. The league formed at the start of the Peloponnesian war when they took the opportunity to break away from the Athenian lead Delian league, by then in effect, Athens' empire. Their coinage, produced at Olynthus, boldly proclaimed their independence in an era where the whole Greek world went to war with eachother. Their identity as Chalcidians, prominently declared on the reverse, perhaps reflects also a prior ethnic unity and tribal identity not merely the invented product of an expedient secession. Nor did this prominence emerge ex nihilo - as the 'Aegina Treasure' has revealed, the island was already well connected with the Minoans in the Bronze Age. Owing to its prominent position on major shipping arteries, it is perhaps unsurprising that they emerged as one of the earliest and most prominent mints in Greece proper in the 6th century. By 550, production of the famous 'sea-turtle' staters had begun on the island with its coins being spread far and wide by its merchants from Magna Graecia to the Black Sea. The perceived antiquity of Aegintine coins was captured by the Greek scholar from Naukratis, Julius Pollux in the 2nd century AD who claimed in his Onomasticon that Pheidon of Argos was the first of all to strike coins replacing the previously used 'spits', and he did this in Aegina. This was not necessarily the most common opinion both Xenophanes and Herodotus correctly attribute the Lydians with the invention - nevertheless it is undeniable that Aegintine coinage was both early and important and perceived as such in the Ancient world. The choice of the turtle design remains mysterious, however it may be connected with the most prominent cult on the island to Aphaia. Aphaia, a native goddess was closely associated with Artemis, a goddess who in other sanctuaries, especially at Orthia in Sparta, was connected with the turtle or tortoise, although the mythological background to this remains opaque. An epithet Artemis Chelitis is even mentioned by Clement, mostly likely morphologically connected to chelus the Greek word for turtle and tortoise. It is entirely possible that Aphaia too was associated with the animal especially as turtle shaped votives have been found at the sanctuary on the island.The success of the island, however, was not to last. The the the the the second se growing prominence of nearby Athens in the 5th century. Herodotus catalogued the increasingly strained relations - already by the 6th century Solon had legislated against Aegintine trade in Attica. Rivalry sparked sporadic outbreaks of war culminating in a crushing Athenian victory in 458 in the course of the 'First Peloponnesian war'. Aegina reduced was forced to pay tribute to Athens, before being humbled further during the major Peloponnesian war losing all autonomy. The dramatic decline of Aegina famously was reflected in its coinage. The turtle design was famously replaced with the tortoise, symbolic of the end of her naval power. I have left the wealthy lands of the Lydians and Phrygians, the sun-parched plains of the Persians, and the Bactrian walls, and have passed over the wintry land of the Medes, and blessed Arabia, and all of Asia which lies along the coast of the salt sea with its beautifully-towered cities full of Hellenes and barbarians mingled together; and I have come to this Hellene city first, having already set those other lands to dance and established my mysteries there, so that I might be a deity manifest among men." Euripides' Bacchae, 1-24.Dionysus was an epiphanic god. Appearing in Thebes in the guise of a man, he comes to destroy the house of Kadmos in revenge for their rejection of his divinity. This forms the plot of Euripides' final play. Pentheus, king of Thebes and Dionysus's cousin becomes the main target for his violent rejection of the Dionysiac mysteries. Dionysus first drove the women out of Thebes in a divine frenzy - they lived on Mount Cithaeron in this state on occasion even tearing animals apart in a Bacchic sparagmos. Pentheus, alarmed at the spread of this foreign god tries to deploy soldiers only for them to be repelled. The tyrant increasingly becomes more violent throughout the play, only for the disguised Dionysus himself to manipulate Pentheus into dressing up as a woman and climbing a tree to spy for himself on the maenadic activities. The predictable result is his own gruesome sparagmos at the hands of his own mother and aunt before the triumphal establishment of the Dionysiac mysteries in Thebes. Nominative determinism indeed for Pentheus whose name is linguistically connected to penthos the Greek word for grief. Dionysus clearly is no mere god of wine but represents something altogether a lot more sinister and hard to define. He embodies many paradoxes - he is a foreign eastern god