

Swet is a documented moneyer for Bedford from the voided Shortcross coinage struck in reign of Cnut (1016-1035/6), however his technical proficiency appears to have lapsed in the intervening decade, another of his Arm and Sceptre dies reading SPOT ON BEDEFO++ (SCBI 40, 1572), the initial cross replacing an R in that case. It is likely rather than a coin reading to a moneyer 'Guswet', it is the assumption of the present cataloguer that the initial cross simply and mistakenly replaces the letter D on the present coin.

Little research has been afforded to the study of contemporary imitations in Medieval British numismatics, let alone a focus applied to the gold specie on account of the extreme paucity of surviving specimens for study. The late Marion Archibald documented the small corpus of representative samples in the British Museum trays for the Numismatic Chronicle in 2006, alongside which the infrequent appearance of imitation Nobles and their fractions have appeared at global public auction including a remarkable gilt-silver imitation of the excessively rare Third Coinage Noble of Edward III (fl. 1346-1351), found at Market Rasen, Lincolnshire and sold in these rooms (Spink Auction, 28 January 2019, lot 1618). At 32% below the proscribed weight of the Treaty Period Coinage as at 1351 (120 grains) and still 25% deficient on the retariffment of 1412 (108 grains).

THE WEALDEN RING

An Early Post-Medieval Diamond and Enamel Ring (c. 1550-1650), the central table-cut diamond (~ 0.6ct) set within a raised box bezel made of sheet gold decorated with three tongue-shaped cells of pale blue-green enamel to all four sides, the shoulders of D-shaped cross section decorated with vine scroll pattern, with traces of blue-green enamel surviving, the design terminates halfway down the side of the hoop, the lower section of the hoop plain and with trapezoidal cross section, diameter 17.54mm, width 3.03mm, thickness 1.14mm, 2.48g, ring size approx. O, [Spink XRF: 80.7% Gold; 10.7% Silver; 8.6% Copper] (cf. Cheapside Hoard, Museum of London, No. A14244; cf. PAS: SUR-ED1CD5, PAS: WMID-2A18B1; cf. V&A 935-1871), a complete, wearable, and typically characteristic example of an early 17th century gem set ring, opaque white enamel discoloured over time, the diamond likely sourced from India and cut in France, a breathtaking survivor with a stunning, sparkling diamond that takes centre stage, an extremely rare opportunity to own a museum worthy example, unearthed in East Sussex only two years ago

The stone's thermal conductivity has been tested, and the reading for a diamond was positive.

"[the very best diamonds] must be without any faults, both in corners and sides, clean cut without any nastiness, and of a good water crystalline, and shining clear, not yellow, bluish, or blackish or brown, but clear, and clean in all perfection." (Hannibal Gamon, The Goldsmith's Storehouse).



The Wealden Ring dates to c.1550-1650 and can be compared to others recorded with the Portable Antiquities Scheme including the Selbourne Ring, found in Hampshire (SUR-ED1CD5), and another found in Staffordshire (WMID-2A18B1), which was acquired by the Stoke Potteries and Art Gallery in 2018. Both examples were set with rock crystal however, rather than with diamond.

Whereas the English official gold standard set by Act of Parliament in 1576 was 22 carats, the standard in France was 19.2 carats, which became known as the 'touch of Paris'. The Wealden Ring obviously aligns more closely with the latter, suggesting that it is quite likely the ring was made abroad before making its way over to the British Isles.

One of the defining features of this ring is the tongue-shaped cells filled with enamel that surround the bezel. Now a blue-green colour, it is assumed that this enamel was once opaque white, and since discoloured. One of the Wealden Ring's closest comparable examples is a similar ring found amongst the 1912 Cheapside Hoard of 17th Century jewels, now housed in the Museum of London (A14244). That ring has white enamel decoration the entire way around the bad, as well as on the bezel, suggesting that it was custom made for the wearer, as resizing after such decoration would not have been possible. The Wealden Ring, too, is decorated with scrolls of vines, typical of gem set rings of the period, but it is plain beyond the shoulders. There are some traces of remaining enamel in the moulded relief, but most has been lost to time and erosion.

