He was born in Pall Mall, London on 15 March 1791 to Benjamin Vulliamy (1747-1811), a third-generation clock maker who received a royal appointment as the King's Clockmaker in 1773. Benjamin is best remembered for building the Regulator Clock, which between 1780 and 1884, was the main timekeeper of the King's Observatory at Kew. The Vulliamy family moved to London from Switzerland in the 1730s. For over a hundred years the family's clockmaking business was based at 68 Pall Mall. Upon the death of Benjamin in 1811, the business was inherited by Lewis's brother Benjamin Lewis. At this time the company was known for its highly decorative clocks, objects d'art and furnishings made from metal, alongside watches and regulators. An engineering and architectural flare was also present in the work of Benjamin Lewis. He was an Associate member of the Institution of Civil Engineers and produced several turret clocks for modern buildings. He was even commissioned by the architect Sir Charles Barry to produce a design for the 'Big Ben' clock; however, it was rejected in favour of the work of Edward John Dent. Under his headship the business continued to produce pieces for the highest echelons of society including the Royal family up until the reign of Victoria. This interest in engineering and architecture was greater shared by Lewis, who in 1809 was admitted to the Royal Academy Schools to study architectural drawing. In 1810 he was awarded this silver medal for 'THE BEST DRAWING IN ARCHITECTURE', this was followed by a gold medal in 1813. He was elected Royal Academy travelling student in 1818, after which he studied abroad for four years, mostly in Italy but also Greece and Asia Minor. From 1822 he exhibited at the Academy. Records reveal that while studying in Malta in 1820, he wrote to Henry Howard, Secretary of the Royal Academy of Arts, seeking to explain why he was delayed in submitting his work. He also asked for an extension, exclaiming that he would not draw from his allowance until he had heard back from the Academy. He was articled to architect Sir Robert Smirke, best known as a leader within the Greek Revival movement. Smirke designed work for many public buildings, including the main block and façade of the British Museum as well as modifications which were made to the Royal Mint. On Vulliamy's return to England, he established a practice on Oxford Street. His most notable works include those he completed for his major patron, Robert Stayner Holford, on Westonbirt House, Gloucestershire and the London residence Dorchester House, Park Lane. The latter was demolished in 1929 to make way for the Dorchester Hotel. Other works include the Law society, Chancery Lane, 1831 and Connaught Hall, Tavistock square, 1825-1826. Following the Church Building Acts of 1818 and 1824, he became involved with the Church Commissioners. He ended up designing at least 14 churches for the Commissioners, including St Michael's in Highgate, Holy Trinty in Burnley and alternations to Rochester Cathedral, amongst many others. Following struggles with bronchitis, Vulliamy died at his home on Clapham Common in 1871, his estate was valued at £60,000 (equivalent to £7,060,000 in 2023). Of his five children, two followed in his architectural footsteps, however it is his nephew George John Vulliamy who is best remembered within the architectural field. He worked under both his uncle and Sir Charles Barry, later going on to elected superintending architect to the Metropolitan Board of Works. He designed the pedestal and sphinxes for Cleopatra's Needle on the embankment as well as the iconic Dolphin lamp standards and camel benches of the London embankment. Generally prize medals were excluded, as he felt that if he did not do so the book would never be complete or be published. However his overriding consideration was that medals of national importance would be included. As Royal Prize Medals were thought to be of national importance they were there confusingly in both categories. The result was that Royal Prize Medals issued during the reigns of George IV (1820-1830) to George VI (1936-1952) were included in BHM...."He continues: "There are also other Royal Price Medals not listed in BHM and not present in the following set: those medals produced with the effigy of Edward VIII, of which twenty-six were produced late in 1937. Equivalent issues to nos. 1-7, 10-12, 14-16, 18 and 20-21 were produced bearing the effigy of Edward VIII; no Edward VIII medals were produced for the Royal Geographical Society (Founder's Medal); the Royal Institute of British Architects, the Police Essay Competition or the Poetry Medal. A Royal Household Long and Faithful Service medal of Edward VIII was produced but never awarded; there is an example in the Royal Mint Museum.Laurence Brown was an assiduous researcher and I am sure that the omission of these medals from BHM was deliberate, presumably because he believed that they should be considered as Patterns for medals that were not issued, and thus lay outside the scope of his book. However since the publication of BHM two examples of Royal Prize Medals with the effigy of Edward VIII have appeared at auction inscribed with recipients' names, so it would appear that at least two were in fact awarded. The abdication of King Edward VIII on the 11 December 1936 brought to an end a tumultuous 325-day reign. The termination of his reign brought with it the logistical headache of scrapping his approved effigy for a replacement in the likeness of King George VI. Deputy-Master of the Royal Mint (1922-1938), Sir Robert Arthur Johnson conceded: "The work of the two artists was all but completed when the events of last December rendered it nugatory. Over 200 dies of coins, medals and seals were thus rendered useless and the Mint was faced with the task of securing portraits of his present Majesty with but limited time available." He added in the same December 1937 interview shortly before his death: "I am betraying no profound secret in stating that