Naval General Service 1793-1840, 1 copy clasp, Sylph 28 Sepr 1801 (Admiral Sir Charles Dashwood KCB, GCTS), neatly reengraved naming in a style to match the official impressed style, good very fineCaptain K. J. Douglas-Morris lists Dashwood as receiving a three clasp Naval General Service Medal, with clasps for 1 June 1794, 12 Octr 1798 (Verified aboard, not on roll), and Sylph 28 Sepr 1801. Colin Message lists Dashwood as receiving a single clasp Naval General Service, with the clasp 1 June 1794. The only other recipient of the Sylph 28 Sepr 1801 clasp is Lieutenant Samuel Burgess, who received a five-clasp medal (also with clasps for 1 June 1794, Trafalgar, Boat Service 27 July 1809, and Algiers), and whose medal formed part of the Hamilton-Smith Collection.Sir Charles Dashwood was born on 1 September 1765 and entered the Royal Navy as a Midshipman in January 1779. Serving in H.M.S. Impregnable at the Glorious First of June, he 'so distinguishing himself on that occasion that he was promoted to a Lieutenancy in the same ship on the 20th of that month.' He was promoted to the command of H.M.S. Sylph, 18 guns, on 2 August 1799, and on the night of 28 September 1801: 'particularly distinguished himself by his gallantry in beating off the French frigate L'Artémise, of 44 guns and 351 men, after a vigourous action of two hours and five minutes off the north coast of Spain: the Sylph, though her loss in men was trifling, suffered considerably in hull, masts, ands rigging.'Promoted to Post-rank on 2 November 1801, Dashwood was presented with the honour of a Knight Grand Cross of the Order of the Tower and the Sword on 28 March 1825, and was nominated a Knight Commander of the Order of the Bath on 4 July 1840. He was promoted Vice-Admiral of the White on 23 November 1841, and died in service on 21 September 1847, being posthumously promoted to the rank of Admiral the following day. (x) Naval General Service 1793-1840, 1 copy clasp, Nassau 22nd March 1808 (James Hazlewood.), claw sometime reaffixed and re-suspended with a contemporary tailor's copy clasp, otherwise with light edge wear and bruising, very fine James Hazlewood is entitled to a clasp for Syria, serving as an Ordinary Seaman aboard H.M.S. Castor.Castor was a 36-gun fifth rate frigate launched in May 1832. She participated in the Syrian Campaign against the Pasha of Egypt Muhammad Ali as part of the Mediterranean Fleet under Admiral Robert Stopford. Castor was involved in the Bombardment of Acre during the conflict on 3 November 1840, which successfully ended with the capture of the city and the forced surrender of Muhammad Ali, bringing the conflict to a close. However, Castor faced unusually several losses in what was nearly a bloodless engagement for the British, with the ship sustaining four of the eighteen overall British casualties. James Hazlewood potentially went on to participate in the Crimean War, as his name appears on the roll for the Baltic Medal serving as a Private aboard H.M.S. They succeeded in bringing the guns through and after a successful action at Corunna the British escaped annihilation, their victory marred only by the death of their commander Sir John Moore. The 6th Foot (later the Royal Warwickshire Regiment) saw heavy action in Spain, first at Vittoria and later during the action at Roncesvalles. A month later the regiment fought a creditable action assaulting the Heights of Echalar which drew direct comment from Wellington himself: 'The most gallant and the finest thing, it is impossible that I can extol too highly the conduct of these brave troops. Thomas Gore Browne was appointed 2nd Lieutenant in the Royal Foot Artillery on 23 February 1801; 1st Lieutenant, 19 November 1802; 2nd Captain, 1 February 1808; Captain, 4 September 1823; Lieutenant-Colonel, 1 July 1836; Colonel, 9 November 1846.He served in the Walcheren expedition and was present at the siege of Flushing. At the battle of Waterloo he served in Major George W. Unett's Brigade, which was at Hal with Sir Charles Colville's Division, and afterwards at the siege of Cambrai and with the Army of Occupation until November 1818. He served at Jamaica 1829-31, and commanded the Royal Artillery at Gibraltar 1839-44. Colonel Gore Browne died at Southampton on 23 January 1854, aged 69, and is buried in the Old Common Cemetery, Southampton. There is also a memorial to him at the Sandpits Cemetery, Gibraltar. Sutlej 1845-46, for Moodkee 1845, 1 clasp, Ferozeshuhur (Michael Rabbitt 9th Reg.), suspension sometime neatly repinned, heavy wear to naming, contact marks, fineDuring the battle of Moodkee, on 18 December 1845, the first battle of the campaign, the 9th Foot suffered 52 Officers and men killed and wounded. With the battle raging, during the early evening of the 21 December, the Brigade of which the 9th Foot formed a part, commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Taylor of the 9th led an attack against the Sikh guns. With light failing and advancing into the thick smoke and dust of battle, Taylor's Brigade saw nothing ahead of them until they were at the very muzzles of the Sikh guns. In the Chaos that reigned when the guns opened up on them, the 9th suffered a very large percentage of the casualties they would during the battle. During this bloodbath of a battle, fought over two days, the battle was very nearly lost by the British, the 9th Foot suffering no less than 273 Officers and men killed and wounded. It should be noted that the Regiment saw action during the First Afghan War, they are entitiled to a Cabul 1942 medal although it is not known if Rabbitt was present. During the invasion of Waikato, her company provided reinforcements for the Naval Brigade at Auckland, New Zealand on 2 October 1863. The first with about 550 all ranks, landed on 19 November 1846 at Russell; the second, on 1 August 1846, at Wellington; the third, mainly wives and children, on 14 January 1847, at Auckland, and the last, with 84 men, 14 women and 13 children, landed at Wellington 18 December 1852. Fitzgerald served with the Service Company in Afghanistan (Medal) and then in Egypt & Sudan (Medal & clasp, Bronze Star). Baltic 1854-55 (Lieut. W. H. Annesley H.M.S. Harrier), contemporarily engraved naming, suspension slack, contact marks, very fineWilliam Henry Annesley was born in Ireland on 4 October 1830, the son of Francis and Mary Annesley and grandson of the Second Earl of Annesley, he was also a direct descendant of Edward III. Attending the Royal Naval School Annesley joined the crew of Harrier in the Baltic with the rank of Lieutenant. His service papers note:'17 July 1855, gazetted with strong praise for his exertions at the destruction of shipping at Nystad'. This being that attack on the Russian ships at Nystad by the boats of Harrier and Cuckoo. Annesley remained in service, being promoted Commander in 1863. Highlanders), regimentally impressed naming, light contact marks, very fineCharles Muirhead was a native of Leith and enlisted with the 42nd Highlanders on 6 January 1855His career is perhaps best summarised by his obituary in The Scotsman: 'Crimea Veteran's Funeral at Leith. - The funeral took place vesterday from his residence at 2Crown Place, Leith of Charles Muirhead, late of the 42nd Highlanders, who died in Leith Hospital on Saturday. He held the Turkish medal, the Indian Mutiny medal (with clasp for Lucknow), and the Crimean medal (with clasp from Sebastopol.) Muirhead, who joined the 42nd when he was nineteen, in 1855, was about sixty-seven years of age, and it was his boast that during the whole of his service - ten years in the regulars and twenty-two years in the reserves- he was never before an officer for bad conduct. He was one of the first draft to proceed to the Crimea. He is survived by a widow, a son and two daughters. Muirhead was a native of the burgh. 'Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. Jas Crone. 42nd Ft.), depot impressed naming, contact marks, edge bruise, nearly very fineJames Crone, born in 1838 at Glasgow, was a tailor prior to enlisting in the 42nd Royal Highlanders on 7 August 1848. He embarked for Varna on 20 May 1854 returning to England on 17 September 1855. He was wounded in the trenches before Sebastopol by a grape shot on 18 June 1855 and had difficulty walking, which led to his eventual medical discharge on 28 September 1855; sold together with copied service papers. Crofton, 20th Regiment, who was awarded the Turkish Order of the Mejidie and Legion of Honour, who was severely wounded at the Battle of Inkermann and later murdered by a soldier in DevonTurkish Crimea, Sardinian Issue, unnamed as issued, sold together with an envelope of attribution, good very fineHugh Denis Crofton was born at Dublin on 7 January 1814, the son of Emily and Sir Morgan George Crofton, 3rd Baron Crofton. He was serving as Colonel of the 20th Regiment of Foot during the Crimean war, seeing action at Alma and Inkermann, being seriously wounded at the latter engagement.Crofton was killed on 15 September 1861 at Fulwood Barracks Preston, Devon where he was shot by a soldier of the 32nd Regiment. The murderer, Private McCaffery was subsequently shot for the crime, his case was immortalized in the song The Ballad of Private McCaffery. 'We have all heard the romantic story of the soldier whose life was saved at Waterloo by a packet of his lady-love's letters, which, carried next to his heart, deflected the otherwise fatal bullet from a French rifle. Some confirmation of the story is afforded by the case of Lieutenant Athol Lindsay Forbes, who was wounded recently during an engagement with the natives in Burmah. A bullet shattered his arm, and, glancing off, would have penetrated his heart but for the presence beneath his tunic a packet of letters from home. It had long been his custom to deposit his letters there, and when his tunic was removed by the surgeons, there, embedded in the mass of papers, was the flattened bullet, whose deadly course had thus providentially been stayed. So states a report in the Preston Herald on 8 July 1891, in fact referring to Lieutenant Lindsay Anstruther - not Athol Lindsay -Forbes. The India General Service Medal awarded to Major L. A. Forbes, Indian Army, who was severely wounded as a subaltern in the 39th Garhwalis in the Chin Hills of Upper Burma in March 1891Afterwards seconded for political employment, he was appointed H.M. Consul at Basra, whilst back home he replaced Ernest Shackleton as Secretary of the Scottish Geographical Society in 1905, the latter having resigned his post to contest Dundee at the pending general electionIndia General Service 1854-95, 1 clasp, Burma 1889-92 (Lieut. L. A. Forbes, 39th Bl. Infy.), good very fineLindsay Anstruther Forbes was born in Dalhonsie in the Punjab on 21 October 1865, the son of Major Frederick Murray Hay Forbes, an Indian Army officer and the scion of a well-known Aberdeenshire family. Young Lindsay was originally commissioned in the Highland Light Infantry in November 1886 but transferred to the Indian Staff Corps in May 1888. Subsequently appointed a Wing Officer in the newly raised 39th Garhwalis - who had been formed from the old 2nd Battalion of the 3rd Goorkas - he quickly witnessed active service in the ongoing Burma operations.In late March 1891, as part of an expedition bound for Tao and Tlantlang, Forbes was given command of 100 soldiers of the 39th Garhwalis, a force supported by two guns. The object of the expedition was to meet the Tlantlang chiefs to discuss recent incursions into Lushai, in addition to meeting messengers with letters from the Superintendent of the Southern Lushai Hills. The column reached Tao without opposition, although on the road it had ran into several armed Chins. However, they stated that they were merely on their way to attend a conference at Tlantlang. But the column's political officer later obtained intelligence of a different nature, namely that said Chins had intended to attack the column but backed off owing to lack of volunteers. Evidence of that ill-intent quickly unfolded near Haka on the morning of 2 April, when the advance guard of homeward bound column came under a heavy fire from