The true star of The Wealden Ring, however, is the diamond. In an age when lab grown diamonds push their way into the jewellery market by force, a natural specimen in such a flawless condition, makes for staggering viewing. The setting of the diamond in the bezel makes it difficult to estimate an exact weight, but from initial measurements it would appear the stone is somewhere between 0.5-1 carats. The gem (which likely heralded from India) is table-cut with scissor cut facets and is an incredibly rare survivor - just like its Cheapside comparable.

The global paths which led to the construction of this ring, harks to Queen Elizabeth I's fervour for colonialism, as she sent explorers like Sir Francis Drake and Sir Walter Raleigh on expeditions around the world. This diamond is representation of heady competition between European powers, as countries such as England and Spain raced across the seas to establish territories and plunder for new materials of exceptional quality.

Sumptuary laws at the time indicate that the owner of such a piece would have to have been owned by someone of considerable rank. The find spot of the ring is also particularly interesting, near Sheffield Green in Uckfield, close to Sheffield Park. Now a sprawling garden landscaped by Capability Brown and owned by The National Trust, it was once an important ancient estate. It was mentioned in the Domesday Book, had been owned by Dukes, Lords, and Earls. Even Henry VIII came to Sheffield Park, in August 1538, when he was hosted by the 3rd Duke of Norfolk, Thomas Howard. In the surrounding fields and farms, there were further residences that date to the Medieval period. At the time of production, this area was clearly both housing and hosting wealthy members of society, and we can only wonder at exactly who may have owned and lost the ring. What we can tell, is that they cannot have had it long, as there is hardly any wear showing.

The inscription on this mourning ring commemorates William Hewer, who died at the age of seventy-four on 3rd December 1715. He was not only a notable historic figure in that he became MP for Yarmouth and was responsible for the accounts of the Navy Special Commission, but he is mostly remembered for his close connection to iconic diarist Samuel Pepys. He worked as a clerk for Pepys and is mentioned hundreds of times in his diaries, both as a member of staff and a trusted companion. Anyone who has read the diary of Samuel Pepys will be familiar with Hewer.

Pepys lived with him at several points: in his own lodgings and then later at Hewer's residences near The Strand and then his estate in the village of Clapham. Pepys died in 1703 at Hewer's Clapham Common home, leaving in his custody, his entire library. The two men were undoubtably close after 40 years of knowing one another, demonstrated further by Pepys' decision to make him executor of his will and leaving him the equivalent of about £50,000 in today's money.

William Hewer's own will does not make specific reference to leaving money to make memento mori rings, only for 'mourning,' but given that a substantial portion of his estate was left to his godson (Hewer Edgeley-Hewer), it is quite possible that this found ring belonged to him.

William Hewer is one of the closest figures to the great diarist Samuel Pepys, who has achieved global notoriety, is therefore by proxy also of significant historical note. He was the executor of Pepys' will, was custodian of Pepys' library and had the responsibility of resolving its long-term future. Hewer also had his own book collection and commissioned one of the earliest bookpile design bookplates used in England, in 1699.

William and Mary is the first Coronation medal to depict a conjoined Royal double portrait; in direct recognition of the assent of Parliament to their crowning as equals, rather than Queen Mary II and William of Orange, her Prince Consort. On the obverse, they are addressed simply as King and Queen (REX ET REGINA), omitting the sensitive constitutional issue that they had yet to be offered the Scottish crown at the time of their English Coronation. As exceedingly beautiful as the workmanship of Roettier is here, the design was widely questioned by contemporaries. Some interpreted the iconography of Jove throwing a thunderbolt against Phatron, who falls into the flaming earth as an emblem of William and Mary courting disaster by seizing the reins of her father's chariot. More likely, the intention was to imply that the couple had saved the kingdom from near disaster by the arrogant James II. Perhaps the decision to focus on past failings rather than hopeful prospects was a misplaced judgment, nevertheless the aim to lend legitimacy to their new reign was clear. As equals, William III and Mary II both used Coronations chairs, with Mary's having to be made specifically for the event alongside additional regalia. The duplication of insignia could be to blame for one particular blunder when the Queen's ruby ring was accidently placed on the King's finger. As a result of their 'Glorious' or 'Bloodless' Revolution, other alterations were made to their accession service. The two were required to swear to govern according to the statutes of Parliament, and more significantly to plead their loyalty to the maintenance of the Protestant religion, neither of which had been undertaken before.

