fineProvenance:Glendinning's November 1915.Glendinning's November 1939.Samuel Knee was born at Devizes, Wiltshire in 1792 and enlisted on 10 July 1808 with the 1st Battalion, 69th **Regiment of Foot. Joining his Regiment in the East Indies he** was here during the campaigns waged against French and Dutch held islands in the east between 1810-1811 which culminated in the capture of Java. They saw heavy fighting in the Battle of Cornelis in which the Battalion Commander, Lieutenant-Colonel McLeod was killed. Knee survived the fighting on Java however he did not escape the campaign unscathed. Found to be suffering from Ulcers he had his right leg amputated while returning from the campaign. The Waterloo Medal awarded to Saddler Sergeant A. Wallace, 2nd or Royal North British Dragoons (Scots Greys)Waterloo 1815 (Sad. Seri. Alex. Wallace, 2nd or R.N. Brit. Reg. Drag...), final part of unit under clip, good very fineAlexander Wallace was born at Mauchlin, East Ayrshire in 1779 and enlisted into the Scots Greys at Salisbury in March 1801. Promoted Saddler Sergeant on 1 April 1814, he served with the unit during the Waterloo campaign as part of Captain Barnard's Troop.Little more need be said of the part played by the Scots Greys at Waterloo: a French officer with the 3rd Division gave his account of their famed attack:'Just as I was pushing one of our men back into the ranks I saw him fall at my feet from a sabre slash. I turned round instantly - to see English cavalry forcing their way into our midst and hacking us to pieces. Just as it is difficult, if not impossible, for the best cavalry to break into infantry who are formed into squares and who defend themselves with coolness and daring, so it is true that once the ranks have been penetrated, then resistance is useless and nothing remains for the cavalry to do but to slaughter at almost no risk to themselves. This is what happened, in vain our poor fellows stood up and stretched out their arms; they could not reach far enough to bayonet these cavalrymen mounted on powerful horses, and the few shots fired in chaotic melee were just as fatal to our own men as to the English. And so we found ourselves defenceless against a relentless enemy who, in the intoxication of battle, sabred even our drummers and fifers without mercy.'An officer of the 92nd Highlanders gave his own abridged version: 'The Scots Greys actually walked over this column.'Finally, Napoleon himself was said to have commented: 'Ah, ces terribles chevaux gris (Those terrible grev horses)'.Stephen Wood, in his Illustrated History of the **Regiment took those words as his title whilst in 1881 Lady** Butler's epic oil 'Scotland Forever!' captured the sheer intensity of the action in fine style; that painting is housed at the Leeds Art Gallery.Wallace was discharged 'worn out' in June 1824, by this time aged 45; sold together with copied research. Waterloo 1815 (Thomas Tulet, 28th Regiment Foot), fitted with a contemporary silver straight-bar suspension, traces of lacquer, plugged and neat restoration around suspension, good fine and betterThomas Tulet served in Captain (Brevet Lieutenant-Colonel) Sir Frederick Steven's No. 9 Company during the Waterloo Campaign. The 28th (North **Gloucestershire)** Regiment of Foot served with much distinction in Belgium, fighting at both Quatre Bras on 16 June and at Waterloo itself two days later. Part of Major-General Sir **James Kempt's 8th Brigade**, on 18 June they were positioned around the centre of Wellington's line and consequently saw a great deal of heavy fighting - indeed, they were the only British infantry regiment mentioned in his Waterloo Despatch. Additionally, their part in the Battle of Ouatre Bras was later immortalised in a painting ('The 28th Regiment at Quatre **Bras'**, 1875) by none other than Elizabeth Thompson, Lady Butler, the Victorian artist of famous scenes from British military campaigns and battles.Sold together with a comprehensive file of copied research.Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. Posted almost immediately to South Africa for service in the Xhosa Wars he was not long with the unit but soon transferred to the Cape Mounted Riflemen on 8 March 1848. Appointed Corporal on 1 September 1849 he served in that rank for four years before being further advanced Sergeant on 1 November 1853. He was finally invalided as a result of dysentery on 31 June 1858, a period of service which would have seen him fight in the 7th and 8th Xhosa Wars. Thomas Rainsbury enlisted with the Royal Navy on 21 April 1828, being first posted to the sloop Orestes. Serving with her until 9 March 1831, he went ashore and remained their until being posted to the Battleship Asia on 5 July of that year and remaining with her until 23 July 1834. Posted to the third-rate Edinburgh on 20 August 1837 he remained with her for the next two years. during which she was on station in the Mediterranean.Rainsbury left Edinburgh just prior to her service in the Egyptian-Ottoman War, instead joining the aging fourth-rate Endymion on 22 October 1840. With this vessel he went into action during the First Opium War, while she commanded by Captain- later Admiral- Sir Frederick William Grey. Returning to England on 3 July 1843 he was discharged two days later on 5 July 1843. Grey was later a Greenwich Hospital Pensioner; sold together with a former auction listing, service record and a Greenwich Pensioners record sheet.Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. Cleary, 10th Foot, who survived the heavy fighting outside Mooltan only to die of wounds sustained during the Siege of LucknowPunjab 1848-49, 2 clasps, Goojerat, Mooltan (Michl. Cleary. 10th Foot.), minor contact marks, edge bruise, very fineMichael Cleary was in service with the 10th Foot by 1841, being stationed in the North of England. Posted to India prior to the Second Anglo-Sikh War, he saw heavy fighting with his **Regiment at the Siege of Mooltan. Both repelling sorties from** the garrison and facing house to house fighting through the city. They later joined General Gough's army for the Battle of Goojerat.Cleary remained in India, being stationed at Wazirabad in 1851. On the outbreak of the Indian Mutiny the **10th joined General Franks' column fighting their way towards** Lucknow. Joining with General Havlock's relief force they battled their way back into the city. Attesting with the Royal Artillery at Dover, Kent on 30 October 1860 as a Gunner he must have regretted his decision soon, deserting on **1** December. Having been caught and returned to service West transferred to the 51st Regiment of Foot on 1 December 1863.He served in the East Indies for a total of slightly over eight years, taking part in the Jowaki expedition while there. During this sortie three British columns drove the Jowaki back towards their capital of Jemmu, taking the town they brought the tribe to peace talks but British conditions were refused. The expedition was a success however the conflict never officially ended.West requested his discharged at Umbeylla in 1880 and returned to Britain where he was discharged at Netley on 29 March 1881. He listed his intended place of residence as North Morton, Near Wallingford, Berkshire although he also appears on the register of the Royal Hospital Chelsea as a Chelsea Pensioner. Posted to the 1st Battalion in India in 1890 he was still there for the expeditions in 1891 against the Hazra tribes and the Iazai (Samana) expedition that same year. Later he was also present for the Relief of Chitral in 1895 (medal and clasp). Returning to Britain after over six years in India it was not long before Astle was posted to South Africa. Here he saw Boer War service although strangely - while his name appears on a QSA medal roll with clasps for Elandslaagte, Defence of Ladysmith and Belfast - there is no mention of this on his service records. **Invalided from South Africa on 30 July 1901, he was discharged** from the Regimental Depot on 5 December of that year. Clinton - by this time an experienced N.C.O. who had been assisting the previous incumbent for some time - was promoted to replace him in June 1849.Still in service with the Regiment on the outbreak of the Crimean War he was posted to the 82nd Regiment on 2 September 1855. Serving as their Quartermaster for the duration of the campaign, a difficult task in the Crimea where British logistics were famously poor. His service number is 2229 and he appears on the roll for the Punjab Medal with clasps for Goojerat and Mooltan.Setting the sceneCawnpore (now Kanpur) was a strategic garrison town on the Grand Trunk Road which guarded the approaches to Oudh. With rumours of mutiny rife, approximately eight to nine hundred residents entered the entrenchment at Cawnpore consisting of 300 military personnel, together with 300 women and children; the balance was made up of merchants, business owners, Civil Servants, domestic servants and the Eurasian community.The India Office holds the complete Nominal Roll of Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, Men, Women and Children of the 32nd Light Infantry, comprising the Depot at Cawnpore, dated Lucknow 1st October 1857; this lists 84 officers and men - Noble among them - many of whom were sick or convalescents, together with 42 wives and 54 children. Of Noble's precise fate we shall never know, but it is likely he participated in a number of gallant sorties under Captain John Moore during the ensuing siege.Nana SahibOn 5 June 1857, the 2nd Bengal Cavalry mutinied at Cawnpore. The garrison's three native infantry regiments followed suit next day and a deputation of mutineers rode out to the estate of Dhondu Pant, who was shortly to become infamous in Victorian Britain as the arch-fiend Nana Sahib. With amazing self-assurance, the British at Cawnpore - who politely referred to him as the Maharajah of Bithur (a title not recognised at Calcutta) - believed that Nana Sahib would assist them in maintaining law and order. Nana Sahib, however, was a bitter and ambitious man. He was an adopted son of the last Peshwa of Bithur, Baji Rao II, and dreamt of enjoying the same elevated position in the world as his father. Quickly persuaded that he had nothing to gain by continuing to support the British, he was advised by Azimullah, his agent who had represented his interests in London, that he ought not to go to Delhi, the hub of the rebellion where he, a high born Brahmin, would be subordinate to the decrepit Mohammedan king. It would be far wiser to rally around him the Cawnpore regiments, quickly dispose of Wheeler and the other eight or nine hundred occupants of his pitiful entrenchment, and establish a new independent kingdom from which he might hold sway over vast tracts of India.The siege commencesOn 6 June Wheeler was informed that his entrenchment would soon be under attack by rebel forces fighting in the name of Nana Sahib. At first, however, the majority of mutineers of the Cawnpore Division seemed more interested in lording it about the city than striking a blow at their former masters. Nevertheless those who did take turns in the batteries and firing their muskets soon began to inflict fearful damage and terrible suffering on Wheeler's people. It soon became apparent that Wheeler, who at over seventy and already in poor health, lacked the energy to visit the outposts, organize raiding parties and generally attend to day to day running of the defence. The decapitation of his favourite son, Lieutenant Godfrey Wheeler, by a round shot and the physical effects of the searing heat further sapped the will of the old General and shortly the onerous burden of executive command devolved on Captain John Moore.First assaultFollowing the appearance of green standards in the enemy lines calling the Mohammedans to join their Hindu brethren in their great enterprise, the enemy launched their first general assault on the 11th, after five days of incessant bombardment. The 2nd Cavalry attacked dismounted but after the loss of two of their number they concluded that enough had been done to sustain the credit of their branch of the service, and retired to console themselves for their repulse in the opium shops of the suburbs'. A native infantry regiment came on next supported by the 'rabble of the bazaars'. Men and women inside the shattered barracks fell to their knees in prayer, some wrote their names on the walls, while outside officers and men ably supported by the gentlemen of the Railway Service and other civilian volunteers under Moore's direction, punished the half-hearted attempt with sizeable loss.Nonetheless European casualties continued to mount on an hourly basis especially from the fire of Nana Sahib's seemingly limitless supply of artillery plundered from the Cawnpore arsenal. A large part of the entrenchment was exposed to musket fire and the mere act of obtaining a drink of water by day from the well frequently proved fatal. W. J. Shepherd, a halfcaste employed in the Commissariat Office, recalled one of Moore's men, a dangerous looking Private of the 32nd, threatening to run through his sickly brother with a bayonet unless he assisted him in drawing water, which, after the brickwork frame and machinery had been shot away, meant hauling up the heavy bucket by hand from a depth of sixty feet.Moore's responseOn the 14th, the garrison suffered a serious setback when the roof of the thatched barrack was set on fire destroying the few medical supplies, as well as the jackets of the soldiers of the 32nd who could afterwards be seen poking through the ashes looking for lost medals. Moore immediately determined to 'give the enemy an early and a convincing proof that the spirit of our people was not broken by this great calamity':'At the dead of night ensuing he stole out from the entrenchment with fifty picked men at his heels in the direction of the chapel and the racket-court. Beginning from this point, the party hurried down the rebel lines under favour of the darkness, doing whatever rapid mischief was possible. They surprised in untimely slumber some native gunners, who never waked again; spiked and rolled over several twenty-four pounders; gratified their feelings by blowing up a piece which had given them special annoyance; and got back, carrying in their arms four of their number and leaving one behind. Food shortageAt the start of the defence rations had been unwisely squandered. Private soldiers had been seen consuming champagne, jam, tins of herrings and salmon, and bottles of rum. The luxuries, placed in the food store principally by a regimental officer who had little faith in Sir Hugh as a caterer, ran out all too quickly, and the daily ration was soon limited to half a pint of split peas and flour cooked into a kind of porridge. Dog and horse flesh were keenly sought and when a sacred bull presented itself in front the entrenchment it was met with a storm of lead. To shoot down this pampered monster, the fakeer of the animal world, was no considerable feat for the marksmen who could hit a black buck running at a distance of a hundred and fifty paces. The difficulty consisted in the retrieving of the game, which lay a full three hundred yards from our rampart, on a plain swept by the fire of the insurgents. Inside our place, however, courage was more plentiful than beef; eight or ten volunteers professed themselves ready to follow Captain Moore, who was first at any feast which partook of the nature of a fray. The party provided themselves with a rope which they fastened round the legs and horns of the beast, and dragged home their prize amidst a storm of cheers and bullets, alive but not unscathed. 'But generally morale was at a low ebb and in their despair some members of the garrison attempted suicide. The temperature never dropped below 120°. 'Faces that had been beautiful,' wrote Lieutenant Mowbray Thomson, 'became chiselled with deep furrows. Some were slowly sinking into the settled vacancy of look whi

Collins, 90th Light Infantry, part of Sir Henry Havelock's column which fought its way through the rebel armies besieging the city, suffering a serious gunshot wound to the legIndian Mutiny 1857-59, 1 clasp, Defence of Lucknow (J. Collins, 90th Lt. Infy.), slight edge bruise, minor polishing, very fineJob Collins was born at St. Albans, Hertfordshire in 1826 and attested with the 90th Light Infantry at Oueen's Square, Middlesex on 11 December 1843. He deserted in early November the next year, starting a trend of imprisonment which he was to follow for the next decade, being tried for various crimes at least once every two years. Joining the British Army in the Crimea (Medal and clasp 'Sebastopol') Collins went on to serve in India during the Mutiny. The regiment landed in August 1857 and swiftly went to work, taking part in the disarming of the 63rd Native Infantry and the 11th Irregular **Cavalry at Berhampore during the Dinapoor Mutiny. Having** successfully disarmed the potential mutineers they joined the relief column under Sir Henry Havlock for the push towards Lucknow.Assigned to Colonel Hamilton's Brigade they fought alongside the 78th Highlanders and Brasyer's Sikhs during the capture of the Alumbagh. They remained in the garden overnight under artillery fire from the mutineers who had been driven from the position. After Neill's Brigade had taken the Charbagh bridge, the 90th were sent forward to silence two enemy guns which were positioned on the right of the British advance at the end of a narrow defile. This they accomplished under heavy fire from the two guns and large numbers of rebel infantry. As a result of this detour, they found themselves acting as a rear-guard for the rest of the column and under close attack by rebel forces converging on the column from the surrounding area. After heavy fighting they managed to push through to the British Residency relieving Colonel Inglis's garrison. Unfortunately, the losses to the column had been so high that it was no longer possible for them to effect the relief and they found themselves besieged as well. The 90th saw heavy action throughout this period and it was here that Collins was wounded with his discharged papers noting a gunshot wound in the left leg, 'with partial fracture of the tibia'.Given that he is not entitled to the Lucknow clasp we may infer that he was wounded during the advance on Lucknow and either invalided or did not take part in any fighting during the second siege. Collins was returned to Britain and discharged as medically unfit at Chatham on 22 July 1858; sold together with a typed biographical summery. Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. An unusual 'Action at Kentee' casualty's Indian Mutiny Medal awarded to Bombardier A. Rickett, 'B' Company, 4th Battalion, Madras Artillery, who was wounded by a battle-axe during the action on 4 March 1859Indian Mutiny 1857-59, 1 clasp, Central India (Bombr Anty. Rcikett [sic], B Cy. 4th Bn Madras Art.), contact wear and pitting, slight edge bruise, very fineAnthony Rickett was born at Falkingham (now known as Folkingham), Lincolnshire in 1829 and enlisted with the armed forces of the Honourable East India Company at Liverpool on 2 August 1847. Embarking on H.M.S. Thetis and arriving at Madras in 1848, at the outbreak of the Indian Mutiny in 1857 Rickett was stationed with 'B' Company, 4th Battalion, Madras Artillery with the rank of Bombardier. This unit was attached to the Saugor Field Division seeing action at Kubrae on 17 April before advancing to the Battle of Banda the two days later. This action pitted a column of 1,000 men under General Whitlock against a force of 7,000 mutineers under the Nawab of Banda. Victory at Banda allowed the column to advance on Kirwi; in this state the Madras Gunners were in action during the **Defence of Kirwi Palace on 25 December and later in the week** on 29 December.Further action early the next year at Chicumba left 2nd Captain I. B. Swete of the Madras Horse Artillerv severely wounded on 15 January 1859. From here they advanced to Kentee were a force of mutineers led by Lopal Singh ambushed the column, attacking both soldiers and civilians. **Ricketts was wounded by a battle-axe during the engagement** which ended with the mutineers withdrawing having caused heavy losses. They were pursued by 100 Sikh cavalrymen under Brigadier Faddy who exacted a heavy revenge on the attackers.Ricketts survived his wound and remained with the unit for the rest of the Mutiny although he does not appear to have transferred to the Royal Artillery when the H.E.I.C. army disbanded in 1861. He did however remain in India, joining the European Veterans Establishment, an institution he remained with until his death on 14 April 1893. The burial register notes his death as caused by an 'abscess of the liver' and he was buried at Pallaveram cemetery by Major A. G. H. Hayne of the Veterans Establishment; sold together with a copied casualty roll, biography and medal rolls as well as a registry of the Veterans Establishment and burial details. Cook, 70th (East Surrey) Regiment of Foot, who made the fanciful claim to be the grand nephew and a direct descendant of Captain James CookThis claim was later disputed by Mr. James Watson, Research Secretary of the Royal Australian Historical Society in a letter to the Morning Herald, referring to the recent New Zealand cable message reporting the death of William Cook, grand-nephew of Captain Cook, aged 97, says: 'As to the relationship claimed, it is extremely doubtful and quite unknown to any of Captain Cook's biographers. Captain Cook himself had no descendants of the second generation, nor to his only brother John - born 1727, died 1750 - can any son be traced, nor does it seem at all probable, calculating from these dates, that such a relationship existed'New Zealand 1845-66, undated (157 Pte. W. Cook, 70th Regt.), good very fineThe New Zealand Herald takes up the story. Readers of the New Zealand Herald in September 1922 would have probably been quite intrigued to read of the passing of someone in the Borough of Avondale who appeared to have a distinguished set of links to our past.Mr. William Cook in whom was centred a most interesting link with the earlier history of New Zealand, passed away at Avondale to-day, at the age of 97. Mr. Cook was a grandson of the youngest brother of Captain James Cook, the great navigator, and his mother was a sister of Sir George Bowen, who was Governor of New Zealand from 1868 until 1878.Mr Cook was born near Portsmouth, England. From his early boyhood he wished to be a soldier, and while still in his teens he joined the volunteers. This did not prove exciting enough, and he went to Ireland and joined the 47th Regiment in Richmond Barracks, Dublin. While there the Crimean War broke out, and young Cook exchanged into the 13th Regiment, which was ordered for active service. A period of training with the regiment at Colchester followed, and arriving at last at the Crimea, Mr. Cook had a year and eleven months of an existence which could hardly be called life. Speaking in after years of the unsatisfactory conditions that existed during that strenuous time, Mr. Cook stated that so inadequate were the arrangements that he and many of his fellow-soldiers went a full twelve months without a change of clothing. It was not until after the arrival of Miss Florence Nightingale that matters were put on a better footing. Mr. Cook frequently came into contact with Miss Nightingale, and he always retained a kindly remembrance of the change that her arrival brought to the soldiers.While he was still in the Crimea, the news was received of the outbreak of the Indian Mutiny. Though the siege of Sebastapol [SIC] had not yet been effective, troops were rushed from the Crimea to India, among them being Mr Cook. His Regiment landed at Karachi, and from there they journeyed up the Indus to Mooltan, a distance of over 1300 miles, in flat-bottomed boats, which often stuck on mudbanks. On arriving at Mooltan, they disembarked and marched to Lahore, where fighting was proceeding, Lahore is. 900 miles from Mooltan, and the greater part of the route was covered with dense jungle; through which the soldiers had to cut their way. They often had to fight for their lives, as the Sepoys were constantly on their tracks.A TERRIBLE VOYAGEMr. Cook was stationed in India for three and a half years, when trouble having broken out with the Maoris in New Zealand, his Regiment (the 70th) was ordered to embark for Auckland. That voyage Mr. Cook never forgot. India had not been left far behind when cholera broke out on the ship. The crew numbered 18 all told, and a shipwrecked crew of a similar number was picked up near the southern coast of India. So virulent did the epidemic become that on arrival at Auckland there were only two of the combined crews of 36 alive, and in addition 200 of the soldiers died. The captain and first mate of the ship early succumbed, and the only persons on board with a knowledge of navigation were the boatswain and his mate. Some of the soldiers were told off to do duty as sailors, among them being Mr. Cook, and he was wont to relate with pride that on his arrival at Auckland he was given £3 10s extra pay for his work as a seaman. The trouble with the Maoris was steadily coming to a head, and the 70th Regiment was marched from Auckland to Drury, stopping on the way for a while at Otahuhu. The Great South Road from Drury to Mercer was constructed by the regiment, and various other public works were undertaken. In 1863 the regiment saw plenty of active service, especially near Shepherd's Bush.ENTERPRISE IN NEW ZEALANDIN 1865, when the war had ended, Mr. Cook left the army and received a grant of 60 acres of land at Whangarei for his services. He bought an adjoining block of ten acres for 10s an acre, and intended to take up farming for a change. However, his plans were changed. Contracts were let by the Provincial Government for railway construction works, and Mr Cook entered into partnership with Messrs Dawson and Elliot and undertook the construction of the railway from the Parnell tunnel to Penrose. The first engine was sent from England in parts, and Mr. Cook assisted to assemble it at Newmarket. Unfortunately, however, Mr Cook lost £400 on the contract, and as [the] Provincial Government ...was short of funds, there was no chance to recoup himself by entering on another railway contract. Mr Cook afterwards entered into the employment of the late Mr. Alfred Buckland, snr., and remained with him until early in the seventies.Mr Cook, ever a man of many parts, subsequently engaged as a guarrying contractor, and he often stated with pride that he personally quarried many of the stones used in the construction of the original Bank of New Zealand, the Bank of Australasia, and the Bank of New South Wales, and also for the Shortland Street Post Office and the Supreme Court. Road contracts were afterwards taken up, and among the streets constructed by Mr. Cook was a large portion of the Manukau Road between Parnell and Remuera. Mr Cook, who had been a widower for some years, leaves a large number of descendants. He enjoyed good health until two or three months ago. 'The Auckland War Memorial Museum records confirm that 157 William Cook arrived in New Zealand on the ship 'Minden' from Calcutta on 27 May 1861 and that he purchased his discharge from the Regiment and subsequently settled in Auckland. This corresponds in part to the story related by The New Zealand HeraldNotably Cook also claimed descent from the former Governor of Queensland Sir George Bowen. The truth of this claim is unknown however it given Cook's history it seems