Chins on both sides of the road. Forbes dashed to the assistance of the advance guard, as one of the column's guns also got into action, but he was severely wounded in the process. His wound, as cited above, amounted to a shattered arm, but would have been fatal but for the saving grace of his pocket full of letters. A full narrative account of the action is included, but by way of summary, the Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs - Sir J. Fergusson, M.P. - made the following response to a question raised in the House of Commons by Forbes family's Aberdeenshire M.P.: The following telegram has been received from the Viceroy: reported from Chin country that a detachment - under Lieutenant Mocatta - detailed from Haka, was attacked April 4, while retuning towards Haka, by a large gathering of Chins of the Klanglang tribe. Lieutenant Forbes was wounded severely in the arm, five men killed and 12 wounded. This disturbance is believed to be local and unconnected with events on the Manipur side. Steps will be taken to punish the offending tribes. Forbes - who lost the use of his injured arm for the rest of his life - nonetheless remained on duty and obtained a secondment to political department. Fluent in Persian and Hindustani, he was appointed Her Majesty's Consul in Basra in August 1897 and later served as a Political Officer back in India, in charge of famine relief in the Malwa district. In a letter to one of his brothers, he wrote 'doing a splendid work amongst the Bhil children, keeping hundreds of them alive. Having then transferred to the supernumerary list as a Major in November 1904, Forbes applied for the post of secretary to the Scottish Geographical Society, in place of Ernest Shackleton, who had resigned to contest a Dundee seat in the general election of 1905. The scale of Forbes suitability and popularity may be gleaned from the fact there were over 300 applications for the post. He died in April 1953. Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. McCandlish 2d. Bn. Seaforth Highrs.), very fineThomas McCandlish was killed in action on 11 December 1899 at Magersfontein. The diary of Private John Winning, 2nd Seaforth Highlanders held in the Highlanders Museum records the events of 11 December 1899, stating: When we laid down that night it was impossible to sleep, for the cold, so we welcomed 12 o' clock. When we got orders to stand to arms we were told to light our pipes, as no lights had to be shown after we moved off; we were also told to look at our rifles and see that they were in working order, while doing this someone let off a round. This was rather unlucky as it must have let them know that we were coming. It turned so dark that a rope had to be passed from the front to the rear regiment so that we would not loose [sic] one another. We must have been very close to the hill when the Kimberly search light played on us, showing us up to the enemy in grand style. At about 4am daylight was just breaking. The regiments got the order to extend when a red light flashed on the hill, and the next minute a fearful storm of bullets were poured into us. We got the order to fire bayonets and lie down, but some of the front companies charged with a wild cheer but didn't get far before many of them were moved down. At this stage, we received many conflicting orders, some being to charge others being to retire, till we did not know what to do. About this time General Wauchope was killed, although we did not know till we had to retire, which we had to do eventually but not for long as we advanced again in long extended lines, 5 paces between each man, to within 80 yards of the position where we laid down as it was impossible to get any closer owing to the heavy fire that was directed on us. Here we lay all day ... but it was useless, as the courage of the troops had been fiercely broken at being led into such a death-trap at the commencement. At 5pm we got orders to retire, which we did for about 2 minutes, strong picquets were put out and we were told we were staying here for the night. We were issued with a dram of rum and a couple of biscuits. 'McCandlish is commemorated on the Dingwall Seaforth Highlanders Boer War Memorial; sold together with copied research. Commissioned 2nd Lieutenant on 29 June 1878 with the Royal Horse Guards he was advanced Lieutenant on 4 September 1880. Joining the Regiment in Ireland he was appointed Adjutant, listed in that role as early as 1884. Byng was advanced Captain on 18 January 1885 and remained in service, being finally promoted Major on 18 January 1891. He retire on 6 February 1895, it is not clear what the circumstances were which took him to South Africa on the outbreak of the Anglo-Boer War however he was appointed Major with Thorneycroft's Mounted Infantry, joining them in the fighting on the Tugela Heights. They saw heavy fighting at Colenso and were one of the central units involved in the Battle of Spion Kop. After the British finally managed to cross the Tugela River and relieved Ladysmith Thorneycroft commanded a column hunting Boer Guerillas. It seems likely that Byng was involved in similar work although it is perhaps notable that he did not serve in the Orange Free State and the medal roll makes clear that his Cape Colony bar was claimed after the others. Returning to Britian he married Lady Eleanor Mary Howard, the sister of the Earl of Suffolk and Berkshire. His best man was his elder brother Colonel Charles Byng, formerly commanding officer of the 1st Life Guards. Byng retired to Avening House, Avening, Stroud with his wife and joined the Reserve of Officers, however he was not to see service again, dying on 27 May 1915; sold together with copied research.Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. They were stationed at Rustenburg, North West Provence in 1901 under the command of General Cunningham in 1901 when General French ordered them to march on Vlakfontein, part of a sweep to capture Koos de la Rev. They encountered some resistance but by the night of 23 January they had made good progress and set up camp near the farm of Middlefontein. The first they knew of a Boer attack was when the advanced pickets came under attack, the British responding with artillery and an increased infantry presence. The 2nd Worcestershire Regiment attacked a Boer held hill and managed to drive the enemy from it, strengthening the British position. In the night de la Rey arrived and by the morning the British position was in much more dire straights. Fortunately for the Cunningham's command they still had heliograph contact with the rest of their forces and a column was directed to relieve them. This would not arrive until the next day however which left them under the sights of the Boer's for the entire day, under constant attack. The men of the Border Regiment took the brunt of the casualties however later in the day they managed to secure an unoccupied Kraal, turning it into a defensive position. During the action Cain was wounded in the thigh, becoming one of 23 men of the Regiment wounded in action at Middlefontein. The Boers became aware of the approaching relief column during the night and began to withdraw, though they kept up a desultory fire throughout the day. They withdrew completely at midday, Cain survived his wounds and continued to serve, being posted to India on 22 September 1902. He returned to South Africa on 31 December 1904, but left again on 8 February 1906 and returned to Briain, joining the Army Reserve on 8 May. Educated at Cheltenham College he was accepted as a Gentleman Cadet at the Royal Military College, Sandhurst. Commissioned into the Indian Army (unattached list) as a 2nd Lieutenant on 8 January 1901, he joined the Royal Scots Fusiliers in India on 9 March1901. Advanced to Lieutenant on 12 December 1904, he transferred to the Indian Army joining the 2nd Rajput Light Infantry on 30 September 1905. The Regiment was stationed in Bombay, India when the Great War started. They were initially sent to Egypt to defend the Suez Canal. They took part in the defence of the Canal when Turkish forces attacked on 3-4 February 1915. They next deployed to Mesopotamia in December 1915 with Landale being advanced to Major. On 8 January 1916. Landale was tragically killed in action at the Battle of Dujaila Redoubt on 8 March 1916 in a failed attempt to break through to the besieged British garrison at Kut. The Regiment suffered grievous losses that day with ten of its eleven British officers and fifty percent of the Regiment becoming casualties. His Brigade Commander wrote at the time 'Major Landale has been in command of the Regiment since they arrived in Mesopotamia and that the magnificent way in which the Regiment went in to attack and fought was largely due to his leadership and fine example. He was wounded in the thigh but took no notice and went on until mortally wounded."Today in World War One' describes the muddled battle, stating: Aylmer planned a ten-mile night march towards the main Turkish obstacle on his line of approach-the redoubt at the Dujaila depression. He hoped his troops, arriving and attacking at dawn, would have total surprise and could quickly overwhelm the Turkish defenders. However, the night march did not proceed as quickly as planned; they did not start until 10:20 PM on March 7, and there were further delays in separating support from infantry columns.By dawn around 5:40 AM, the British Indian forces were still over two miles from the Turkish lines at Dujaila. Aylmer believed the element of surprise had been lost, and did not want to risk a two-mile attack over open ground. This was despite reports from scouts indicating that the Turkish trenches were essentially empty. Many of the Turkish defenders around Kut had been transferred north to fight the Russians in Persia or the Caucasus after the loss of Erzurum, leaving the lines at Dujaila essentially denuded. Aylmer instead brought up his guns and began an artillery barrage at 7AM, which proceeded for the next three hours. This was the first the Turkish commander in the area, Ali Ihsan Bey, had heard of the British advance, and he quickly told his artillery and machine guns to rush to the area and "answer the enemy artillery and to fire on any enemy troops as they marched." He recalled that "The enemy did not send their infantry forward while their artillery was firing on us. We benefited from this mistake and all of our troops managed to arrive" in time. When the infantry attacked at 10am, they now took heavy casualties from the newly arrived Turkish forces. One Turkish veteran, Abidin Ege, recalled, "The distance between us and the enemy was only 800 meters. Both sides started firing and the battle began. The enemy made every effort to reach us, but their forces were melting under the heat of our fire." A renewed attack in the afternoon briefly reached the redoubt itself but was repulsed; the British suffered nearly 3500 casualties out of his 18,000-man force. On the other side, Abidin Ege wrote that "we had an absolute victory against the enemy, yet we lost half of our battalion." The British withdrew that night in disarray. There are photographs of Landale in 'The Looker-on' of 18 March 1916 and in the 'Graphic' of the same date. Extraordinarily his father, Surgeon General James Landale died on the same day as his son.Landale has no known grave and is commemorated on the Basra Memorial. He is also commemorated on his parent's grave in Cheltenham Cemetery and Crematorium, Cheltenham, Gloucestershire; sold together with an archive of copied research. Notice of his death was reported in the East Kent Times & District Advertiser of 11 February 1903, which states: 'Lednor a Sergeant Major in the Royal Horse Artillery went to the war and was found dead when on the way to Pretoria. By his dead body was a revolver and a letter to a Miss Kate Ball, an Irish lady, to whom he was engaged and in which he left her his belongings'. The contents of his letter were reported in the Irish Times on 10 February 1903: Dear Katie, I have been accused of a crime I never committed. It is too much for me. In a moment more I shall be gone. I