The marriage of William of Orange and the Princess Anne was fixed for the 12th November 1733, but on the previous evening the Prince was attacked with pleurisy, and it was not before the spring of the following year that, after a visit to Bath, he was sufficiently recovered to allow the marriage to take place. There were fifty original 'silver tickets' that were gifted to those who helped fund the Bristol Old Vic theatre on King Street in 1766, as well as two 'gold' tickets. Each receiver had pledged the sum of £50 towards the building, and in return were granted the right to watch every performance in the theatre, forever - a promise that the theatre still says it would continue to honour today: "We famously uphold our policy for all the tokens that have been authenticated".

The 'gold' tickets were actually made from silver, but their benefits were transferable, meaning that the ticket could be lent out by the owners. It Is believed that these were given to a man called Edward Crump (a cabinet maker) and his wife Ann for the "great trouble and expense" they had experienced to rally for the building of the theatre on the land. Several of the silver tokens, and one of the gold, have subsequently been donated to the University of Bristol Theatre Collection. In 2016, to mark the 250th anniversary of the theatre, new tickets were minted in silver. There were each sold for £50,000 to raise funds needed to renovate the theatre.

James Berry, OBE, is a distinguished coin designer best known for his work on the iconic 1935 Waitangi Crown. Over his career, he submitted numerous proposals for coinage designs, with the Royal Mint ultimately selecting a series of his reverse designs for New Zealand's first decimal coinage in 1967. While his standard effigy of Queen Elizabeth II was not adopted for the nation's circulating coinage, it was approved for use on New Zealand's Dollar coins from 1979 to 1982.

This exceptionally rare pattern, struck by the Royal Mint, features an experimental effigy of Queen Elizabeth II by Berry that was never adopted for production, with Arnold Machin's effigy replacing it in 1983.

 - 3.4.2 At the time of making the request you shall provide the reasons why such an opinion or certificate is required by you and specify the identity of your proposed expert which will be subject to agreement
 - 3.4.3 We reserve the right, at our discretion, to refuse a request for an expert opinion or Certificate of Authenticity including (without limitation):
 - 3.4.3.1 where the proposed expert is not known to us; or
 - 3.4.3.2 where the request is made based solely on account of condition where an existing opinion or Certificate of Authenticity to which the Philatelic Item(s) is to be sold by us in relation to cites other faults or defects not included in the catalogue description. You acknowledge that any Philatelic Item(s) accompanied by a Certificate of Authenticity is sold on the basis of that Certificate only and not on the basis of any other description or warranty as to authenticity; or
 - 3.4.3.3 where there is already a recognised certificate relating to the item that was issued less than 5 years ago from the date of the request; or
 - 3.4.3.4 where we will submit the Lot to the Expert Committee.
 - 3.4.4 You acknowledge and accept that the length of time taken by an Expert Committee to reach an opinion will vary depending on the circumstances and in any event is beyond our control.
 - 3.4.5 If you receive any correspondence from the Expert Committee in relation to the Lot, including but not limited to a Certificate of Authenticity, you must provide us with copies of such correspondence no later than 7 days after you receive such correspondence.
 - 3.4.6 You acknowledge that, notwithstanding that a certificate or opinion has been sought under this clause 3.4, you shall pay for the Philatelic Item(s) on receipt of the invoice from us in accordance with the applicable payment provisions set out in these Terms and Conditions, and such money shall be held by us until the certificate or opinion has been issued.
 - 3.4.7 Upon a certificate or opinion being issued by the Expert Committee that does not indicate any material fault in the Philatelic Item(s) that would allow you to return the item, we shall pay to the Seller the relevant proceeds of sale and deliver to you the Philatelic Item(s) once received back from the Expert Committee.
 - 3.4.8 Upon a certificate or opinion being issued by the Expert Committee that does indicate a material fault in the Philatelic Item(s) that would allow you to return the item, we shall refund to you the money paid by you for the Philatelic Item(s) and shall return the Philatelic Item(s) to the Seller.

AT THE SALE

Refusal of admission

Our sales usually take place on our own premises or premises over which we have control for the sale, and we have the right, exercisable at our complete discretion, to refuse admission to the premises or attendance at an auction. You will only be eligible to bid on Lots which include NFT(s) if you have a valid online Digital Wallet in your name and under your control.