The Midland Mounted Rifles came into being in the second phase of the war for the purpose of assisting to expel the invaders from the Colony. In April and May 1901, they were often in action and were said to have done very well on two occasions in the latter month, particularly at Zwagershoek. At Doornhoek, on the 13th, they had Lieutenant P E H Coombs and several men wounded. The first reference in dispatches to the corps by name was unfortunately associated with a mishap. In the dispatch of 8th July 1901, dealing with the operations against Kritzinger's, Letter's, and other commandos, Lord Kitchener said: "On the 21st of June a party of 60 Midland Mounted Rifles-a local corpswas surrounded and captured by Kritzinger between Cradock and Graaf Reinet: 9 men were killed and 2 officers and 10 men wounded". According to the published casualty lists the number of killed and wounded was slightly larger. Captain H J Spandow died of his wounds; Lieutenant A P Robertson was severely wounded. It is satisfactory that the detachment made a very good fight, and that there was no surrender until the losses became out of all proportion to the end to be gained in holding out. The Midland Mounted Rifles were to get their chance in due time. The dispatch of 8th September 1901 deals with the capture of Letter's commando by Colonel Scobell on 5th September.In the dispatch Lord Kitchener said: "It must also be mentioned that three days previously Letter's commando had been checked by a party of Midland Mounted Rifles, who killed seven and wounded six of their number, and prevented the Boers escaping by a pass which the patrol was then holding". The corps continued to do much useful work in the central districts of Cape Colony.Mannheimer was promoted to Captain in the 8th Battalion Royal Warwickshire Regiment on 29 August 1914, and changed his name by Deed Poll in 1915 from Mannheimer to Manning. Carter gives a fine account of the defence: Early in September that year, Louis Botha, Commandant General of the Boer Republican Forces, started gathering together the biggest raiding Commando of the guerilla war. With the arrival of the Spring rains, he made ready to move South.His Commando of picked, tough, fighting men had come from Bethal and South Middelburg; from Ermelo, Carolina and Standerton, and numbered almost a thousand. Across a cold, rain-swept veld, they silently set out from Blaaukop, near Ermelo in the Eastern Transvaal, to begin the second Boer invasion of the Colony of Natal.The cold rivulets of water ran off their hats and over hunched shoulders. It soaked into ragged and patched jackets and dripped off their noses and sodden beards. Their laps formed cold pools in their saddles, and bodies frozen and wet were chafed by the constant roll of the horses.Despite the weather, there was an air of excitement among this motley throng, for the long desolate winter months of planning and preparation were past. At last they were on the move. The essential pasture for their horses was now assured, and they became a powerful far-ranging fighting force.Louis Botha, his brother Chris at his side, headed the biggest raiding Commando in this spring revival of Boer activity. They rode south-east, through Piet-Retief, avoiding the few British outposts and columns along their route, all the time gathering more men. Commandos from Wakkerstroom Piet Retief, Utrecht and Vryheid eventually swelled their ranks to over 2000 mounted men.Botha's plan was to invade Northern Natal, disrupt British control to the limit, then cut south to enter the Cape Colony and ultimately join forces with Smuts who had already succeeded in getting unto the Cape with his small force. An ambitious, but not impossible plan.British columns sent to catch him got bogged down in the quagmires that passed for roads. Botha with no wheeled transport, was much better off. Using pack animals for carrying supplies, he averaged 10 miles a day with ease, the British barely three. By September 17th he had reached the Blood River Poort, also known as Spieshoek, about 15 miles west of Vryheid, there to await the Vryheid Commando under his brotherin-law, Cherry Emmett.British Intelligence reports on Botha's movements were sketchy. At Dundee, Capt Herbert Gough, with orders for a routine patrol to intercept and escort a convoy of empty British wagons from Vryheid, only had information several days old. To his knowledge Botha was at least 20 miles away.Gough's Mounted Infantry, totalling 585 men with the Johannesburg Mounted Rifles under Lieut.-Col. H. K. (Bimbash) Stewart, a pretty rough crowd of irregulars, reached de Jager's Drift on the Buffalo River on 16th September. Next day, grey, wet and miserable, his advance patrol reported a group of about 300 Boers about five miles beyond the Blood River at Scheepersnek. By 2 p.m. Gough was in a position to attack. The Boers, meantime, moving north to the Blood River Poort, could with skill, be approached on a converging path by the British, who in turn could remain concealed behind the long low north ridge of the Rooikoppies.Leaving Stewart and the J.M.I. to quard his transport, Gough impetuously rode forward, certain of his surprise. The Boers, oblivious of their peril, had off-saddled at the foot of the hills. Gough had cornered them. To complete the attack, his force had to cover a mile of open ground. This the British did at the gallop, fanning out with two field guns bringing up the rear. The first volley seemed to panic the unsuspecting Boers, when to Gough's horror, the main bulk of Botha's force burst out of the Poort. Crossing his front at full gallop, they wheeled to their right, enveloping and rolling up Gough's flank against the mountain. Others, climbing over the ledges of the Western hill, poured a deadly plunging fire on the hapless mounted infantry. In 10 minutes it was all over. Forty-four killed and wounded and 241 prisoners were the price of Gough's impetuosity. Stewart, following some miles behind, was lucky to save the transport and get back to de Jager's Drift intact. Botha's men were jubilant. The way south now clear, they re-equipped themselves with British rifles, ammunition, horses, boots and trousers and released their prisoners next day to find their way to Vryheid, sore-footed and trouserless.Meanwhile the foul weather continued to hamper British columns, while swollen rivers delayed Botha. His horses were in poor condition and the sodden ground made heavy going. Unable to force the pace, British garrisons were able to thwart his attempts to cross the Buffalo River into Natal at both Vant's Drift and Rorke's Drift.Moving further and further south in what was then still the Transvaal, Botha reached Babanango Kop on the 24th. From here his path was guarded by two small fortified posts at Itala and Fort Prospect. Beyond these lay Melmoth, Eshowe and the Indian Ocean. The necessity to take these two posts is highly debatable as they could easily have been by-passed. For Botha to protect his communications was a fallacy as he had none. Stores he needed and fresh horses, too, but despite these requirements the two posts seemed, in all probability, to offer another easy victory.By now the weather had cleared. From his look-out on the top of Babanango, the rolling green hills of Zululand stretched south to the horizon. To his left Dingaan's kraal where Piet Retief and his party had been slain 60 odd years before, could be seen in the distance. To his right he could clearly see Isandhlwana, 'the little hand', where nearly 1500 British troops, 900 of them white, had been massacred by Cetewayo's impis 22 year's earlier. In front lay Itala, a commanding height, eight miles to the South.Through his fieldglasses he could see the British camp at the base. Further to the left, atop a smooth green dome of a hill, he could make out Fort Prospect. The distance between these two points was 14 miles. He could easily slip through.But Botha needed time to revive his horses, and another victory like Blood River Poort would slow the British columns bearing in on him. His spies reported that the two outposts were weak and undermanned, and that they should fall to him without difficulty, so he made ready to attack. Since the battle of Allemansnek, 15 months earlier, Natal had been out of the conflict zone. For the people of this British Colony the war was far away. They were now more concerned withs their local elections than with activity against stubborn, unconquerable, Commandos. They could hardly have been less interested in Louis Botha's Commando and the peril facing them.Six months earlier a detachment from the 5th Mounted Infantry Division had been posted to Nkandhla as a frontier guard. They also provided the garrison at Fort Prospect, a strong point half-way to Melmoth right on the border road. The sum total of their forces was about 400 men.It was a backwater of the war. Life was pleasant and easy for the troops who made their mark with the local farmers and their families. Their Commanding Officer was an Irishman, Major A. J. Chapman, of the Dublin Fusiliers. Chapman was a cle

Posted to the 1st Battalion the next month on 29 April 1898 he was posted to Gibraltar on 10 March 1899.Belmont, Graspan and Modder RiverRemaining there until the outbreak of the Boer War later in the year, Richards entered the war on 28 October 1899. Joining the Guard's Brigade for the march to relieve Kimberly under the command of General Methuen. The British found themselves opposed on the march several times, starting with a force under Commandant Prinsloo occupying three kopjes at Belmont.During the action that followed the Coldstreamers were held in the Brigade reserve during the attack on Gun Hill. As the attack developed the British line shifted south and they advanced into a frontal assault against Razor Back and Sugar Loaf Hills. Advancing on the British found the same force again blocking their path at Graspan however the action was largely concluded before the Guard's Brigade came up.Finally having conducted a remarkable advance, fighting two battles in as many days, Methuen's army reached the Modder River on 28 November a mere three days after their last action. Not expecting to be opposed on the crossing the army advanced with the Guards on the right of the line.A storm of fire from the opposite bank put paid to that notion and the British, Guards and all, found themselves lying before a well-entrenched enemy with very little cover. 1st Coldstream Guards, presumably with Richards attempted to find a ford, working their way around to the right of the line. However, the hail of Mauser bullets remained steady and no gap in the enemy line was found. In the end it was the South Lancashire's who forced their way over the river, creating a beachhead that the British were able to build upon and by the morning of 29 November the British head their crossing.MagersfonteinControl of this vital position allowed the British advance to continue and despite heavy losses it was felt that they had opened the path of Kimberly. Despite no small despondency in the Boer High Command, De La Rey persuaded Cronje and Prinsloo to attempt one last stand at the line of hills called Magersontein.Despite the failure of their last attempt at Belmont Methuen decided to attempt a night march against the feature on 11 December 1899, having first held his ground at the Modder River for some time to regain his strength. The Highland Brigade, fronted by Brigadier-General Andy Wauchope, was to lead the advance with the rest of the column coming up behind.In the early hours of the morning they advanced, but were unable to make the position before the light rose with the Brigade still in marching formation when the sun rose. As such the first Boer volley hammered into the tight packed ranks causing appalling losses including Wauchope himself. Regardless of the loss the Highland Brigade pressed on and it was not long before losses began to mount. With the Scots unable to advance and a large part of the Boer army mounted, Methuen feared for the ends of his line being encircled. His next moves are detailed in The Boer War by Thomas Packenham, which states: 'To prevent them being driven back - that was now his [Methuen's] only concern. In this he very nearly succeeded. He sent some Gordons forward to reinforce the centre; the Guards were used to block the Boers on the east. Casualties they had, but less than twenty were killed. Lieutenant-Colonel Alfred Codrington, CO of the Coldstream Guards, was hit in the right ankle; he called, "Outer, right low." Britian's premier Marquis Major Lord Winchester, was shot dead; it was said he had turned his back on the enemy to watch the captive balloon. But Conje like Methuen was cautious about seizing his opportunities. The shadows shortened. Disaster passed into stalemate.'As such the 1st Coldstream Guards found themselves in the open terrain of the British flank trying to hold the line against an invisible foe. The Battalion guarded the flank of the Gordon's for the rest of the day, warding of the probing moves of the Boer fighters. In these trying hours Richards was seriously wounded, suffering what the Guards casualty roll referred to as a 'gunshot wound to the abdomen'.As the night closed in the Highland Brigade could no longer take the punishment, they fell back with over 200 casualties. British losses for the day both dead and wounded came to 902 men, compared to only 236 Boers. The column was forced to fall back with Kimberly left to withstand the Siege for another three months.EpilogueRichards' wounded was severe enough to see him invalided back to Britain on 24 March 1900, however despite the injury he managed to cling to life. It was clear that he would never again be fighting fit and as such he was discharged on 18 September 1900.Still young and now an invalid he was forced to move back in with his family, residing at Margarets Lane, Shedfield. His father, Henry Richards, had been a timber merchant but he had passed away by this time and it is likely the family was supported by his younger brother, James, an under-gardener.Despite his poor circumstances in the wake of the war Richards lived a long life, finally dying on 5 January 1957 at Droxford, Hampshire. Brogan survived the fighting and continued to serve in South Africa until 18 September 1902.Upon returning to Britain, he was posted to the Army Reserve on 8 October 1902 being discharged on 17 February 1907. Moor, published in the London Gazette of 12 September** 1902, starting with its goals: 'The objects of the expedition were:a) To abolish the slave trade which was actively carried on throughout the entire territories belonging to and dominated by the Aro tribe.b) To abolish the fetish of the Aros known as "Long Juju," which, by superstition and fraud caused many evils amongst the Ibo tribes generally, and to all the outlying tribes of the entire protectorate, who continually appealed to it. While this Juju existed, it was impossible to establish effective government in the territories.c) To open up the whole of the Ibo country lying between the Cross River and the Niger to civilization and trade of collecting the natural products of their country and developing it to the best advantage.d) To introduce a currency in lieu of slaves, brass rods, and other forms of native currency that existed in the territories, and which from their nature and cumbersomeness were opposed to advance in any direction.e) Finally, to establish throughout the territories a labor market to take the place of slavery. A few days before the operations commenced a most deplorable massacre of some 400 men, women and children, mostly women and children, was carried out in the hinterland of the Opobo district, at a town called Obegu. The Aros had long threatened to attack the tribes friendly to the government, and though the people of Obegu had been warned to keep careful watch, they were unfortunately caught napping by a conglomerate force of the various sections of the Aro tribe, together with other Ibos unfriendly to them, and their town was destroyed with the slaughter of the people above mentioned. This gave another object and duty to the Field Force, viz., that of capturing and bringing to justice the natives responsible for this bloodthirsty massacre, in the carrying out of which one section of the Aro tribe alone, the Abams, who were great head hunters, are reported to have obtained 200 heads. I am able to state with certainty that the objects of the expedition detailed in paragraph 2 of this dispatch have been effectively carried out in so far as could be done by military operations. The slave trade has been abolished, the evil fetish of the Aro tribe has been broken, the entire colony has been opened up, and the natives are already beginning to engage in legitimate trade in place of the traffic in human beings, and a currency of British coinage has been introduced which the natives are now gladly accepting in lieu of slaves, brass rods, manillas etc.'Subject to 5% tax on Hammer Price in addition to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium.

An 'Retreat from Mons - M.I.D.' 1914 Star awarded to 2nd Lieutenant H. E. A. Poole, 11th Hussars, late 20th Hussars, the son of a Military Knight of Windsor, who entered the war as a Corporal, was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant and thrice wounded only to die of his wounds on 2 June 19151914 Star (5439 L.Sit. H. Poole. 20/Hrs.), minor wear, very fineHugh Edward Algernon Poole was born the son of Major Charles Arthur Edward Poole, late 10th Hussars who had been serving as a Military Knight of Windsor since 1906. Entering the war in France on 16 August 1914 he saw heavy fighting between the Battle of Mons and the Battle of the Aisne. Notably having been advance Lance-Sergeant, Poole was 'mentioned' in Field Marshal French's dispatch from 28 August 1914 (London Gazette 20 October 1914).On that day the 5th Cavalry Brigade, including the 20th Hussars were attempting to slow the German advance near Cerizy. The 20th distinguished themselves by attacking a German Battery north of the village: while one section distracted the enemy with heavy fire two Squadrons charged and routed them for the loss of only one man. It should be noted that Poole appears in Army Mentions as having been 'mentioned' on 8 October during the Battle of the Aisne, however this is likely as a result of a correction in rank issued around this time.At this stage Poole was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant and posted from the 20th to the 11th Hussars. He continued to serve with them in France until being sent home as a result of serious wounds suffered in action. Despite making it back to Britain Poole's injuries were too severe and he died on 2 June 1915. A note of his Commonwealth War Graves entry states that he was wounded in action three times. The War Diary records this historic event: 'Tue, Dec 29, 1914 BLARINGHEM, FRANCE29.12.14 Major (A.H.) Gault, Capt (C.F.) SMITH & 2 N.C.O's went up to trenches of 3rd Division at KEMMEL. 24 hours in trenches to learn method of reliefs & gain experience: valuable hints and information gained.'According to an article in the 2 February 1915 issue of The Gazette (Montreal), Fairbanks-Smith was one of the first members CEF to go into action. In the article, he describes the horrid conditions in water-filled trenches, the pluck of the newly arrived Canadians, and the poor sanitary habits of the French troops. He also recalls a near miss when a German bullet passed between his head and that of a Canadian sergeant, missing both men by mere inches. On 9 January 1915, he was admitted to No. 7 Stationary Hospital, Boulogne with a dislocated semi-lunar cartilage of his right knee. The injury incapacitated him for six weeks and required him being invalided back to England. The 2 February 1915 of the Montreal Gazette states that Fairbanks-Smith was injured while traversing some trenches in almost total darkness. He fell into a trench filled with German dead, dislocating his knee and remained there for two days under intermittent shell-fire until recovered by men of his unit. Recovered from his injury, he was likely with the unit in their famous stand at Ypres in May 1915 and thence transferred to the Durham Light Infantry in September 1915. After the Great War, he played first class cricket for Somerset and went to the United States in retirement. Settling in California, Smith was a motion picture executive and later owned a restaurant and died on 25 May 1948 at Middleton, Sussex; sold together with copied research. The leaders sheweed [SIC] good initiative and the spirit of all ranks was magnificent'Five parties advanced on the house from the south and cleared the houses in short order with the enemy losing a number of officers and other ranks as well as several men taken prisoner of war. The report also notes a suspicion that the enemy were expecting the raid as soon after it took place a heavy counter barrage was launched.British losses were noted as 17 with several caused by their own barrage. Trodd survived the bulk of the fighting however he was killed upon his return as a result of the enemy shelling. Davies, Sgt., R.M.), good very fineAmran Vivian Davies, who was born in Monmouth on 10 January 1919, was mentioned in despatches for his services in H.M.S. Adventure, a mine-laying cruiser (London Gazette 1 January 1944, refers). The award likely stemmed from Adventure's interception of the blockade runner Silvaplana, which was scuttled in the Bay of Biscay on 10 April 1943, an incident described thus by Gordon Holman in The King's Cruisers: 'An older cruiser-minelayer, H.M.S. Adventure, not only gave excellent service during the war but accounted for an important blockade runner when it was nearing a German-held port after a voyage from Japan. It was the Silvaplana, believed to be carrying 6,000 to 8,000 tons of rubber and tin, which had the misfortune to meet the Adventure about 200 miles off Cape Finisterre. Challenged by the warship, the blockade runner, which could not be identified at the time, fled. She was a fast ship because Captain R. G. Bowes-Lyon, M.V.O., R.N., has said it was a long chase before the 28-knot minelayer-cruiser came up with the Silvaplana. This is Captain Bowes-Lyon's graphic description of what happened at the end of the chase:"I tried to find out the ship's identity. His answers to my signals were unsatisfactory and suspicious. Then he made a signal, 'Be careful, I saw a submarine this morning.' If anything was calculated to arouse suspicion it was such a message from a strange ship. It was a very stupid signal to make. So we closed to about 9,000 yards and I ordered him to stop. To emphasise the signal, we fired two shells across the bows. Within a few minutes, even before the enemy ship had come to rest, two boats were lowered and were guickly followed by others. Then the bridge burst into flames. Immediately afterwards there were considerable explosions under the bridge and superstructure aft and, two minutes later, just after the last boats had got away, heavy scuttling charges were heard and seen to detonate. His scuttling organisation was perfect."Even so, the Germans not only lost a very valuable cargo, they also lost more than 100 German Navy personnel and 50 more nationals, picked up and made prisoners by the Adventure.'Davies died in Monmouth on 25 July 2004.Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. They faced hard fighting during the advance with a portion of the Regiment even required to ride as mounted infantry due to their lack of trained horsemen. Advancing at first by steamer they disembarked approximately ten miles away from the town, preparing to march the rest of the distance. They made the outskirts of Arrah after approximately four hours, when they were ambushed from the cover of a nearby embankment. The rebels waited until the British were around 30 yards away before opening fire. Captain Charles Dunbar of the 10th Regiment was killed in the opening salvo and the rest of the column was forced into a disorderly withdrawal. After a short flight their officers regained control however the they were unable to break through and instead pulled back under heavy fire to the boats. The 10th Regiment suffered 47 officer's and other ranks killed, during the withdrawal to the boats Private Dempsey of the 10th won the Victoria Cross. The role of the K.S.L.I. is outlined well by an article on the Soldiers of Shropshire Museum website which states: 'Those responsible for conducting house inspections, as well as disinfecting them, became known as the Whitewash Brigade - and this is where the KSLI came into action. Due to being stationed out in Hong Kong at the time of the outbreak, KSLI volunteers sprang into action to begin supressing the disease. Amongst other things, the KSLI were responsible for spraying/fumigating houses, whitewashing walls with lime and even clearing corpses out of houses. Those having their houses inspected would be given clean clothes and their own clothes would be sent to a disinfecting station. An article from the 1939 Hong Kong Press wrote that although the job of the KSLI was "gruesome", it was "not altogether unpopular with the soldiers. Military discipline of the Barrack Square had to disappear and with a generous rum ration, given with a view to warding off infection, they carried out their strange duties with the utmost cheerfulness". 'Their job was difficult, dangerous and in some cases resulted in clashes with a largely mistrustful local community. As a reward for their service the soldiers were presented with the Hong Kong Plague medal. Clarke was posted to India, remaining there until 2 January 1897 when he returned to Britain, joining the Army Reserve four days later.Mobilised for service on the outbreak of the Boer War, Clarke arrived at South Africa again on 7 November 1899. He was to see action during the Battle of Paardeberg, where the battalion earned high praise for pressing close to the Boer defences. Later they were to see heavy fighting at Thoba Mountain in May 1900, however Clarke was not long in South Africa and returned to Britain on 25 June. He was to remain there for over a year before joining the British army assembling in Egypt for the long-delayed reconquest of the Sudan on 4 February 1897. The re-conquest of the Sudan had begun the year earlier with the capture of Dongola and the army had spent much of 1917 extending the Sudan Military Railroad and consolidating in preparation for a knock-out blow the next year. The British Brigade, Major-General Gatacre joined the Egyptian Army in late February 1898, rushed down to the front at Berber by means of the new railroad.Skirmishes with Baggra horsemen proved indecisive and the enemy army, commanded by the Khedive's nephew Mahmud, was now encamped at Nukhayla. A raid by Egyptian Infantry of the town of Shendi - where Mahmud had left his food and non-combatants - left the Mahdist forces in a poor position. Despite this Kitchener's own supplies were dwindling at an alarming rate and he decided to attack.Mahmud's Army was camped in a zabara - a thorn fenced enclosure - set within an acacia forest which prevented any attack except from the front. The British Army advanced in a square formation through the night, arriving before the zabara in the early hours of morning and forming into assault columns. The Sudanese Brigades formed the right and centre of the line with the British Brigade on the left. The Battle started with an intense artillery bombardment intended to hammer the Mahdist Army into submission before the infantry attack. When Kitchener sounded the advance the British line was headed by the Camerons with the Lincolns behind. As they closed with the zabara the dervishes opened fire and tore into the British advance with a heavy fire, despite this they continued to advance stolidly. They stormed over the zabara into the scene of devastation beyond, for the Anglo-Egyptian guns had done their work well. Despite this the enemy was much in evidence and fought tooth and nail against the wall of bayonets to drive the Sirdar's army back beyond the camp. Worse the entire area was honeycombed with trenches and a second zabara further in the centre in which Mahmud had withdrawn. Khartoum by Micheal Asher refers: Once again, it was bayonet against sword and spear. But the quality of the British bayonets had improved in the thirteen years since et-Teb and Tamaai. For long minutes there was a bloody hand-to-hand tussle inside the zariba. The attackers were streaming into it, thousands upon thousands of men, crammed shoulder to shoulder, stabbing, thrusting, firing and gouging.'In the end the enemy army was totally defeated and hounded from the camp. Mahmud was wounded by a bayonet and taken prisoner although the more dangerous enemy - Osman Dinga - had escaped. This was the only flaw in an otherwise textbook victory, the enemy army ceased to exist as a coherent fighting force and the British advance on Khartoum was open.Lee remained in Egypt being appointed Corporal on 19 June 1898 before being posted to India on 17 October 1898. Unfortunately, he was soon charged with misconduct and arrested, reduced back to the ranks he returned to duty on 24 December 1899. Agreeing to extended service he remained with the Regiment until his eventual discharge on 28 January 1907; sold together with a typed biography. Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. 