wish you to have all my money, and also anything that my belongings will fetch. Good bye - Yours, Willie'. The royal visit was for their majesties to meet the people of the Sudan, which was governed by the British as an Anglo-Egyptian Condominium - an unique political situation where Britain governed the Sudan in the name of the Khedive who actually had no say in the matter! A polite fiction which seemed to work. The British Agent and Consul General in Egypt, Lord Kitchener, the Governor-General, Sir Reginald Wingate, and the principal Aid-de-Camp to the Khedive, Ramzi Tahir Pasha, boarded the ship to welcome the royal couple, who were then escorted to a pavilion in nearby Suakin to meet the principal Sudanese chiefs. The Guard of honour consisted of detachments of both the Yorkshire Regiment and 8th Egyptian Battalion. At the pavilion the Governor-General read out address conveying the loval welcome of the Sudanese people. In his reply the King said that he was pleased to pay a brief visit and regretted that he was unable to spare the time to penetrate further into the country, and went on to say that he was glad to meet representatives of the tribes, many whom have travelled hundreds of miles to welcome them. A number of principal chiefs were then presented, each receiving a specially struck medal to commemorate the occasion. Later the royal party travelled by train the 10 miles to Sinkat for a grand review of native troops. They returned to HMS Medina at 1900hrs, and the ship set sail for Suez. The medal is 51mm (2") diameter medal, was designed to be worn around the neck suspended from an 85 cm (33") silver chain, and was commissioned from the Royal Mint especially for presentation to the Sudanese chiefs at the Suakin gathering. The medal is extremely rare as only 50 were struck. Incidentally the total cost of production was forty-eight pounds, nine shillings and three pence, a not inconsiderable sum in 1911. She was patrolling the North Sea on 15 October 1914 when she slowed her pace to pick up mail from a steamship. A torpedo struck Hawke on her starboard causing a major explosion, the crew leapt to collision stations but in moments she was listing. The torpedo had caused major damage and she rolled over and sank extremely quickly with just 70 officers and men surviving, thanks to the aid of a Norwegian vessel. Evans-Jones, K.B.E., who went by the bardic name Cynan, one of the most influential figures of the 20th Century in Welsh literary circlesBritish War Medal 1914-20 (Rev. A, Evans-Jones.), good very fineAlbert Evans-Jones later also known as Cynan, was born at Pwllheli, Caernarvonshire on 14 April 1895 the son of Richard and Hannah Jones, his father ran the Central Restaurant at Penlan Street, Pwllheli. Educated at Pwllheli Grammer School and later the University College of North Wales, Bangor he graduated in 1916, immediately joining the 86th (Welsh Student Company) of the Royal Army Medical Corps. However he was Appointed Chaplain to the Forces, 4th Class on 5 September 1917 whilst serving in Salonica. After the war he was ordained and began to work as a priest but also as a dramatist and poet in the Welsh bardic tradition. Evans-Jones won the Eisteddfod crown in 1923 and the chair the next year in 1924. Appointed Regional Tutor for Anglesey, a role which fell under the purview of the University College of North Wales, Bangor, where he remained a fixture until his retirement. The Dictionary of Welsh Biography perhaps summarises his post-war career and impact of modern Welsh culture best, stating: 'Cynan, as he was generally known, was a prominent figure in the life of Wales through his links with the National Eisteddfod. (He adopted the pseudonym Cynan on becoming a member of the Gorsedd of Bards, and retained it in his title on being knighted). He was appointed Recorder of the Gorsedd in 1935, and joint-secretary of the National Eisteddfod Council in 1937. From 1950 till 1954 and from 1963 till 1966 he held the post of Archdruid, the only instance of a person being elected to a second term in this office. Soon after his appointment as Recorder of the Gorsedd he initiated changes and reforms. Endowed with a keen sense of drama and pageant, he realised that the Gorsedd ceremonies were capable of being made attractive to the crowds. He brought order and dignity to the proceedings, and introduced new ceremonies, such as the flower dance. He renounced all the Gorsedd's former claims to antiquity and links with the Druids, and openly acknowledged that it was the invention of Iolo Morganwg (Edward Williams). He succeeded in gaining many new members, including some academics. In 1935 a start was made on the reorganisation of the Eisteddfod which resulted in the establishment of the Court and the Council, and in this Cynan played a prominent part. He was appointed President of the Court in 1967. He was also prominent as a National Eisteddfod competitor. In 1921 he won the crown at Caernarfon with his poem ' Mab y Bwthyn ', the story of a young Welshman's experiences in the 1914-18 war. So topical was the subject and so simple and straightforward the style and the versification that the poem attained immediate popularity. The subject of Cynan's second prize poem, 'Yr Ynys Unig' (Mold 1923), the story of Father Damien's mission to the lepers, made this an equally popular composition. His third crown poem, 'Y Dyrfa' (Bangor 1931), described a rugby match, the first time such a topic was attempted. The influence of contemporary English poets, especially John Masefield and J.C. Squire, is evident in these eisteddfodic poems, but it has been so thoroughly assimilated as to make the poems completely and distinctively Welsh. In the Pontypool eisteddfod in 1924 Cynan was awarded the chair for a poem ' I'r Duw nid adwaenir', which is a unique achievement in that the poem is in the metre known as 'tri thrawiad', which is not one of the recognised strict metres. He also adjudicated many times at the National Eisteddfod. 'Publishing a number of volumes of poetry and also a number of plays one of his best known is the poem written upon his retirement from the University College of North Wales: When I am old and reverendWith money to my name, With all my judgments overYet basking in my fame:I'll buy a lonely cottageWith nothing 'fore its door, But the rocks of Aberdaron And the ocean's maddened roar. The aircraft had taken off from Brooklands, Weybridge, Surrey for King's Lynn, various people were taken up for pleasure flights however Bigg-Wither was unable to pull up from a spiral nose dive and crashed into Hardwick Road cemetery in King's Lynn, he died as a result of his injuries. The incident was reported in the Nottingham Journal of 3 May 1926: 'A terrible flying accident occured at King's Lynn (Norfolk) shortly before five o'clock yesterday afternoon and resulted in the death of Captain A. O. Bigg-Wither, of Waterlooroad, London, and considerable injury to George Mark Lloyd (22), of Baker-street, London. The accident occurred during an exhibition flight. The machine belonged to Messrs. Lloyds Aviation Company, who were at King's Lynn for a week giving performances of flying and passenger pleasure trips. The weather had been unsuitable until vesterday when a high wind was blowing. About 2.30 flying commenced and there were several thousand present to watch the flights. Several local people were taken up in pairs for short trips, and at 4.30 Lloyd went up with the pilot, Captain Bigg-Wither, and a local man named Arthur Barrett, a motor demonstrator. When about 2,000 feet up Lloyd walked along the right wing of the machine and performed other daring feats. He returned to his seat, and the pilot commenced a series of banking feats and then started a spiral nose dive. He seemed unable to recover from it and the machine crashed to earth in a cemetery, knocking over several tombstones and completely wrecking itself. Just before it reached the ground -Barrett, the passenger, jumped from the machine and escaped practically unhurt. Captain Bigg-Wither and Lloyd were observed to have sustained serious injuries, and the former died on his arrival at hospital. Lloyd is suffering from a broken jaw and other injuries. Barrett walked to the hospital and was treated for a slight cut on the head. The squadron's flights operated independently, carrying out bombing and strafing missions against Bolshevik forces. AN OFFICER WHO WAS UNFIT FOR STRAIN OF SERVICE'At an inquest held at Harrogate on Lieutenant Quartermaster W. E. Upton (51), Sherwood Foresters, who was found dead in his billet, the Somerset Hotel, on Sunday morning, it was stated that five weeks ago he was granted a month's sick leave owing to nervous debility. Upon his return he was again examined by the medical board and passed for home service only.Mr Wallter Upton, of Ripon, said his brother belonged to Norwich, and while there on leave was advised by his civil doctor not to return to duty. Major Rowan, the officer temporarily commanding the regiment, said that an officer might not wish to leave the service, and probably the deceased did not communicate the advice of his civil doctor to the board. Watts, 1st Battalion, Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire Regiment, who was taken Prisoner of War at Tobruk only to escape from captivity in Italy in 1943General Service 1918-62, 1 clasp, Palestine (4974044 Pte. J. H. Watts. Foresters.), very fineJames Henry Watts was born on 29 July 1914 enlisted on 18 July 1934 and was stationed with 'A' Company in Jamacia on 24 September 1935. The next year- whilst still on Jamacia- he appears on the Regimental Annual 1936 with the Headquarters Wing Signals. Stationed with the 1st Battalion he served in Palestine and was still with them on the outbreak of the Second World War. They were stationed in Tobruk when the German and Italian armies arrived following the Battle of Gazala, after a slow advance, tightening the perimeter they attacked on the morning of 20 Iune. After two days of bloody fighting the Garrison surrendered although Watts appears on the casualty list for 20 June suggesting that he was either captured early in the Battle or cut off and attempted to evade the enemy. He was transported to Italy after capture and held at Campo 65 in Gravina, remaining there until the Armistice in 1943 when he took the opportunity to escape. A newspaper article in the Daily Mail make note of what happened next stating: Escaped from Prison CampHull Man Reaches British LinesAfter being a prisoner of war since the fall of Tobruk, 20 months ago, Pte. James Watts has written to his wife at 5, Northolmy-st, Howden, near Goole, saying that he contacted a Hampshire Regiment holding the northern slopes of Mount Roccamonfia, Italy. Just before the invasion of Sicily, Pte. Watts wrote to his mother, Mrs L. Conkerton, who resides at 14, Myrtle- grove, Williamson-St., Hull, telling her that he had been transferred from a barbed wire camp to work on a farm, and that he quite enjoyed the change. It appears that he was then transferred to another camp, from which he escaped a few days later. Since that time, three months ago, by various ruses he has worked his way back to the British lines."I was not surprised to hear that he had escaped." Said his mother. "He is the kind that will not be beaten."Pte. Watts, who is 33, has four children, one of whom he has not seen, and this was his fourth Christmas away from home. A fine swimmer he went though Dunkirk and has four brothers in the Middle East. He attended Blenkin-st. School.At the outset of the war he was a member of the Territorials and carried put props on the docks'Having returned to Britain Watts was transferred to the Army Catering Corps on 9 November 1944 and finished the war with that unit; sold together with copied research. Littlejohns' was still serving with the Worcester Regiment on the outbreak of the Second World War, being with the 1st Battalion who were in fact still in Palestine when the war began. A Private of the Regiment, Private Darby, was the first British soldier to die during the war, having been wounded previously in Palestine. The first killed