whose came from India to, however, he was also born in Thebes the son of Semele (daughter of Kadmos). He was uniquely 'twice born' from his mother when she was struck by lighting by Zeus and then from Zeus after being sewn up into his thigh. His connexion to mystery cult and Orphic religious practices makes him one of the most complex Greek divinities. His confused status of both man and god, his trial before Pentheus and his later death and resurrection even make him a close parallel to the figure of Jesus. Afterall Dionysus had a peculiarly syncretic afterlife in early Christianity with Bacchic imagery populating Christian art. The Christian author Nonnos, who wrote the Metabole (a paraphrase of John's gospel) also wrote a major epic poem, the Dionysiaca, about the pagan god in over 20,000 lines.Dionysus remained, however, a distinctively Theban god, connected with the city through the very myth of his origin. One of the god's major cult centres was the sanctuary of Dionysus Lysios ('the deliverer') in the city around the mythical tomb of Semele, where Dionysus delivers the prologue in Eurpides' play. Her divine identity was really a personification of the word which could just be used as the noun for luck or chance. As a personification, she had a very slippery identity, but one which became increasingly popular and more tangible in the 4th century and the Hellenistic period. Cults to her popped up in most major Greek cities as she came to personify the very destiny of a city itself. Her popularity too was attested in literature, as she became a frequent character in Greek 'New' Comedy, albeit in an often in a malevolent role. In her role as the city goddess, she acquired her distinctive turreted crown. Statues of her as such became so popular that the sculptor Eutychides made a career of it at the end of the fourth century, enough to warrant an entry in Pliny. Smyrna typified this type of engagement - Tyche even became the city's main cult alongside her counterpart Nemesis. One of the city's main gates was even called the agathe Tyche (literally the 'Good Luck' gate). Ruling as a satrap of Caria, alongside his wife and sister, his kingdom occupied a curious position at the fringes of both the Greek and the Persian worlds. The famous Mausoleum especially has been identified as an exemplar of a cultural 'creolisation' in which Hellenic elements made by Greek sculptors adorned a monument distinctively carian in type. Such a monument is inconceivable without this cultural bilending - elements of two distinctive cultures were creatively combined to create something altogether unique. Such cultural bilingualism is too apaparent on Maussolos' coinage. First a general under Alexander I Balas, he surrendered Antioch to Ptolemy VI of Egypt during the civil war between Alexander and Demetrius II Nicator and offered him the throne. Ptolemy was forced to abandon this position out of fear of provoking Roman military intervention, and supporting Demetrius' claim, Tryphon de facto emerged on the side of Demetrius II. This, however, was not to last as he launched a rival bid for the throne by supporting Antiochus the five year-old son on Alexander, taking advantage of the lack of support for Demetrius in the army. By 144, Tryphon had defeated Demetrius installing Antiochus VI Dionysus as Seleukid king. Tryphon's fickle loyalties became apparent once more in 142 BC when the young king died under mysterious circumstances, facilitating Tryphon's more open power grab, styling himself as Tryphon Autokrator - literally 'self-ruler' a fitting title for such a duplicitous usurper. Needless to say, such a blatant epithet was never repeated and remains unique to Tryphon. Tryphon. the only successful extradvnastic Seleukid usurper, sought to distance himself from the dynasty highlighting this break in his coinage. Both portraiture with his flowing hair and the reverse type with the Macedonian helmet with its elaborate ibex-horn bear strikingly little resemblance to previous Seleukid coinage. His reign was, however, short-lived. In 138, he was defeated at Antioch, Dor and finally at his hometown of Apamea by Antiochos VII Sidetes, the brother of Demetrius II. Sometimes I am seen as I am now: sometimes I become a snake: or, again, the lead bull of the herd..."Achelous is one of the most intriguing characters in Ovid's Metamorphoses. In Book 8. Theseus takes shelter with the river god where Theseus' companions and the god discuss some of the most memorable metamorphoses in the book including Philemon's and Baucis' transformation into trees and the ever-hungry **Erysichthon.