Re-joining on the outbreak of the Great War he entered the war in France on 1 March 1915 with the 4th Battalion, Lincolnshire Regiment. Later transferred to the Labour Corps he was discharged from their as a Sergeant on 5 March **1919.Surprisingly this was not the end of his career as** Loveridge attested once more with a 90 day emergency attestation on 18 May 1921. He served until 12 July 1921 with the 4th Battalion, Lincolnshire Regiment. He was posted to South Africa for service in the Boer War with the 2nd Canadian Mounted Rifles, a Regiment that famously saw action at the Battle of Hart's River in March 1902. In a letter written in 1907 Potter noted that he was present for the action and requested his Q.S.A.- still unissued at the time- be sent to him. He remained with the Regiment until it was disbanded before returning to Canada.He re-enlisted with the 12th Battalion, Canadian **Expeditionary Force at Fredericton, New Brunswick on 19** September 1914. Embarking on the S.S. Scotia on 4 October he was discharged on 30 November and re-enlisted with the 1st Battalion, Dorsetshire Regiment. Entering the war in France on 18 February 1915 Potter was present with the unit when it was engaged in the Second Battle of Ypres.Stationed on the frontline on Hill 60 before Zillebeke, the Regiment came under a heavy artillery attack in the morning on 1 May. Suddenly a German gas attack developed, disabling the vast majority of the Dorset's save one Company under Captain Batten which was- by chance- standing to in order to practice gas drill. Troops from the Bedfordshire and the Devonshire Regiments were rushed forward to repel the German attack and they, along with some gallant resistance from the surviving Dorsets held the line till reinforcements arrived. The Devonshire Regiment war diary notes the deadly effect of the gas that day stating: 'Its appears that most of the affected men were immediately struck down and unfortunately lay about at the bottom of the trenches where the gas soon completely asphyxiated them.'Despite having protection issued the attack was so sudden and the affect of the gas so guick that some 300 men were overcome before they could react. Potter is noted as being one of those killed in this initial attack, along with 250 more of the Regiment he died on the morning of 1 May and is remembered upon the Menin Gate memorial; sold together with correspondence from the Dorset Military Museum, a copied letter between the recipient and the Canadian Minister of Militia as well as a letter from the Canadian Public archive confirming the recipient as a Canadian who transferred to the B.E.F. early in the war along with service papers. This time he was sent to join the 1st Battalion in India, arriving on 2 October 1903. Here he was to take part in the Tibet Expedition the following year, the Royal Fusiliers were particularly heavily engaged during the Storming of Gyantse Dzong. Howse returned to Britain on 23 January 1905 and remained there until 1913 when he was discharged. Despite this his career was not over and with the outbreak of the Great War the next year he again returned to the colours. Entering the war in France as a Colour Sergeant on 31 May 1915, with the 9th Battalion. He soon put his experience to good work being 'mentioned' after six months (London Gazette 1 January 1916). His age and physical condition saw him posted to the Regimental Depot as Company **Ouartermaster Sergeant and later Regimental Ouartermaster** Sergeant. Posted to the Battleship Brittania on 15 October 1912 he was to serve with her through the Great War.Brittania began the conflict at Rosyth with the Grand Fleet, later taking part in the Battle of Dogger Bank. Posted to Sheerness in early 1916 and later the Adriatic, short round-trip to Bermuda and a refit brought Britannia to Gibraltar on 9 November 1918, just two days before the Armistice.Here - just off Cape Trafalgar - she was torpedoed by UB-50. This first blast set off another in the 9.2 inch magazine, which in turn detonated a store of cordite. Poorly-placed flooding valves and even worse visibility made it impossible to properly control the blaze in the magazines. Britannia remained at a 10-degree list for the next two-and-ahalf hours but it was clear she was sinking. 50 of her crew were killed in the attack and another 60 injured; fortunately Cornfield was among those rescued. 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'The war is going to start properly soon, and I'm going to start it.'So wrote Captain Bernard Warburton-Lee of H.M.S. Hardy, Captain (D), 2nd British Destroyer Flotilla, in a letter his wife on 5 April 1940; when she received it the war had indeed started properly, and her husband had earned its first Victoria Cross - posthumously. When Hotspur emerged from the smoke and followed about two miles astern of Hostile and Havock, she presented an astonishing appearance with two enormous sprays of water either side like ornamental fountains, caused by her jagged bow and a shell hole. The sight was immediately gladdening and just what was needed to inspire Wright [of the Hostile] and Courage [of the Havock] to save her at any cost ... Like two sheep-dogs, the Hostile and Havock closed in behind their stray ewe lamb and hustled her away from the snarling wolves; it was beautifully done. The timely rescue of Hotspur, as recounted in Narvik - Battles in the Fjords, by Captain Peter Dickens, R.N.A pre-war Palestine and Second World War 'V.C. action' campaign group of seven awarded to Chief Petty Officer B. R. Coleman, Royal Navy, who was present in H.M.S. Hotspur at the First Battle of Narvik in April 1940As part of Warburton-Lee's 2nd Destroyer Flotilla, in a series of point-blank actions, Hotspur's guns and torpedoes contributed to destruction or severe mauling of some ten enemy ships, over whom 'hung a sepulchral, acrid mist'But the flotilla paid a heavy price for its enterprise and daring, Hardy being run aground and Hunter - after colliding with Hostspur capsizing. Nor did Petty Officer Coleman and his shipmates escape without cost, the muchdamaged Hotspur suffering a loss of 18 killedNaval General Service 1915-62, 1 clasp, Palestine 1936-1939 (J. 113488 B. R. Coleman, P.O., R.N.); 1939-45 Star; Atlantic Star; Africa Star; Burma Star; War Medal 1939-45; Royal Navy L.S. & G.C., G.VI.R., 1st issue (JX. 113488 B. R. Coleman, P.O., H.M.S. Languard), good very fine (7)Bertram Roland Coleman was born at Sittingbourne, Kent on 25 March 1909 and entered the Royal Navy as a Boy 2nd Class in March 1928.By the outbreak of hostilities - and having been actively employed off Palestine in the interim - he was serving as a Petty Officer in the destroyer H.M.S. Hotspur, and it was in the same capacity that he was present at the First Battle of Narvik on 10 April 1940.On that memorable date, following Warburton-Lee's opening foray into Narvik, Hotspur moved forward and fired four torpedoes into the harbour, sinking at least two merchant ships.But as the British flotilla departed the scene, it ran into five enemy destroyers, heralding the commencement of a hotly contested action of the point-blank variety. Amidst much gunfire, two of the enemy destroyers crossed the 'T' of the British flotilla and inflicted mortal damage on Warburton-Lee's command, the Hardy. She was forced to run aground.Hunter, hit by a torpedo, fared little better, and was then rammed by Hotspur due to her damaged steering gear. The two destroyers, under punishing fire, managed to disentangle themselves but Hunter capsized soon afterwards. Here, then, as cited above, the moment that Hotspur's own fate seemed sealed, but for the timely arrival of Havock and Hostile.During her assorted encounters of the close kind at Narvik and in Ofotfjord, Hotspur received seven direct hits from enemy shellfire. Her No. 2 boiler, electrical circuits, depth charges and her range-finder were all knocked out and she sustained a loss of 18 men killed. Temporary repairs, however, enabled her to limp back home.In June 1941, Coleman removed to the sloop Languard - an ex-U.S. Coast Guard cutter - and he was likewise employed at the time of being awarded his L.S. & G.C. Medal in January 1942.He finally came ashore as a Chief Petty Officer in May 1949; sold with a limited-edition print of H.M.S. A hard-fought 'Old Contemptible's' casualty pair awarded to Private A. McLaren, 1st Battalion, Royal Highlanders (Black Watch), a veteran of the Battle of Mons who survived the savage fighting of 1914 only to be seriously wounded and discharged after the Battle of Aubers Ridge1914 Star (2547 Pte A. McLaren. R. Highrs), entitled to rosette and clasp; Victory Medal 1914-1919 (2547 Pte. A. Mc Laren. R. Highrs), polished, very fine (2)Alexander McLaren was serving as a member of the Special Reserve on the outbreak of the Great War. Returning to the colours McLaren joined the 1st Battalion. Roval Highlanders (Black Watch) and entered the war with the rest of the British Expeditionary Force as part of the 1st Division on 13 August 1914. Taking up positions on around the town of Mons the British faced a heavy attack from the German 1st Army under General Von Kluck. Here- for the first time- they faced the full military power of a German Field Army, despite checking their advance and causing heavy losses the army was forced to withdraw.Present on the Retreat from Mons the Battalion was part of General Haig's Corps and so avoided the heavy fighting at Le Cateau. They were however still present for the miraculous Allied victory on the Marne where they formed the easternmost part of the British line, co-operating with French cavalry to Petit Morin River- eventually capturing Sablonnières.At the bloody repulse on the Aisne the Black Watch formed part of the right-hand part of the line and suffered heavy losses along with the rest of the Army. As the Race to the Sea began, they advanced towards the climactic action at Ypres, here 1st Battalion was to see action in the savage action at Gheluvelt. Here they lost five officers and 250 men, their line pierced in several places the Battalion fought heroically, hand-to-hand against an overwhelming number of opponents.With the British just holding on at Gheluvelt things on the Western Front calmed somewhat, with neither side making any major attacks until mid-1915. Here a British force was pulled together to attack the Aubers Ridge in support of a French attack further south, a force which included 1st Battalion, Black Watch. They formed part of the second wave during the assault, managing to reach and clear the forward German trenches, their offensive stalled under heavy fire. At this stage they received a counter attack and those who had made it to the enemy trenches were cut off and killed or captured. It was around this time that McLaren himself was wounded in action. After treatment it became clear that he was not going to recover fully and he was discharged on 20 August 1915. Despite this McLaren had survived through the Battalion's first year in the field and was in many respects lucky to have done so.; sold together with Medal Roll, M.I.C. and Silver War Badge Roll.Further entitled to the British War Medal 1914-20.Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. 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'The London Scottish, hastily assembled from detached duties a few days before, with no preparatory training, with defective rifles and without their machine-guns, had been flung into one of the most desperate fights of the War. At a most critical moment they had held back the rush of overwhelming numbers long enough to prevent a break through that would have imperilled the whole position about Ypres. The Queen Mother.1914 Star, Bar (1425 Pte. R.A. Inkster. 14-Lond. R.); British War and Victory Medals (Lieut. R.A. Inkster.), good very fine (3)Robert A. Inkster of Scalloway, Shetland, was born in 1886 and served a banking apprenticeship in Lerwick before moving south and joining the London Scottish on 25 February 1911. Posted to 'E' Company, Inkster went to France with the 1st **Battalion on 15 September 1914 and must therefore have surely** shared in their famous action at Messines on 31 October. Severely wounded the following month and invalided home to recover, his obituary in the Regimental Journal notes that he convalesced at Glamis Castle: as a teenager, Lady Elizabeth Bowes Lyon (future wife of H.M. King George VI and later well known as H.M. The Queen Mother) worked there and tended to many of the casualties - Inkster may well have been one of them. Subsequently commissioned into the 13th Battalion Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders (a training and Home Defence unit) on 24 September 1915, his obituary further notes that he was vet again unfortunately wounded whilst instructing new recruits in the throwing of hand grenades. Though his War and Victory Medals are named to him as a Lieutenant, his M.I.C. notes his final rank as Captain; he also appears additionally entitled to the **Territorial Efficiency Medal though a further note on his M.I.C.** states this being returned for disposal. 'But the rain of debris was so thick that we were compelled to seek shelter in the cabin and when we were able to emerge again there was no sign of the Princess Irene upon which we had been working only a few hours before. Golden, L.Sto, R.N.), flan on BWM a little thin in places as issued, edge bruising and minor contact wear, very fine (3)James Golden was born at Maidstone Kent on 20 April 1887, the son of Thomas and Caroline Golden of Hawthorne Cottage, Loose, Maidstone. Enlisting on 29 September 1909 as Stoker Class II he joined Acheron that same day before being posted to H.M.S. Bulwark on 23 March 1910.With her he was advanced to Stoker Class I on 1 October 1910 a rank he was to serve in for the next two years before reaching his final position of Leading Stoker on 6 November 1912, while with H.M.S. St. George. Upon the outbreak of the Great War Golden was stationed with the destroyer H.M.S. Bat as part of the 8th Destroyer Flotilla. The Bombardment of HartlepoolRemoving to the scout cruiser Forward, he joined her with the 9th Flotilla at Hartlepool alongside the Patrol. Both were in port on the morning of 16 December 1914 when a powerful German Fleet including two Battlecruisers, Seydlitz and Moltke appeared over the horizon. This fleet opened fire on the town while the two coastal batteries were unable to make a dent in reply.Patrol got underway and left the harbour to confront the intruders but Forward found herself unable to make steam. While Patrol was engaged by the armoured cruiser Blucher in the channel Forward was attempting to get underway. Despite desperate efforts she was not to emerge from the port until the German warships were already in retreat.Princess IreneAfter the raid Forward was posted to the 7th Destroyer Flotilla in the river Humber. Golden was posted ashore on 20 April 1915 and joined the shore establishment Pembroke II. From here he was posted to the minelayer Princess Irene, originally built as a passenger liner she was now operating out of Sheerness, Kent.The raids on Hartlepool, Scarborough and Whitby had caused a great deal of concern over the vulnerability of the British coastline. Part of the response was a programme of minelaying which took place over the coming months, Princess Irene took part in this- laying over 400 mines in early May before returning to Sheerness to rearm.She arrived there on 26 May, starting to take on mines as soon as possible. The morning of the next day she was still lying at anchor with a barge and boat- number 263- alongside her. Suddenly an enormous explosion ripped through the vessel, destroying her totally and wiping out all but one of her crew. Lieutenant Arthur Notley aboard the trawler Scott observed the holocaust stating that: 'the explosion occurred by her mainmast, well abaft of her funnels. This was a vellowish white flame which rose to about 60 ft. and was accompanied by a dense volume of dark brown smoke that completely and suddenly enveloped the vessel. Between three and five seconds later there was a second, dull, explosion, quite distinct from the first, and this time there was no flame but a large amount of white smoke rising inside a column of black smoke which assumed a much greater altitude.'(Blown to Eternity - The loss of HMS Princess Irene, refers)AftermathThe wreckage of the vessel was blasted as far as twelve miles from the site of the explosion. Four oil tanks at the Isle of Grain Fuel Depot were punctured by pieces of debris andtragically- nine year old child named Hilda Johnson was killed in her garden by part of the Princess Irene. A farm labourer in a nearby field suffered a fatal heart attack and an electrical fitter died of head injuries caused by a chunk of steel plate bursting through the wall of a coaling ship chart house. One of the stricken vessel's boilers landed upon the deck of the same coaling ship, causing further injury and damage.Windows in nearby Chatham were shattered and panic seized the surrounding area for some time afterwards. Along with debris personal items were scattered over the surrounding area including boots, monogrammed serviettes and a tin of condensed milk.Only one crewman survived. Stoker David Wills, one of working party aboard for the refitting of the vessel and at the time was in the galley, although his memory as to the events of the explosion was totally blank. It is entirely possible that Golden known to Willis as- according a newspaper article entitled killed on the Princess Irene- 'It is thought that he was one of a working party from Chatham sent to Sheerness, and that he was on the launch which was stationed by the Princess Irene when she blew up'.Such was the nature of the explosion very few of the crew's bodies could be recovered, little of what was discovered was identifiable. It is unknown if any part of Golden's physical remains were found however he is remembered upon the Chatham Naval Memorial; sold together with the recipient's original medal slip of issue, a newspaper cutting relating to the recipient's death and a copy of Blown to Eternity - The loss of HMS Princess Irene along with copied research comprising a Commonwealth War Graves certificate and photocopies of the original documents present with the lot.Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. This** vessel began the war in the Mediterranean and was soon posted to support the Gallipoli Landings in 1915, playing a notable role at X Beach on 25 April. She was patrolling for submarines in May 1915 when the Austro-Hungarian U-IV managed to hit her with a torpedo. Despite the damage Dublin managed to escape and remained afloat, being posted home in 1916. Williams went ashore on 6 February 1916, joining the crew of the light cruiser Active on April 1916. Posted to support Admiral Jellicoe's flagship Iron Duke she performed this role during the Battle of Jutland. Active was stationed on the left of the destroyer screen before the battle and when the fleet deployed to port she was stationed behind the battleline. As such she fired only eight rounds from her 4-inch guns during the the fighting. After Jutland Williams briefly went ashore before returning to Active on 1 January 1917 and seeing out the rest of the war with her. After the end of the Great War he was posted to Cadmus at Hong Kong, Walrus and Hood. Shore pensioned on 8 March 1931 Williams was called up again for service in the Second World War. Jutland - in the drinkHe was present at the Battle of Jutland, 31 May to 1 June 1916, when the Nestor, together with H.M.S. Nomad and H.M.S. Nicotar, launched an attack on the German Battle Cruisers: both Nestor and Nomad were sunk in the ensuing action, with the captain of the former, **Commander the Hon. Edward Bingham, being** awarded the Victoria Cross for his gallantry in leading the attack. Unleashed by Beatty at around 4 p.m. on 31 May, the destroyers of the 13th Flotilla made headlong for the enemy at a rate of 30 knots, those of the 2nd Division - under Bingham, V.C. in Nestor - bearing the brunt of 'an extremely warm welcome' from the German battlecruiser line. The surviving crews of both ships were picked up by German Torpedo Boats, Stone being lucky to come away from the ordeal with his life and eventually be repatriated. The result of this damage was that Mainz had to be scuttled, a major success for the British.Seager was still with Lydiard when she steamed into action at the Battle of Jutland. The Laforey-class destroyers were unable to keep pace with the Battlecruiser fleet and as such most didn't see action until the night. Lydiard was leading her squadron- which had lost touch with the fleet- only to run into the High Seas Fleet in the dark. The result was that Petard took a battering and Turbulent was sunk, Lydiard however crossed the line unscathed.Remaining with the Lydiard for the rest of the war Seager served with number of vessels over the coming years including Royal Arthur, Pandora and Ramillies. Roberts was stationed at the Torpedo School H.M.S. Vernon on the outbreak of the Great War and was soon posted to the K-class destroyer Fortune on 16 November 1914. This vessel was part of the 4th Destroyer Flotilla at this time, part of the Great Fleet. Her service was relatively uneventful prior to the Battle of Jutland.Going into action with Beatty's Grand Fleet later in the Battle Fortune was on the disengaged side of the line. As night fell the British lost contact with the Germans and spent much of the night and early morning attempting to rengage. At around 23:15 the British destroyers engaged a force of light cruisers back up by Battleships, suffering heavy losses in the process. They continued to hunt for the German warships until Fortune and Ardent, now alone, encountered them. The Oldenburg caught Fortune in floodlights, exposing her to fire from four German Battleships. She was immediately hammered with heavy fire but notably also returned it at a prodigious rate letting off seven 5.9 inch shells and eight 3.5 inch shells in just 28 seconds. The uneven fight was a forgone conclusion however and Fortune sank beneath the weight of German fire, her crew manning the guns to the last. Only seven men survived with two of them being wounded, the remaining 67 were killed. Pembroke.), the first three heavily polished, edge bruising, contact marks overall, nearly very fine (4)Arthur William West was born at Edgeware, London on 28 April 1898 and enlisted with the Royal Navy on 10 September 1913 as Boy Class II. The MediterraneanPosted to the Battleship Russell with the 6th Battle Squadron as Boy Class I on the outbreak of the Great War he remained with her during the transfer to the Mediterranean in the build up to the Gallipoli Campaign. Here she was involved in the evacuation of troops from Cape Helles and later remained on in the Eastern Mediterranean. West reach maturity aboard the battleship, being appointed Ordinary Seaman on 20 April 1916. Whilst underway just off Malta on 27 April Russell struck two sea mines laid by U-73. They did not cause her to sink immediately but a fire broke out in her after section. Despite efforts to control it an explosion near one of the 12-inch guns brought matters to a head and the vessel was evacuated with over 100 men dying in the disaster. West was amongst the survivors and after a brief interval he joined the crew of the destroyer Petard.JutlandWith this vessel he saw action at Jutland where she formed part of the heavily engaged 13th Destroyer Flotilla. Part of Beatty's Battlecruiser fleet Petard was part of the destroyer screen ordered to launch a torpedo attack upon the enemy in the early hours of the Battle. They engaged the German escorts and a close quarters battle was fought between the fleets, both Nestor and Nomad were sunk in this clash.Petard however made it through, striking the German destroyer V29 with a torpedo and battering her with 4-inch gunfire on the way past. She came upon the German Battlecruiser line and took again lined up her torpedoes: We fired another torpedo at about 9,000 vards range at the German Battlecruiser line and then turned to starboard to a slightly converging but nearly parallel course, to the German battle-cruisers. We steamed ahead a little and when about four points on their bow fired the remaining two torpedoes. By this time the German destroyers seemed to have disappeared.'(Lt. **Commander E. C. Thomson, as quoted in The Jutland Honours)Despite** not being aware of it one of Petard's torpedoes had in fact run on a good distance and hit Seydlitz causing serious damage. In fact when the battlecruiser returned to port her freeboard was reduced to only 2.5 meters and she had taken on 5,300 tons of water. On her return journey Petard was also to rescue one of the survivors of the battleship Queen Mary, one of only twenty to be saved. During the night of 31 May-1 June she was one of the warships that became lost and crossed the German line, coming uner fire from Westfalen. She was hit four times as a result with nine killed and six wounded as a result of a hit upon one of her 4-inch guns. Surviving the intense action at Jutland West remained with Petard until 1 October 1917 when he was posted to Verdun. He was to see postwar service with a number of warships including Cyclops, Colombo and Moorhen. Appointed Sailmaker's Mate on 14 October 1934 and Sailmaker on 1 February 1937 West was pensioned on 19 April 1938. He returned to service for the Second World War, once again being appointed Sailmaker. Posted to the shore establishment Calliope on 16 May 1941 he was to serve there until being invalided from service on 7 August 1945; sold together with copied service papers. She took part in Operation XX, a failed attempt to force the German High Seas Fleet to sally from port. Over the course of the war her mines took a heavy toll however sinking a number of German warships including M47, SS Turin and UB-61. At the end of the conflict she had laid 25,242 mines, more than any other British minelayer.Marsden remained with Princess Magret after the end of the war when she was directed to the as part of the first Royal Naval intervention in the Estonian and Latvian Wars of Independence. She landed 5,000 rifles for the Estonian Army at Reval and then went on to Riga. Here the Red Army was advancing on the city and Princess Magret took aboard several refugees before its fall. She returned to Britian in January 1919 and Marsden left her on 31 March 1919, being formally demobilised then and issued his R.F.R. Reaching his majority with the Battleship Cornwallis on 10 February 1906 he was to serve with a number of warships before the Great War including Thesus and Defience. He joined the light cruiser Falmouth on 29 July 1914, being present with her at the Battle of Heligoland Bight not long later.Falmouth was posted to the 3rd Light Cruiser Squadron before the Battle of Jutland in 1916, being the Flagship for Rear Admiral Napier. This Squadron was part of the force assigned to escort the Battlecruiser Fleet in drawing out the High Seas Fleet. Not engaged in the Run to the South the Squadron were the first to encounter the Grand Fleet before the final major engagement of the Battle.Falmouth targeted Weisbaden and landed hits upon Lutzow and **Derfflinger before engaging the cruiser Munchen. She struck** the German warship twice, causing damage to her boilers and preventing her from keeping up steam. Falmouth fired a total of 175 shells dueing the action. After the Battle she was on of the ships which sortied on 19 August 1916 only to be targeted by the u-boat, U-66. Hit by a torpedo Falmouth managed to make steam and head for home, at some stage being taken on by a tug. Unfortunately she was surprised by U-63 and hit twice more just off Flamborough Head. This proved too much and Falmouth sank some eight hours later. Shank survived the sinking and was posted ashore to Vivid I on 27 August. **Returning to service afloat on 14 September with the cruiser** Weymouth he remained with her until 31 January 1918. Serving intermittently between shore establishments and H.M.S. Fearless foor the rest of the war, Shank joined the Royal Fleet **Reserve on 12 September 1920.** He was discharged as over the age limit on 9 February 1938 just missing Second World War Service; sold together with copied service papers and census data as well as a copied photograph of H.M.S. He joined the books of Defence on 11 January 1915 and was present during the Battle of Jutland on 31 May 1916, being the flagship of **Rear-Admiral Sir Robert Arbuthnot**, leading the 1st Cruiser Squadron. The Squadron formed the starboard flank of the cruiser screen, ahead of the main body of the Grand Fleet. Defence was just to the right of the centre of the line. At 1747hrs, Defence and Warrior, the leading two ships of the squadron, spotted the German II Scouting Group and opened fire. Their shells fell short and the two ships turned to port in pursuit, cutting in front of the battlecruiser Lion, which was forced to turn away to avoid a collision. Shortly afterwards, they spotted the disabled German light cruiser Wiesbaden and closed to engage. When the two ships reached a range of 5,500 vards from Wiesbaden they were spotted in turn at 1805hrs by the German battlecruiser Derfflinger and four battleships which were less than 8,000 yards away. The fire from the German ships was heavy and Defence was hit by two salvoes from the German ships that caused the aft 9.2-inch magazine to explode. The resulting fire spread via the ammunition passages to the adjacent 7.5-inch magazines which detonated in turn. The ship exploded at 1820hrs with the loss of all hands. Hecla); Italy, Kingdom, Messina Earthquake Medal 1908, the last two with some minor contact wear, overall good very fine (5)Leonard Stubbington was born at Bishops Walton, Hampshire on 4 January 1881 and worked as a Gardner prior to enlisting with the Royal Navy on 12 March 1899 as Domestic Class II. He served with a number of vessels through the turn of the century including Comus and Charybdis being advanced Domestic Class I on 28 February 1905 whilst ashore at Victory I. Posted to Euryalus on 4 September 1907 Stubbington was promoted Officer's Steward Class II less than a month later on 1 November.He was still serving in this rank the next year on 28 December 1908 when a massive earthquake-measuring 7.5 on the Richter Scale- rocked the Messina strait between Italy and Sicily. A tsunami with waves as high as 40 feet crashed down over the coastline and the estimated death toll is believed to be as high as 85,000. The nearest international ships including Euryalus rushed to provide assistance forming search parties for survivors and providing medical aid where possible. In gratitude the Italian Government approved the creation of a commemorative medal issued to those who landed to give aid. Doubtless as a Steward Stubbington was heavily involved in the relief efforts.Soon promoted Officer's Steward Class I the next year on 8 February 1909 and went ashore that same year on 22 April. Stubbington was to serve aboard multiple vessels before the Great War including Terrible. Topaze and Patrol before going ashore at Chatham on 3 December 1912. He was still there on the outbreak of the Great War and served the first two years of the war there before joining the company of the tender H.M.S. Hecla on 1 July 1916. Removing to the former minelayer, Apollo from 1 September 1917, notably as Officer's Steward Class I he would likely have served the Ship's Captain -later Rear Admiral-Arthur Wood, a 1st Class Cricketer. Remaining with Apollo until **1920** he was to serve aboard Crescent and Tiger before finally being demobilised on 23 October 1922; sold together with copied service papers. 