in action was Corporal Priday of the King's Shropshire Light Infantry. They were swiftly posted to North Africa where they were stationed in Tobruk after the British defeat at the Battle of Gazala. The German and Italian army encircled the city and slowly probed the defences, driving them in from 15-20 June until they were in a position to storm the city. The assault when it came tore a hole in the British defences and, after the uncoordinated counter-attacks were brushed aside, they were on the verge of taking the port.Littlejohns is listed as missing on this day, presumably cut off from the rest of the Battalion, he seems to have attempted to evade capture. The Battalion itself only formally surrendered on 22 June but Littlejohns managed to avoid this fate only being taken prisoner of war in the desert on 28 June. He was taken to Italy and held at Campo 53 in Macereta where he remained for a year. The signing of the Armistice with Italy saw many prisoners attempt to escape and Littlejohns was amongst them, however he was again unable to evade capture and fell into German hands. Sent to Stalag XI-A at Altengabrow in November 1943, he joined a work camp at Hallendorf on 24 December 1943. Littlejohns returned home to Devon after the war; sold together with copied research. The Battalion was present at Tobruk in 1942 the city was encircled and stormed by Rommel's Afrika Corps. The initial attack on 20 June broke through the British and Indian troops holding the South Eastern corner of the defences and drove to the edge of the port. In an impossible position the Allied forces surrendered although fighting continued until 22 June. After the City Fell Oliver's Regiment was ordered to attempt a breakout, he relates the circumstances of his capture. stating: On the 21st. June my Batt. Was holding a defensive position on the inner perimeter at Tobruk. About 17:00 hrs. word came that the garrison had capitulated. We were ordered to destroy all equipment and attempt to break through. About 19.00 hrs. I was taken prisoner by a German patrol.'Oliver was taken first to Benghazi and the next month was transported to Italy when he passed through Campo 65 at Gravina, before his final journey to his permanent home at Camp 146/2 at Robbio, arriving on 8 August 1942. There he worked on a farm for over a vear until the Italian-Allied Armistice in September 1943. when he and several others decided to escape, again Oliver relates: One the 9th of September the Italian Guards left the camp. With 5 others I hid in the fields near the camp. A week later the others were all recaptured and I moved to a farm about 7 kms from Robbio. I stayed with a family there until October 21st when I left for Switzerland. He names one member of the family on his prisoner of war report, Mario Greppi of Confienza, who is noted as sheltering him from 15 September-21 October 1943. The narrative of his escape continues, stating: 'On October 21st I left Robbio with a guide. We went by train from Nocara to a small station near Como. We crossed the frontier about 15.00hrs. Having made it to Switzerland he was able to emplane for South Africa on 30 October 1944. The country changed from the flat desert of the South into a mass of razor-fanged peaks and steep sliced wadis. The enemy changed too, so did our tactics, to meet the threat of mines, ambushes and night attacks. Christmas and Hogmanay were celebrated as much as we could, and the dissidents obliged by leaving us alone in those nights. The Battalion carried out a large number of operations and was extremely successful in its results. Companies went out into the mountains for three or fours days at a time, visiting the villages by day and retiring to the high ground by night. Most of these operations had their little battle (more often with the locals who would take long range pot-shots by day and come close in by night). The highly trained and well equipped dissident bands attack the more permanent camps. Hamilton subsequently served with the Scots Guards in Northern Ireland from August 1971, where he commanded a Special Reconnaissance Patrol, and received a General Officer Commanding-in-Chief's Commendation on 7 May 1972: Lance Corporal Hamilton arrived in Ulster with his Battalion on 25 August 1971, as a Guardsman. He quickly proved himself ideally suited to the stresses of patrolling in Belfast. He has displayed tremendous toughness and determination and this led to his promotion to Local Lance Corporal on 1 November 1971. He was appointed to command a four-man permanent reconnaissance patrol operating in one of the worst areas and was entirely responsible for the operation of his patrol which he has led with extraordinary enthusiasm and tenacity. His performance has been outstanding. The Chorley Guardian of 12 October 1895 published his experiences in the Chitral campaign, a copy of which accompanies the group. The Chorley Guardian on 29 July 1949 published details of his death: 'The death under tragic circumstances was recoded yesterday of my Graham Leigh of 19 Kensington Road, Chorley. He was a well-known personality, a bachelor and a gentleman whom courtesy was a notable characteristic. Mr Leigh was 75 years old and second son of the late Alderman Arthur George Leigh who was mayor of Chorley from November 1887 to 1889. In his early manhood Mr Leigh trained for military service at Sandhurst (sic) and for a short time was stationed in India. Subsequently he held an appointment as Inspector for the Ribble and Mersey water board from which he retired 15 years ago. He served for a short period on the Borough Road Safety committee...'The coroner recorded a verdict of suicide whilst the balance of his mind was disturbed by ill health. He was found hanging in the wash house of his home on 28 July. He suffered depression, the result of his sister's poor health; sold together with a quantity of copied research. The 41st Foot were posted for service in the Crimean War, disembarking at Kalamita Bay in summer 1854, and they saw action at the Battles of the Alma and Inkerman as well as the Siege of Sebastopol. Cullen's name appears on the roll with entitlement to clasps for Alma and Inkerman, as well as for Sebastopol. There is also a note on the Sebastopol medal roll that he was sent to England from Balaclava on 10 November 1855. The 41st Foot distinguished themselves in the war, during which they earned two Victoria Crosses, captured the Russian drums at Inkerman, and famously brought back to England a goat mascot. At some stage after returning home from the Crimea, Cullen was posted once more overseas and served on the Ionian Islands for two years. His behaviour later during his length of service was much improved from his earlier days, and he received four good conduct badges from 1857 through 1863. After a 21-year career with the Colours, Cullen was discharged with pension at Camp Colchester on 21 July 1865 at his own request, intending to return home to Chelsea and live at 8 Gregory St. He later died on 3 December 1875, aged just 51. Remaining in India, they were next part of the Mohmand Expedition that took place from 5 December 1863 until 2 Ianuary 1864, for which Showell earned his Northwest Frontier clasp. The expedition was under the command of Brevet Colonel A.F. Macdonell, C.B., who led his force against Sultan Muhammed Khan. The unit spent the rest of the year in Peshawar and then in Nowshera. The event was immortalised by G. W. Bacon.Barton himself was advanced Captain in March 1887 and resigned his commission in January 1888. His time with the Militia was not complete however, as he rose to become a Captain in the Royal North Devon Hussars by November 1892. Charles Henry Selwyn was born in Bradford, Yorkshire on 1 March 1863, the son of Julius and Sophie Schlesinger; Charles changed his surname to Selwyn in 1893. Commissioned in the Connaught Rangers on 25 August 1883, he transferred to the Indian Army in December 1886, soon after which he was employed in the Burma operations with the 18th Bengal Infantry (Medal & 2 clasps). Subsequently appointed a Squadron Officer in the 12th Bengal Cavalry - and having then been advanced to Captain in August 1894 - he was attached to the 11th Bengal Lancers (Probyn's Horse) during the relief of Chitral operations in 1895, in which the regiment participated in a number of actions.Later that year, Selwyn was appointed a Staff Captain in the Intelligence Department of the Indian Army, followed by service as an Assistant Secretary in the Government of India Military Department. And it was in the latter role that he was employed as a Special Service Officer in China in the period July-December 1900, an appointment no doubt prompted by his linguistic skills, which included Chinese, German and Russian. Indeed, he was specifically employed as a member of an International Commission to promote harmonious relations between the assorted Allied contingents.But Selwyn also played his part in active operations and established a police force in Pekin, a feat to which Sir Claude McDonald - the hero of the defence of the Legations - referred to in a letter home: 'In the south-west corner of the 'Tartar' city, inhabited by Mandarins and high officials, an efficient police service has been organised under Captain Selwyn of the Bengal Lancers.' In that respect - and working alongside a fellow Indian Army officer -Selwyn had command of 20 soldiers, 60 natives and six Chinese officials. Both men were duly mentioned in despatches: 'Captains C. H. Selwyn and G. de S. Barrow, Indian Staff Corps, Special Service Officers, have been employed since the occupation of Pekin as police officers in charge of portions of the city under British control. They have performed their duties with tact and discretion and fully maintained the British reputation for justice and good government.' (London Gazette 14 May 1901, refers). Selwyn was advanced to Major in August 1901 and was afterwards employed as a Field Intelligence Officer on the staff at Shanghai.Back in India, one of his first appointments was as Deputy Assistant Adjutant-General in the Peshawar Division, but he returned to regimental duty in November 1906, when he was appointed Squadron Commander and 2nd-in-Command of the 12th Bengal Cavalry. Having then been advanced to Lieutenant-Colonel in August 1909, he was appointed Commandant of the 28th Light Cavalry in January 1911. Come the outbreak of hostilities in August 1914, Selwyn appears to have been on extended furlough back in the U.K. And he appears to have been employed at the India Office in London and as a member of the committee that approved of the issuance of official memorial plaques to the next of kin of the fallen. He also - rather gamely - served as a driver in the French Red Cross in the period February to August 1918, and out in Russia as a Colonel on the staff in 1919-20, where his linguistic skill no doubt found favour and was entitled to a British War and Victory Medal Pair. Selwyn died in Germany in 1927, but not before instilling in his daughter Robina his skills as an ex-Bengal Lancer:'It seems that the modern girl is not yet content with her successful invasion of most of the professions but must always be finding new outlets for her enthusiasm. Hambrook 32.F.B.R.A.), contemporarily impressed naming, official correction to number on Khedive's Sudan, contact marks, good very fine (7)George William Hambrook was born at Sutton, Kent on 6 October 1873 and was a farm labourer when he enlisted in the Royal Artillery on 6 April 1892. He served in the 32 Field Battery at Omdurman which used lyddite for the first time when they opened fire at 6.45 am on 2 September during the opening phase.The Opening Phase & 32nd Field BatteryAbout 50 yards from the zareba, two shells exploded, the bursts gouging holes in the gravel and red sand. The shells were from Mahdist artillery, but the guns were so poorly served that they fell short. The Anglo-Egyptian artillery replied, but with a far more deadly accuracy. On the right, Ibrahim al-Khalil and his men pressed forward, spilling over the ridge that marked Jebel Sergham's eastern boundary. Guns from the 32nd Field