** There is, however, a final twist: Achelous himself is capable of metamorphosis as he reveals at the end of the book. We learn that he can transform himself into many forms including a man and a snake, however, it is his bull form which is his most important and famous. In the following book he goes on to narrate how he lost one of his horns in a fight with Hercules. Achelous in bull form is widely recognisable in Greek art oft appearing on Greek vases with his distinctive bearded old man's head oddly imposed onto bull's body. It is within this context we have to view the rather odd depiction of the 'man headed bull' on this Tetradrachm. It is not unsurprising that the Greeks conceptualised the gods associated with rivers as capable of a metamorphosis. Rivers were seen as inherently changing entities - Heraclitus after all had remarked 'you cannot step in the same river twice'. Artistic representation of these gods thus had many forms, but perhaps the most enduring was the bull. Achelous was the archetype of this, the most famous river god of all. The representation of rivers on coins commonly became this 'man headed bull', the distinctive iconographic marker of rivers. Gela proved no exception to this rule. In fact, the tauriform river gods were most commonly represented on coins in Sicily and Magna Graecia. The tauriform figures cannot be distinguished between one another - context and the legend are required to determine the river in question. In this case, Gela is proclaimed above identifying both the town and the river. Such a representation was especially apt for Gela, a town named after its major river. He collaborated with H.C. Russell. Director of Sydney Observatory, participating the 1874 Transit of Venus observations in Eden, and the later 1882 exhibiton at Port Macquarie, the town in which he worked as a bank manager, and founded an observatory that same year. Having fallen on hard times during the economic depression of the 1890s, Macdonnell resigned from the bank, sold his astronomical equipment and started again in Sydney. So Propertius thunders in his famous elegy about the corrupting influence of women. After a series of mythological examples, we get to the climax of Cleopatra and her corrupting influence over Mark Antony. Cleopatra comes last, seemingly outdoing all previous mythological examples. Propertius does not even have to mention either of their names for the reader to be fully aware of who he has in mind. Such was their infamy. The reality of this corrupting influence and the shame and scandal of it as presented by Propertius has been thoroughly challenged by historians, however, it is undeniable that Antony displayed a dramatic shift of allegiances whereby he ditched Octavian (the future Emperor Augustus) and aligned himself fully with Cleopatra. Lot 180, dating to almost a decade earlier, signals Antony's alliance with Octavian placing both of their portraits on the coin. The stability of this makeshift triumvirate was further underpinned by Antony's marriage to Octavia, Octavian's sister, in 40 BC. She too frequently appeared on his coins, both featured in individual portraits on the reverse and double portraits with Antony on the obverse. This denarius from 32 BC, however, marks the dramatic break. Gone is Octavian and Octavia - instead we find Cleopatra herself accompanied by bold royal titles. Antony himself appears in the legend without title save only for the rather optimistic claim that he conquered Armenia, the marginal victory he achieved in the broader context of his failed Parthian campaign. This represents a complete break with Roman tradition, despite the pair of portraits seeming rather conventional numismatically. The reference to the royal sons alarmingly referred to their two children, Alexander Helios and Cleopatra Selene (literally the Alexander 'the Sun' and Cleopatra 'the Moon'). These names not only defy Roman tradition, but they help to establish the notion of a royal dynasty of which Antony is the head. This royal ambition represented an existential threat to the Republic, at least according to Octavian and many of the writers of the period. Never before had Antony seemed less like a Roman Imperator and more like a foreign king. Antony appears 'un-Romaned' by Cleopatra, something which was ultimately played into Octavian's hands. After defeating the pair only, a year later at Actium, he could present himself as the sole defender and restorer of the res publica concealing his own transformation of the Roman state from democracy to autocracy. He even went so far as to plant laurel trees outside his house and purportedly even on occasion dressing as the god. His first major building project in Rome (started 36 BC) was to build the first temple of Apollo within the pomerium. This temple perhaps was the most significant of all of Augustus' building projects. Built next to his house on the Palatine hill and often used to