Registration before bidding
All bidders must be registered either by completing a registration form or creating an account online. Please be aware that we usually require buyers to present identification before making a bid at auction, undergo a credit

check or provide a trade reference. If you have not bid successfully with Spink in the past, or you are registering with us for the first time, we reserve the right to require a deposit of up to 50% of the amount you intend to spend. Such deposit will be deducted from your invoice should you be successful. If you are unsuccessful at auction, your deposit will be returned by the same means it was paid to Spink.

Some Lots may be designated, prior to the auction, as "Premium Lots"; which means a deposit may be required before placing a bid on the item for sale. Information will be posted on our website in such an event.

Bidding as Principal When making a bid (whether such bids are made in person or by way of telephone bids operated by Spink, commission or online or email bids), you will be deemed to be acting as principal and will be accepting personal liability, unless it has been agreed in writing, at the time of registration, that you are acting as agent on behalf of a third party buyer acceptable to us.

Commission Bids

- 4.4.1 If you give us instructions to bid on your behalf, by using the form If you give us instructions to bid on your operant, by using the form provided in our catalogues or via our website, we shall use reasonable endeavours to do so, provided these instructions are received not later than 24 hours before the auction. If we receive commission bids on a particular Lot for identical amounts, and at auction these bids are the highest bids for the Lot, it will be sold to the person whose bid was received first. Commission bids are undertaken subject to other commitments at the time of the sale, and the conduct of the auction may be such that we are unable to bid as requested. Since this is undertaken as a free service to prospective buyers on the terms stated, we cannot accept liability for failure to make a commission bid. You should therefore always attend personally if you wish to be certain of bidding.
- 4.4.2 Lots offered by timed auction are available for sale online only. At any time before the closing time you can place a bid equal to a minimum bid or a higher bid. You could also place your maximum bid and we will bid on your behalf increasing the price in increments to keep you in the lead up to your maximum bid. Placed bids cannot be cancelled or decreased.

On-line Bidding
We offer internet services as a convenience to our clients. We will not be responsible for errors or failures to execute bids placed on the internet, responsible for errors of rainties to execute bids placed on the internet, including, without limitation, errors or failures caused by (i) a loss of internet connection by either party for whatever reason; (ii) a breakdown or problems with the online bidding software and/or (iii) a breakdown or problems with your internet connection, computer or system. Execution of on-line internet bids on www.spink.com and Spink Live is a free service undertaken subject to other commitments at the time of the auction and we do not accept liability for failing to execute an online internet bid or for errors or omissions in connection with this activity.

Telephone Bids

If you make arrangements with us not less than 24 hours before the sale, we shall use reasonable endeavours to contact you to enable you to participate in bidding by telephone, but in no circumstances will we be liable to either the Seller or you as a result of failure to do so.

Currency Converter

At some auctions, a currency converter will be operated, based on the one month forward rates of exchange quoted to us by Barclays Bank Plc or any other appropriate rate determined by us, at opening on the date of the other appropriate rate determined by us, at opening on the date of the auction. Bidding will take place in a currency determined by us, which is usually sterling for auctions held in London. The currency converter is not always reliable, and errors may occur beyond our control either in the accuracy of the Lot number displayed on the converter, or the foreign currency equivalent of sterling bids. We shall not be liable to you for any loss suffered as a result of you following the currency converter.

Video images

 4.10.1 We reserve the right to bid on Lots on the Seller's behalf up to the amount of the Reserve (if any), which will never be above the low estimate printed in the auction catalogue.

 - as principal.
 4.10.3 Lots with this symbol (⋑) indicate that a party has provided Spink with an irrevocable bid on the Lot that will be executed during the sale at a value that ensures that the Lot will sell. The irrevocable bidder, who may bid in excess of the irrevocable bid, will be compensated based on his bid in the event he or she is not the successful bidder or may receive a fixed fee in the event he or she is the successful bidder.

If the irrevocable bidder is the successful bidder, the fixed fee for providing the irrevocable bid may be netted against the irrevocable bidder's obligation to pay the full purchase price for the Lot. If the irrevocable bid is not secured until after the printing of the auction catalogue, a pre-sale announcement will be made indicating that there

is an irrevocable bid on the Lot.