the coinage effigy of the former King was, at his personal wish, prepared facing to the left. But as there has been no coinage bearing the bust of the former King, the old tradition has maintained by showing the effigy of the present monarch facing in the same direction as the last monarch but one. The new King's effigy faces left, as did those of King George V and Queen Victoria, a fact which is surely one of the most happy augury. "He concluded: "During 1936, in the early stages when the coinage for King Edward was in question, I was made aware that some desire existed for a complete departure from the heraldic tradition which has been associated for several centuries with our principal coins."Based on surviving Royal Mint Archives, Official Gazette entries, contemporary newspaper reports and eyewitness accounts, the following timeline can be reconstructed for the numismatic and philatelic record of the short-lived King's reign. 20 January 1936 - At five minutes to midnight, King George V dies at Sandringham and his eldest son David, Prince of Wales becomes King Edward VIII.Thursday, 6 February 1936 - An official at the General Post Office informs the Daily Telegraph, that: "New postage stamps and postal orders bearing the portrait of King Edward VIII are not likely to be issued until the end of the year. He was simultaneously Elector of Saxony as Frederick Augustus I from 1694 until his death in 1733. The second son of Elector John George III of Saxony, Augustus succeeded as elector in 1694 after the death of his elder brother from smallpox. After the death of John III Sobieski of Poland, Augustus became one of eighteen candidates to the throne of the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth. The death of Sobieski marked the end of a twenty-two-year reign and a period marked within the Commonwealth as one of great stability. He was a popular ruler, remembered as a great military commander and noted for his victory at the Battle of Vienna in 1683 over the neighbouring Ottoman Empire. To secure the Polish throne Augustus converted from Lutheranism to Catholicism in 1697, which was necessary to rule the predominantly Catholic Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth. He won a contested election, defeating other candidates including the French-backed Prince of Conti. In 1573 the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth adopted an elective monarchy system, meaning when the monarch died the throne was not automatically passed to their legitimate heir. Instead, the entire nobility, known as 'szlachta', assembled to vote for their next ruler and therefore elected the king to act as a servant to the nation. The szlachta, became the dominant social class within the commonwealth which was able to exercise political rights and social power. However, this echelon of society differed from the nobility of other western-European countries. As well as the power to select their monarch and control legislature they were also understood to be equals before the king rather than subservient to him. One factor which influenced this was the fact their land was in full ownership rather than feudal tenure. This political culture of egality came to be embedded as a constitutional principle known as Golden Liberty. This system ensured that monarchs could not build up hereditary dynastic power, each monarch had to negotiate and promise to respect noble privileges, and foreign powers could be waged against each other (candidates often came from different European dynasties). One of the problems this caused was that there was often little incentive to invest in long-term reforms, knowing their sons would not automatically inherit. This was a frustration of Augustus II, as he could not quarantee his son's succession and had limited ability to strengthen the monarchy or implement lasting changes. His attempts to strengthen royal authority and reform the commonwealth met fierce resistance. The Saxon-Polish personal union also drained Polish resources, as Augustus often prioritised Saxon interests. His son Augustus III did eventually win election in 1733, but only after the War of the Polish Succession. The defining conflict of Augustus' reign was the Great Northern War against Sweden's Charles XII. It was a major conflict that reshaped the balance of power in Northern and Eastern Europe. At the war's outset, Sweden under King Charles XII was the dominant military power in the Baltic region but faced a coalition of enemies including Russia under Peter the Great, Denmark-Norway under Frederick IV, and Saxony Poland-Lithuania led by Augustus II. This triple alliance hoped to take advantage of the young and inexperienced 18-year-old King of Sweden. The war did ultimately end with Sweden's defeat and marked the rise of Russia as the new dominant power in the Baltic sea region. Augustus played a significant but troubled role in the conflict. He was one of the key instigators of the war, forming an alliance with Denmark and Russia in 1699 to challenge Swedish supremacy. However, Charles XII defeated him repeatedly and by 1706 Augustus was forced to renounce the Polish throne and break his alliance with Russia after Sweden invaded Saxony. He only returned to power after Charles XII suffered a catastrophic defeat at the Battle of Poltava in 1709, although he remained a relatively minor player for the remainder of the war. The Battle of Poltava was a resounding Russian victory over Sweden and in turn made Russia the leading political voice within the conflict. In October 1709 the Treaty of Thorn was signed between Augustus and Peter the Great, which in effect revived their earlier alliance of 1699 and worked to unite them against their common rival, Sweden. The treaty marked a key moment in the shifting balance of power in Eastern-European. Although it resulted in Augustus being reinstated to the throne there were several clauses that greatly favoured Russia and fostered the nation's powerful rise. Augustus was beholden to tackle