Battery opened up at 2,800 yards, a rain of shells that produced terrible carnage. As many as 20 shells hit the advancing black mass in the first minute, throwing up dirty blossoms of flame and red dust with each detonation. Men were decapitated, eviscerated, torn limb from limb; yet others came forward with incredible courage and resolution. Al-Khalil was blown from the saddle, tumbling in the dirt when his horse's head was nearly severed by a shell fragment. Mounting a fresh horse, he led his men forward-but by this time they were within range of the Maxim machine guns and the Lee-Medford rifles. The machine guns opened up, chattering a steady hail of death, and the Grenadier Guards stood up and poured a steady fire on the enemy's shredded ranks. Ibrahim al-Khalil was shot in the head and chest, and the bloodied survivors reluctantly fell back. Sheikh Osman al-Din's attack in the centre was equally disastrous. British shells tore bloody gaps in the ranks and tossed men like rag dolls into the air, yet the Dervishes refused to give up the fight. A carpet of spent cartridge shells gathered around each British soldier, and rifles grew so hot that they had to be replaced by weapons from the reserve. The Dervishes fared no better on the left. The Sudanese regiments had little love for their Mahdist countrymen, and some probably wanted revenge for the khalifa's depredations. The Sudanese opened up at 800 yards, great gouts of smoke, flame, and lead spouting from their Martini-Henrys. Dervish leaders pressed forward, but human flesh and blood could not stand against this hurricane of lead and metal. The ground was now clear for the 21st Lancers. Hambrook served in the 65th Battery, a howitzer Battery, during the Boer War which took part in the battle of Magersfontein on 11 December 1899. They pursued Cronje, and did great work at Paardeberg, being specially mentioned in General Colvile's report. Hambrook was discharged on serving his first period of engagement on 5 April 1904.He re-enlisted in the Royal Marine Engineers on 12 January 1915 and was posted to the 63rd Royal Naval Division which served at Gallipoli where he was wounded on 19 June 1915 and again on 24 July 1915. He subsequently transferred to the Royal Engineers after recovering from his wounds and served at home for the remainder of the war.George died at Thanet, Kent in March 1947; sold together with copied research. The Battalion garrisoned King's Post and Leicester Post to start with before also taking over Observation Post.After the attack on Lombard's Kop on 8 December Colonel Metcalfe of the Rifle Brigade determined to attack Surprise Hill and destroy the Howitzer there. Five companies of the Battalion moved to attack the position on the night of 10-11 December, Stone amongst them. They achieved surprise but unfortunately there were several delays, the gun was not in its emplacement and had to be located, and after that the first explosive inserted failed to detonate. A second managed to disable the gun but by this time the Boers had massed in sufficient numbers to take on the British raiders. Encircled the force seemed to be in trouble for a moment however a bayonet charge managed to clear their way. The British saw losses of 12 killed and 36 wounded with 10 taken prisoner, Stone was amongst the wounded although his injury was described as light. The Battalion was involved in the repulse of the Boer attack on 6 January, sending reinforcements to Caeser's Camp and seeing heavy fighting. With Ladysmith relieved the Battalion joined the advance North into Boer territory, with Stone now well recovered from his wounds.At Belfast/Bergendal they were part of the initial assault, attacking to the west of the British line towards the Bergendal Kopie. Their attack came in the teeth of heavy rifle and artillery fire but managed to push forward until the Boers withdrew. During the fighting Rifleman Durrant spotted Corporal Weller- who had been knocked down by enemy fire- disorientated and on the ground. He rushed through the fire to his comrade, lifted him and carried him safely back to British lines covering a distance of 200 yards twice under the heaviest fire. The capture of the Kopje by the Rifle Brigade and Inniskilling Fusiliers forced the Boers to abandon their entire position and guit the field. The Battalion lost 24 dead and 70 wounded including Stone whose injuries at this juncture were described as severe. It is unclear if he was able to continue serving after this point as the medal roll describes him as invalided: sold together with copied research. Retiring on 11 August 1911 Moore clearly wished to return to service and was recommended for a vacant Majority with the 3rd Battalion King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry. Promoted Lieutenant-Colonel of 3rd Battalion on 4 August 1914 he was later given responsibility for raising and commanding 7th Service Battalion, Royal Irish Fusiliers. Moore entered the war in France from 18 February 1916 and remained there for 8 months, until the battalion was amalgamated. He was Mentioned in Sir Douglas Haig's despatch of 7 November 1917 (London Gazette 1 January 1918). He died at Richmond, Yorkshire, on 15 November 1925; sold together with copied research. Aeolus, he was further promoted Able Seaman with Undaunted on 1 September 1896. Joining the crew of Forte on 20 April 1899 and serving with the Naval Brigade she landed during the Anglo-Boer War, being one of the party which manned guns during the battles around the Tugela Heights. Carpenter was advanced Petty Officer Class II on 1 November 1901, after his service in South Africa. Serving with Niobe on the outbreak of the Great War, left her on 23 September 1915 and joined H.M.S. Mona's Isle on 16 November 1915. This was used by the Royal Navy largely to lay anti-submarine nets however she had several other roles. largely performed around the Irish coastline. One memorable duty occurred when a Dutch Merchant ship carrying gold bullion was sunk by a U-Boat, Mona's Isle was used as a base for the salvage teams who recovered the precious gold. This mission was made far more perilous as the U-Boats remained in the area and could easily have attacked the stationary ship.Carpenter joined the Royal Fleet Reserve on 23 December 1917 but remained with Mona's Isle, he was later demobilised on 29 August 1919. T. Lawley, consisting of this regiment and the 7th Hussars, to operate in the Winburg district. The brigade was for some time in the north of the Orange River Colony. They took part in General Elliot's great drive in the last half of February, which was the most productive of the very numerous operations of that nature. It was during this drive that Stevn and De Wet with some followers broke the line near Vrede, but the bulk of the enemy were driven back by the New Zealanders under Garratt, who held their ground with magnificent determination and inflicted very heavy loss. The drive resulted in over 800 prisoners, 25,000 cattle, 2000 horses, 200 waggons, and 50,000 rounds of ammunition. In March 1902 Lawley's brigade was moved to Springs in the Transvaal, and on 1st April had severe fighting. In his despatch of 8 April Lord Kitchener says that Colonel Lawley sent out Colonel Fanshawe with three squadrons Queen's Bays and 30 National Scouts to make a detour preparatory to co-operating with his own advance. At 3.15 am Fanshawe surrounded a farm, where several Boers were captured; he then went on and tried to surround a laager. but the enemy were on the alert and he 'was received by a very heavy fire and realising that he was in presence of superior numbers, ordered a gradual retirement upon Leeuwkop. Close fighting then went on for several hours. The Bays, who were skilfully handled, retired steadily by alternate squadrons, whilst the Boers followed, pressing the withdrawal with the greatest determination and persistence'. Leeuwkop was found to be in the enemy's hands, and Fanshawe had to make for another ridge, 'where he received the timely support of the 7th Hussars and Lieutenant Colonel Lawley's guns'. The Boers then fell quickly back. 'In this affair, although the Bays were capably handled and displayed steadiness and gallantry in face of superior numbers, their losses were, I regret to say, heavy. Two squadron-leaders and 10 non-commissioned officers and men were killed, and 5 officers and 59 men were wounded'. Funnell was discharged unfit for further service on 16 February 1905. Shortly afterwards, when the enemy unleased its destroyers in a torpedo attack, Royal Oak's 6-inch guns contributed to the impressive wall of retaliatory fire; in all, she expended 38 of her 15-inch shells and 80 of her 6-inch shells. Having next attended an advanced W./T. course at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich, Minter was promoted to Lieutenant-Commander in February 1922, and, in August 1926, joined the Warspite as Fleet W./T. Officer to Admiral Sir Roger Keyes, C.-in-C. Mediterranean. His Assistant Fleet W./T. Officer was Lieutenant Lord Louis Mountbatten.Minter was placed on the Retired List as a Commander in May 1936, but returned to duty on the renewal of hostilities. In April 1942, he joined the Harwich base Badger for W./T. duties to the Fleet Officer in Charge, and he remained similarly employed until reverting to the Retired List in September 1945. Ark Royal was withdrawn from the Black Sea in late 1919 and disembarked her seaplanes at Malta to load a dozen Airco DH.9 bombers and 181 personnel of the supporting Z Force for transport to British Somaliland. The ship arrived in Berbera on 30 December and the squadron was unloaded to support the air and land campaign against Diiriye Guure. Ark Royal served during this campaign solely as a depot and repair ship for the RAF. She was withdrawn before its conclusion and transferred to the Black Sea to support the White Russian forces there as they began to collapse. The ship twice ferried refugees from the Caucasian coast to the Crimea and, after the second voyage, had to be fumigated at Constantinople after an outbreak of typhus among her passengers. During the summer of 1920, Ark Royal ferried RAF aircraft and personnel to Basra. She then returned to Britain for a refit and was put into reserve at Rosyth in November. Doughty was shore pensioned on 29 June 1922, subsequently joining the R.F.R. on 16 October 1922; sold together with copied service papers. An outstanding Great War campaign and long service group of five awarded to Leading Stoker W. T. Brown, Royal Navy, who was present in H.M.S. Broke's epic encounters at Jutland in May 1916 and in the Dover Straits in April 1917On the former occasion, Broke was caught close-range in the searchlights of the enemy battleship Westfalen and pulverised by heavy calibre fire which resulted in the loss of more than 40% of her ship's companyOn the latter occasion Broke rammed the enemy destroyer G-42 at 27 knots, almost turning her adversary over on her beam-ends: a brutal boarding party hand-to-hand encounter ensued, so much so that Broke's decks were 'literally running in blood'1914-15 Star (SS. 100068 W. T. Brown, A.L. Sto., R.N.); British War and Victory Medals (SS. 100068 W. T. Broen, L. Sto., R.N.); Imperial Service Medal, G.VI.R., 1st issue (William Thomas Brown), officially corrected naming; Royal Fleet Reserve L.S. & G.C., G.V.R., 1st issue (SS. 100068 Po. B. 2809 W. T. Brown, L. Sto., R.F.R.), generally good very fine (5)William Thomas Brown was born in Ilford, Essex on 12 August 1882 and entered the Royal Navy as a Stoker 2nd Class in October 1903. Having then joined the Royal Fleet Reserve in October 1908, he was recalled on the outbreak of hostilities and joined the destroyer H.M.S. Broke in December 1914. And he would remain likewise employed until August 1918, thereby sharing in her honours at Jutland and in the Dover Straits.JutlandAs neatly summarised in The Jutland Honours by Chris Bilham, Broke suffered shocking casualties and damage: At around 23:15 hours ships were seen approaching from the starboard beam, i.e. the west, on a converging course. When they were only 600 yards away Tipperary, the flotilla