host sessions of the senate, Augustus' temple was placed at the very centre of civic life even receiving mentions by Virgil, Tibullus and Horace. With this strong personal connexion to the god, it was fortuitous, or rather fated (as Augustus portraved it), that his most important victory at Actium in September 31 BC occurred at the site of a sanctuary of Apollo. The sanctuary of Apollo Actius was an old sanctuary dating to a time before the Corithian colonists settled at Actium. Its presence overlooking the battle was of course a total coincidence, however, it was clear proof to Augustus that providence was on his side. After the battle, he made much of this carefully restoring and expanding the sanctuary as well as completing and dedicating his own temple of Apollo Palatinus. Coins like this one were no mere passive invocation to the god, but with ACT crucially inscribed in exergue on the reverse it helped make Augustus' new regime seem part of some grand divine plan. Is it a denarius of Tiberius or even of Augustus? The Greek word used in the Bible is indeed 'denarion' which is highly suggestive of this. However, because of the total absence of these coin types from circulation in Judaea at this point alternatives have been proposed from Antioch, Cappadocia, and Tyre. A further textual complication comes from one of the Nag Hammadi Coptic texts, the non-canonical 'Gospel of Thomas'. In its 100th verse we once more find a rendition of the tribute penny story. Here, instead of the expected silver denarius we find reference to a gold coin. Therefore, could this Aureus of Tiberius too be considered a possible contender for the 'Tribute Penny'?Probably not. Attempts to work out the precise types of the coin held by Jesus that day are entirely futile not least because of the dates of composition of the gospels decades and generations after the life of Christ. Too many attempts have been made to make a particular coin fit with the story when the issue most likely is really a textual one. Stevenson (DRC) is scathing about Claudius' use of the type, remarking 'as if that most indolent and apathetic, if not most stupid, of Emperors ever did an heroic or humane action to merit the eulogy'. Not alone in his hostile view of Claudius, Seneca in his Apocolocyntosis writes that Claudius' voice belonged to no land animal, and that Hercules himself was a good deal disturbed at the sight of him, fearing a thirteenth labour was upon him.Despite the disdain of the Imperial family, it seems that from very early on the general populace respected Claudius. At Augustus' death, the equites chose Claudius to head their delegation. When his house burned down, the Senate demanded it be rebuilt at public expense. They also requested that Claudius be allowed to debate in the Senate.After the assassination of Caligula, Claudius was brought to the principate having had no preparation for the imperial role. His physical ailments had meant that he was not seen as a threat by potential enemies throughout the reigns of Tiberius and Caligula. Despite a lack of administrative experience Claudius did prove an able and efficient emperor, who improved upon Rome's infrastructure of roads, aqueducts and canals and increased the size of the empire. During his reign, Thrace, Lycia and Judaea were all annexed as Roman provinces, and the conquest of Britain was begun. Claudius' reign also is also notable for the centralisation and formalisation of imperial bureaucracy. Though portrayed by several ancient historians as lowbrow, bloodthirsty and cruel, guick to anger and too easily manipulated, Claudius' works present a very different view, painting a picture of an intelligent, scholarly, well-read, and conscientious administrator with an eve to detail and justice. Since the discovery of his 'Letter to the Alexandrians', much work has been done to rehabilitate Claudius' reputation. Besides his history of Augustus' reign, his major works were a twenty-volume history of the Etruscans and an eight-volume history of Carthage. Claudius is also noteworthy as being the last person known to have been able to read Etruscan. Such a marriage was taboo in the Roman world and caused great controversy at the time. The decision to form this incestuous union, however, was a pragmatic one. Claudius' previous wife, Messalina, had been executed the previous year by the Praetorian guard without trial. It was not uncommon for Imperial women to fall from favour and end up exiled, however, to be executed in such a manner was unprecedented. Messalina had seemingly conspired against Claudius going so far as to marry the senator Gaius Silius while Claudius was out of Rome in Ostia. The immediacy of the political threat necessitated an urgent response culminating in her summary