4.11 The Auctioneer's Discretion

4.12 Successful Bid

- 4.12.1 Subject to the auctioneer's discretion, the striking of his hammer marks the acceptance of the highest bid, provided always that such bid is higher than the Reserve (where applicable), and the conclusion of a
- contract for sale between you and the Seller.

 4.12.2 The highest bid at the closing time of the timed auction will be the successful bid and the price will be the hammer price and this will be a conclusion of a contract for sale between you and the Seller. All lots sold in the timed auction are subject to charges per section 5 and all clauses of these terms and conditions.

4.13 After Sale Arrangements

If you enter into any private sale agreements for any Lot with the Seller within 60 days of the auction, we, as exclusive agents of the Seller reserve the right to charge you the applicable Buyer's Premium in accordance with these Terms and Conditions, and the Seller a commission in accordance with the terms of the Seller's agreement.

4.14 Return of Lot and cancellation of sale

- 4.14.1 Once your bid has been accepted for a Lot then you are liable to pay for that Lot in accordance with these Terms and Conditions. If there are any problems with a Lot then you must notify us within 7 days of receipt of the Lot, specifying the nature of the problem. Please note that an auction sale is not an approval sale. Lots examined by you (or your representative) prior to the sale, Lots for which we have provided condition reports and Lots purchased by floor bidders (including bidders or generalized participations). (including bidders executing commission bids on behalf of other parties) may not be returned and a cancellation of the sale and refund sought except in the case of Forgery in accordance with clause 5.13 below. We may then request that the Lot is returned to us for inspection. Save as set out in clause 5.13, the cancellation of the sale of any Lot and the refund of the corresponding purchase price is entirely at our sole discretion. We will not exercise that discretion if the Lot is not received by us in the same condition that it was in at the auction date (for the avoidance of doubt including but not limited to any item which has undergone any cleaning, restorative, conservation work, reperforating, pressing, re-gumming or having been taken out of the third party holder after the item has been sold to you shall not be considered as being returned in the same condition as the auction date)
- 4.14.2 No Lot may be returned on account of condition if the condition 4.2 No Lot may be returned on account of condition if the condition was stated by a third party grading company (including, but not limited to PCGS, NGC, ANACS, ICG, PMG, WBG, Legacy Currency Grading) and which conflicts with our condition report or statement of opinion. As stated above at clause 3.2.2, except in the case of manifest error, our condition report and/or opinion stated at the time of the sale shall take precedence over any condition report or third party obtained by you from a third party.
- 4.14.3 No Lot identified as containing any NFT may be returned or is eligible for any refund once the NFT has been transferred to the Digital Wallet instructed by the Buyer. No warranty stated in clause 5.13.1 is given for such Lot.
- 4.14.4 In the event that a buyer, following a sale, submits any Philatelic Item(s) (including being part of a Lot) for expertising without our knowledge and no extension has been requested or agreed, then in the event that the certificate indicates any material fault in the Philatelic Item(s) not described by us, we shall have sole discretion as to whether or not any refund (whether in part or in full) is made to the buyer. No refunds will be considered in the event that any submissions are made to us later than 6 (six) years from the date of sale.

AFTER THE AUCTION

Buyer's Premium and other charges

In addition to the Hammer Price, you must pay us the Buyer's Premium at a rate of 22.5% of the final Hammer price of each Lot, postage charge and a fee for paying by card. Any Lot identified as containing an NFT is subject to the Buyer's Premium at a rate of 25% of the final Hammer Price, postage charge and in certain situations a fee for paying by card.

Value Added Tax

VAT on Margin scheme Lots (identified by the absence of any VAT symbol next to the Lot number) is payable at 20% on the Buyer's

VAT Refunds - Buyers from outside the UK 5.3

5.3.1 As we remain liable to account for VAT on all Lots unless they have been exported outside the UK within 3 months of the date of sale, you will be asked to deposit all amounts of VAT invoiced. However, if a

- Spink nominated shipper is instructed, then any refundable VAT will not be collected. In all other cases refunds due will be made when valid proof of export is provided. For avoidance of doubt, please note refunds cannot be made to private Buyers, when Lots are bought for private use, if exported by the Buyer.
- 5.3.2 If you are registered as a collectibles business outside the UK and the Lots are invoiced to this business, are not for private use, if you export the Lots outside the UK yourself or appoint your own agent you must obtain shipping documents from the Shipping Department for which a charge of £50 will be made.
- 5.3.3 Where required, we can advise you on how to export Lots as a specific form of export evidence is required. Where we advise you on the export of the Lots, please be aware that the ultimate responsibility
- in respect of obtaining a valid proof of export will lie with you and we will not be responsible for your failure to obtain such proof.