leader, challenged them. The reply was a storm of gunfire, leaving Tipperary a sinking, burning wreck. Broke and some of the other destroyers then attacked the ships - enemy light cruisers, closely followed by battleships - and a torpedo from one of them hit the light cruiser Elbing. The destroyers resumed their course south but, only a few minutes later, encountered the battleship Westfalen. The Broke had just begun her torpedo attack when she was illuminated with searchlights and then subjected to heavy gunfire at close range. As one of her lieutenants put it, 'It was perfectly damnable having their light right in our faces (about four or five cables off) and being properly biffed.' Nearly all the gun crews were killed; among the casualties was the helmsman and as he fell, he pulled the wheel to one side and Broke rammed the Sparrowhawk at speed. One of Broke's officers went forward to inspect the damage and found a stranger, who turned out to be Sparrowhawk's Sub-Lieutenant who had been pitched on board by the force of the collision. Commander Allen sent the man back with a message to his C.O. that in view of the serious damage to Broke, the Sparrowhawk should prepare to take his crew on board; Lieutenant Commander Hopkins of the Sparrowhawk replied that it was a pity because he had just sent a message to Allen requesting him to take Sparrowhawk's crew! While the two ships were locked together in clouds of hissing steam from ruptured pipes, the Sparrowhawk was then rammed by the Contest as well. Fortunately, the Germans had moved on and the three destroyers were separated.Broke then began an arduous passage back to the U.K. At 01:30 she was approached by enemy destroyers which fired a few shells at her, killing a few more men, then inexplicably made off. The weather became so bad that she had to turn towards the south-east, as to continue on her homewards course to the west would have risked the collapse of her bulkheads. She eventually made port on the evening of 3 June.Broke's casualties were forty-seven killed, thirty-six wounded. This was more than 40% of her company and by far the heaviest of any of the destroyers, excepting those which were sunk. Action in the the Dover StraitsA superb account of Broke's famous encounter with six enemy destroyers in the Dover Straits on the night of 20-21 April 1917 is to be found in Taffrail's Endless Story, from which the following extracts have been taken: It is impossible to describe the sensations of those on board both these ships as the collision occurred - the Broke's grimly triumphant; the Germans filled with terrorstricken amazement and horror. It was a dreadful moment; but worse was yet to come. Man were screaming and shouting for help as the Broke's guns, at their maximum depression, pumped shell after shell at a few yards' range into the mass of men huddled on the deck of her stricken enemy. One of the German's torpedo-tubes had stuck into the Broke's side and was torn off its mounting. The anti-aircraft 2-pounders added to the din with their stuttering uproar, while the British seamen that remained alive in the forepart of the ship, with rifles and fixed bayonets, and revolvers and naked cutlasses, headed by Mr. Midshipman Donald Gyles, R.N.R., already wounded by a shell splinter in the eye, swarmed forward on to the Broke's forecastle to repel boarders. They were taking no chances. No quarter was given. Every German who clambered over the bows was shot or bayoneted. A deadly small-arm fire was poured from the forecastle into the terrified men on G. 42's deck. Even the officers on the Broke's bridge used their automatic pistols. Few of their enemies survived the storm of lead and nickel ... 'Taffrail continues: 'Many casualties had occurred among the guns' crews of the forecastle through two enemy shells, one of which had detonated projectiles in a ready rack. All the electric cables and voice-pipes from the bridge had been shot away, while the after compass, after wireless-room, and searchlight were demolished. The foremost funnel was pierced through and through by splinters until it resembled a huge nutmeg-grater. A shell passing in through the side above the waterline had penetrated a coalbunker, to explode in the boiler-room beyond, killing or wounding every man in the compartment and severing the main steam-pipe, from which the steam escaped with a deafening roar. And, besides the damage from enemy shell, the British flotilla-leader had a badly bent and crumpled bow, and two huge gashes forward above the waterline. Dead and wounded lay everywhere ... In the space of a few moments the Broke was converted into a smoking-shambles. In places, her decks were literally running in blood. She sustained 57 casualties, of whom 21 were killed outright, and no part of the ship was immune ... 'Broke eventually limped home and news of her spectacular action soon hit the headlines. Her captain - 'Teddy' Evans of Antarctic fame - and crew also received the warm approbation of Their Lordships of the Admiralty. William Brown saw out the rest of the war with shore appointments and was finally demobilised as a Leading Stoker in the summer of 1921. He opted however to rejoin the Royal Fleet Reserve on the same occasion and received the L.S. & G.C. Medal in February 1923; his subsequent award of the I.S.M. was in respect of his services as a messenger in the Civil Service. Warrior managed to avoid the fate of his squadron mate Defence but still came under the guns of several German vessels, including the Battlecruiser Derfflinger, during the Run to the North. They suffered an astonishing beating with hits from at least fifteen 28-inch shells and six 18-inch shells. Warrior was only saved when the steering aboard Warspite suffered damage, forcing her to run in circles, and the appearance of the much larger Battlecruiser was too tempting a target for the enemy who switched their fire to her. The punishment had proven too severe for Warrior however and she foundered during the night with her crew, including Millard, taken aboard Engadine. A local newspaper reported that he was awarded a silver watch by the people of Camberly in recognition of his bravery in the battle. He was posted away to the armed cruiser Moldovia but was transferred ashore on 8 January 1918, just two weeks before she was sunk by a U-Boat. Joining Murray serving on the Dover Patrol on 29 January he was with her when she sailed the next month to oppose a lightning fast German raid over the channel. Sadly they failed to make contact and the raiders escaped having destroyed a trawler and several drifters. A newspaper article references Millard serving with Miranda during the Zeebrugge Operation on St. George's Day 1918 however there is no reference to this posting in his service papersMillard was sent ashore in September and was still there when the war ended in November 1918, he went on to serve with a number of postings between the wars. Notably he joined the crew of H.M.S. PC TH, a river patrol boat, on 21 March 1925 and he was still with her on 3 June 1925 when he earned the Marine Society Medal.Continuing to serve he was advanced Petty Officer with Warspite on 24 June 1933, not long after the award of his L.S. & G.C. Further promoted Chief Petty Officer on 1 February 1939 Millard was pensioned in March 1940 but remained in service, joining the crew of Sandown on 14 May 1940. This paddle steamer had a remarkable career, being pressed into service as a minesweeper early in the war she was the lead ship of the 10th Flotilla as the Dunkirk evacuations got underway. An article in the Portsmouth Evening News reports on her exploits there stating: Her first war job was as leader of the 10th Minesweeping Flotilla operating from Dover. Day and night she swept the convoy routes clear of enemy mines. She took part in the evacuation of British troops from Holland, and towed back to England a Dutch tug and lifeboat packed with Dutchmen determined to fight on with the Allies. Dunkirk, Calais, BoulogneShe made six trips to the beaches at Dunkirk and brought off 3,000 men  $\,$ [SIC]. She had an almost miraculous survival from incessant bombing and shelling."After Dunkirk," said her Chief Engineer, Lieut. C. Callope, R.N.V.R., of Milford-on-Sea, Hampshire, "came Calais, when she arrived on the scene just in time to rescue 150 British troops cut off in their retreat to Boulogne."And then Boulogne itself. When she became the last hope for hundreds of the B.E.F. as the Panzers were entering the port"Attacked by Dive BombersBy then H.M.S. Sandown had become an expert in looking for trouble and escorting hmnn [SIC] for trouble and escaping unscathed, but her most remarkable feat of survival was when 22 dive-bombers swooped down upon her during mine-sweeping operations, dropped over 100 bombs and failed to register a single hit. Shrapnel marks from near misses were the only damage inflicted."Our most exciting moment." Continued Lieut. Collope "was when a 'near miss' from an exploding mine threw up her stern sent her bows below the water until her forward gun platform was completely submerged, see-sawed back until her stern went under and water flooded the engine-room to a depth of two feet."The Sandown, now a heavily armed ack-ack ship and part of Britain's first line of defence against enemy air attack, has continued her search for trouble with the same immunity under the command of Liet-Comdr. A. H. Dunkerley, R.N.R. Twice mentioned in dispatches, Lieut-Comdr. Dunkerley, who is an old Manchester Grammer School bot, and whose home is at Hyde, Cheshire, has served throughout the war in "paddlers" including the famous Royal Eagle. She has been credited with two enemy aircraft. She took the pilot of one [of] them prisoner.'A further newspaper article refers the 'Veteran of the Ship', stating: Veteran of the Sandown is Chief Petty Officer Ivan Millard (43), who was one of the youngest sailors to take part in the Battle of Jutland in the last war. Fifteen years of age at the time, he was a survivor from H.M.S. Warrior, and received a mention in dispatches [SIC]. Chief Petty Officer Millard was again in the thick of the battle when the destroyer in which he served H.M.S. Miranda, took part in the famous Zeebrugge operation on St. George's Day, 1918 [SIC]. He passed into the serving ranks in 1915, and has been in continuous naval service ever since. Chief Petty Officer Millard who has been in the Royal Navy for 30 years, is a native of Camberley, Surrey.'It further makes reference to him volunteering to join the Medway Queen in picking up the last batch of men from the beach. Millard continued with Sandown, throughout the war, during which she supported the Normandy Landings and the Allied advance During the Battle of the Scheldt. Going ashore to Jackdaw after the war he was released in September 1945 and retired to Gosport where he died on 4 May 1961; sold together with copied research. Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. In mid-June he was posted to Halton Barracks, before on 4 July joining the North Russia **Expeditionary Force and remaining on their strength until** October. He remustered as a Fitter Armourer, and served in the UK before being tried by District Court Martial in April 1920. Dix was sentenced to 84 days detention and reduced to the rank of AC2. He was promoted to Corporal in May 1921, and posted to Iraq Group in October of the same year. Dix served with 6 Squadron (Bristol F.2bs) in Iraq from November 1921. The Squadron, initially operating from Baghdad West, undertook patrol duties against Turkish-backed rebels in Northern Iraq and later policed large areas of desert to protect towns against marauding bands of raiders. Dix advanced to Acting Sergeant in April 1923, and was classed as an Aerial Gunner in June of the same year. During 6 Squadron's operations in Kurdistan Dix was employed as the Squadron's Armourer Sergeant and also called on to fly as an aerial gunner and observer. Having returned to the UK in 1926, Dix was posted to the Armament and Gunnery School at Eastchurch and then on to the School of Army Co-operation at Old Sarum. He was discharged in May 1927. He was serving aboard Shannon at the beginning of the Great War, transferring to London in February 1916 and served aboard her for the remainder of the war.London was transferred to the 2nd Detached Squadron, organised to reinforce the Italian Navy in the Adriatic Sea when Italy declared war on Austria-Hungary. She was based at Taranto, Italy, and underwent a refit at Gibraltar in October 1915 during her Adriatic service. In October 1916, London returned to the United Kingdom, paid off at Devonport Dockvard to provide crews for antisubmarine vessels, and was laid up. While inactive, she underwent a refit in 1916-1917. The work included removing her main deck 6-inch guns and the upper deck 12pounder guns and moving four of the 6-inch weapons to the upper deck battery where the 12-pounder guns had been located.In February 1918, London moved to Rosyth and began conversion to a minelayer. The conversion included removal of all four of her 12-inch guns and her anti-torpedo nets, replacement of her after main-battery turret with a 6-inch gun, and installation of minelaying equipment on her quarterdeck, including rails for 240 mines, and of a canvas screen to conceal the entire quarterdeck from external view. She also received an experimental dazzle camouflage paint scheme. The conversion was completed in April 1918, and on 18 May 1918 London recommissioned at Rosyth for service in the Grand Fleet's 1st Minelaying Squadron. Before the war ended on 11 November 1918, London had laid 2,640 mines in the Northern Mine Barrage.Warwick left London in July 1921 and was shore based at Plymouth for the remainder of his service being discharged on 1 December 1937. His Royal Navy Long Service & Good Conduct Medal was issued to him in January 1932. A short spell as a civilian was probably enough to convince Warwick that it wasn't for him and he enlisted in the Royal Marine Police on 4 February 1938. In the 1939 Register he is recorded as a Constable in the Royal Marine Police living at Gillingham, Kent with his wife and 3 daughters. With the outbreak of the Second World War Sly was gazetted Lieutenant into the Cheshire Regiment on 27 June 1940 and was employed at the Royal Army Service Corps Record Office based at Hastings from 3 October 1941 as a Wing Lieutenant.Promoted to Temporary Captain on 18 September 1946, he transferred to the Reserve in December 1947. Sly died on 6 January 1956 at 29 Shaftesbury Avenue, Weston-super-Mare, due to 'Misadventure' as a result of old gun-shot wounds to the chest received on active service in the 1914-18 War. The History of the Great War Military Operations - France and Belgium, 1914 (Antwerp, La Bassee, Armentieres, Messines, and Ypres October - November 1914 refers, stating: There was little to stop the German advance if it were persisted in; for the line of the I. Corps had been thinned to the utmost to support the most threatened spots. There was now a decrease in the noise of battle, which might be attributable to a successful counterattack or ominous of the approaching end. The 1st Division sent up towards Gheluvelt its last reserve of fighting men, technical troops, the 23rd and 26th Field Companies Royal Engineers, under Colonel A. L. Schreiber. The latter company was shortly afterwards despatched as infantry, without technical equipment, to Major-General Bulfin's command.'Trigg is listed as killed in action on 1 November, doubtless during the units heroic efforts in holding back the German Offensive. The ship managed to reach Halifax for repairs and re fitting. Continuing with his journey his ship had the misfortune of being torpedoed off South West Africa and the ship abandoned on 2 April 1943. He was picked up by a naval vessel and taken to Cape Town, South Africa where he continued on his journey eventually arriving at Colombo on 5 May 1943. Educated at Fraserburgh Infant School he left in 1911 and enlisted with the Gordon Highlanders, being posted to the 5th Battalion and entering the war in France on 12 October 1915.Cruden served there until he was commissioned on 24 January 1917, going on to serve in the same Battalion as 2nd Lieutenant in 'C' Company. He was serving in that same rank when the German Spring Offensive broke on 21 March 1918 and Cruden found himself swept up in the chaos. They were in the Gricourt-Fresnoy Sector at the time and found it 'unusually quiet' only to come under an exceptionally heavy barrage on the morning of 21 March. German troops managed to infiltrate the frontlines and the first the Battalion knew they were advancing towards the Headquarters. The battle from this point became so confused that the war diary gives scant details. What is clear is that the Battalion, especially the officers were decimated, a total of 25 officers were casualties with Cruden listed as 'wounded and prisoner'. The unit suffered an overall total of 560 men. killed, wounded and prisoners during the disastrous day of fighting. It is likely that his capture accounts for the late Gazette of Cruden's M.C. and that it was awarded for his actions during the 21 March. Notably after the outbreak of the Second World War he was again commissioned Lieutenant although what his service in this conflict entailed has not been uncovered; sold together with copied research. Harry Cruden was born at Fraserburgh, Aberdeenshire on 16 August 1895, the son of Lewis and Maggie Cruden of 53 Saltoun Place, Fraserburgh. Educated at Fraserburgh Infant School he left in 1903 and enlisted with the Gordon Highlanders, entering the war in France on 3 May 1915. During his long association with the force he frequently appeared as prosector at the magistrate's court and undertook a significant amount of work in the prosecution of 'Buck Ruxton' in 1936. He retired from Lancaster City police after a long and successful police career in 1946. The heinous crimes of Doctor Buck Ruxton and ground breaking forensicsBuck Ruxton was a Lancashire GP who murdered his wife and their maid before dismembering the womens' bodies in a bath tub and dumping their remains in a ravine more than 100 miles away. Following a huge search, more than 80 body parts, including two severed heads, were found each neatly bundled up in newspapers, wrapping paper and sheets, and scattered. Teeth and fingertips had been removed to prevent identification. Pivotal to the prosecution's case were groundbreaking advances in forensic science which linked him to his victims' remains, which were found dumped beneath a bridge over a stream in Moffatt, Dumfriesshire, in September 1935. This pioneering forensic work become an integral part of modern policing. Jurors only needed an hour to see through the doctor's lies finding him guilty of murdering Isabella Ruxton and Mary Rogerson in Lancaster. Ruxton was sentenced to death on Friday 13 March 1936 and sent to the gallows. William Edgar was born in Londonderry, Ireland, on 17 March 1876, and was the son of John and Letitia Edgar. He originally joined the Royal Marines Light Infantry and enlisted at Glasgow on 3 January 1894 and completed his service with the rank of Private on 22 March 1906 and then emigrated to South Australia. With the outbreak of the Great War he enlisted as a Private into the Australian Imperial Force at Morphettville, South Australia, on 19 August 1914, he was quickly promoted to Corporal on 16 September 1914. Edgar embarked on the Ionian to join the Mediterranean Expeditionary Force at Alexandria on 2 March 1915 and arrived in Gallipoli on 28 April 1915 and was promoted to Sergeant on the same day. Edgar suffered a Gun Shot Wound to the thigh (service papers note 25/29 April 1915) and he was evacuated to Malta on the Clan McGilvray disembarking on 4 May 1915. Having recovered he embarked at Alexandria on 14 June 1915 and returned to Gallipoli arriving on 20 June 1915. He was admitted to hospital on 12 September 1915 with Febrile (fever) and put on the hospital ship Nevasa the following day. Edgar was to further suffer from Malaria and eventually rejoined his unit at Mudros on 24 November 1915.He transferred to the 3rd M.G.Company on 13 March 1916 at Serapeum, Egypt and was promoted to Company Quartermaster Sergeant on 18 March 1916. Edgar then proceeded to join the British Expeditionary Force at Alexandria on 29 March 1916 and arrived at Marseilles on 5 April 1916. He was further promoted to W.O.II on 5 August 1916 in the field. He had leave to England on 26 November 1916 and returned to the field on 14 December 1916. Edgar had further leave this time in Paris between 5 August 1917-8 August 1917 and rejoined his unit on the 9 August 1917. He again returned to England for further leave on 15 September returning to the field on 26 September 1917. Edgar was promoted to Acting Regimental Sergeant Major on 2 March 1918. On the 1 April 1918 his unit had a Designation Change to become the 1st Machine Gun Battalion. Edgar suffered from Shrapnel Wounds received to the right ankle and hand on the 28th May 1918 and firstly went to the 3rd Australian Field Ambulance but was transferred to the 2nd Casualty Clearing Station and died later the same day and was buried in the Ebblinghem Military Cemetery, Nord, France. His effects including the D.C.M. were left to his sister who lived in South Australia, his papers note the Memorial Plaque and Memorial Scroll were issued to his father John Edgar who lived in Scotland. A farmer he enlisted in the 1st A.I.F. on 26 January 1915 and posted to the 6th Field Ambulance on 26 January 1915 later transferring to the 1st Australian General Hospital on 31 March 1915 which left Australia for Egypt on 10 April 1915. After service in Egypt, he joined the BEF which arrived at Marseilles, France on 6 April 1916. He returned to the 6th Field Ambulance on 21 April 1917. Returning to Australia on 9 February 1919 he was discharged on 2 June 1919. He was employed as an assistant cashier when he enlisted again on 24 June 1941. Posted to Darwin on 20 September 1941 he remained there until 20 June 1942 and would have been present when the Japanese mounted two air raids on Darwin on 19 February 1942. The two attacks, which were planned and led by the commander responsible for the attack on Pearl Harbor ten weeks earlier, involved 188 attack aircraft which were launched from four Japanese aircraft-carriers in the Timor Sea. and a second raid of 54 land-based bombers. The carrier battle group consisted additionally of two heavy cruisers, one light cruiser, seven destroyers, three submarines, and two other heavy cruisers on distant cover. In the first attack, which began just before 10.00 am. Kate bombers hit shipping, infrastructure and the town; and Val dive bombers escorted by Zero fighters then attacked shipping in the harbour, and the military and civil aerodromes. The attack ceased after about 25 minutes. The second raid, which began around 11.45 am, involved high altitude bombing of the Royal Australian Air Force base by twin-engine machines. The two raids killed 235 people with a further 300 to 400 wounded. Thirty aircraft were destroyed, including nine out of the ten flying in defence, nine ships in the harbour and two outside were sunk, and some of the civil and military facilities in Darwin were destroyed. After service in Darwin, he was posted to Royal Park at Melbourne and was discharged on 12 November 1945. Vol. Bty.); Defence Medal 1939-45, unnamed as issued, mounted for wear, very fine (4)Arthur John Lawrence served in East Africa with the Calcutta Volunteer Battery from 3 October 1914; the unit (comprising six 12-pounder, 6-cwt field guns) sailed from India with Indian Expeditionary Force 'B' and perhaps the best account of their services and experiences can be found in a contemporary report from 'The Straits Times' of 5 December 1916: Calcutta Contingent. Splendid Services in East Africa, Nearly twenty-seven months ago a Volunteer Battery was formed in Calcutta for service in British East Africa, The Battery, which was designated the Calcutta Volunteer Battery, was composed of members of the Calcutta Port Defence Volunteers and the Cossipore Artillery Volunteers. About a month after its formation - in September, 1914 - the Battery numbering