New ZealandMissionary Mail1840 (24 May) entire letter from a Mr William Swainson in London to the Rev. Jn. Bumby at Mangungu, Hokianga. There are no English markings other than rates, on the front is a weak boxed red "missent to kororarika n.z." and on the back a very fine black oval "(Crown)/kororarika/18 ja/1840/new zealand" (the 1840 was fixed and is actually 1841). Manuscript 2/- shows two shillings paid in England and manuscript 1/- deleted and changed to 4/-. The transcribed letter deals with Swainson's desire to settle in New Zealand and acquire large areas of lands while he makes clear that he does not want to be seen to have robbed the natives in any way, he also tells Bumby to deal with a locally settled Dutch naturalist to whom he will be known. He plans to bring out 11 corn mills with him. Swainson sailed for New Zealand on the Jane arriving in Port Nicholson (Wellington) in May 1841. John Bumby, starting with an entire from Birmingham to his sister and family, with red Birmingham c.d.s. of 7 March 1837 where he is ministering to a very busy parish. The second letter dated 1838 (29 March) is to his sister and refers to his going with Mr. Waterhouse to the "South Seas" and that he has been told this will be good for his health. The third letter is without postal markings and refers to him not liking the Triton at all and that he hopes to be shortly at Kawia. It is addressed to his sister at the Mission House. Mangungu, possibly for forwarding with other mail. The fourth letter of May 1839 is without postal markings and is again from on board the Triton and refers to him taking off on a long expedition. The fifth letter is without an envelope or outer wrapper on his return from the South and may be a draft, it gives details of prospects further south and the suitability of land such as Taranaki for agriculture, also speculation on the number of inhabitants with very different estimates. The fifth item is written by his sister Mary after receiving the news that Iohn has been drowned in the River Thames. The final item is dated 1840 (17 July) to the Wesleyan Mission House in London giving details of the death of John Bumby, signed by Revs John Whiteley, James Wallis, Thomas Buddle and Henry Turton. No transcript,. There is also a poem about his going to New Zealand, possibly addressed to his father J.H.B. There is a 1990 commemorative booklet on John Bumby included with details of his demise.