execution by the Praetorians. Claudius would be told of his wife's death over dinner. Purportedly, he did not react and only asked his attendant for another glass of wine. At this point of crisis, Claudius needed a new wife, someone who could reinforce his imperial legitimacy and blot out the memory of his scandalous previous marriage. The answer was brought to him by one of his trusted freedmen. Agrippina, despite the incest, was the perfect candidate as daughter of Germanicus and granddaughter of Augustus. Claudius himself was had no blood relation to the first emperor, therefore such a marriage could cement his imperial legitimacy and reinforce the Julio-Claudian dynasty. It also had the advantage of preventing her from marrying another man who then might pose a threat to Claudius.After persuading the senate that the match was in the public interest, Claudius was soon married to his niece. Proclaimed Augusta the following year, Agrippina enjoyed remarkable prominence as empress. Her laureate portrait on the reverse of this coin to match Claudius' on the reverse almost presents her as a kind of joint ruler. Imperial women by this point were commonly featured on coins, however, this laureate portrait attests to a unique prominence. This prominence is well attested by the Roman historians who noted her elevated power. When Caractacus, king of the Catuvellauni was hauled before Claudius as a captive he bowed to both Claudius and Agrippina on the dais. Even a city was named after the Empress - Agrippinensium, modern day Cologne. Ever unfortunate in marriage, this one too ended in disaster. Agrippina, once she could ensure her own son's succession likely poisoned the elderly emperor's mushrooms. Nero thus became emperor, raised there through his mother's machinations. So, the god Janus remarks in Ovid's Fasti alluding to the Roman custom of the gates of the temple of Janus being shut at times of peace. When the gates are shut, Janus barricades war inside allowing the world to be at peace. This tradition went back to the very origins of the Republic when the temple was founded by Numa. Famously, the bellicosity of the Romans allowed the doors to be shut on only two occasions in the Republic, once in the time of Numa and again after the 1st Punic War. It was Augustus' famous closure of them after the Battle of Actium which became the third. His claim to have brought pax to the world lay at the very foundation of his new regime. The story, however, was a lie. Not just Augustus' claim that all wars were now over, but it seems to have been a 'tradition' which he seemingly invented. Nevertheless, the potent symbol of the closed doors would endure throughout the principate. The most famous of subsequent closures would be in the reign of Nero after his Parthian wars as commemorated on this coin. It would be fair to call this Sestertius an act of Neronian propaganda. Nero invoked this 'Augustan' peace to celebrate the end of a war he did not actually win. From AD 58-63, a dispute over succession in Armenia had provoked the first military confrontation between the Romans and the Parthians since Mark Antony. Gnaeus Domitius Corbulo had waged the war on Nero's behalf. The highpoint of which saw Corbulo catapult the decapitated head of an Armenian noble directly into an Armenian assembly in the blockaded city of Tigranocerta prompting them to immediately surrender. Corbulo flattened Armenia removing the Parthian candidate for the Armenian throne, Tigranes. However, the subsequent Parthian counterattack saw many of Corbulo's successes reversed, and after the humiliating defeat at Rhandeia terms were reached. Tigranes would remain in power in Armenia, provided that he pretended to be the client king of Nero too. Needless to say, this was hardly a glorious victory. In his usual ironic tone, Tacitus mocked Nero's erection of trophies and arches on the Capitoline hill as Nero took advantage of general ignorance over the actual political situation. The war ended in 63, however this coin was not struck until 66 when Tigranes himself made the journey to Rome to swear his loyalty to Nero. The theatrics staged by this occasion were notorious, including stunts like the guiding of all the furniture in the theatre of Pompey. The celebrations started in Puetoli where Tigranes got to show off his skills by shooting buffalos in the arena. It was, however, the events in Rome which were to become legendary. Nero received Tigranes dressed up in the costume of the triumphator as the king of Armenia knelt before him pledging his loyalty. Artaraxa was even going to be renamed 'Neronia'. This coin, one of Nero's most famous issues, was struck for the occasion - a powerful declaration of universal peace, reminiscent of Augustus himself. The reverse type