'The attack took Maori by surprise, no ships or shore-batteries having engaged the raiders, with the result that nearly all officers and ratings were asleep. The explosion opened the bulkhead between the engine room and the gearing room. Lubricating oil in the gearing room, about 2,000 gallons, caught fire. Oil fuel from one of the tanks later added to the blaze. The fire spread to the ready use ammunition lockers on the after superstructure, causing continuous explosions which flung jagged splinters round the deck. A large explosion was thought to be the depth charges in the warhead magazine. The position in Maori became untenable and she had to be abandoned. Boats in the harbour took off most of the crew. Soon after this there was [a] heavy explosion, believed to be the 4-inch magazine blowing up Maori settled by the stern and remained at an angle with her forepart out of the water up to the break in the forecastle. Three hands had been killed and six wounded.'(The loss of the destroyer Maori during the Siege of Malta as described in Destroyer Down: An Account of HM Destroyer Losses, 1939-1945, by Arthur Evans refers)The 'Battle of Cape Bon 1941' group of seven awarded to Leading Seaman G. W. Hewerdine, Royal Navy, whose career spanned two world wars, a remarkable three 'near misses' culminating in his surviving the loss of H.M.S. Maori during the Siege of Malta in February 19421914-15 Star (J.20223, G. W. Hewrdine, A.B., R.N.); British War and Victory Medals (J.20223 G. W. Hewerdine. A.B. R.N.); 1939-45 Star; Africa Star; War Medal 1939-45; Royal Navy L.S. & G.C., G.V.R. (J.20223 G. W. Hewerdine, A.B. H.M.S. Eagle.), the second war awards with their named and addressed box of issue, heavy polishing and contact wear to second and third, minor contact wear to seventh, overall very fine (7)George William Hewerdine was born at Melton Mowbray, Leicestershire on 13 May 1897 and worked as a groom and gardener prior to enlisting as Boy Class II on 20 September 1912. Still underage when the war began he was stationed with H.M.S. Suffolk. By a twist of fate Hewerdine had been posted to the cruiser from the doomed Carnarvon not long before the former vessel was sent to patrol the Atlantic therefore missing the disastrous Battle of Coronel.Reaching his majority aboard the Suffolk on 13 May 1915 he remained with her, hunting commerce raiders, until 25 August 1916. At this stage Hewerdine removed to H.M.S. Dolphin, the Royal Navy's submarine training school, after which he joined the K-class submarine K11.It was here that his run of bad luck began, with Hewerdine's new posting soon hitting problems. While on patrol in the North Sea her engines caught fire forcing her to service and be towed back to port for repairs. He then removed to K22, joining her on 1 January 1918 in time for Operation E.C.1. - The Battle of May Island. A failed exercise which saw two submarines sunk and four more damaged along with H.M.S. Fearless and over 100 men losing their lives.Hewerdine remained with submarines until 10 July 1918 when he went ashore and, perhaps having had enough of submarine warfare at May Island, was posted to the destroyer Senator on 5 November in the Black Sea. He went on to see service with various craft including the gunboat Cicala, likely during the vessel's time hunting pirates on the China Station. Later joining Emperor of India, Scotsman and finally Wren, that being his last posting afloat before being shore pensioned on 12 May 1937.Returning to the colours on the outbreak of the Second World War Hewerdine was posted to the armed merchantman H.M.S. Cheshire. This ship acted as an escort for much of the war with Hewerdine joining her on 25 August 1939. She was performing this role on 14 October 1939 with a convoy North-West of Ireland when a torpedo fired by U-137 struck her amidships.Despite severe damage she survived afloat with her crew of over 220 men being taken onto the Canadian destroyer Skeena. Meanwhile Cheshire herself was towed back into port and remarkably survived the incident. She soon returned to work with Hewerdine aboard, however he would not be there for long with a posted ashore to Drake I 16 December 1940. Joining Drake IV for the destroyer Maori, at the time part of the 14th Destroyer Flotilla on 11 July 1941. Serving with the British Mediterranean Fleet during this time it was not long before Hewerdine, Maori and the rest of the squadron were thrown into action at the Battle of Cape Bon. Attempts by the Italians to resupply their forces in North Africa were being stymied by the defenders of Malta and in desperation the Regina Marina ordered supplies to be carried aboard two cruisers, Da Barbiano and Di Giussano. The 14th Destroyer Flotilla under Commander G. Stokes was ordered to intercept them, comprising two tribal class warships, an 'L' class and a Dutch destroyer the Isaac Sweers. Ignoring a last minute order not to engage Stokes prowled the coast, coming upon the Italian convoy off Cape Bon early in the morning of 13 December 1941. Two [H.M.S.] Sikh torpedoes slammed into the Italian flagship at 03:24. As she erupted into flames, the destroyer struck with 4.7 inch batteries and machine-guns. By this time Legion, following off Sikh's starboard quarter, had two torpedoes running towards Da Barbiano. Legion's captain had assumed that Stokes would target the second cruiser, not the first. When he saw this was not the case, he quickly shifted aim and hurled six more at Di Giussano. Maori, following off Legion's port quarter, first two torpedoes at 03:26. One struck Da Barbiano astern. A survivor reported, "The blaze from the gasoline barrels aft propagated itself to the oil that was gushing from the bunkers, igniting a hellish inferno." The ship sank within five minutes just 3,500 meters offshore.'(Six Victories: North Africa, Malta, and the Traffic War, November 1941-March, by Vincent O'Hara refers)Maori remained in the vicinity of Malta, taking part in a number of small skirmishes and convoys while deployed there. Stationed in Valletta harbour on the night of 12 February 1942 she was caught in a sudden air raid which dropped a bomb into her engine room at 01:12. The bulk of her crew were asleep at the time and one can imagine the sense of panic as they awoke, doubtless this contributed to the crisis and the firefighters were unable to prevent the ships 4.7 inch ammunition from detonating.Despite the danger losses were fortunately light with only three dead and another six wounded, Hewerdine was among the survivors and was doubtless taken off with them into the harbour. Moari sank with her bow up out of the water, her rear section was removed and taken to Marsamxett harbour. Dolphin on 8 December 1916, being posted to the submarine C28. After the end of the war he joined the new K-class with H.M.S. K16, returning to destroyers with Broke in 1926. Watson was pensioned ashore on 19 July **1935.Remobilised for service with the anti-aircraft cruiser** Calcutta on 24 August 1939. On that famous day she screened the 1st Battle Cruiser Squadron as one of twelve destroyers operating with the 13th Destroyer Flotilla. Her skipper, Lieutenant-Commander M. G. B. Leage wrote in his report that she fired two torpedoes from 7,000 yards at the German Scouting Group at, shortly after the Germans had reversed course to the South. Legge believed that one of his torpedoes may have struck the last German ship in the line, but no hits were made.Reynolds remained in the service and earned his L.S. & G.C. Medal in November 1929 before being issued a Hurt Certificate after being slightly injured by an explosion on Westcott on 18 March 1936. (x) The first ships to sail under Operation Dynamo proceeded without escort via Route Z, and after an uneventful voyage Mona's Isle berthed at the Gare Maritime at about midnight. When she cast off five hours later she had 1,420 troops on board. The voyage back to Dover was not so easy. For the first twenty miles the Mona's Isle was within artillery range of the shore- which was now in enemy hands- and she was soon being repeatedly hit by shellfire. Luckily, the shells did not explode, and when her rudder was hit her master managed to keep going by steering with the main engines. Slowly she limped out of range of short artilleryonly to be attacked from the air by six Me 109s that made repeated passes, machine-gunning the decks. By the time she arrived back at Dover, twenty-three of her passengers were dead and dozens were wounded. Serving on a number of ships before reaching his majority including Prince George, Carnarvon and Monarch he was appointed Ordinary Seaman with the last.JutlandAdvanced Able Seaman on 26 January 1914 Cummings joined the destroyer Hecla in May that same year. On the outbreak of the Great War this vessel was serving as the Depot ship for the Fourth Destroyer Flotilla. Cummings was to serve the first half of the war with her before removing to another destroyer within the Flotilla Midge on 18 March 1916. This vessel served with Admiral Beatty's portion of the Grand Fleet at the Battle of Jutland. She was attached to the 2nd Cruiser Squadron as an escort, she did not suffer any losses in the battle. After the action Cummings was posted to the M-class destroyer Pellew on 18 July 1916. The Action of 11-12 December 1917 This newly built vessel was consigned to convoy duties for the duration of the war, having several near misses in 1917. Cummings was promoted Leading Seaman with her on 11 November of that year. At the end of the year- in a bid to draw out the German U-boats- the Admiralty laid a trap consisting of what appeared to be a lightly defended convoy but was in fact armed merchantmen. Unfortunately the plan went awry when they were attacked, not by U-boats but a strong force of German destroyers. The armed merchant ships turned away while Pellew and her sister ship Patridge turned on the enemy in a bid to by them time. Heavily outnumbered the German force detached a destroyer to engage the convoy while the remainder engaged the British ships.Patridge took heavy hits with one torpedo tube being seriously damaged, despite this she was able to launch one which struck V100 but did not explode. Heavy seas made firing difficult, the gunner had to wait until they were out of the trough of the waves before taking shots. Patridge was struck in the engine room and came to a dead stop, hit multiple times the order was given for the vessel to be abandoned.Pellew was now alone, she too had been struck in the engine room but managed to retain some speed. However the leads to her torpedo tubes had been severed, rendering the weapons useless. Crippled and unable to make use of her most potent weapons she was lucky forced to make use of the bad weather to withdraw. With the covering action already a failure fighting on was useless and she took refuge in Norway with the rest what remained of the convoy.Cummings went ashore on 30 July 1918 remaining there for the rest of the war, he received a 'mention' for 'For services in Grand Fleet Destroyers between 1 January and 30 June 1918' (London Gazette 11 December 1918). Posted to Strenuous after the end of hostilities he saw service with many vessels between the wars, notably being awarded his L.S. & GC. with Iron Duke. He was pensioned on 13 November 1934. Mona's Isle and the Dunkirk EvacuationsAs war became inevitable Cummings returned to service on 31 August 1939 as Leading Seaman (pensioner). Posted first to Armed Boarding Vessel no. 3 he later joined the Armed Boarding Vessel (also described as an Ocean Boarding Vessel) Mona's Isle on 14 September 1939. This was the first of 8 Isle of Man Steam Packet Company vessels to be requisitioned for the evacuation. She was the first vessel to leave Dover- not including the radio link destroyer Wolsey- and had a peaceful crossing on the night of 27 May 1940. Her return journey was to prove less tranquil as she left France with 1,420 troops aboard the German guns on the Gravelines opened fire, however it was to be the Luftwaffe which proved a greater trial.One of the soldier's rescued by Mona Isle gave the following testimony:'We had a quiet time for about an hour or so until we saw planes approaching. The boys thought that they were spitfires but they turned out to be Dorniers [SIC] who strafed the boat... I had a premonition that they weren't British and took shelter in an alcove, the bullets were passing within an inch or two from my feet, had I been on deck I certainly would have been killed. As it was I got a bullet in the shoulder and, as I was being treated for that, we were shelled by German guns.Mona Isle made a second trip on 2 June taking off another 1,200 men. Her commander received the D.S.O. for his leadership and one Petty Officer earned the D.S.M. for sticking to his gun despite multiple wounds.Cummings left Mona Isle on 29 July 1940 and went ashore at Victory I. There was not much of the farm left in a few minutes and I did not go back for my overcoat and pack, you can be sure"This unit was one of those sent into action on 25 September on the opening day of the Battle of Loos. As they advanced towards German lines they came under a hail of machine gun fire from the Hohenzollern Redoubt. Casualties mounted but the attack continued pushing into the Hulloch **Ouarries before they were unable to advance further. They** consolidated there but losses had been appallingly high with highest ranked survivor being a Lieutenant. Hughes was killed during the attack and is commemorated upon the Loos Memorial: sold together with copied research including M.I.C., Soldier's Died in the Great War entry and an extract from More Than A Name as well as an original slip of issue. R.); 1939-45 Star; War Medal 1939-45, very fine (7) Ernest Charles Barnaby was born on 8 July 1894 at Walsall, West Midlands and was a railway goods porter by trade. Barnaby and the 1st Battalion were mobilised on 4 August 1914 at Dover, arriving in France on 23 August 1914 after sailing on the Saturnai.Following the retreat from Mons the Battalion found themselves on the Ligny Road at dawn on 26 August 1914. An account of the catastrophic following three hours is described by Captain G.R.R. Beaumont who was in B Company at the time: 'We arrived at dawn by the Ligny Road to a spot where subsequently we suffered so heavily. The Battalion was ordered to form close Column facing the enemy's direction of defences. Companies were dressed by the right, piled arms, and place equipment at their feet. There was a big stir because some of the arms were out of alignment and the equipment did not in all cases show a true line. A full 7 to 10 minutes was spent in adjusting these errors. The Brigade Commander rode up to the Commanding Officer and shortly afterwards we were told to remain where we were as breakfast would shortly be up. Everyone was very tired and hungry having had nothing to eat since dinner the day before. A remark was passed as regards our safety. My Company Commander replied that French Cavalry were out in front and the enemy could not possibly worry us for at least three hours. Three Companies of the Battalion in close Column, the fourth company just about to move up to the left with a view to continuing a line with the 20th who had just commenced to dig in. Just about this time some Cavalry (about a troop) rode within 500 yards of us, looked at us and trotted off again. I saw their uniform quite distinctly and mentioned that they were not Frenchmen. I was told not to talk nonsense and reminded that I was very young. It was early in the morning and nobody felt talkative, least of all my Company Commander? The Cavalry appeared again in the distance and brought up wheeled vehicles; this was all done very peaceably and exposed to full view. We could now hear the road transport on the cobbled road and a shout went up "Here's the Cooker". New life came to the men and Mess Tins were hurriedly sought. Then came the fire. The field we were in was a cornfield. The corn had been cut. Bullets were mostly about 4 feet high just hitting the top of the corn stalks. Temporary panic ensued. Some tried to reach the valley behind, others chewed the cud; of those who got up most were hit. The machine gun fire only lasted about two minutes and caused about 400 casualties. The 4th Company moving off to the left was caught in columns of fours. Shell fire now started and did considerable damage to the transport, the cooker being the first vehicle to go. A little Sealyham terrier* that we had collected at Horsham St. Faith's before embarking, and that the troops had jacketed with the Union Jack was killed whilst standing next to the Driver of a General Service Wagon. I mention this as I saw the same Driver the day after still carrying the dog, he was very upset when he was ordered to bury it. The Commanding Officer was killed by the first burst and the Second in Command rallied the Battalion; several of us taking up position to the right of the point where we had suffered so heavily. An attack was organised at once, we re-took our arms and got in most of the wounded. The others were left and taken prisoner later at Haucourt Church that night. The above extract from a letter of an officer of the King's Own. As regards the last sentence of it, 4 Division (it should be remembered) had no Field Ambulance and it therefore had great difficulty in getting any of its wounded away. It was also deficient of signals, Cavalry, Cyclists, Royal Engineers Train and Divisional Ammunition Column.The 4th Division Headquarters at Haucourt got the 'overs' from this firing, the General's ADC and several men being hit. Stragglers began to come back into the village where the Divisional Staff collected them and led them forward again to the position North of Warnelle Ravine. Barnaby is commemorated on the La Ferte-Sous-Jouarre Memorial.Arthur Edward Barnaby, a native of Walsall, West Midlands, was born on 1 May 1882 and was an enameller by trade. Mobilised with the 2nd Battalion he left for India when war was declared. The Battalion was then sent to France arriving on 16 January 1915; the Walsall Advertiser reports that Barnaby was wounded in early 1915. The Battalion took part in some of the most ferocious fighting of early 1915, including the bayonet charge at Zwartelen on 17 February 1915, repulsing an attack near Ypres on 21 February 1915. They were to witness the German gas attack on Allied troops at Gravenstafel on 24 April 1915. On 8 May 1915 the Germans attacked the Frezenberg Ridge as part of the 2nd battle of Ypres, The Battalion had been 1100 strong at the beginning but by the end of the day could only muster sixty-seven men. The final casualties for the day were recorded as 15 officers and 893 men.Leaving for Egypt in November1915 the Battalion spent the remainder of the war in Salonika taking part in the battle at Doiran.By 1939 Barnaby was a labourer, when he re-enlisted for the Second World War. He was posted to 50 Company, Auxiliary Military Pioneer Corps as part of the British Expeditionary Force in France at the age of 50. Having been taken off he was killed in action when the Lancastria was bombed and sunk off St. Nazaire on 17 June 1940.Loss of the LancastriaMuch has been written about the disaster that occurred off St. Nazaire on 17 June 1940, but by way of summary, the following extract is taken from Charles Hocking's Dictionary of Disasters at Sea: 'On 17 June 1940, the Cunard White Star Line's S.S. Lancastria, Captain J. Sharp, was lying off St. Nazaire takin on board British troops who were being evacuated from France. The embarkation began at 8 a.m. and continued until 4 p.m., by which time the liner was ready to weigh anchor. In addition to the soldiers there was a small party of civilians, and their wives and children. As far as can be ascertained there were 5,310 persons on board, of whom 300 were crew. The first attack by aircraft came about 2 p.m., followed after a short interval by a second raid. In these attacks the Orient liner Oronsay was hit and damaged but still remained seaworthy.At about 4.30 p.m., in a third attack, the ship was struck by a salvo of bombs, one of which passed right through the dining saloon and burst in the engine room. The damage to the Lancastria was vital and she took a heavy list, and although the boats were got out with all possible speed it was evident from the outset that there was no hope of rescue for thousands of those on board. Only two lifeboats managed to get away, the others capsizing owing to difficulties with the falls or through being overloaded. Tugs and other small craft were quickly on the scene and picked up hundreds of men in the water. The Lancastria remained afloat for barely 30 minutes, turning gradually over to port so that those still on board were able to walk upon her side as she lay. After floating in this position for some time she capsized completely and we

The result was that his eye was 'excised' according to his medical records, invalided back to Australia it soon became clear that while his wounds would heal Vines was no longer fit for service. Vanguard casualty's pair awarded to Ship's Steward's Assistant G. W. E. Lee, Royal Navy, a Jutland Veteran who was killed in action during the destruction of Vanguard and whose diary, found floating in Scapa Flow some 18 months later, was to be one of the few artifacts recovered from the tragedyBritish War and Victory Medals (M.23273 W. April 2001.George William Ellis Lee was born at Caltestock, Dorset on 11 October 1894 the son of Samuel and Jane Lee of the School House, Cullompton, Devon. Becoming a teacher himself upon graduating he taught at Heathcoat Boy's School, Tiverton and later Saltney College, Birmingham. Joining the Royal Navy at Vivid I on 28 January 1916 as Ship's Steward's Assistant, Lee was soon posted to the Battleship Vanguard on 2 March. Part of the 4th Battle Squadron under Captain Dick she joined Beatty's Grand Fleet during the Battle of Jutland on 31 May 1916. The 16th ship in the British line she fired 80 of her 12-inch shells over the course of the Battle, sustaining no hits herself.Returning to the base at Scapa Flow, Vanguard had just completed a round of exercises on 9 July 1917 and was lying at anchor with the rest of the fleet. Workmen came aboard to help refit the ships guns and a concert aboard Royal Oak attracted a number of officers who left the ship for the entertainment as evening set it. A summary of the subsequent events can be found on the Scottish Ship Wrecks website which states:'Gradually the lights round the anchorage flickered out as many of the sailors settled down for the night ready for their early watch the next day. At around 11:20pm the half dark evening was illuminated by a huge flame that shot up from the Vanguard aft of her foremast. Almost immediately the stillness was shattered by a massive explosion and the hillsides round Scapa were lit up by a gigantic fireball from the ship. A second even larger explosion followed which extinguished the flames and, as the smoke cleared, the Vanguard had disappeared. Around the anchorage burning wreckage rained down on the fleet - a large piece landed on the deck of HMS Belleraphon anchored next in line to the Vanguard - another, a complete 12" gun turret weighing over 400 tons, landed on Flotta nearly a mile away. Of the 845 men who were aboard the ship only the sixteen officers on Royal Oak and two astonishingly lucky sailors who were flung clear lived. One further man flung clear of the destruction survived for some time but was unable to recover from his injuries. In the wake of the wreck a court of inquiry was convened which, strangely did not come to a satisfactory verdict, stating that the explosion could have been a result of unstable cordite detonating but not ruling out sabotage.Lee was killed in the explosion with only his diary remaining, astonishingly it stayed intact and was recovered over a year later, the Western Times expands stating: 'The diary is much weather and sea water stained, but all the entries therein are decipherable. Its recovery in this remarkable way, 18 months after the tragedy, has, of course, given melancholy satisfaction both to Mr. and Mrs. Lee and to Miss Jarrett, who are very grateful to the finder for his kind thought in forwarding it to them. York when she was targeted by Italian MTM boats in Suda Bay, Crete in March 1941Two such boats - capable of 34 knots and packed with 660lbs. of explosives in their bows - struck York amidships on the night of 26 March 1941, the resultant explosion inflicting fatal damage. For good measure, the Luftwaffe followed up over the coming days, reducing the cruiser to a total wreckBritish War and Victory Medals (J. 41504 A. F. York in February 1940. He was consequently aboard her at the time of her loss off Crete in May 1941.H.M.S. York - an explosive endIn respect of York's loss, the above cited article by Dwight Zimmerman, takes up the story: Located south of Greece, Crete was being used by the British forces in Egypt as a forward operating base as part of its campaign to support the Greek army against Italian army invasion in early spring 1941. British fleet operations were staged in Suda Bay, a long, deep natural harbour on the island's northwest coast. In mid-March, Italian aerial reconnaissance had observed a heavy concentration of ships in the harbour. In addition to the York, the light cruiser Coventry, destroyer Hasty, and fourteen support ships and tankers, including the 18,000-ton tanker Pericles, were in the harbour. An attack was quickly planned, using six MTMs dispatched from the destroyers Francesco Crispi and Quintino Sella, which were specially modified to transport them. Packed with 660 pounds of explosives in their bows and with a top speed of 34 knots, the MTMs were high-speed motorized bombs. Because of the high risk involved, such missions were considered one-way efforts. But, unlike the later Japanese kamikaze aircraft, the MTMs were not suicide weapons. Once the operator, piloting the boat from the stern, got within striking distance of his target, he would leap out of the boat and float away on a life raft designed to protect him from the shock of the explosion, and from which presumably he would be captured. The night of March 26 had no moon and calm seas. In less than a minute after getting into position ten miles northwest of the entrance to Souda Bay at 3:30 a.m. the destroyers launched the six MTMs under the command of Lt. Luigi Faggioni. Faggioni and his boats had less than two hours to reach the bay and find his targets, as sunrise would occur at 5:18 a.m. The harbour was protected by three boom and net barriers, with one at the mouth of the bay, and the second about a half-mile beyond, near the forts that guarded the entrance. The third barrier was near the base of the bay, protecting the anchored ships. Taking advantage of the heavy haze protecting the MTMs from shore observation, Faggioni's boats, designed to run over such obstacles as protective booms, easily crossed the barriers.Shortly after the six MTMs crossed the third, and last, barrier they separated and sought out their assigned targets. Two attacked the York, located closest to the third barrier. At 4:46 a.m., the silence in the bay was shattered by a series of deafening explosions. Thinking that it was an aerial attack, the anti-aircraft batteries began firing blindly into the night sky.The attack was a spectacular success. The York was hit amidships. Both engine rooms were flooded, leaving the ship without power. The cruiser was quickly taken under tow by a tug and the Hasty and beached. The Pericles was sunk, though because it settled in shallow water, most of its fuel cargo was able to be unloaded. Two other cargo ships were damaged. Only one of the MTMs failed to hit its target. It was later found on a nearby beach. Initially the Luftwaffe insisted it had sunk the York. After abandoning hopes of salvaging the cruiser, the Royal Navy scuttled York as the British evacuated Crete. Italian navy officers later boarded the hulk, recovered the York's log, and put an end to the Luftwaffe's claims.Faggioni and his men, Sub. Lt. Angelo Cabrini, Petty Officers Alessio de Vito, Tullio Tedeschi, Lino Beccati, and Sgt. Emilio Barberi, were all captured. Eventually they would receive Italy's Medaglia d'Oro, the equivalent of the Medal of Honor.'Italy strikes againHaving been borne on the books of the shore establishment Nile in the interim, Arnall joined the battleship Queen Elizabeth in September 1941. It proved to be a short-lived appointment. On 20 December, she too fell victim to a gallant Italian clandestine attack at Alexandria, on this occasion enacted by "Charioteers". The resultant - and impressive - explosion tore a 40 feet square hole under the battleship's foremost boiler room.Arctic run - Mention in DespatchesOf Arnall's subsequent wartime appointments, we know that he served on the Arctic run in the destroyer Obedient, for he was mentioned in despatches for like services in convoys JW and RA 57 in February-March 1944 (London Gazette 30 May 1944). The recommendation states: 'Whilst in charge of the Depth Charge Party he showed leadership and energy under difficult circumstances with the result that a pattern of depth charges was always ready when required. Her claim was that it fired the last rounds on the German held coast towards the end of the Great War. This vessel had been used as a control ship on naval exercises but was withdrawn for service upon the commencement of hostilities in September 1939. Deployed on operations here from 28 May 1940 Shikari was notably involved in rescuing French soldiers from the sinking S.S. Prague off Gravelines on 1 June. She gave further aid to her allies over the next few days as the withdrawing French troops who had been guarding the Dunkirk beaches were evacuated. Indeed she was to prove the last of the Royal Navy ships to make the dangerous run in as the German Army closed on the Allied enclave, exchanging fire with shore batteries as she escaped the net.On the completion of