 5.3.4 If you export the Lot, subject to par. 5.3.2., you must return the valid proof of export to us within 3 months of the date of sale. If you fail to return the valid proof of export to us within such period and you have not already accounted to us for the VAT, you will be liable to us for the full amount of the VAT due on such Lot and we shall be entitled to invoice you for this sum.
- 5.3.5 To apply for a refund of any VAT paid, the valid proof of export must be sent to our Shipping Department clearly marked 'VAT Refund' within 3 months of the date of sale. No payment will be made where the total amount of VAT refundable is less than £50 and Spink will charge £50 for each refund processed.
- 5.3.6 Where a Lot is included within the Margin Scheme and Auctioneers' Scheme and valid evidence of export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale, the VAT on Buyer's Premium may be refunded.
- 5.3.7 Where the Lot is marked as a Daggered (†) Lot the VAT charged on the Hammer Price may be refunded where evidence of valid export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale. A refund of VAT charged on the Buyer's Premium can also be made on receipt of proof of registration as a collectibles business.
- 5.3.8 Where the Lot is marked as an Omega (Ω) Lot or an Import VAT
 (x) Lot and valid evidence of export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale, the VAT charged on both the Hammer Price and Buyer's Premium may be refunded.
- 5.3.9 Lot marked as Investment Gold (g) is exempt from VAT on Hammer price. A refund of VAT charged on the Buyer's Premium can be made on receipt of proof of registration as a collectibles business and where valid evidence of export from the UK is produced within 3 months of the date of sale.

Payment

- 5.4.1 You must provide us with your full name and permanent address and, if so requested, details of the bank from which any payments to us will be made. You must pay the full amount due (comprising the Hammer Price, the Buyer's Premium and any applicable VAT) within seven days after the date of the sale even if the Lot in question has been submitted for expertising and/or is awaiting a certificate to be issued. This applies even if you wish to export the Lot and an export licence is (or may be) required.

 5.4.1.1 We shall hold all proceeds of sale until such time as any expertising
- and/or issue of certificates and/or export licence has been finalised.
- 5.4.1.2 In the event that the certificate indicates a material adverse issue with regard to the item in the Lot in question and/or the export licence is refused, we shall make an appropriate refund to the buyer.

 5.4.2 You will not acquire title to the Lot until

 (i) all amounts due have been paid in full. This includes instances
- where special arrangements were made for release of Lot prior to full
- where special arrangements were made (ii) the NFT has been transferred to your Digital Wallet if the Lot you bought is identified as containing NFT, at this point the sale of the Lot becomes unconditional and incapable of any refund for any
- 5.4.3 Payment should be made in sterling by one of the following methods:
 - Direct bank transfer to our account details of which are set out on the invoice. All bank charges shall be met by you. Please ensure that your client number is noted on the transfer.
 - By cheque or bank draft made payable to Spink and Son Ltd and sent to Spink at 69 Southampton Row, Bloomsbury, London WC1B 4ET. Please note that the processing charges for payments made by cheques or bank drafts drawn on a non-U.K bank shall be met by you. Please ensure that the remittance slip printed at the bottom of the invoice is enclosed with your payment.
 - By Visa or Mastercard. All Corporate cards regardless of origin and Consumer debit and credit cards issued outside the UK are subject to a fee of 3%. For all card payments there are limits to the amounts we will accept depending on the type of card being used and whether or not the cardholder is present.

 By cryptocurrency, if we have indicated in the catalogue or by a
- written announcement or notice prior to the sale of a Lot identified as containing any NFT that such cryptocurrency payment may be made by you and will be accepted by us.

 5.4.4 Payments should be made by the registered buyer and not by third
- parties, unless it has been agreed at the time of registration that you are acting as an agent on behalf of a third party.

Invoices may consist of one or more pages and will show: Zero rated Lots (o); no symbol Lots sold under the Margin Scheme and Auctioneers'

Scheme; Lots marked (g) special scheme Investment Gold; Daggered Lots (†), imported Lots marked (x) and (Ω).