of the temple also serves as our best indication for what the temple of Janus actually looked like. So far, no archaeological remains and even its location is widely disputed. They maintained these symbols to be the almond-blossom staff of Aaron the High Priest, and the other side, a dish of the Manna which the Children of Israel were fed in the desert."So Nachmanides records his first encounter with Jewish revolt coins in his 12th century commentary on the Torah. The interpretation is not too far off- now we would say that they are pomegranates instead of almonds. The chalice for holding the Manna too could just be a bowl for holding the Omer in the temple. Nevertheless, both the obverse and reverse types are heavily connected to Jewish ritual in the temple itself. The coin fundamentally rejects Greek and Roman numismatic precedents in an effort to establish an inherently Jewish coinage. Such a coinage was uniquely suitable to their desperate break for freedom that began in AD 66. Roman abuses especially those committed by the overzealous procurator Gessius Florus had provoked the province to revolt in 66 BC. One of Florus' most notorious acts had been to steal most of the silver from the temple in Jerusalem. It is likely that these silver revolt coins were made from the little left over. As far as revolts went against the Romans, this one was remarkably successful. Cestius Gallus the governor of Syria swooped into crush the rebels only to have his legion routed and its eagle captured. Nero then ordered Vespasian to resolve the rapidly deteriorating situation with four legions. Vespasian and his son Titus would ultimately be successful, however the suicide of Nero and the subsequent civil war which saw Vespasian himself rise to the purple delayed them. Vespasian left his son to take Jerusalem itself, a notoriously bloody siege which lasted seven months. **Refugees fleeing the starving city were crucified around the walls** - at height of the siege the Romans carried out 500 crucifixions a day. The inevitable carnage at the fall of the city saw the immolation of the temple itself and would provoke the great diaspora for the Jewish people. The last pockets of rebels were cleared out of various forts up to AD 74. The last stand was made at the hilltop fort at Masada where, according to Josephus, rather than be conquered by the Romans the remaining 960 committed mass suicide. The victory for the Romans was total. The chalice represented on the Shekel likely too is represented on the triumphal arch of Titus among the many spoils of war shipped to Rome. There had not been a proper triumph in Rome for at least a generation. Augustus excluded individuals from triumphing outside the imperial family owing to the potential political threat. There were of course triumphs in the early principate -Claudius became a triumphator following the capture of Britian, however everybody really knew that the job was carried out by Aulus Plautius and Claudius had barely spent two weeks on the island. This could not be said of Titus, who conducted the siege of Jerusalem personally and brutally reduced the city. The spoils carried in the procession were reminiscent of the great triumphs of the republic. The scale of the spoils was even immortalised on the arch dedicated to Titus on the edge of the forum - an internal panel famously features Roman soldiers carrying spoils from the temple including the menorah. Such a conquest for the fledgling Flavian dynasty was a godsend. The civil war in which Vespasian secured power could be long forgotten, this was a triumph over a foreign enemy which put them alongside the heroes of the republic. Naturally, the capitalised on this as much as possible. Simon, styling himself as nasi "prince" of Israel, managed to establish an independent enclave in the province which held out for four years before being ultimately crushed by Hadrian's legions. Much like the Jewish war, coinage was struck with bold Zionist slogans proclaiming the freedom of Israel and Jerusalem. Israel was used in opposition to the Roman name for the province Judaea rejecting the Roman taxonomy altogether. Moreover, the legend was once more proclaimed in the paleo-Hebrew script, a form that no longer existed in common use. Israel's glorious Iron age past was invoked under the likes of King David. The boldness of this coinage did not stop at the legend alone. Far more unambiguous than the Jewish war, distinctively Jewish iconography is displayed to emotive effect. Jewish 'iconography' itself is a problematic category not least because of the command in Exodus 30:4 not to make graven images. Simon could not simply produce coinage with his face on in Hellenistic or Roman style. Nevertheless, the iconography deployed on his coinage