the evacuations Shikari was posted back to convoy duty, being given Atlantic duty in September. Stationed on convoy defence in the North-Western Approaches in March 1943 it was here that the ship hit bad weather and nearly foundered. Shikari survived her ordeal and was later active in **Operation Rosegarden while operating out of Iceland. During** this time she faced heavy attack from U-boats before returning to the North-Western Approaches. She had served faithfully for much of the war but by this time the S-class was being replaced by the American leased Captain-class vessels. Shikari was withdrawn from Operations in September 1944 and saw only training duty for the rest of the war. While they were able to halt the Italian attack. constant assaults by air soon took their toll. Breconshire was hit by a bomb and taken under tow, managing to reach Marsaxlokk Harbour on 25 March. She was a sitting duck in the harbour however and was sung by German bombs the next day.Park survived the desperate fighting, although there is no record of where he went after the Breconshire sank. Barcham was killed in the attack on Bayonet and Scabbard Trenches on 12 October 1916, the unit suffered heavy losses with 92 men killed in action.Constance Wormald Barcham (nee de Burgh-Lawson) was born at Eastcroft, Lincolnshire in 1896, the daughter of Alice and Wormald de Lisle Henry de Burgh-Lawson. She was also the granddaughter of Sir Henry de Burgh-Lawson, the first de Burgh-Lawson baronet. She grew up in Arksey, Yorkshire where her father was a potato and fodder merchant before moving to Norfolk where she met Thomas Colin Barcham, the couple married at Kingsclere on February 1916. It appears the death of her husband on the Somme in **October 1916 spurred Barcham to join Queen Mary's Army** Auxiliary Corps on as a Forewoman. She served from 24 September 1917 in France, before returning to Britain on 4 August 1918. Working as a Ladies outfitter after the war Barcham lived in London between Hendon and Wembley. Stephen, 11th (Lonsdale) Battalion, Border Regiment, who was killed during the run up to the Somme Offensive while undertaking a raid in the Leipzig Salient on the night of 5-6 June 1916British War and Victory Medals (13641 Sjt. W. W. Stephen. Bord. R.), minor contact marks, very fine (2)William Walter Stephen was born at Whitehaven, Cumberland in 1889, the son of James Stephen of Workington. Enlisting at Workington on 30 September 1914 with the 11th (Lonsdale) Battalion, Border Regiment. He entered the war in France on 22 November 1915 (1914-15 Star) and saw several difficult months over the winter in trenches near Albert. The Londsdale's saw much less action in the run up to the Somme Offensive. They did take part in important action however, less than a month before the start of the battle it was decided to undertake a trench raid. Unusual activity had been observed around the Leipzig Salient- a defensive work near Authuille and the target of the Brigade during the Offensive- and a patrol was needed to investigate it and take prisoners for questioning.3 officers and 82 other ranks volunteered for the action and- led by Lieutenant Barnes- they assembled on the night of 5 June 1916 under cover of a preliminary bombardment. An Ammonal torpedo party advanced ahead of the rest of the raiders and detonated what remained of the wire. The party advanced afterwards in two waves, bombing as they went and taking a number of prisoners.After ten minutes of fighting the position had been properly mapped and the prisoners secured. Lieutenant Barnes ordered the withdrawal using a klaxon horn, unfortunately this also alerted the Germans to the retreat. A heavy bombardment was opened on the British lines causing heavy losses as the raiders tried to make their way back.Barnes was killed during the retreat; his body being found by a patrol of the Lancashire Fusiliers later in the night. In the chaos of the fighting retreat Stephen was separated from the rest of the party, he is the only member of the party listed as missing in the after-action report. It was later established that he was killed during the raid, although his body was never found. R. D. Anderson. W. York. R.), good very fine (2)Richard Dixon Anderson was born at Bradford, Yorkshire in 1895, the son of Joshua and Ada Anderson of 43 Thorncliffe Road, Bradford. His father worked as a Locomotive Engine Driver however the younger Anderson did not follow him into this area, instead working as an Assistant Gold Blocker.On the outbreak of the Great War Anderson was attested for the 2/5th (Reserve) Battalion, West Yorkshire Regiment. Posted from here to the 26th (3rd Tyneside Irish) Battalion, Northumberland Fusiliers with the new service number 260032 he entered the war in France at some stage after 1916. Still with this unit in Spring 1917 Anderson went into action with them at the Battle of Arras on 9-10 April. Initially stationed in reserve they advanced to consolidate the gains of 24th and 25th Battalions, taking the Blue line. During the night orders were given to take the Brown line with the 26th Battalion advancing over the Arras-Bailleul Road and Paris Railway line.Despite high losses- 28 killed and 72 wounded- Anderson survived the fighting and joined the Battalion in withdrawing from the line in the wake of the fighting. Returning to the line later in the month the Brigade was tasked with seizing the village of Rouex, in which the Germans still held the Chateau and Chemical works.Both position were riddled with snipers and dug in machine gun nest, making the assault a battle of attrition. A platoon under Lieutenant Shackleton attempted to clear the position but forced back with heavy losses, including the Lieutenant himself. The Battalion found itself under fire from the rear and was forced to clear houses behind them of snipers before digging in before the town. The 26th Battalion lost 28 men dead, 166 wounded and 54 missing in the period between 23-30 April. Anderson was one of those killed in the fighting on 28 April and is commemorated upon the Arras Memorial. It should be noted that he is listed as serving with the 1st/5th Battalion by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. However the Northumbrian Fusilier's Index, Registry of Effects and Medal Roll all state 26th Battalion. Enlisting at Falmouth with the Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry, he was posted to the 6th Battalion and entered the war in France on 3 August **1915.**At this time the unit was stationed at Ypres and they were to see heavy but intermittent fighting there over the next few months. They were stationed in the Divisional reserve in Mid-September, most notably during an attack by the 42nd Brigade north of Hooge on 24 September. Passing the next day in the dugouts they were later relieved and marched to GHQ at Roulers railway station. They were still here the next day when Truscott was listed as killed in action, he was likely confirmed dead having been posted missing after being killed by the German artillery during the attack two days before. He is commemorated upon the Ypres (Menin Gate) Memorial and was survived by his mother, full brothers and a half-brother. Notably his half-brother was to serve in the Second World War, being taken prisoner of war by the Japanese at the Fall of Singapore: sold together with copied research comprising an extract from the West Briton and Cornwall Advertiser, census information and registry of effects as well as a Battalion war diary extract, Commonwealth War Graves certificate and research on the recipient's half-brother.Further entitled to the 1914-15 Star.Gordon Pope Truscott was born at Falmouth. Richards appears in Railwaymen Died In The Great War, working as a Signalman with the Barry Railway prior to the Great War. Enlisting at Pontypridd with the South Wales Borderers and was posted to the 10th Battalion in France. This unit arrived in France in 1916, seeing heavy fighting at the Somme, Passchendaele and before the Hindenburg Line. They were much in service during the Hundred Days Offensive where the Allies finally rolled back the German forces in France. They were stationed in the Brigade **Reserve in Late October 1918 seeing heavy gas shelling** between 28-29 October. Tragically Richards is listed as killed in action on 29 October, likely as a result of the German gas attack, his death came just thirteen days before the end of the war. Ward, 1st/4th Battalion, West Riding Regiment late 6th Battalion, Durham Light Infantry, who was killed in action on 22 September 1916 less than a week after his transfer to the West Riding RegimentBritish War and Victory Medals (3005 Pte. J. Ward. Durh. L. I.), good very fine (2)John Ward was the son of John and Ellen Ward of Darlington, Yorkshire and lived at 27 William Street, Spennymoor, Durham before enlisting there on 5 October 1914. Posted to the 6th (Reserve) Battalion, Durham Light Infantry he was appointed Corporal with this unit with 2nd/6th Battalion on 14 April 1916. This unit served as a reserve to 1st/6th Battalion and not long after the appointment Ward joined them in France, reverting to Private the day he arrived on 21 July 1916. Arriving in time for the Battle of the Somme he found the British Army battered by the heavy fighting and in desperate need of reinforcements.As Ward was acclimatising to his new surroundings the 1st/4th Battalion, West Riding Regiment had been thrown into the savage around Ancre. The attack they made on 3 September 1916 near Schwaben Redoubt was to prove one of the costliest of their war with 11 officers and 336 other ranks becoming casualties. The Battalion needed to be largely re-constituted, the History of the 1/4th Battalion Duke of Wellington's (West Riding) Regiment, 1914-1919 outlines the process involved: The supply of men was simpler. Large drafts arrived within a few days, and, by the middle of September, the Battalion's fighting strength was practically the same as it had been at the beginning of the month. On September 21st a draft of eleven officers arrived, and several more joined a few days later. Among them were three or four who had already served with the Battalion abroad, either as officers or in the ranks, while others had seen active service elsewhere. 'Ward was one the first drafted to bring this battle-hardened unit back to full strength, arriving on 8 September 1916 being given the service number 4/6570, later dropping the 4 to leave 6570. Fully re-constituted by the 15 September they were once again marched to the front to support an attack by the 1/7th Battalion, Duke of Wellington's Regiment on the Leipzig Redoubt. The attack was a success with the Battalion suffering only light losses in their supporting role- a role they continued to perform when 5th Battalion, Duke of Wellington's Regiment was posted to occupy the captured positions. Three days later they took over the defence of the position themselves, a particularly onerous duty as the German guns had marked their trenches and dugouts making their bombardments particularly accurate. Once again, the Battalion History gives us an idea of nature of the hellish position they found themselves in, stating:'D Company, with C Company in close support to it, held the whole of the captured ground; the other companies occupied the old British line. D Company's sector was a ghastly place. Rain and shell-fire had turned the ground into a mass of mud, littered with the awful debris of battle. Never had the Battalion seen so many dead Germans; and there were many British too. Bodies were lying all over the ground in the open; many more were exposed by the shovel, and hastily recovered. A hot September sun beat down in the daytime, and the air was filled with the stench of decaying humanity.'The Battalion held their ground in the awful landscape until relieved on 24 September, in that time a great many men were killed by constant rain of shellfire. Ward was one of these, killed in action on 22 September, he is commemorated upon the Thiepval Memorial; sold together with copied research including extracts from the recipient's service papers, medal rolls, Commonwealth War Graves certificate and registry of effects.Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. An 'Attack on Bayonet Trench - Somme Offensive' casualty's pair awarded to Private J. Milligan, 2nd Battalion, Royal Scots Fusiliers, who was killed in action during the attack on 12 October 1916British War and Victory Medals (43400 Pte. J. Milligan. R. S. Fus.), good very fine (2)John Milligan lived at Calvend, Kirkcudbrightshire, Scotland before enlisting at Dumfries for service with the 2nd Battalion, Royal Scots Fusiliers. Entering the war after 1915 he was present with his unit during the Somme Offensive, in action three times throughout July they left the line and did not return to the fighting until November. As the offensive progressed the British army ran up against the Le Transloy Ridges, a stretch of high ground overlooking the Albert-Bapaume Road. This was guarded by a line of trenches and redoubts which the advancing British attempted to reduce over the coming months. The 2nd Battalion were no exception- at the time part of the 30th Division they went into action against one of these features called 'Bavonet Trench' on 12 October 1916.Advancing through the mud of No Man's land with the 7th Battalion, Suffolk Regiment on their left and a Battalion of the Norfolk **Regiment on their right they came under extremely heavy** machine gun fire from their flanks. Continuing to push through the fire 2nd Battalion found themselves before an unbroken forest of wire, caught before this the unit was cut to pieces.Milligan was one of those killed, likely by machine gun fire while stuck before the German trenches with little cover. His body was buried at the A.I.F. burial ground, Flers and he is further commemorated upon the Scottish National War Memorial; sold together with copied medal rolls, Soldier Died in the Great War entry and Commonwealth War Graves Certificate.Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. A poignant 'Mesopotamia 1916' casualty's pair awarded to Private A. Blackley, Seaforth Highlanders who was mortally wounded in the attempt to relieve Kut in January 1916British War and Victory Medals (S-2625 Pte. A. Blackley, Sea. Highrs.), nearly extremely fine (2)Andrew Blackley was born at Elderslie, Paisley in 1896, the son of John and Jane Blackley, of 1, Wallace Place, Elderslie, Renfrewshire. **Enlisting at Johnstone, Renfrewshire with the Seaforth Highlanders** Blackley entered the war in France on 19 March 1915. He joined the 1st Battalion who had arrived from India in October the year previously, as part of the Meerut Division.FranceBlackley's first taste of real action on the Western Front was the Battle of Aubers Ridge on 9 May 1915, when the Battalion was thrown into the fighting along with the rest of the Division in support of a larger French attack to the south. A heavy bombardment preceded the attack however it soon became clear that they had failed to seriously damage the enemy positions. Leaving the trenches, they were met with a wall of maxim and rifle fire- three attempts were made each with heavy losses and the attack ended with no ground taken and a casualty rate of 21 officers, 488 men. The Battalion later saw action at the Battle of Loos before being posted to join the British army in Mesopotamia. Arriving in December they joined General Alymer's Tigris Corps, marching to the relief of Kut which was besieged early in the month. The Siege of KutBlackley and the rest of the 1st Battalion were immediately thrown into the relief efforts, serving as part of the 19th Brigade they went into action at the Battle of Sheikh Sa'ad. Under pressure from Townsend- bottled up in Kut- Alymer sent General Younghusband with those forces available to attempt a breakthrough. Without cavalry and with the weather too poor to launch aircraft the British marched blindly into the Ottoman defences around Sheikh Sa'ad, 6 January. The first day of fighting resulted in a failure to breakthrough against stiff resistance from the outnumbered Ottoman defenders. 19th Brigade formed part of the British left for the second day of fighting requiring a five-mile march in the searing desert heat before they reached their starting positions. The delay allowed the Ottoman's to launch a spoiling attack which- while driven back- caused further delays, seriously disordering the assault. Repeated attacks against the Ottoman 35th Division failed to make a breakthrough, the poor cover before the defences forced the Brigade to advance through a storm of machine gun, rifle and shell fire with no respite.Regrouping on 8 January, Tigris Corps was to make two more attempts to reach the defenders at Wadi on 13 January and Hanna on 21 January. At some stage during the month Blackley was seriously wounded in the fighting- likely at Hanna when the British forces took some 2,700 losses in a single day. The standard of medical care available to the Tigris Corps was extremely low and it is likely Blackely was evacuated to Basra or even to one of the Hospital Ships operating in the Persian Gulf. Sadly, his wounds were to prove mortal and he died from them on 30 January 1916 with his place of death listed as the 'Persian Gulf'. He is buried at the Basra War Cemetery and remembered on the Scottish National Memorial Roll; sold together with copied medal roll, Soldier Died in the Great War entry and Commonwealth War Graves Certificate.Further entitled to the 1914-15 Star.Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. He and his wife, Hilda Emily Fenton, who he had married in 1920, bought a property on Guernsey in 1938 just before he was recalled to Sandakan in the Post and Telegraph Department.Both he and his wife became civilian internees of the Japanese when they invaded Borneo, although held in separate camps in Kuching. They returned to Guernsey briefly after the war before Fenton resumed his post in Sandakan.An unfortunate incident occurred in 1948 which was to have dramatic repercussions for Fenton. A clerk in the Posts & Telegraphs Department in North Borneo was found guilty of stealing a significant quantity of stamps. Fenton and a senior colleague were subsequently found guilty of grave neglect of duty with Fenton suffering the ignominy of being 'retired' from the service and sent home.As a postscript the town of Sandakan became embroiled in a major criminal investigation by Allied forces as it became known that the Japanese had forcibly moved the internees in 1945, mainly Australians, from the Sandakan prisoner of war camp to Ranau in what became known as 'The Sandakan Death Marches'. Only a handful of POWs who escaped on route survived, the remainder, several thousand poor souls, either dying from the effects of the march or being murdered during the march. The Sandakan Death Marches have been the subject of several books.Fenton died in May 1974 at his home, La Rocque Colin, St. Peter-in-the-wood, Guernsey, Channel Islands; sold together with the boxes of issue for his Medals with their original silk ribbons, a quantity of research and numerous personal diaries (from the Great War through to 1941), which give a remarkable insight to his career and experiences. Never formally published and unseen for generations, Lt Caunt's autobiography adds a new layer of intimacy to the commemoration in this centenary year of the greatest conflict man had known. That Lt Caunt's name is not better known is as he would have wished it, for as he wrote:"What happened during those four years happened to so many thousands of others so exactly, that I seek neither praise for my doings nor individuality for my story."Rather, he said, his was the story of others - "brave, unselfish men who by their example of courage and cheerfulness revived the spirits of others less brave but who since have crossed the border, never to return in body but who remain in spirit, never to be forgotten".Horace Caunt had been born in March 1895 in Dewsbury, one of six children, to a local bank manager. In 1915, he joined the 13th Battalion, Prince of Wales Own West Yorkshire Regiment. It stayed in reserve in England for two years so in 2017 he applied and transferred to the Royal Flying Corps, forerunner to the RAF, to train as a fighter pilot. Posted to Doncaster, he found the racecourse transformed into an aerodrome, and describes what he saw."I made for the hangers to see the aircraft and what marvellous machines I thought they were, Maurice Farman Shorthorns, built of bamboo struts and piano wire, they looked like huge box kites with the propeller at the back to push them into flight. Although they would be seen to be comical these days, then, we were quite willing to risk our young lives in them. They used to take off after a long run and clatter across the sky at about seventy miles per hour, do a circuit or two and come in to land on two wheels. They were fondly referred to as 'Rumpetys'."Lt Caunt was then ordered to Beverley, whose racecourse had also been commandeered, for instruction in advanced flying, bombing techniques, photography and signals."After our daily courses we were allowed to fly freely so we generally made straight for the seaside town of Bridlington to buzz the pier and anyone on it, but after complaints from an irate town council, and an old lady who had been prostrated with shock, flying over the town was restricted to below two thousand feet."He then describes what must have been one of the earliest aerial views of Leeds and the surrounding towns."I ran into a terrific hail storm and received the most painful buffeting of my life, but as I was beginning to really get worried - as the storm whirled the plane about like a leaf in the wind - we flew out into brilliant sunshine."Espying Leeds in the distance I landed in Tadcaster to find the propellers had been very badly chipped by impact with large hailstones. They had to be changed before my return to Beverley. Next day my CO informed me I was now fully qualified as a pilot and could now wear wings. He also added that this was about as near as I would get to being an angel."That November, he went to the front in France at Popringhe airfield, near Ypres. He shot down at least three enemy planes during the next month, but his mood darkened after one sortie, when he returned and looked in vain for a comrade he identifies only by his nickname, Tiny."Exhausted and very subdued I heaved myself out of the cockpit and went to look for Tiny, but my heart sank when I heard it was reported that he had failed to return. "To help pass the time I counted the bullet holes in my machine, giving up the task when I reached 40. After waiting an hour I was forced to conclude that he was down, but that there was still hope he may be down on our side of the lines. The confirmation of my second Hun was poor consolation for the loss of my friend. Suddenly there was a void somewhere and nothing could fill his empty chair in the mess. Next morning I went through his kit and packed it ready to be sent home to his parents."His spirits dropped further when he crashlanded and was taken prisoner, an experience he describes in detail."Just past Ypres we spotted a Hun two-seater at work, so getting well above with the sun behind, I waggled my wings to warn the flight to watch my tail, and then dived down in pursuit. At 50 yards I gave him full fire from my guns, he crumpled up in his cockpit, my speed swept me past and under the Hun and zooming up I prepared to dive again, but saw the German aircraft spinning for the ground. Foolishly I followed him down, to see the machine crash into a wood. This seemed to signal machine guns on the ground to open up. I was only about 200 feet up and could see the tracer bullets flying past me in all directions. It was time to depart.I was roughly ten miles behind the lines, and this is a terribly long way when you have to control every yard. Suddenly with a cough and a splutter my engine gave up the struggle, frantic jerking of the controls had no effect.Nearer and nearer to safety I got, when a shell exploded on the ground beneath, the explosion sending me spinning. Fortunately, I managed to recover control before hitting the ground and managed to land awkwardly, running into a shell hole. The plane went over on her nose, I scrambled out, grabbing the Very light pistol on the way. A quick shot and my treasured Nieuport aeroplane went up in flames.Two German officers had crept up on me unseen and when the plane went up in flames they fired on me with a large horse pistol, one of the shots passing through a slack part of my flying suit. Soldiers rushed up and away I went to a nearby dug out."Now in enemy territory, he was surprised to find that the officer classes were still observing 19th century standards of civility."The German troops were quite friendly, some shouting encouraging words in English as I passed by. Many stopped me to take a photograph. The officers' quarters were in the cellar, where I got ticked off for failing to stand to attention in the presence of a fierce Major wearing a monocle. Having been shouted at by this bad tempered Prussian, I was relieved to see a jovial faced officer enter the room, obviously of a higher rank judging by the way the major jumped to attention and saluted. I saluted him, to be greeted in return with a smile and a salute and an invitation to be seated. He was a Colonel, and a very human one too, for he sharply told the Major to leave, and sent for some food and drink for me. He also proffered a cigar, which I gratefully ac

With them he joined the Second World War in France before being transported to North Africa. With the Japanese offensive in Malaya gaining pace the British found themselves opposed by a large number of Light Tanks, something which was considered impossible according to their own tactical doctrine.To combat this a single squadron of light tanks from the 3rd Hussars were ordered to embark for Singapore. 'B' Squadron was chosen and in early 1941 they got underway, unfortunately they were not able to reach the city before its fall. Instead they were re-directed to Dutch Sumatra, arriving in Sumatra as the Japanese began their invasion of the island.A series of contradictory orders resulted in the unit leaving for Java only a week later having been unable to load much of their equipment. Arriving in Java they went into action alongside Dutch and Australian troops near Bandung however by 6 March the Dutch government was prepared to capitulate. The Hussars were ordered to destroy their tanks, a task they accomplished by pushing them into a ravine, before making for the coast. They were unsuccessful, largely thanks to the efficiency with which the Dutch had destroyed the boats on the coastline to prevent their use by the Japanese. Colyer went 'in the bag' with the others on 8 March 1942, although their loss was only reported on 1 February 1943. He was held at the Hiroshima Prison Camp until the end of the war, being lucky to survive his ordeal with 54 of the 145 men of 'B' Squadron dying in captivity.Colyer was repatriated on 2 September 1945 returning to his wife Clara at 14 Chester Road, Neston. The Battalion next saw service in Sicily.McCabe was reported as wounded in action on 12 July 1943 and later as a prisoner of the Germans on 17 January 1944. Initially imprisoned at Stalag IX C, McCabe and other prisoners were being transported to Germany by train being evacuated in anticipation of the Allied advance. At the Orvieto North railway bridge at Allerona the US 320th Bombardment group destroyed the bridge completely unaware that the train was full of Allied Prisoners of War.Richard Morris of the US Army who was on the train recounted in his memoirs: ... the train was halted on the bridge over the river when the Allied bombs started to fall, and the German guards fled the train leaving the prisoners locked inside.'Iris Origo wrote in her diary, War in Val d'Orcia that '...some of the carriages