Collection of Purchases

- 5.6.1 Unless specifically agreed to the contrary, we shall retain Lots purchased until all amounts due to us, or to the Spink Group, have been paid in full. Buyers will be required to pay for their Lots when they wish to take possession of the same, which must be within 7 days of the date of the sale, unless prior arrangements have been made with Spink. Without prior agreement, Lots will not be released until cleared funds are received with regard to payments made by cheque.
- 5.6.2 Unless we notify you to the contrary, items retained by us will be covered in accordance with our policy which is available for inspection at our offices from the date of sale for a period of seven days or until the time of collection, whichever is sooner. After seven days or from the time of collection, whichever is the earlier, the Lot will be entirely at your risk.
- 5.6.3 Our policy will not cover and we are unable to accept responsibility for damage caused by woodworm, changes in atmospheric conditions or acts of terrorism.

Notification

We are not able to notify successful bidders by telephone. While Invoices are sent out by email or mail after the auction we do not accept responsibility for notifying you of the result of your bid. You are requested to contact us by telephone or in person as soon as possible after the auction to obtain details of the outcome of your bids to avoid incurring charges for late payment.

- Packing and handling 5.8.1 We shall use all reasonable endeavours to take care when handling and packing a purchased Lot but remind you that after seven days or from the time of collection, whichever is sooner, the Lot is entirely at your risk. Our postage charges are set out at the back of the catalogue.
- 5.8.2 It is the responsibility of the Buyer to be aware of any Import Duties that may be incurred upon importation to the final destination. Spink will not accept return of any package in order to avoid these duties. The onus is also on the Buyer to be aware of any Customs import restrictions that prohibit the importation of certain collectibles. Spink will not accept return of the Lot(s) under these circumstances. Spink will not accept responsibility for Lot(s) seized or destroyed by Customs
- 5.8.3 If the Buyer requires delivery of the Lot to an address other than the invoice address this will be carried out at the discretion of Spink.

Recommended packers and shippers
If required our shipping department may arrange shipment as your agent. Although we may suggest carriers if specifically requested, our suggestions are made on the basis of our general experience of such parties in the past and we are not responsible to any person to whom we have made a recommendation for the acts or omissions of the third parties concerned.

- Remedies for non-payment or failure to collect purchases 5.10.1 If you fail to make payment within seven days of your stipulated payment date set out in your invoice, we shall be entitled to exercise one or more of the following rights or remedies:
 - 5.10.1.1 to charge interest at the rate of 2% per month compound interest, calculated on a daily basis, from the date the full amount
 - 5.10.1.2 to set off against any amounts which the Spink Group may owe you in any other transaction the outstanding amount remaining unpaid by you;
 - 5.10.1.3 we may keep hold of all or some of your Lots or other property in the possession of the Spink Group until you have paid all the amounts you owe us or the Spink Group, even if the unpaid amounts do not relate to those Lots or other property. Following fourteen days' notice to you of the amount outstanding and remaining unpaid, the Spink Group shall have the right to arrange the sale of such Lots or other property. We shall apply the proceeds in discharge of the amount outstanding to us or the Spink Group, and pay any balance to you;
 - 5.10.1.4 where several amounts are owed by you to the Spink Group in respect of different transactions, to apply any amount paid to discharge any amount owed in respect of any particular transaction, whether or not you so direct;
 - 5.10.1.5 to reject at any future auction any bids made by you or on your behalf or obtain a deposit from you before accepting any bids.
- 5.10.2 If you fail to make payment within thirty-five days, we shall in addition be entitled:
 - 5.10.2.1 to cancel the sale of the Lot or any other item sold to you at the same or any other auction;
 - 5.10.2.2 to arrange a resale of the Lot, publicly or privately, and, if this results in a lower price being obtained, claim the balance from you together with all reasonable costs including a 20% seller's commission, expenses, damages, legal fees, commissions and premiums of whatever kind associated with both sales or otherwise, ncurred in connection with your failure to make payment;
 - 5.10.2.3 when reselling the Lot, place a notice in our catalogue stating that you successfully purchased the Lot at auction but have subsequently failed to pay the Hammer Price of the Lot; or 5.10.2.4 take any other appropriate action as we deem fit.
- 5.10.3 If you fail to collect within fourteen days after the sale, whether or not payment has been made, you will be required
 - 5.10.3.1 to pay a storage charge of £2 per item per day plus any additional handling cost that may apply.5.10.3.2 you will not be entitled to collect the Lot until all
 - outstanding charges are met, together with payment of all other amounts due to us.