is no less politically charged. The obverse features the Temple in Jerusalem which had been destroyed by Titus and his army 62 years previously. Two generations of Jews had passed with no focal point of their worship, many would not have even knew what the temple had looked like. Even more strikingly however, is the presence of the Ark of the Covenant in the temple. The Ark was already destroyed before the second temple - the image of the Temple invoked therefore is it at its very height. Much like the legend this is an aspirational statement. The temple site had long since become a Roman temple, and two years before the revolt, Hadrian had rebranded Jerusalem as Aelia Capitolina, a Roman colony. At the point where Jewish identity had been most eroded, the Bar Kokhba coins invoke a better age of the Jewish state and promise a restoration. The source of the metal for these coins is also striking. Unlike during the Jewish war where they were able to use up the temples silver supply, all of the Bar Kokhba coinage was overstruck. This gave the coins a negative fiduciary value - money was actually lost in the production of these coins. These coins, thus, were an entirely a political coinage, struck to get a message out. The hope of Jewish freedom and the establishment of Israel was of course all a pipe dream, not least because Simon never got anywhere near Jerusalem. There is even no real evidence that his coins even got that far. However, despite the failure these coins endured as emotive symbols of Jewish identity. Later hoards have been found which have included high value Roman Imperial gold and silver coins which also include some low value Bar Kokhba bronzes.One such hoard found in Te-omin Cave including a few pieces from the Jewish War and even a Hasmonean Bronze issue. The hunt for the Marousian lion would become legendary, Antinous almost died and had to be rescued by his lover who then finished the job killing the lion. The hunt was commemorated by a Greek poet who lived in Egypt, Pancrates, in epic Hexameters adopting a bold heroic tone as if Hadrian and his lover were Homeric heroes. An iconographic depiction of the hunt is even preserved on a tondo of the arch of Constantine (recycled from a previous Hadrianic monument). It may seem odd for one hunt to receive this much attention. This was no ordinary hunt however - a few weeks later one of its participants was to become a god. In October, Antinous drowned in the Nile under mysterious circumstances. Antinous' death has received much speculation both ancient and modern. Had he been killed by the emperor or was it a suicide? Cassius Dio even raises the possibility of a selfsacrifice to guarantee Hadrian's health. A death in the Nile after all was very significant in Egyptian religion, the very manner which the their god Osiris died. The precise circumstances can never be known, but we do know what happened next: Hadrian overcome with grief initiated one of the most elaborate apotheoses for his dead lover - Antinous was to become a god. The divine status of Antinous varied significantly depending upon the region. In most cases it was a Hero-cult an elevated status ambiguously positioned between man and god which was most often reserved for the mythological sons of gods. Antinous would also be syncretically worshipped combined with other deities including Osiris (the Egyptian god of the dead who was died also in the Nile), Hermes, and Dionysus. Evidence for his cult has been found in 70 cities across the empire with at least 28 temples dedicated to him. The success of the cult too is attested in the popularity of his portraiture: after Augustus and Hadrian himself, more images have been identified as Antinous than any other historical figure in antiquity. Stories such as the hunt of the Marousian lion became a mythology which defined his heroic status. This coin, minted in Alexandria only a few years after his death attests to the worship of this new god. Curious syncretisms play out: the obverse features Antinous wearing the Egyptian hem-hem; the reverse shows him as Hermes, one of the most common combinations - temples were even set up to Hermes-Antinous a temple as early as 131. This type of veneration was unique at this time in the empire. Outside and unrelated to the imperial cult this was an apotheosis that belonged to a different age. The murder of this rather lacklustre emperor brought about the most politically unstable halfcentury in Roman history, a near complete military anarchy in which the various imperial armies often proclaimed their own generals as emperor with the result being a near perpetual civil war. Maximinus Thrax was the first of these military men to be chosen, a rather vicious man, perhaps even of Gothic ancestry. With Imperial