plunged into the river: there were over 400 dead and wounded.' Captain William Cook, the Intelligence Officer of the 320th Bombardment Group wrote afterwards that '...an excellent concentration of bombs bracketed the bridge...a train of 40/50 cars standing across the bridge received direct hits destroying 10 cars, derailing three and the remainder buckled up in an arch.'So it was this '...was possibly the worst incident of 'friendly fire' in the second world war, and certainly the worst in Italy' according to Janet Kinrade Dethick, a British expatriate living in Umbria, who has carried out extensive research into the tragedy. The Battle of the Bay of Biscay, 28 December 1943On that occasion, in the company of her 'good companion' the Enterprise, Glasgow fought a remarkable action against five Narvik- and six Elbing-class enemy destroyers. It was far from a one-sided encounter, the British total armament amounting to nineteen 6-inch guns, versus a German one of no less than forty-nine 5.9-inch or 4.1-inch guns, and a superiority of 76 torpedo tubes to just fourteen.Gordon Holman's The King's Cruisers takes up the story: 'Our aircraft continued to shadow the enemy ships until the Glasgow and Enterprise came in sight of them early in the afternoon. At long range, both cruisers opened fire and the enemy quickly replied. For an hour there was a running fight as the opposing ships steamed hard on a south-easterly course. A number of hits were obtained on the destroyers, and, with our aircraft joining in, the Germans split up, first into two or three groups and then into smaller units, as they tried to escape. Although thus meant that some were bound to get away, it was also fatal for those on which the cruisers decided to concentrate. Smoke screens and their extra speed failed to save them, and three of the destroyers were sunk, while others only escaped after receiving damage.'Holman continues: 'The British cruisers suffered slight damage and a few casualties but, coming within a day or two of the destruction of the Scharnhorst, their success enables the Royal Navy to conclude 1943 on a note of triumph.'Further honoursIn the following year, Glasgow saw further action off the Normandy coast, providing supporting fire to the American landings on Omaha beach on D-Day.So, too, at the bombardment of Cherbourg, when she went into action alongside her consort Encounter, and cruisers of the United States Navy, the whole under the command of Rear-Admiral Morton L. Depp, U.S.N., flying his flag in the Tuscaloosa.On that memorable occasion, on 25 June 1944, the allied squadron came under heavy fire from the shore batteries. Gordon Holman's The King's Cruisers, takes up the story: Their fire was immediately answered by the big ships, the Glasgow being among the first to get off a salvo. Her 6-inch guns kept up a rapid fire throughout the three hours of the bombardment, and there were times when the Germans seemed to have been stung into concentrating on the British ship. She was twice hit by heavy shells, and although ordered to retire, reported in a quarter of an hour that she was fit to carry on ... with her big battle ensign strung out in the breeze, no ship looked, or was, more truculent than the Glasgow. On one occasion she turned straight in towards the shore as if she would crash right into the harbour. Then she reduced speed until she was almost stopped, but despite these deceptive tactics the radar-controlled fire of the enemy hung on to her ... The younger McIntosh however did not follow his father into this profession, instead preferring the life of a Merchant Seaman. What is certain is that by the outbreak of the Second World War McIntosh was serving as Chief Officer on the S.S. West Wales out of Cardiff. This vessel formed part of Convoy SC-19 making the run between Canada and Liverpool. The convoy was targeted by a wolfpack from the 7th U-boat Flotilla on 29 January 1941 while still in the Atlantic. Their escort of nine warships proved unable to protect them and the convoy scattered with several being picked off as a result.West Wales was one of those that straggled behind and at 06.18 she was torpedoed amidships by U-94. Fortunately for the crew a destroyer minding the slower ships swept in to hammer the U-boat with fire and force her to dive. Many of the survivors were then taken off however McIntosh was not among them, though whether he died in the initial attack or the subsequent sinking is unclear. He is commemorated upon the Tower Hill Memorial. All other destroyers had been sent to Singapore on 8 December 1941.On 10 December, she took part in a raid on Japanese crafts attempting to land on Lamma Island. The Royal Marines attached to the depot ship Tamar were deployed to assist the land forces, with their commanding officer instructing his men to defend the island "...to the last man and last round.' Thracian evacuated some of the 5/7th Battalion, Rajput Rifles from the Devil's Peak area while shells and mortars fell all around them and transported them to Aberdeen, on the south of the island. Meanwhile the Naval Dockyard was under constant bombardment but was not evacuated. The old wooden depot ship Tamar was taken out of the basin and sunk at a buoy in the harbour on 12 December. The Japanese attempted to negotiate a surrender on 13 December and again four days later, but both were firmly refused. A serious attempt to cross the harbour was made by the Japanese on the night of 15 December. Thracian sailed from Aberdeen into Kowloon Bay, shielded by the darkness against the enemy guns, to intercept junks full of enemy troops. The need to keep close to the shore entailed some risks and she was inadvertently run aground, which caused damage and flooding to her forward compartments. However, she got herself off, then destroyed the junks and was able to return to Aberdeen, where efforts were made by the dockyard staff to dock her there the next evening. The following afternoon an accurate high level bombing attack was made on the Aberdeen dockyard, starting big fires and many casualties, with one near miss slightly damaging Thracian further. When it was found that the damage caused by grounding could not be repaired, the decision was made to strip Thracian of all armament and early on 17 December she was undocked and steamed round to Repulse Bay, where she was run aground and abandoned on Round Island. The crew continued to defend the colony as infantry and would suffer heavy losses in the battle and subsequent captivity. On 24 December 1941, Japanese troops began salvaging the ship, and she was later captured by the Imperial Japanese Army, being used as Patrol Boat No. 101 later in the Second World War. Later joining the escort for Convoy ON **153 in December they fell under the sights of German U-Boats** on the night of 16 December.U-211 spotted the destroyer and fired a torpedo that struck Firedrake to starboard, abreast of the forward boiler room. The resulting explosion tore the ship in two, despite this she did not sink immediately and a desperate battle ensued to keep her afloat. Only some 35 men remained alive but they sealed the bulkheads, jettisoned the depth charges and began to fire star flares to attract attention.Fortunately for these men the corvette Sunflower found them in time. Most of the survivors were taken off but despite this some 140 died in the attack, including James. He is commemorated upon Chatham Naval Memorial; sold together with a copied Commonwealth War Graves certificate.Herbert **James was born at Walton-on-the-Naze. H.M.S. Resource), very fine (5) Fred Hadfield was born at Blackburn on 22 November 1906 and was a bleach works labourer when he enlisted in the Roval Navy. He serving initially aboard Repulse as Stoker 2nd Class on 1 January 1929. Advancement and other vessels followed until 20 December 1939 when Hadfield joined Kipling and was confirmed in the rate of Stoker Petty Officer on 1 August 1939. She was named after the author and poet Rudvard Kipling, was laid down by Yarrow, Scotstoun on 20 October 1937, launched on 19 January 1939, by Kipling's daughter, and commissioned on 12 December 1939. On 11 October 1940, Kipling, along with another six destroyers, escorted the battleship Renown to bombard the French port of Cherbourg. At dawn on 23 May 1941, Kelly and Kashmir were retiring at full speed round the west of Crete. After surviving two heavy air attacks they were overtaken at 0755hrs by a formation of twenty-four divebombers. Both ships were quickly sunk, with a loss of 210 lives. Fortunately, the destroyer Kipling was nearby, and, despite continuous bombing, rescued from the sea 279 officers and men, including Lord Louis Mountbatten, while she herself remained unscathed. Next morning, while still fifty miles away from Alexandria, and crowded from stem to stern with men, she ran completely out of fuel, but was safely met and towed in. It should be noted that the actons of the Kellly inspired the fictional Torrin and Captain Kinross (Mountbatten), portrayed by Noel Coward, in the movie In Which We Serve.Fortunately for Hadfield he was removed and was serving on Resource when Kipling was herself destroyed on 11 May 1942.Hadfield was pensioned ashore on 26 June 1950 having received his L.S. & G.C. He is promoted to Acting Aircrewman in June 1948 and then to Aircrewman I in September 1950, during this time he served on Ocean, Terror, Peregrine and Daedalus on which he completes his service being pensioned on 7 July 1952. Sikh, including operations off Norway in which she came under sustained air attack at Nasmos and elsewhere. His next seagoing appointment was in another destroyer - the Wrestler from August 1941 until December 1942, in which period, under the command of Lieutenant R. W. B. Lacon, D.S.C., R.N., he witnessed action on the Malta run, not least as an escort in **Operation "Pedestal".** Earlier, on 2 May 1942, with her consort Wishart, Wrestler accounted for the U-74 east of Cartagena. Wrestler used her Hedgehog mortar twice, in addition to carrying out two full pattern depth charge attacks, explosions being heard after both attacks. U-74 was lost with all hands.And in mid-November 1942, a month before his transferral to the Wanderer. Morris was also present at the destruction of the U-98, west of Gibraltar. There were no survivors. It was aboard the Wanderer that he was present at his third U-boat "kill", namely the destruction of the U-523 off Vigo, Spain on 28 August 1943, in company with the corvette Wallflower; on this occasion there were 37 survivors.Morris's final wartime seagoing appointment was in the cruiser Caledon, from December 1943 until March 1944, following which he was employed at the Massewa naval base Bull until June 1945.He was awarded his L.S. & G.C. His first posting afloat was the Battleship Ramellies on 8 May 1925 and this was followed up by Comus, Lucia and Zanzibar, that last as Telegraphist. Lowther's career eventually took him east, being posted to the gunboat Cricket in China on 23 May 1938. Going ashore on 20 March 1939 he joined the Kranji Wirless Station at Singapore and was still stationed there on the outbreak of the Second World War. Notably at this stage the Far East Combined Bureau, an offshoot of Bletchley Park was stationed at Singapore with an intercept station at Kranji. Posted to Kilindini on 1 October 1942- in line with the movements of the F.E.C.B.- Lowther was to remain there until 17 October 1943 when he was transferred to the newly acquired aircraft carrier Khedive. Joining her in the Mediterranean with the new rank of Petty Officer Telegraphist the next year she was to serve as Command Ship for the invasion of Southern France. Khedive was posted to the Far East in 1945 and joined the 21st Aircraft Carrier Squadron. She was earmarked for the recapture of Singapore but with that cities surrender merely provided security for its occupation. The well-documented campaign pair awarded to Guardsman C. W. Parkin, 2nd Battalion, Welsh GuardsThe Battalion endured a last-ditch heroic defence at Boulogne before going 'in the bag'; their ordeal continued during 'The Long March' from Lamsdorf in May 19451939-45 Star; War Medal 1939-45, very fine (2) Cyril Walter Parkin was born at Hull on 29 May 1915 and was a labourer upon his enlistment in the Welsh Guards on 15 July 1939. He was posted to No 3 Company, 2nd Battalion and spent most of May 1940 stationed at the Tower of London on defensive duties. Arriving in France the Battalion was immediately in the thick of things fighting predominantly in a defensive capacity before Parkin was captured by the Germans on 27 May 1940.The report of operations from 21 to 25 May by Major J. C. Windsor Lewis of 3 Company, 2nd Battalion Welsh Guards when the Company formed the apex of the defensive line, East of Boulogne, on the slopes of Mont Lambert takes up the story; 'I never received the Bn order to withdraw as I could not be found. I remained with my Forward Sections all the night as I was the only officer left in the Company after the battle in the morning. The others were all casualties. This explains why I never received the order to withdraw. I was therefore left in Boulogne with the two Sections that I had been with on the Road blocks; the remainder of my Coy were successfully evacuated to England with the Bn.On hearing the news after Stand-to in the morning 24 May that the Bn had gone, I decided to move as quickly as possible to the Quayside with the men I had left.On arrival at Quayside with the remnants of my Coy, I found the utmost confusion in progress. There were stragglers from Nos. 2 and 4 Coys, 2 W.G., some IRISH GUARDS, about 150 refugees, 120 odd French soldiers with two officers, 200 of the A.M.Ps, 120 men of R.E. and others. I collected this force in the sheds by the station while I, with a Major E.G.M. BURT of the R.E. who had since died, went off to find the minesweeper which had just come into the harbour and ask if it would evacuate us to England. The minesweeper, which was French, refused but said that when it put to sea again that morning it would make signals to any boat or warship that is saw to come to our rescue. I had previously been told by Staff Officers on the Harbour Station that the BDE had embarked overnight for U.K. but that boats were supposed to be returning for us. They never came, and I heard later that they had been sunk in the effort to reach beleaguered Boulogne.On re-crossing the bridge with Major BURT to get back to the troops in the sheds, we were heavily fired upon by M.G.s from neighbouring houses but using cars, etc for cover we managed to reach the sheds without being hit. The sheds were now very congested with troops and refugees, so I sent off and officer of the R.E., Lieut. Kenneth Roscoe, to make a reconnaissance of the station itself and see how best we could defend it and obtain cover there for all. This officer returned shortly after with a comprehensive report and I decided immediately to move the refugees into the Shelters underneath the Station itself. The Germans then began to open fire upon us in the sheds and several men were wounded. I immediately began to retire my force into the station. This was quite easily affected as there was a covered way of approach afforded by a line of railway trucks. The fire from the German tanks was quite severe when we finally abandoned the sheds which shortly afterwards went up in flames. The Germans then began to fire incendiary bombs into the Station and several of these lit up trucks which contained ammunition and inflammable matter. I hastily prepared the Station for defence by the erection of a sandbagged breastwork in front of the Station and on the left flank overlooking the Town and Custom House. The sandbags were already in the Station. Many of my Command, such as the A.M.Ps were unarmed, and while they prepared the position and carried sandbags the W. GDS personnel and French took up positions under cover and in trains, two of which were in the Station. All Ranks worked very hard and carried out their tasks under fire from enemy tanks and M.Gs.By midday 24 May we had established as good a defensive position as possible under the circumstances. The position was held by the W. GDS and French infantry. All these troops were already thoroughly exhausted and their tenacity and bravery in keeping the enemy at bay for nearly 2 days without sufficient food and water is, I think, worthy of the highest praise. Firing form the German tanks, of whom 3 were in front of our position, continued all day, sometimes intense at other times mild, and after 2200hrs dying down altogether. In the evening of 24 May, about 1800hrs, the Germans made an effort to landform a boat on my right flank. Their party of infantry was a small one and we drove them back to the other side of the Harbour with Bren A.T. Rifle and Rifle fire, inflicting losses upon them.I was able to give the troops holding our positions some rest that night in relays, but early in the morning after Stand-to when the French infantry were holding our front line, the Germans again attacked heavily and we lost several men. At about 0900hrs I was able to see with binoculars big troop movements taking place on the high ground above BOULOGNE. I hoped these might be French, but it soon turned out to be a big enemy force arriving to consolidate the capture of the town. Their artillery which had begun to fire upon us the previous evening was increased, a bit shed to the right of my position was blown up and my own wounded men were being knocked about. I made a reconnaissance to my flank to see if there was any possible way of escape, but the route was covered by two enemy tanks. At noon the enemy, now strongly reinforced, opened up an intense fire upon my position and I was compelled to withdraw from my front line of breastworks into the Station itself, protected only by glass overhead and by a train on the left flank. There was a little food and ammunition left and no more water, and after another hour of the greatest discomfort I decided that my position was now quite hopeless and that a massacre would ensue if I did not capitulate. Having an eye to the number of refugees under my care and the big percentage of unarmed men, I decided to surrender.My little force had fought most splendidly in the face of heavy odds. Exhausted and without proper nourishment they never lost heart. Parkin was incarcerated at Stalag 344 near the village of Lamsdorf which was to have sinister connotations in a few short years. On 7 January 1945 Parkin and his fellow captives, who had been held in cramped conditions with very little to eat for nearly five years were issued with orders to evacuate the camps and to forcibly march hundreds of miles west into central German territory. Tens of thousands of men were involved in these events, thousands of whom perished. Most marched many hundreds of miles, sometimes 20 miles a day, before being liberated by allied forces in April and May of 1945. Many of the dead succumbed to starvation, exposure, and disease. Some were shot by guards for attempting escape or simply being unable to continue.Much has been written and documented about this horrific march. Parkin survived and arrived in Germany on 10 April 1945 where he was incarcerated at Stalag 7A until 29 April 1945 when he was eventually liberated.A page on the website http://dunkirk1940.org/index.php?&p=1_266 is dedicated to Parkin.Sold together with a quantity of original postcards and letters sent by Parkin to his mother throughout his years of captivity and document the ordeal suffered by him and his fellow captives and the original letter from the Welsh Guards Record Office informing his mother that he was 'missing', besides letters from the Welsh Guards Comforts and Families Association and the British Red Cross, besides a quantity of research, incl

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'My unit, the 4th Battalion, Royal Berkshire Regiment, was sent to defend the Albert Canal in Belgium. There were only British troops in our area. Our officer put us into position, and that was the last we saw of him. We weren't ready - we were completely unprepared. The German troops who attacked us were the cream of the army - Rommel's troops. They overwhelmed us. I was captured on the 29th May 1940. I was 21. I was wounded in the wrist when I tried to surrender, and two or three of the boys by the side of me were killed. A German soldier said 'Tommy, the war is over for you'. After I was captured I saw Rommel going by. The younger Germans were horrible, and knocked us about. We were marched through Holland to the German border. The summer of 1940 was very hot, and the Dutch put out water for us. When the Germans saw this, they kicked it over. At the German border, we were put on cattle trucks, and I was sent to Stalag VIIIB ... 'George Ballard, a Territorial of the 4th Battalion, Royal Berkshire Regiment, recalls his unhappy fate in France in May 1940. Spencer, Roval Engineers, who was taken prisoner at the Fall of Hong Kong only to die in the tragic sinking of the prison transport Lisbon-Maru by the U.S.S. Grouper on 1 October 19421939-45 Star; Pacific Star; War Medal 1939-45, sold together with a named memorial scroll and Roval Society certificate, good very fine (3)Geoffery William Spencer was born at Kentish Town on 19 May 1919, the son of Elizabeth and Bertie Spencer, his father was a police officer and had been awarded the Military Medal and King's Police Medal for Gallantry. Enlisting with the Royal Engineers on 28 August 1937 he joined the 40th Fortress Company on 14 December 1938 with the service number '1874667'. This was one of two Fortress Companies assigned to China Command during the Defence of Hong Kong. They held out for a total of seventeen days before being forced to surrender by relentless Japanese pressure. The survivors included Spencer who was taken on 25 December 1941. Kept on the mainland for some time after Hong Kong fell he was one of those selected for transport to Japan in 1942. Taken to the prisoner of war transport vessel the S.S. Lisbon Maru, the vessel began a slow progress back to Japan. Conditions aboard the vessel were appalling and a number of men had already died as the vessel crossed the South China Sea. She was not marked as carrying prisoners of war and as such appeared to be a simple troop transport when sighted by the U.S.S. Grouper on the morning of 1 October 1942.She torpedoed the vessel in the starboard coal bunker, as a response all P.O.W.s were immediately sent below to clear the deck. They were later sealed in while the Japanese troops on board were evacuated leaving only a reduced guard and the ships crew. It soon became clear that the vessel was sinking and the prisoners panicked and torn their way free of the hold.Several casualties were incurred as they rushed the guards and forced them back leaping off the boat to safety. The men of the Royal Artillery found themselves caught when the ladder into their hold collapsed and they were unable to escape, they were heard singing 'It's a Long Way to Tipperary'. Around 200 men were able to escape the doomed vessel, however 842 perished, Spencer was amongst them. Radford, Royal Army Service Corps1939-45 Star: Africa Star: Italy Star: France & Germany Star: Defence and War Medals 1939-45, together with his original Soldier's Pay and Service Book, spine taped, good very fine (9)Lionel Radford, who was from Alperton, Wembley, served in the 1/5th Battalion, The Sherwood Foresters and was taken P.O.W. at the fall of Singapore in February 1942.As recounted in numerous histories, the Foresters displayed considerable fortitude and gallantry in the final days of the defence of Singapore. Allocated to "Tomforce" with the 4th Norfolks and elements of the 18th Reconnaissance Corps - the Battalion was ordered to re-capture Bukit Timah and the hill overlooking the village.Advancing along the Bukit Timah dual carriageway, in extended order, the Foresters and "Tomforce" had to cover nine miles of hostile terrain to reach their objective, and they were met with fierce opposition - and enemy aircraft attack - on closing the objective. Having then put in a gallant attack on the hill overlooking the village, and taken its first casualties, "Tomforce's" actions proved in vain, for flanking forces had given way to relentless Japanese attacks.Next ordered to assist the 2/10 Baluchis hold the village of Nee Soon, situated in the middle of Singapore, the Foresters came under a crescendo of mortar and small arms fire. Then an ominous rumbling sound was heard approaching down the road. The Japanese were bringing up tanks and the Foresters had no means to counter them. Private Morrell of the Foresters sought cover behind a large log, watching in horror as it grew smaller and smaller as enemy fire took great chunks out of it:"[Then] We pulled back into the rubber. We didn't run away. We just parted to let them go through. What else could we do? We had nothing to stop them."It mattered not. On the 15th came the formal surrender of Singapore. But as the battalion's historian, Clifford Housley, noted, 'With hindsight and given the opportunity, they might well have decided to fight on'.Instead, the likes of Lionel Radford and his fellow Foresters had to endure terrible suffering at the hands of their Japanese captors. He died in captivity on 16 November 1943, aged 26, and is buried in Thanbyuzayat War Cemetery, on the Thai-Burma border.Undoubtedly a victim of the "Railway of Death", he actually died at Tambaya hospital camp, but his remains were moved to Thanbyuzayat after the war. His gravestone bears the following inscription:'In loving memory of my dear son Lionel. Wright, 7th Battalion, Royal Warwickshire RegimentWright gave up his Corporal's 'stripes' so that he could serve shoulder-to-shoulder with his twin brother as part of the British Expeditionary Force; the pair were captured at Dunkirk and held at Lamsdorf before having to endure the privations of 'The Long March' in 19451939-1945 Star; War Medal 1939-45; Efficiency Medal, G.VI.R., Territorial (5109378 Pte. A. J. Wright. Warwick), very fine (3) Alec Wright was a pre-war Territorial from Nuneaton, Warwickshire. Both he and twin brother served with the Regiment but in different Battalions. Alec on discovering that his twin brother, Bertram, was about to leave with the B.E.F. gave up his rank to join his brother in the 1/7th Battalion. The Battalion departed for France in early 1940 to join the rest of the Force. On 16 May with the Allied front crumbling rapidly they were ordered back. With the Germans advancing in a pincer movement there was a danger that the Force would be cut off. 143 Brigade (including the 1/7th and 8th Battalion) was sent to defend the Ypres-Comines canal zone. The lives of many thousands rested on this depleted force. The troops withstood the assault of three German Divisions on 27-28 May 1940. This saved 2nd Corps and did much to aid the successful withdrawal of the entire B.E.F.Just one night made a big difference to the number of men that reached England safely (midnight 28th May 25,000 and 29th May a further 47,300).Wright and his twin brother were both taken Prisoner of War and held at the infamous Stalag 344 near the village of Lamsdorf. By 7 January 1945 Wright and his fellow captives, who had been held in cramped conditions with very little to eat for nearly five years, were issued with orders to evacuate the camps and to forcibly march hundreds of miles west into central German territory.Tens of thousands of men were involved in these events, thousands of whom perished. Most marched many hundreds of miles, sometimes 20 miles a day, before being liberated by allied forces in April and May of 1945. Many of the dead succumbed to starvation, exposure, and disease. Some were shot by guards for attempting escape or simply being unable to continue.Much has been written and documented about this horrific march. Senior Warrant Officers took charge in place of the Officers at other Camps. At all the Camps, instead of the men being concentrated in large numbers, parties were detailed in groups of 500 and sent to various smaller Camps, up the river, etc., or kept on the move doing odd jobs here and everywhere. The book Cape Town Highlanders expands on the bitter fighting stating:'In the Cassino sector, the Germans were still putting up bitter resistance, blocking any advance up the Liri Valley, but nevertheless the British and Indians has secured a firm bridgehead across the Rapido by the evening of May 13 and were bringing up their XIII Corps reserve division to cut Highway 6 and isolate Cassino in conjunction with Poles, who had regrouped after their stern fighting in the opening phases of the offensive. That night enemy 105's hit a mortar pit filled with reserve ammunition in the RDLI company area, starting a fire which burned a long time. Battalion HO, the forward brigade telephone exchange and Jeephead were all heavily shelled; many telephone lines were cut and an old Canadian ammunition dump was hit and set alight.'As well as heavy shelling they were forced to contend with German patrols which struck regularly at advanced positions. One of these made up of men from the 1/100th Mountain Regiment of the German 5th Mountain Division infiltrated behind 'B' Company, Cape Town Highlanders on the night of 14 May 1944. They were identified and engaged by the South Africans, with Everett being killed in the engagement. Five German troops were killed and a further three men of 'B' **Company wounded; sold together with copied service papers** and an extract from the Cape Town Highlanders. It was on this outbound journey, over Texel that they encountered German night fighters. One Lancaster piloted by Sergeant Aspin managed to down two, one destroyed, which resulted in his award of the D.F.M.The rest flew on with Lancaster JA714 disappearing from the formation, this was the machine Porter was aboard. They were the only aircraft from the formation to be lost at this stage of the operation and where claimed by the night-fighter ace Karl-Heinz Scherfling. The rest made the target and bombed it, although with limited results- caused by poor weather.Porter and the rest of the crew of JA714 where found to have died when the machine was shot down near Oosterend, Texel. Rescue and other Services were immediately in action at the scene but some time later an unexploded H.E. bomb was discovered 200 feet away. In consequence volunteers were called for, Blackmer, May, Stevens and Turney were among those to volunteer.Blackmer, Stevens and Turney were concerned in the work of penetrating the wall of a cellar, through a matchboard refrigerator lined with cork and then through another 12 inch concrete wall. This work was carried out in dangerous conditions, in a very confined space with the constant peril of heavy falling debris. Through these efforts, three of the persons trapped were rescued. May laboured unceasingly throughout the night in a most gallant manner.Blackmer and Turney were overcome with the cold and the effects of escaping gas and water in the cellar and had to be taken to the Depot. Some time later, however, they returned to work and gave strenuous aid to the task of releasing a young girl who was pinned down by timber and debris, a weight which six jacks had failed to move. After heavy toil, the timber was at last lifted. The whole of this courageous action was carried out in appalling conditions. In their efforts, which greatly contributed to the ultimate rescue of five of the seven trapped persons, these men laboured in an atmosphere rendered foul by escaping gas, in a cellar filling with water. Further they worked for a great part of the period with the knowledge that there was a delayed-action bomb only 200 feet away. 'Edwin Humphrey May was a member of a Civil Defence Rescue Party which was operating on the night of 28 September 1940. During the attack a bomb collapsed a building in the town and the Rescue Party was called in to try and clear the debris to get to the seven people believed to be in the building. Due to the manner of the building's collapse they were forced to effect entry through the cellar, cutting through a refrigerator and a 12-inch thick wall.The cellar on the far side was filling with water and what is worse an unexploded bomb- found to be on a delayed response timer- was less that 200 feet away. The original rescue party numbered seven men however two of them were overcome by the cold water and the effects of gas and had to be pulled out of the cellar. Five of the trapped people were saved although two sadly died, the Chief Officer commanding the party was awarded the M.B.E. and the four volunteers the George medal with original recommendation stating:'Mr. E. H. May was among those to volunteer. Throughout the night and well into the next day, rescue work went on and May laboured in very perilous conditions. The danger from heavy falling debris was very great, there was a serious escape of gas and the cellars of the demolished houses were filling with water. The night was pitch black and overhead passed a constant stream of enemy raiders. For the greater part of the night, May had the knowledge that there was a delay-action H.E. bomb within 200'.Throughout, he aided the unfortunate victims and carried out. [sic] his duties as a member of the squad in a very gallant manner, in the most appalling conditions, regardless of personal risk. This gallant rescue work contributed in large measure to the ultimate saving of five of the trapped persons.'May later went on to be called up for military service; sold together with copied research including recommendations for award and a newspaper article.Subject to 5% tax on Hammer Price in addition to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium.