5.11 Use of Default Information

If you fail to make payment for a Lot in accordance with these Terms and Conditions:

- 5.11.1 we reserve the right to refuse you the right to make bids for any future auction irrespective of whether previous defaults have been settled; and
- 5.11.2 you acknowledge that we may (as necessary for our legitimate interests those of other auctioneers and live bidding platforms in referencing customers and avoiding customer defaults) disclose details of such default to other auctioneers and live bidding platforms, which will include your name, address, nature of the default and the date of the default.

Auctioneers or live bidding platforms who receive details of the default may rely on such information when deciding whether to enter into a transaction with you in the future.

5.12 Export Licence

5.12.1 If required we can, at our discretion, advise you on the detailed provisions of the export licensing regulations. Where we advise you in relation to export licensing regulations the ultimate responsibility in respect of any export will lie with you and we will not be responsible for your failure to apply for any necessary licences.

5.12.2 If the Lot is going to be hand carried by you, you may be required

to produce a valid export licence to us or sign a waiver document stating that a licence will be applied for.
5.12.3 You should always check whether an export licence is required

before exporting. Export licences are usually obtained within two or three weeks but delays can occur.

5.12.4 Unless otherwise agreed by us in writing, the fact that you wish to apply for an export licence does not affect your obligation to make payment within seven days nor our right to charge interest on late

payment.

5.12.5 If you request that we apply for an export licence on your behalf, we shall be entitled to recover from you our disbursements and out of pocket expenses in relation to such application, together with any

5.12.6 We will not be obliged to rescind a sale nor to refund any interest or other expenses incurred by you where payment is made by you despite the fact that an export licence is required.

5.13 Refund in the case of Forgery

- 5.13.1 Unless otherwise described by us, and subject to the rest of this clause 5.13, we guarantee the authenticity of a Lot (other than a miscellancous Lot, or Lot containing an NFT or item not described in the catalogue) offered for sale by us for: (1) a period of 10 (ten) years from the date of sale for coins and banknotes; and (2) a period of 6 (six) years for all other items. 5.13.2 If, after the sale of a Lot, you reasonably believe an item in a Lot
- (other than a miscellaneous item not described in the catalogue) is not

(other than a miscellaneous item not described in the catalogue) is not authentic and is a Forgery, you must:
5.13.2.1 notify us within 7 days of becoming aware the item is a Forgery providing a written explanation and evidence obtained by you that the item is a Forgery. ("Forgery Notice");
5.13.2.2 unless otherwise agreed by us in writing, return the item to us within 14 days from the Forgery Notice, in the same condition as at the action date (for the avoidance of doubt including but not limited.) the auction date (for the avoidance of doubt including but not limited to any item which has undergone any cleaning, restorative, conservation work, reperforating, pressing, re-gumming or having been taken out of the third party holder after the item has been sold to you shall not be considered as being returned in the same condition as the auction date)

5.13.2.3 promptly provide to us such evidence as we may request that you are able to transfer good title to us or the Seller as we direct, free from

any third party claims.

- 5.13.3 Following receipt of the information set out above and the item, we will review and notify you if we agree with your belief the item is not authentic and is a Forgery. You shall cooperate with us at all times and provide such further information and assistance as we may reasonably require for us to carry out our review. Failure to adhere to the above conditions shall mean we shall not be under any obligation to continue the process of review or refund any money paid by you (if
- applicable). 5.13.4 Following our review, if we agree the item is not authentic and is a Forgery we shall notify you in writing. The sale of the Lot to which the item relates shall be rescinded and the amount paid by you refunded to you. For the avoidance of doubt we will only be required to pay you the amount actually paid by you for the Lot concerned and you shall have no claim for interest. Except as otherwise stated in this clause, we shall not be liable to you for any costs, expenses or damages (whether direct, indirect, special or consequential) incurred or suffered by you in respect of any Lot, which breaches our guarantee and is a Fórgery.

5.13.5 Please note an item shall not be considered a Forgery by us where any of the following circumstances apply:5.13.5.1 the catalogue description or saleroom notice of the item at the