legitimacy now solely dependent on the military, the Imperial senate was exposed as nothing more than a charade. There was, however, one final senatorial attempt at relevance. Gordian, the 80-year-old governor of Africa, launched a revolt against Maximinus in the Spring of AD 238, crucially with the support of the disgruntled and sidelined senate. His revolt with his son was famously unsuccessful: after a conclusive defeat at the hands of Capelianus, the governor of neighbouring Numidia, his reign lasted a meagre 22 days. The senate however, emboldened by Gordian attempted to nominate the next emperors, a pair of senators prominent in the senatorial commission appointed by Gordian to deal with Maximinus in the west. Pupienus and Balbinus were selected as co-emperors, a curious and unique revival of something that approximated the old senatorial system, albeit with imperial titles. The Historia Augusta remarkably refers to this Imperial duo in republican terms going so far as to liken Pupienus to the stern Cato the Younger and the genial Balbinus to Julius Caesar. Co-emperors had of course existed before but always as an attempt at reinforcing and strengthening the dynasty. Never before had there been a pair of emperors of no relation who were not trying to establish a dynasty together. Such a power-sharing system would foreshadow the Tetrarchic system at the end of the century. This unique partnership is curiously attested on the coinage of the pair. This particular Antoninianus' reverse attests to this. Clasped hands on reverse types had appeared before usually advertising the concordia or the fides of the army. Thes types highlighted the bond between emperor and his soldiers. Here, however, there is strikingly no reference the army only FIDES MVTVA, the equal bond between the Pupienus and Balbinus themselves. This bond however was of course in reality rather flimsy. The Historia Augusta remarks "there was dissension, too, between Maximus and Balbinus - unspoken, however, and such as could be surmised rather than seen - for Balbinus scorned Maximus, as being humbly born, and Maximus despised Balbinus for a weakling". In fact, the two were perpetually paranoid that the other would try and usurp. Their supposed fides advertised on this coin was actually non-existent. Unsurprisingly the pair did not last long. After 99 days of rule, they were ousted by the praetorian guard and the military would choose the successor, the child grandson of Gordian. The senate's impotence and irrelevance was now undeniable, and the Empire sunk into decades of military anarchy where the sole route to imperial legitimation lay exclusively at the head of an army. Writing in Antioch in early AD 363 shortly before his ill-fated war of aggression against the Sasanian Empire Julian reflects on his own appearance remarking: "I myself out of sheer perversity and ill-temper have added to it this long beard of mine, to punish it, as it would seem, for this very crime of not being handsome by nature. For the same reason I put up with the lice that scamper about in it as though it were a thicket for wild beasts". Julian, not only describes how his beard differentiates himself from his peers in this new beardless Christian age, but his beard is foul with its lice infestation. Julian's seemingly bizarre self-mockery in the misopogon goes to the very heart of his self-positioning as an emperor seeking to establish himself as a pagan philosopher, a radically conservative positioning in a burgeoning Christian empire. Julian associated with philosophers throughout his life, studying Neoplatonism with Aedesius and later Maximus of Tyre - the later was even present for his final philosophical discussion as he lay fatally wounded after being speared at the Battle of Samarra. With his description of his own ugliness he implicitly compares himself to Socrates, who was notoriously ugly. The rather unpleasant description of the lice in his beard too serves to establish a philosophical pedigree indicative of the Cynic tradition with its focus on the repugnant body - the name Cynic even derives from the Greek for dog (cyon). Julian's beard became a crucial marker of his identity as a philosopher, and crucially as a pagan. The prominence of his beard on coins crucially differentiates himself from his Constantinian predecessors, not just physically, but establishes him ideologically as something very different. The beard on his coinage is no mere casual choice, but part of an active effort to define himself as something very different to his predecessors. The reverse type proclaims the virtus of the army a fitting message from a surprisingly militarily successful emperor who achieved notable victories in Gaul as Caesar, most famously the battle of Strasbourg.