John Robert Mead a native of Tynemouth, Northumberland was born on 6 April 1882. Enlisting in the Royal Navy in October 1897, he served on H.M.S. Forte during the Boer War. 'Forte' was an Astrea class cruiser and served on the Cape and West African stations. Mead was promoted to the rank of Gunner on 14 May 1910. Further service followed on H.M.S. Commonwealth between 1911 and 1916, he transferred to H.M.S. Valiant on 26 February 1916.Upon completion on 19 February 1916, under Captain Maurice Woollcombe, H.M.S.Valiant joined the recently formed Fifth Battle Squadron of the Grand Fleet. In an attempt to lure part of the Grand Fleet out of its ports and destroy it, the German High Seas Fleet, consisting of 16 battleships, 6 battle cruisers, and other ships, left Wilhelmshaven early on the morning of 31 May. The plan called for Hipper to leave Wilhelmshaven with the battlecruisers of the 1st and the light cruisers of the 2nd Reconnaissance Group and push north out of sight of the Danish coast. There he was to provoke a departure of British ships by attacking coastal towns and lure them toward the High Seas Fleet. By 3: 05, the 5th Battle Squadron had reached a distance to attack the German light cruisers. By 3: 08, the 5th Battle Squadron had reached the rear of the German battlecruisers and Valiant opened fire on the SMS Moltke which received one hit. The situation changed when the German battleships came into view at 3: 40. Since Beatty had failed to sufficiently signal his intentions when he turned north, the battleships of the 5th Battle Squadron were on an opposite course past the battlecruisers and headed directly for the approaching main body of the High Seas Fleet. At 3: 48 Scheer opened fire on the British battleships. Valiant managed to avoid hits and in turn fired on three German ships from a distance of 14 to 16 kilometers at 4: 30. Valiant continued to participate in the battle until the enemy came out of sight at a distance of 17 kilometers at about 5:02.Mead was commissioned as Lieutenant on 1 March 1918 and Lieutenant Commander 1 March 1926. Recalled for service during the Second World War, Mead is recorded as Lieutenant Commander (retired) H.M.S. Peregrine 20 September 1939. It can be presumed that he was present at the base on 18 August 1940 when it came under attack from a formation of German Stuka dive bombers, he is then transferred to H.M.S. Daedalus on 1 October 1940 and to H.M.S. Goshawk the Roval Naval Air Station at Trinidad on 12 October 1940, where he remains until 2 November 1945 before taking up his last appointment at H.M.S. Orlando, the shore establishment and gunnery school in Scotland. Proceeding to England as part of the 17th Draft, Canadian Engineers he joined the 11th Field Company. Canadian Engineers in the Field on 2 October 1916. He was to serve with them for the duration of the war, winning his M.C. in late 1917.Advanced Captain on 24 May he was further appointed Adjutant on 26 May 1918 of the newly formed 11th Battalion, Canadian Engineers, Kinmond returned to Canada on 6 June 1919 with the 6th Field Company and demobilised on 20 **June 1919 at Ottawa. He later commanded the 11th District Engineers as a Lieutenant-Colonel during the interwar period**, starting on 22 November 1933. During this period, he was also to serve as Honorary Treasurer of the Military Engineers Association of Canada.Rejoining for duty during the Second World War as a Major, Kinmond was posted to command the 4th Fortress (Electrical and Mechanical) Company on 28 October 1940 at Vancouver. London Gazette 22 February 1918. Thomas Robertson Johnston was born in Glasgow in August 1893 and was a plumber by trade when he entered the Royal Navy as a Boy 2nd Class in September 1909. Having then attained the rank of Able Seaman, he was re-mustered as an Air Mechanic 1st Class in the Royal Naval Air Service on the books of Pembroke III in the summer of 1914 and thence, from April 1915, on the books of President II.In February 1916, he joined H.M.S. Laconia on the East Africa Station, followed by an appointment in the Royal Navy's first kite balloon ship, Manica, from June 1916 until April 1917, in which period he was advanced to Petty Officer Mechanic - here, then, the probable period of operations for which he was awarded his D.S.M. - namely kite balloon operations in East Africa, his service record also being endorsed for land services in the period 1916-18, although from April 1917 on the books of H.M.S. Hyacinth at Zanzibar.Manica was a kite balloon ship specially refitted for seaplane operations. The Squadron left England early in February 1916 complete with four Short Sunbeam Seaplanes and four Voisins. It was engaged in bombing and reconnaissance during the offensive against Tanga in April, with two seaplanes on board H.M.S. Laconia. The following month another seaplane was put on board the Manica. A good number of bombing and other missions during the Squadron's operations over the coast of Zanzibar during 1916 and 1917. This included an important role in the capture of Bagamoyo when her seaplanes dropped incendiary bombs from 2000 feet. Operations were carried out principally by the aid of a photographic map which had been prepared by Major Maclean and his observer, Lieutenant Fitzherbert, from the Manica:'Maclean and Fitzherbert flew a reconnaissance over Sadani on the 26th where they came under machine gun fire and retaliated with bombs. Maclean took up W.O. Lacey as observer next day for a flight over Sadani which was bombed. Maclean and Fitzherbert were airborne again on the 28th spotting the fall of shot from the monitor Mersey, firing on a target at Sadani. The same aircrew flew a reconnaissance over Bagamoyo on 29 July, where incendiary and HE bombs were dropped.'Transferred to the strength of the newly established Royal Air Force in April 1918, Johnston went out to France that summer and remained actively employed until the end of hostilities. Reaching his maturity on 17 July 1880 with the cruiser Bacchante, his Victorian service saw him spend a good deal of time in Egypt, being posted to Alexandra in 1883 and Invincible the next year. Posted to H.M.S. Monarch on 1 October 1884 Wallis served with her as part of the Nile Flotilla.Going ashore for much of the next decade Wallis was posted to Royal Arthur in February 1893, becoming Petty Officer on 28 February. He was shore pensioned on 12 September 1902 and joined the Royal Fleet Reserve the next year on 3 February 1903. With the outbreak of the Great War he returned to service at Victory I as a Petty Officer being posted to pre-dreadnaught battleship Magnificent on 3 December 1914. This vessel began the war as part of the Humber Patrol and Wallis served with her for that period before being transferred to Imperieuse- the renamed ironclad Audacious- only a fortnight after her collision off Orkney with the minesweeper Rodean. He was to serve with this warship on station off Orkney as part of her defences for the rest of the war. Finally joining the captured German Armed-Trawler Cinceria on 1 July 1918, still being with her when he was awarded his Meritorious Service Medal. Posted to Hannibal on 23 March 1854 as Gunner's Mate, it was to be with this ship that Brookshaw, saw action in the Baltic. Hannibal was later also to join the action in the Black Sea with some 62 of her crew even being entitled to the Azoff Clasp, Brookshaw was one of these (Medal and Clasp). Finally posted to the Gunnery training ship H.M.S. Cambridge as Chief Gunner's Mate on 3 January 1856. Awarded his L.S. & G.C. with this ship Brookshaw was finally discharged on 26 September 1962. After the end of his career in the Navy he continued to serve, joining the steam-tug Scotia. He was with this vessel that he earned the Royal Humane Society Bronze Medal, the 1877 Annual Report states: J. H. Brookshaw ran over the rough rocks, jumped into deep water, brought the man near the shore, and was assisted out, both being entangled in the weeds'This act of bravery occurred at the Mount Wise 'bathing place', Devonport on 16 July 1876. He had saved the lived of Samuel Davey, a Seaman with the tug Seotia. J. W. Langmuir. R.A.F.); Jubilee 1935; Coronation 1937, mounted as worn, very fine (6)M.B.E. London Gazette 3 June 1919. John William Langmuir was born in Toronto on 15 September 1891. He enlisted in 'E' Company, 2nd Battalion, Oueen's Own Rifles of Canada on 14 October 1914, having previously served in the Trinity College School Cadet Corps. He was appointed a provisional Lieutenant on 21 **October 1914 and joined the Eaton's Motor Machine Gun** Battery as a Lieutenant on 2 February 1915. Deploying to England with the latter unit from Montreal in June 1915, a spinal injury from a vehicle accident during his training in Canada, sustained in May just before he departed, appears to have interfered with his service with the motors. On 8 February 1916, Langmuir took Aero Certificate No. 2440 on a Maurice Farman Biplane at the Military School, Birmingham. He was attached to the Royal Flying Corps from 1 April 1916. Between 12 May-2 September 1916, he served on attachment to No. 4 Squadron, Royal Flying Corps in France, flying the Be2c. He was struck off strength of the Canadian Expeditionary Force on 26 March 1917, on being seconded to the Royal Flying Corps and appears to have remained on attachment to the latter Corps until 4 July 1919, although some notations in his service file suggest this attachment ended 8 December 1916, after a Medical Board determined his spinal injury would not allow him to continue his service. Regardless, he does appear to have continued to serve, being promoted Captain on 23 August 1917. **Transferred to the Canadian Reserve of Officers on 31 May** 1919, his M.B.E. came just a few days later.Langmuir was transferred to the Active List on 1 October 1920, on the reorganization of the Canadian Militia, and appointed to command 'A' Company, Queen's Own Rifles with the rank of Major. He was appointed Regimental Adjutant the following year, on 1 June 1921, and became Second-in-Command on 1 April 1925. On 28 September 1928, he was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel, and appointed to command the unit on 14 April 1930. He became the fifteenth commanding officer of the Queen's Own Rifles, serving in command of the unit from 1930-1935. Promoted to Colonel on 8 November 1933, he was extended in command at this rank. Langmuir died in 1956 and is buried in Oakland Cemetery, Brockville, Ontario. H. H. Kennedy), good very fine (3)M.C. London Gazette 25 August 1917.Kenneth Hartlev Heathcote Kennedv was born at Bijapur. Karnataka, India on 24 December 1885, the son of Micheal and Frances Kennedy later of Hampshire. Notably he was also the Grandson of General Sir Michael Kavanagh Kennedy, K.S.C.I. and Great Grandson of Brigadier- General Sir Michael Kennedy C.B. The young Kennedy was educated at The Kings School, Canterbury from 1894. Returning to India he was active in the Volunteer Corps from a voung age, being commissioned 2nd Lieutenant on 26 May 1905 with the Great Indian Peninsula **Railway Volunteer Rifle Corps. Advanced Lieutenant on 1 April** 1909 and later Captain on 1 April 1912 he was serving at Jhansi the next year in 1913. Being listed as Supernumerary in June 1914 Kennedy was to join the Assam-Bengal Railway Volunteer **Rifles that same year on 13 December.Leaving the Volunteer Corps he transferred to the Indian Army Reserve of Officers on 15** July 1915. Posted to the 90th Punjabis Kennedy entered the war on 10 march 1916 in Mesopotamia. This unit saw action on the Euphrates Front and it was here that Kennedy won his M.C., while the award did not come with a citation it might very well have been the result of his actions on 11 September 1916. The Brigade was to launch a raid against the village of As Sahilan with a company of the 90th Punjabis taking the advanced guard. Kennedy went with them as commander of the machine gun section and from the first performed sterling work. Several times they silenced enemy fire and then dragged their guns forward to cover the front lines to repeat the process. However it was during the withdrawal after the raid had succeeded in its goals when Kennedy proved his metal, the Battalion War Diary takes up the story stating: 'During the earliest stages of the retirement Lieut. Kennedy who accompanied my line was unable to bring his Machine Guns into action owing to his field of fire being masked by our own retiring Infantry, but after we had left the village of As Sahilan some 1500 yards behind he halted where he was until all our infantry had retired past him, and opened fire on the enemy who were now rapidly advancing, at 1200 vards. South of the Village, affectively checking their advance for several minutes.'Advanced Lieutenant on 1 April 1917 he was wounded not long later and left the theatre on 24 September 1917 for India. Having returned to full health Kennedy returned to the Battalion on 15 July 1918 and was promoted Captain that same day. His medals are noted as issued to him by the 'Court of India' in India where he was living in 1920. Returning to Britain in 1927 Kennedy died at St. Leonards, Sussex on 18 April 1971; sold together with copied research including M.I.C., medal rolls and war diary extracts as well as London Gazette and India Gazette extracts.Subject to 5% tax on Hammer Price in addition to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium.