enemies of Russia within Poland; in addition, Russia was able to hold onto previously lost territories and the highest offices in the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth were occupied by nobles supportive of the Tsar. This medal was struck in 1709 to commemorative Augustus' return to the Polish throne. An act of propagandistic power for a figure now of somewhat diminished influence. Further, the commissioning of such a medal is evidence of Augustus' well-regarded patronage of the arts and architecture. Dresden was the capital of his creative endeavours as he sought to transform it into a "Florence on the Elbe". He commissioned the construction of Zwinger Palace, regarded for its renowned baroque style designed by Matthäus Daniel Pöppelmann. He also commissioned Dresden's cathedral and the reconstruction of the Japanese Palace to house his vast porcelain collection. Augustus was fanatically devoted to porcelain, which Europeans called "white gold", and for many years he had been a great collector of Asian ceramics. He was later introduced to Johann Friedrich Böttger, a young alchemist, who claimed to be able to produce porcelain. After further experimentation and the royal patronage and investment of Augustus II the Meissen Porcelain factory was established in 1710. The factory was the first to successful produce European porcelain, ending dependence on Chinese imports, and to this day is a highly regarded name within the craft. Most appropriately Dresden too is the birthplace of this medal, where it was brought into creative fruition by the court medallist Heinrich Paul Groskurt. Meissen, in a similar vain to this medallic issue, was used by Augustus to promote his image. One of the earliest models to be made by the factory was a figure of their patron, which shows him in a powerful stance wearing armour and a victorious laurel wreath. She later married Isaac Swift and moved to Melbourne. Isaac had a son named John Swift, who was the father of Bertram Swift, the father of Leslie John Swift, who in turn is the father of Beverley (née Swift).[Acknowledgements to Beverley Kardachi for providing additional information about her great-great-great-grandmother, Ellen McHenry By 1836, Michael Hogan was granted permission to marry fellow convict Mary Collier, a former nurse in Bathurst, New South Wales. Collier, convicted of "man robbery" in 1831 for the theft of 3 gold sovereigns, was sentenced to seven years (age 17) aboard the Pyramus with 148 others, departing on 8 October 1831 and arriving in NSW on 5 March 1832. She is described in records as a literate Protestant of fair complexion, standing 4' 9-1/4 tall. Previously, in 1835, she was granted an application of marriage to another convict, William West, but that did not go ahead for reasons unknown. Hogan and Collier became publicans in Sydney, establishing the Talbot Inn in 1848, which became the Crossroads Hotel, standing to this day as one of Sydney's oldest pubs. In April 2022, Crossroads became Australia's most expensively traded pub, selling for \$160 million AUD. Their daughter, Mary Anne Hogan, became a notorious figure in San Francisco's criminal underworld with the onset of the California Gold Rush. While she denied receiving any gifts or stolen goods from him, she admitted to handling 21 ounces of gold and \$300 on his behalf, which was later returned. At a meeting of the Volksraad on 21 September 1874, President Burgers presented to the Chairman of the Assembly 50 of his gold coins (the first strike - fine beard variety) to the members of the Council. He was expecting strong recognition and admiration for producing the Republic's first indigenous coinage. Instead there was massive indignation. The members of the Volksraad were appalled and indignant that the President had seen fit to use the Republic's money to produce a coin with his very own face on it. They remonstrated with him saying that it was a most egotistical and self-centred thing to do. The September meeting was one that Burgers would remember for a very long time. This quickly degenerated into massive debate, argumentation and erupted into general pandemonium. "He has produced these coins out of mere vanity and for his ego" exclaimed many of the members. "No, he has introduced our very own coinage" replied others. To make matters worse the die broke - and a smaller second batch, the rarer coarse beard variety (seen below), numbering just 142 pieces was minted - Pratt keeping four of these coins for himself before they were shipped in October 1874. The President's beard appears much thicker and coarser in this second batch. Esterhuysen's has identified at least ten dies that were used to mint the two sets of coins. Contemporary newspaper accounts challenge this accepted narrative, as the Shipping and Mercantile Gazette (7 November 1874), stated: Oct. 10, The Cape papers received by the Walmer Castle report the opening on the 21st September of the Volksraad...At a later stage of the proceedings, "President Burgers handed to the Chairman of the Assembly 50 pieces of gold as a sample of money which he, with the consent of his executive, had coined in London from Transvaal gold. He said it was the first coined money ever struck for South Africa, and that it was one of the steps for forming a nation and added his effigy appeared on the coin against his wish. "The Cape Argus, would be rather more favourable about the enterprise, writing in November 1874: "TRANSVAAL SOVEREIGNS - "We have had the pleasure of seeing some of the new 'staatsponden' or Transvaal Sovereigns, several of which have been received in town. They were coined in England, but the gold is the product of the Transvaal. In weight, size and value they are exactly similar to the English sovereign, and a certificate to this effect from the British Mint is expected by the next steamer. On one side is the well-executed profile of President Burgers, and on the reverse the arms of the Republic, with the inscription 'Eendragt maakt maght'.