Howard Stedman was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant with the Indian Army Reserve of Officers on 20 November **1914.** Later advanced Temporary Lieutenant while holding a special appointment on 18 January 1916, likely his posting to the Judge Advocate General's Department. His actions here are not known, however he must have shown exceptional bravery as he was awarded the Military Cross at the start of 1917.Stedman was still in India during the Kuki Rebellion, which started in December 1917 as a result of British conscription of local tribesmen for the Labour Corps. Attempts by the British Authorities to punish chiefs that refused to allow to the recruitment drive led to violence and the outbreak spiralled from there. Raids began against farms and villages all over Manipur and soon the British had no choice but to take action.Stedman was placed in command of a column advancing from Burma toward Longya. Having burned this settlement without facing opposition he led his column towards Khailet to rendezvous with Captain Coote, the officer in command of another column. It was on this journey that he encountered a Kuki stockade and decided to make a frontal assault. This proved to be the wrong decision as the position was strongly held and the column came under a heavy fire. Colonel L. W. Shakespeare, the British officer in command in the area takes up the story in his work the History of the Assam Rifles, stating:'He [Stedman] then descended, crossed the Manipur river and climbed to Haika en route to Khailet, where the two Columns were to have met. A very long stockade barred his path, against which Steadman [SIC] made a frontal attack and failed to take it, losing 11 killed and many wounded. Steadman [SIC], the only British officer with them, was badly wounded in three places, the carriers began to bolt, and the Column was obliged to retreat to Lenakot- a most unfortunate incident, due to inexperience of the British Officer in command. This makes Stedman one of only five British officers to be wounded during the campaign. After heavy fighting the uprising finally came to an end in May 1919, and although victory went to the British the difficulty with which it was earned had been noticed. As for Stedman, he was awarded the British War and Victory Medals by the Indian Government with his unit noted as the 59th Scinde Rifles (Frontier Force).Confirmed in the rank of Lieutenant on 2 November 1918 while stationed with the 56th Punjab Rifles he was further advanced Captain on 15 August 1919. Involved in the Waziristan Campaigns between 1919-1924 he was transferred to the 4th Gurkha Rifles on 8 December 1921. Joining the Staff of the Waziristan Force on 27 August 1923 he was to serve in this position until the end of the 1921-24 campaign. Appointed Adjutant-General Baluchistan on 25 May 1927 Stedman was promoted Major on 27 May 1937. Remaining in India during the Second World War he retired as a Lieutenant-Colonel on 12 March 1942; sold together with copied research comprising London Gazette extracts, a service record transcription and M.I.C. as well as extracts from the History of the Assam Rifles, The great Kuki rebellion of 1917-19: its real significances and The Kuki Rising 1917-1919. They saw action at the Battle of Festubert, Second Battle of Ypres (both May 1915) and the Battle of Morval in September 1916, but in October 1917 the regiment was ordered back to India.Pierce transferred to the 1/4th (Ross Highland) Battalion Seaforth Highlanders- possibly around this time- seeing further hard service and receiving a dangerous wound (a machine-gun bullet to the abdomen) soon after being previously wounded on the occasion in which he won his welldeserved decoration.Consequently discharged (with entitlement to Silver War Badge No. B67902) he died in Ealing, London, in October 1962. As these artillery installations were of high value to the Germans, they were often wellprotected by machine-gun posts, usually on either flank. These machine guns were holding up proceedings and also were causing many casualties; my grandfather could see what was happening and, in an act of bravery and complete disregard for self-preservation, ran round the side of the hill undetected for most of the way, until he reached the top. Here he found one of the machine-gun posts: two of the occupants ran away, and grandfather single-handedly, with whatever means at his disposal, dispatched the officer and the two operators of the gun, leaving that particular side of the hill open to make headway for the battalion to proceed no longer under fire from that sector.I asked him how he worked out which of the enemy to take down first. He replied: "That was easy! The two that ran away were no threat to me, as they were more scared of me than I was of them. Secondly, the two operating the machine gun were unarmed so my prime objective was the officer who had a holster and was armed." I asked him how he felt after he had done this and his reply was simple: "Somebody had to do something." Here he thrived, earning an official commendation on 30 June 1911 for 'Special ability in the prosecution against two suspected persons'. Earning his Coronation Medal the next month, he married Elizabeth Fisher on 5 August 1911 at Acton. The Kentish Town station General Occurrence Book reports upon the act of bravery which secured his award of the King's Police Medal for Gallantry. A horse attached to a brewery van outside the George V Pub on Holmes Road, Kentish Town, was startled by the noise of train yard nearby and bolted. Thrice, members of the public leapt to try and intercept the rampaging animal and on both occasions they were knocked down with the first man, George Childs, being killed.As the terrified animal ploughed down Holmes Street Spencer, who was outside Holmes Street Police Station at the time, leapt into action. Grabbing hold of the left rein he was pulled along behind the animal onto Kentish Town Road and into Islip Steet. Managing to regain his feet he caught hold of the horse's noseband and nostrils, pulling it to a stop. Despite his success Spencer was clearly seriously hurt, being placed upon the sick list immediately. Commended and given a reward of £10 from the Bow Street Fund for his bravery, he was to be awarded the K.P.M. in the New Years Honours.The Great WarCalled back to the colours upon the outbreak of the Great War, Spencer re-joined on 5 August 1914 and returned to the 2nd Dragoon Guards. Entering the war in France on 14 August 1914 he was present with this unit during the Retreat from Mons during which they saw fighting at Nerv on 1 September 1914. Here they held the line south of the village, near the guns of 'L' Battery as they made their famous stand. It was also detachment of the 2nd that took the Sugar Factory south of Nery when it was threatened by the German 18th Dragoons.In spite of the heavy fighting Spencer managed to survive the fighting and continued to serve with the unit until, 6 November 1916 when he transferred to the Military Mounted Police. Having served with them for a year he was awarded the Military Medal while attached to the 25th Division at Ypres. At this time the Division had been in action at Messines and Pilkem with their HQ at Busseboom.PostwarSpencer was discharged on 28 March 1919 and returned to service with the Metropolitan Police. Continuing to serve with remarkable ability, he was given another Commendation in 1929. In this capacity he earned a further medal, still being in service during the 1935 Jubilee celebrations and finally retiring on 15 December 1935. This was not to be the end of his time in service however, as all too soon war once again covered Europe and Spencer once again donned uniform. He joined the Home Guard as a Private and served for duration of the war, losing his son in the sinking of the S.S. Lisbon Maru on 1 October 1942. Cpl Tye whose section was then in reserve personally and with great gallantry led his section to attack the enemy post from the rear. So determined was this attack that post surrendered, thus enabling the company to gain his objective. Throughout the campaigns this NCO has set a constantly high standard of gallantry and unfailing devotion to duty. His coolness under fire, cheerfulness and courage has been an inspiration to all. The fine example set by this NCO is beyond all praise.'Leslie Paul Tye was born at Retford on 16 October 1924 and was a boot repairer when he enlisted at Lincoln on 2 March 1944. Tye completed his basic training with the General Service Corps, followed by a short stint with the Sherwood Foresters, before eventually joining the 2nd Battalion, Highland Light Infantry (2nd Glasgow Highlanders) in September 1944. This was just in time for the Rhine Crossing.Moyland WoodsCleve was vacated on 14 February to mount an attack on the defended woods south east of Rosendahl. The village was occupied without much opposition but on moving through to take the high ground which was the final objective C Company suffered many casualties. With A Company on their objective, B Company were pushed through to take the high ground on the right and succeeded in getting one platoon forward. This platoon faced a bitter counter-attack and destroyed a SP gun with a PIAT at 50 yards range. The ground was held that night and the following day flanking attacks by the Seaforths and Cameronians enabled the battalion to make its full advance.(Page 249 of The Fifteenth Scottish Division 1939-1945 makes reference to the PIAT gun of Number 10 Platoon destroying an enemy SP gun.)Rhine BridgeheadThe Glasgow Highlanders were in reserve for the assault crossing of the Rhine and it was not until they were well inside the bridgehead at Haffen on 24 March that opposition was met. Both here and in the wooded country in the area of the Mehr lakes the Battalion had to fight hard for its ground. On 27 March the Battalion faced German 88mm and flak guns at point blank range during their attack on the farm of Hegemanns-kath and at nightfall two companies had gained their objectives. The following day the enemy pulled out and the further advance of the battalion was through country littered with abandoned German equipment and decorated with white flags.Discharged on 21 Apriul1947 Tye returned to civilian life; sold together with a quantity of original documents and photographs including his record of service, field service post card and Ministry of Pensions letter confirming he was wounded, receiving a gunshot wound to the right thigh, his Soldiers' Service & Pay Book, box of issue for his M.M., identity tags and a copy of the concise Official History 2nd Battalion The Glasgow Highlanders, which was published in Lubeck in 1946. He distinguished himself during the second day of the Second Battle of Kohima in April 1944. With the lifting of the siege of Kohima in mid-April 1944, another major battle for that famous ridge commenced, only on this occasion the British and Indian forces found themselves on the offensive against an enemy who excelled in defensive warfare. Defending every bunker with extraordinary determination, the surviving elements of Sato's 31st Division reaped heavy casualities on the most of 4th, 5th and 6th Brigades who had been allotted the unenviable task of taking the Allied advance forward. In scenes reminiscent of the famous siege, fierce hand-to-hand fighting, singing, grenade and ph

He possesses a fine offensive spirit in action combined with a complete disregard for personal safety, and has shown himself to be an outstanding member of a gallant crew. He is considered worthy of the award of the Distinguished Flying Medal'Ronald McDonald Calder was born on 13 January 1923 at Edinburgh, the son of James and Nellie Calder, working as a Barman prior to attesting with the Royal Air Force 3 December 1941 and being mobilised on 26 June 1942. Appointed Sergeant on 28 July 1943 he began to train as a Wireless Operator, completing the course Calder became Wireless Operator (Air) on 11 August 1944 being appointed Flight Sergeant the next day.Calder began to flying missions with N. 76 Squadron on 9 April 1944 over Lille in Halifax LW.681 "Y". The attack was a success but "Y" was attacked by a German FW190 fighter on the return journey, successfully driving it off. His next raid was just the next day, this time over Tergnier, returning to the same target the next week on 18 April. "Y" was again in combat just ten days later over Acheres, exchanging shots with another FW190 and a JU88.As series of raids soon followed in quick succession with another one in April, seven in May and nine in June. It was during this month that perhaps the most astonishing of Calder's experiences occurred, during a raid over Amiens on the night of 12-13 June. On this occasion he was again flying in "Y" piloted by Flight-Sergeant Galbraith, in a tight formation with a number of other bombers. On history of the Squadron relates what happened next, stating:'Positioned just about centre of the stream of aircraft jockeying for a place in the bombing-run, bomb-doors open in readiness, Galbraith unwittingly flew beneath another aircraft in his wave. A sound quite unlike anything heard before pierced his ear drums. For a spilt second he froze in his seat and then the inhuman shriek was gone. Gingerly he nudged the controls, the Halifax responded gently to his touch, but that something awful had happened there could be no doubt. He had not long to wait. A pale faced flight engineer reported that a bomb had passed clean through their aircraft. No one was hurt, but at Woodbride, where Galbraith eventually landed, an onlooker remarked that he had never known such a badly damaged aircraft to survive.'Calder's own log book records the incident in less dramatic detail stating 'Bomb dropped on wing, crashed Woodbrige.'. Despite this they were soon back in the air only four days later over Domleger and Noyelle En Chausse on 23 June. The final attack for the month was over the Marshalling Yards at Blainville on 28 June, with intense combat reported between the attacking formation and enemy aircraft. Halifax "Y" reported damage to a JU88 as a result of the fighting. A further eight raids followed in July, with heavy flak reported over the target on each occasion.Calder's last tour of operational flying with No. 76 Squadron was August 1944, largely over heavily defended land targets. During a raid over Cappel on 11 August his Halifax suffered several near misses and was holed by flak. His final mission was over the Tractable 22 Battle Area, Cean on 14 August, again suffering flak damage. This was to be his last mission with No. 76 Squadron, Calder was married the next year on 6 June 1945 at St. Phillip's Church, Logie Green Road, Edinburgh to Margaret Dryden. He is described as a 'Flight Sergeat Royal Air Force' and 'engaged in War Service', his bride is noted as a 'Motor Van Driver'. Calder was advanced Warrant Officer not long later on 12 August 1945, his awards were signed off upon in September 1945 at R.A.F. Given the appointment of Acting Principal in the Quartermaster-General's Branch in January 1900, in June of the same year Wyatt also became Secretary General of the Army Railway Council. In these posts he became a Member of the Royal Victorian Order on 22 August 1902 for his part in the Coronation of Edward VII and the next year received one of the first Imperial Service Orders. He finally retired on 1 April 1903 and died at Weston Park, Basingstoke on 22 September 1920; sold together with copied London Gazette entries, Obituaries, Who was Who entries and the War Office list 1919. Hermione in March 1941, and he remained likewise employed - as a Leading Seaman - up until her loss in the Mediterranean in June 1942. Mediterranean the Malta runHer 'working up' period completed by May 1941, Hermione joined the 1st Cruiser Squadron in the Mediterranean Fleet as part of Force 'H' - and was quickly deployed in escorting the carriers Ark Royal and Furious, bound from Gibraltar to Malta, laden with fighters bound for the beleaguered island.In July, Hermione operated as cover for Ark Royal - and the battleship Nelson and cruiser Renown during an attack on the enemy airfield Aghero, Sardinia. Later in the same month, she participated in the famous Malta convoy, Operation "Substance", in the course of which she went to the rescue of a merchantman and the destroyer Nestor, both under sustained enemy attack; her gunners shot down two enemy aircraft.On 2 August 1941, the Italian submarine Tembien was spotted by one of the Ark Royal's aircraft between Pantelleria and Malta. Hermione manoeuvred to ram her, and did so in spectacular fashion at 28 knots, cutting her in two. There were no survivors. In September, Hermione again escorted the Ark Royal, enabling aircraft to be flown off for the defence of Malta, in addition to participating in another well-known Malta convoy, Operation "Halberd".In March 1942, following the loss of Ark Royal, a renewed attempt was made to fly off aircraft to Malta, this time from the carriers Argus and Eagle but, due to adverse weather conditions, they had to call off the attempt. Later in the month the operation was repeated, and 16 Spitfires reached Malta under the watchful eye of Hermione; she retired to Simonstown, South Africa, for repairs.Operation "Vigorous": Loss of the H.M.S. HermioneBack on the Mediterranean station by the summer of 1942, Hermione was allocated to Force 'A' and, in the middle of June, participated in the hotly contested Malta convoy Operation "Vigorous". Having expended most of her ammunition in consequence of protracted enemy aircraft attack on the 14th, she withdrew, under escort, to Alexandria.At 23.20 hours on the 15th, U-205 spotted a group of warships north of Sollum and attacked two destroyers with one torpedo each at 23.38 and 23.40 hours, but missed. Only then did Reschke - the U-Boats's commander recognize one of the 'shadows' as a cruiser and fired a spread of three torpedoes at 0019 hours on the 16th, hitting Hermione on the starboard side. The ship immediately settled by the stern with a list of 22° and then completely turned over on one side, remaining afloat for 21 minutes before sinking. Eight officers and 80 ratings were lost and the survivors were picked up by escorting destroyers and landed at Alexandria.PostscriptAwarded his L.S. & G.C. Subsequently deployed to the defence of the Dunkirk perimeter, the 5th Borders suffered serious casualties on the last day of May and first day of June, particularly in 'A' and 'C' Companies.On the former date, they had been ordered into the front line on the left flank of the 1st Battalion. East Lancashire Regiment. to prevent the Germans crossing the Bergues-Furnes Canal. It was to prove a desperate and costly enterprise, perhaps best summed-up by the award of the Victoria Cross (V.C.) to Captain **Ervine-Andrews of the 1st East Lancashires.Here, then, a likely** action in which Rowe received his wounds. Appointed Lance-Corporal in 1891 and **Corporal two years later, in December 1895 he was one of only 18** men of the 1st Battalion Scots Guards to participate in the Ashanti Expedition of 1896. Prior to their departure they were inspected at Windsor Castle by Her Majesty Oueen Victoria, with a report by The Graphic mentioning Burt by name and featuring an illustration of the occasion on the front cover of their issue of 7 December 1895. Returning safely home, Burt was promoted Sergeant in June 1896 but not before he had been slightly injured by a blank cartridge during a display for the Royal Military Tournament. This injury clearly did no lasting damage as a mere two years later he was again promoted, this time to Colour-Sergeant.Upon the formation of the Irish Guards on 1 April 1900, Burt transferred to this new regiment of Foot Guards and was appointed their first Regimental Sergeant-Major: it was in this capacity that (after active service in South Africa during the Second Anglo-Boer War) he must have played a central part in Trooping the Colour in 1902, when His Majesty King Edward VII presented the Regiment with their new **Colours. In 1905 Burt was appointed Sergeant-Instructor of the** 26th Middlesex Rifle Volunteer Corps, and in 1908 Colour-Sergeant Instructor in the 25th (County of London) Cyclist Battalion; this was followed a year later with promotion to Acting Sergeant-Major in the same unit. Discharged in January 1916 (with a glowing testimonial), Burt was then commissioned Honorary Lieutenant and Quartermaster in the 25th - and despite his advancing years this did nothing to prevent him seeing active service yet again; he was posted to Bombay in 1916 and participated in the Waziristan Field Force 'Summer Campaign' of May - August 1917. The British were alerted to their** presence and a British patrol was detached to locate the enemy, although the first location they tried proved to be incorrect. A detachment was sent out to check a nearby farmhouse- in fact the correct location- and they soon discovered the column which numbered about twenty men. The sentries had withdrawn from their posts allowing the patrol, under Lieutenant Koe, to advance close to the farmhouse and open fire. The IRA fought back immediately and a firefight raged, however the building had no back door and couldn't be easily exited. The commander of the Column, Jack O'Connell led an attempted breakout but the heavy fire prevented this, with only O'Connell himself escaping. The rest were forced back inside and the arrival of British reinforcements sealed their fate. The thatch of the cottage was fired and a number of men exited with their hands raised. Different stories are told about what followed but they were either gunned down by the Black and Tans present or killed in the crossfire when men still in the house opened fire. When the dust of the ambush had settled there remained only 8 men of the column alive, 4 of whom where wounded.TrailAfterwards five private of the Hampshire Regiment gave evidence in the trails of the prisoners, they are the only identified members of the patrol. One was Private Murhall who gave his recollection as:'he had been detailed to fire on the only window at the rear of the house, from where he had seen a man sniping at the soldiers. Towards dusk he heard shots and shouting from the front of the house. He saw seven civilians lined up near the shed. He remembered seeing all of the accused then present in the court - with the exception of Maurice Moore and John Harty- as being present at Colnmult.'(The Battle of Colnmult by Tom O'Neill, refers)While Murhall's name and number remained the same he was transferred to the Devonshire Regiment. Howard Nelson.)** unofficially engraved, silver and enamel, hallmarked for Birmingham, 1928, in H.P. He was one of three schoolboys who decided to spend the last day of their holidays camping. Having packed a tent they went out onto the moors: stopped there by a local woman, the children were warned to be on the lookout for a group of escaped Italian P.O.W.'s. The Star newspaper takes up the story stating: 'Tomlinson spotted a man, wearing a khaki shirt and trousers and carrying a bundle under his arm, some distance away. The boys became suspicious and fell on their stomachs behind the rocks to keep watch. After a few minutes they saw a second man. They decided it was time to take action. Nelson, a Scout, rushed back to the cycles and fastened them together with a rope, deflated the tires, and removed the pumps."By this time we were certain that they were the escaped Italians and decided to get in touch with the police," Lee stated. "Because I had the fastest bike... I rode to the nearest house nearly a mile away, to phone the police while Howard and Nelson kept watch," he added. When the police arrived the boys approached the cave in which the prisoners were sitting around a fire, with the officers. The Italians offered no resistance, but as they were being put into the police van all gave a Fascist salute.'Nelson and his friends were awarded badges by the 'Gloops Club' at the suggestion of The Star: sold together with two more Gloops Club badges, a 'Glooper's Own' stationery set and a framed letter from 'Auntie Edith', an organiser of the Gloops Club addressed to Howard Nelson and informing him of the award along with copied newspaper article and typed research. 

London Gazette 1 June 1943.John Alastair Dudgeon, who took his second forename, was born on 9 November 1916, the son Professor Leonard Stanley Dudgeon, and his wife Nora.After Repton and Trinity College, Cambridge, he arrived at St. Thomas's Medical School in 1937, but his studies were interrupted by the outbreak of the Second World War. Having joined the 7th Battalion, Rifle Brigade of the Territorial Army in 1936, he decided to put his finals on hold and instead serve as a combatant officer. CombatantEmbarked for the Middle East, he was appointed to the command of 'C' Company at the battle of El Alamein, and won his first M.C. for knocking out 14 enemy tanks, in addition to bringing his medical skills to use under heavy fire. After a period of retraining, the 7th Rifle Brigade arrived in the Medenine area and subsequently, after the indecisive assault on the Matmara Hills, joined the New Zealand Corps now opposite El Hammah, and outflanking the enemy. Dudgeon's unit attempted to 'bounce' the Wadi Akarit position, but the attack proved abortive and he was severely wounded. According to Robin Hastings, author of An Undergraduate's War, it 'was one of the few occasions when a single battalion could influence the course of a campaign.' Dudgeon was invalided home and was awarded a Bar to his M.C.On leaving hospital, he took his finals and transferred to the Royal Army Medical Corps. He subsequently participated in the top-secret Operation "Tyburn", namely the crash production of vaccine against scrub typhus, one of the most serious medical problems in the jungles of South-East Asia.ProfessorWith the war over, Dudgeon's commitment to virology in civilian life began with a posting to the Virus Research Laboratory at Entebbe in Uganda, but in 1949 he, and his new wife, Patricia, returned to St. Thomas's where he became Assistant Pathologist. A year later, he was appointed Assistant Pathologist and Honorary Consultant Virologist to the Hospital for Sick Children, Great Ormond Street, where he served on the Board of Governors from 1962 to 1981. He then spent four years as Director of Virus Research at the Glaxo Laboratories and returned to Great Ormond Street as Consultant Microbiologist.It was about this time that he began to make his most important contributions to the development of the rubella vaccine. Rubella, more commonly known today as German measles, is a viral infection, now rare in the United Kingdom, which produces rashes, swollen glands and flu-like symptoms such as coughs, a runny nose and aching or painful joints. It becomes a serious concern when women catch the virus during the first twenty weeks of pregnancy; birth defects such as brain damage, heart abnormalities, deafness and cataracts, caused by the rubella virus are known as congenital rubella syndrome (CRS).During the early field trials of the vaccine, it was necessary to select young women unlikely to be in the earliest stages of pregnancy; Dudgeon made the ingenious suggestion of asking for the co-operation of nuns, and they proved to be 'most collaborative in the research project which was designed to prevent congenital abnormality resulting from maternal German measles.' This highly original idea to conduct preliminary trials in closed religious communities required the permission of the Archbishop of Canterbury, Dr. Ramsay, and the Archbishop of Westminster, Cardinal Heenan. With their support, Dudgeon was able to show that the vaccine virus did not pass from person to person, was safe, and that immunity lasted for many years; it laid the foundations for the routine use of vaccine and what we understand today as the MMR vaccine. In the early 1960s he began to design the programme of immunisations for children and travellers. At the Institute of Child Health, his programme covered infective gastroenteritis, encephalitis in childhood, and intrauterine infections, with special reference to congenital rubella and cytomegalovirus infections. He was awarded the Harding Medal and the Bissett Hawkins Medal. Dudgeon's remarkable work attracted many young research workers to his Department from Australasia, Europe and the U.S.A., and he enjoyed a Research Fellowship at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia.As his career reached its latter stages, he began to take on a more administrative role; he was advisor to the Ministry of Health and a member of the Committee on Safety of Medicines. He was also a consultant advisor on infectious diseases to the World Health Organisation. Appointed C.B.E. in 1977, Dudgeon became Deputy Lieutenant of Greater London in the following year; he had earlier been appointed Officer of St. John (0. St. J.) in 1958. Following his retirement in 1982, he kept himself busy as a member of the Council of the British Heart Foundation and as Chairman of its Research Funds Committee. He was also appointed Fellow of the Royal Society of Apothecaries in 1986. According to his obituary notice in The Times on 16 October 1989, Dudgeon was 'known for being clear headed, far-seeing and industrious, qualities which were matched by his courteous and kindly manner.' And according to his 1985 entry in Who's Who, aside from his vast achievements in Microbiology, the Professor also enjoyed sailing at the Aldeburgh Yacht Club. In his address given at Dudgeon's funeral, the Reverend Canon David Hutchinson, the Vicar of Aldeburgh, alluded to this interest: Alastair's hoby was sailing; and no doubt, with some of his family as crew, battled together against the elements, using the tide and wind for their advantage. Reaching maturity with H.M.S. Achilles on 1 September 1911, he saw service with a number of vessels prior to the outbreak of the Great War including Vindictive and Latona. Seeing Great War service Le Bargy ended the war with the wclass destroyer Woolston as Petty Officer.Serving aboard Collingwood, Malaya and Effingham after the end of the war he was promoted Chief Petty Officer with the latter on 2 June **1928.** He was shore pensioned from Victory I on 31 August 1933 however as war loomed Le Bargy returned to service on 25 January 1938. Posted to St. Angelo, the Malta shore base, on 14 April 1939 he served with an R.M.S. unit clearing mines. With the Island besieged by German and Italian forces Le Bargy was kept busy alongside his superior Lieutenant-Commander W. E. Hiscock. They were called into action in September 1941 when an Italian mine was dropped into St. George's Bay, the mine proved to be booby trapped and in attempting to defuse it they triggered a countdown. With great presence of mind, he crawled towards the enemy bunker and although hit by a burst he continued to advance. Inspired by his personal example his platoon rushed forward and destroyed the enemy position completely. The leadership and courage displayed by Naib Subedar Aimer Singh in this action were in the best traditions of the Indian Army.'The Vir Chakra is an Indian gallantry award presented for acts of bravery in the battlefield. The award of the decoration carries with it the right to use Vr.C. as a postnominal abbreviation. It is third in precedence in the wartime gallantry awards and comes after the Param Vir Chakra and Maha Vir Chakra.Aimer Singh, a native of Ambala, Harvana, India was born on the 5 December 1935. He enlisted in the 4th Sikhs on the 5 December 1950 and took part in the Indo-Pakistan War of 1965 - specifically Operation Riddle, where he won his award during the advance on the village of Burki in Pakistan.The Battle of Burki (Barki) was a battle fought by Indian Infantry and Pakistani Armour in the Indo-Pakistani War of 1965. Barki is a village that lies south-east of Lahore near the border with the Punjab, and is just 11km from the Allama Igbal International Airport in Lahore.During the fighting, the relative strengths of both sides were fairly even and Indian infantry clashed with Pakistani forces that were entrenched in pillboxes, dug-outs and slit trenches that had been carved into the canal banks. The Pakistanis were supported by a large number of tanks, as well as fighter jets. Nevertheless, the battle resulted in an Indian victory.During the fighting the 4th Sikhs suffered 123 casualties, of which 23 were killed. The Sikhs won one MVC (Sub. Ajit Singh (posthumous.)), three Vr.C's (L/Naik Pritam Singh (posthumous.), Maj. Shamsher Singh Manhas, & Hav. Ajmer Singh) and the battle honour 'Burki'.The Battalion was then chosen to recapture Khem Karan. On 12 September, 200 men under Lieutenant-Colonel Anant Singh were selected for the attack. They marched through the night and reached the outskirts of Khem Karan, where a group of tanks were to link up with the men: the men rested for some time and then heard tank noises, thinking it was the Indian Armour they rushed out into a group of Patton tanks of the Pakistan Army. During the fighting (in which 40 men were killed and another 40 men managed to break out) the rest including the C.O. were taken prisoner by the Pakistan Army.Near the Enguiry Office, at Amabla Cantonment Railway station, there are two marble stones fixed on the wall in honour of two war heroes, Second Lt Ravinder Singh Bedi and Naib Subedar Ajmer Singh, both residents of Ambala - it stands there to this day. A Stalingrad Veteran's Medal for Bravery awarded to Lieutenant-**Colonel Petr Nikolaevich Prikhno, Chief of Staff of 63rd Rifle** Division, 31st Army, formerly the 8th Motorised Rifle N.K.V.D. Division, for his role in the initial defence of the Serafimovich bridgehead, a crucial area to the north of Stalingrad which formed one of the launch areas for the counter-attack which would surround the German Sixth Army in November 1942. A much-decorated officer, Prikhno would later receive an Order of the Red Banner for his role in Operation Uranus - the Stalingrad counterattack - two orders of the Patriotic War 1st Class - one of which was for the storming and capture of Konigsberg in April 1945 - as well as two further orders of the Red Banner, and an Order of Lenin for long serviceRussia, Soviet Union, Medal for Bravery, reverse numbered 108416, 1st type medal, subsequently converted for wear on a 2nd type suspender due to post-1943 field regulations, slight damage to red enamel lettering but overall good very finePetr Nikolaevich Prikhno was born in Cherkassy District in the Kiev Region in 1906 and would join the Red Army in 1924; he subsequently became a Party Member in 1928.Prikhno saw frontline service in the Patriotic War from 22 June 1941 and would go on to be heavily involved in the celebrated Defence of Stalingrad. This Medal for Bravery was awarded to him on 19 October 1942 whilst serving as Lieutenant-Colonel and Chief-of-Staff of the 63rd Rifle Division, 31st Army - formerly the 8th Motorised Rifle N.K.V.D. Division - for the following act: 'Comrade Prikhno has been the first Chief of Staff of 8th Motorised Rifle NKVD Division, and later Chief of Staff of 63rd Rifle Division. He has been efficient in organising the respective headquarters functions. In all the combat operations, he ensured efficient and continuous combat governance of the troops and proper combat documentation. In the situations near Bobrovsky and Serafimovich, when the enemy imposed direct threat to the division headquarters, Comrade Prikhno personally organised the headquarters personnel to man the defensive perimeter. As the result of this effort, the enemy thrust was repelled and all the personal and vehicles were safely relocated and evaded the enemy, even though it was done under heavy enemy fire. He is a disciplined and reliable officer. He is devoted to the cause of the Lenin-Stalin party and the Socialist Motherland. He enjoys the well deserved respect of the troops.'He would go on to receive a number of other awards during the course of his service - the first of these would be an Order of the Red Banner on 4 February 1943; the Russian archives suggest this was for the opening days of the Stalingrad counter-attack from 19-24 November 1942, where units broke out of the Serafimovich bridgehead that he had defended and formed part of the northern pincer that met at Kalach-on-Don on 24 November and surrounded the German Sixth Army in the city.He would then be awarded an Order of the Red Banner (3 November 1944) for 20 years long service and an Order of the Patriotic War 1st Class on 22 November 1944 for fighting as part of the 1st Baltic Front in Latvia.In April 1945 he would take part in the storming of Konigsberg, being awarded another Order of the Patriotic War by decree of the 3rd Belorussian Front on 22 April 1945 for his role in the fighting. He would later receive an Order of Lenin on 11 November 1951 for 25 years long service and then a third Order of Red Banner on 26 October 1955 for 30 years long service.