one hundred and ten strong, including officers, left for Bombay en route to East Africa. The men enlisted for a period of two years and saw a good deal of active service. The Battery distinguished itself and one of its members won the Distinguished Conduct Medal while no less than five others, among them two officers, were mentioned in despatches. At the expiration of the period for which they enlisted the men were detained for a couple of months longer as it was feared that their services would still be required. Fortunately, however, they were not needed any longer and the majority of them left East Africa for India, arriving in Calcutta on November 11.The returning party comprised seven non-commissioned officers and fifty-six men, or a total of sixty-three in all. It was generally anticipated that the men would have been dismissed at the station but the military authorities decided that they would have to go to Fort William for that purpose. After all the kit of the party had been collected and packed on carts, the men fell in on the roadway opposite No.1 platform when the roll call was taken Fours were then formed, and followed by a procession of motor cars, private conveyances and hackney carriages, the men marched across the Howrah Bridge and along Strand Road, entering the Fort by the Calcutta Gate. After once more answering to the roll call at the Fort, the men were dismissed. Services in East Africa Interviewed by a representative of the Englishman, some of the members stated that the Battery left Calcutta on September 14, 1914, and landed in British East Africa on October 3, 1914, and were immediately sent to the front. The Battery was divided into three sections, one section being sent to Tavoi and the other two sections to Nairobi. The Battery saw a good deal of active service and took part in various engagements. The main engagements were at Salita Hill and Latema Nek. The Battery bombarded Salita Hill no less than three times. The Battery also marched on Mikocheni, Luki Gora and Dahawa but did not come into action at these three places. That the Battery distinguished itself is evidenced by the fact that Corporal Sievwright of the Cossipore Artillery Volunteers was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal. In addition Major Kinloch of the Cossipore Artillery Volunteers, Second Lieutenant Browning, Corporal Binning and Bombardier Emeny - all of the Calcutta Port Defence Volunteers - and Gunner Tocher of the Cossiporal Artillery Volunteers, were mentioned in despatches. The Battery was singularly fortunate in that its casualties were exceptionally light. One man was killed and four men were wounded. During the period they were in the field the men did a large amount of treking. It is estimated that in all they treked over one thousand miles. The difficulties that they had to encounter were well nigh insurmoutable. As the enemy held the main roads, the Battery had to execute flanking movements. The result was that they had to cut their way through dense jungle and make their own roads as they advanced. There was plenty of hard marching and eventually the Battery went as far south as Marogoro. As the lines of communication were very long, the rations at times fell short. On the whole, however, considering the lengthy communications and the difficult country to be traversed, there was nothing to complain of as regards the food supply.Disabled Enemy GunAfter the action at Latema Nek, a disabled six-inch gun was found in the zone of fire of the Battery. Naturally the Battery claimed the gun but although the authorities admitted that the gun in question was most probably put out of action by the Calcutta Volunteer Battery it was not made over to the Battery. At the expiration of the period for which they enlisted, only some men of the original Battery rejoined. Several others being what is known as "draft" men had no option but to re-enlist. Nineteen members of the original Battery obtained commissions and are now stationed somewhere in East Africa. The two diseases prevalent in East Africa are malaria and dysentery, and every man, without exception, suffered from these distressing complaints. As a matter of fact some men contracted these diseases no less than fifteen or twenty times. Plenty of game of all kinds was come across by the men and several shikar parties were organised. At one period when the Battery was passing across the Kapiti plain the men occupied the only water holes in the district. Towards evening the animals came for their last drink and it was estimated that at one time there must have been thousands of different kinds of deer, gnu and zebras within rifle range. Shikaris were well to the fore and a large amount of eatable game was knocked over.On another occasion the Battery came across no less than seven lions. The animals were so close that one of the noncommissioned officers fired at them with his revolver but, needless to say, without result. However, these lions were hunted the next day by some planters who shot the whole lot. While in garrison at Kim it was quite a common occurrence to come across rhinoceros during patrols every day. One day the men came across two ostrich nests. One contained fifty-five eggs and the other eighteen eggs. Omelettes and scrambled eggs varied the menu of the Battery for some days. Advanced Able Seaman in 1919 he was further promoted Leading Seaman with Iron Duke in 1925.Maxfield remained in service being promoted Petty Officer on 1 September 1937. On the outbreak of the Second World War he was posted to the armed merchant cruiser Scotstoun which was serving with the 10th Cruiser Squadron. She was serving in the Northern Patrol out of Clyde when she was torpedoed and sunk by U-25. One local newspaper the John o' Groat Journal reported on the heroism of the guns crews stating: By this time the men had taken to the boats. Eight lifeboats were launched, and a motor launch overturned as she was being released from the davits. The men on her were thrown into the water and had to be picked up by the other boats. The Scotstoun began to sink by the stern, but the gun crew continued at their posts in an endeavour to sink the attacker. Only the periscope was visible, about 250 yards away. Unfortunately they were unable to make contact with their attacker who escaped retribution, however Maxfield also escaped along with most of the crew. Curacoa Lempriere saw service with her in the **Baltic during Operation Red Trek.He saw many postings** between the Great War and the Second World War including Leander, Vimy and Westminster, Pensioned in November 1939 he remained in service with H.M.S. Wren on the Western Approaches Command. After the invasion of Norway Wren was ordered to support British convoys travelling to the new front and whilst there, she undertook fire support for the landings at Bjerkvik. She later returned to convoy duties and was serving with the 16th Destroyer Flotilla in July 1940. Alongside the Destroyer Montrose she was undertaking an anti-aircraft role for minesweepers off Sussex on 27 July. There Wren came under attacked by a massed formation of 15 Junkers JU87, the speed and scale of the attack giving them no chance to escape. While she took no direct hits, they were damaged by several near misses which saw them hole below the waterline. The result was heavy flooding which collapsed the bulkheads and caused the destroyer to sink quickly with some 37 casualties. Lively, on patrol off the Skerries, Dublin, responded to the news of Leinster's sinking, and along with the destroyers Mallard and Seal set out to rescue survivors. Lively picked up 127 survivors. Kime was demobilised on 7 April 1919.Between the wars Kime was a book publisher and continued the family legacy of publishing Kimes International Law Directory which is still published annually. During the Second World War Kime rejoined the service as Lieutenant in the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve on 21 March 1940 and appointed Assistant to the Staff Officer, Intelligence. Elevated to Lieutenant Commander on 30 November 1942 he was based at HMS Cormorant, the Royal Naval base at Gibraltar. He left Gibraltar in October 1944 and returned to England where he was posted to the stone frigate Odyssey for service in Naval party 1742 as Staff Officer, Intelligence until the end of the war. Kime retired from the R.N.V.R. on 1 July 1961.On 13 June 1957 he was awarded the O.B.E. for political services in Hertfordshire. We killed the majority [of the 20 who approached] and my revolver was twice emptied, most of the bullets finding an excellent billet, including one German Officer.'Further withdrawing through a wood, the gallant trio were surrounded but Manders was knocked down, further dislocating his shoulder, being left for dead. He began to attempt to crawl back to friendly lines but was jumped by three enemy and had to 'surrender quietly'. Relinquishing his commission in February 1920, he was appointed a District Commissioner at El Cayo in British Honduras (Belize). Thus Manders also held an appointment in the territory's Defence Force. From April 1928, he was Major in Command of the British Honduras Defence Force, perhaps taking them over to **England for the 1937 Coronation. Williams, a wholesale drapery business that was based at 72 St.Paul's Churchvard, London E.C. between September 1914 -February 1917 before he joined the Royal Flying Corps at Denham on 23 August 1917. He transferred to 55 M.A. on 5 October 1917, and from there he transferred to No.49 Training Squadron based at Doncaster on 28 November 1917. Pierce ioined No.90 Squadron based at Shotwick on 9 January 1918 and from there transferred to the Training Division on 30 March 1918. He entered the war in early 1918 (date not confirmed) and served with No.90 Squadron. On 20 May 1918 Pierce shot at an Albatros D.III east of La Bassee, however two days later was noted as being in hospital (no details confirming the complaint). He then joined No.19 Squadron on 3 June 1918. Pierce was part of two formations from the Squadron "A" Flight and "C" Flight who were over the Bois de Biez in the early evening of 13 July 1918. In the fading sunlight they could see six other aircraft, which turned out to be a Pfalz and five new Fokker D.VIIs. "C" Flight went down first and broke up the German formation. "A" Flight followed and began picking targets. Taking full advantage of the element of surprise the pilots managed to shoot down just about all of the Fokkers. Pierce shot down one which was seen to crash. His next encounter was on 11 August 1918 when he shot down a singleseater aeroplane east of Albert.His final flight however was on 13 August 1918 when he took off at 05:36 flying a Sopwith Dolphin from Savy Aerodrome for Allonville aerodrome however a thick mist covered the aerodrome. Pierce collided with Lieutenant W. G. Lance and both were killed in the air collision. A.I.F.), good very fine (2) John "Jack" Greaves was born at Sydney in 1894 and enlisted on 28 August 1915 with the 20th Battalion, A.I.F, listing his address as 29 East Street, Surry Hills, New South Wales. Posted to England he joined the 19th Battalion in January 1916 and joined them in France on 2 November 1916. That same month the Battalion took part in an attack against The Maze feature, a series of interconnected trench systems near Fluer. Around the time of this attack the German forces opposite them were preparing their withdrawal to the Hindenburg Line. This they began to carry out in 1917, the carefully pre-prepared defences included booby-trapped positions and lines of communication bracketed by guns. The latter proved to be disastrous from Greaves who had been appointed 'Trench Quarter Master' and was organising the supply of rations on 1 March 1917. As he brought the supply party up the road the German guns zeroed in on their positions opened fire. A direct hit landed right at the centre of the party, killing 9 men outright and wounding another 14, including Greaves. He was taken to 1/1 South Midlands Casualty Clearing Station but his wounds proved to be mortal and he was buried at Dernancourt Communal Cemetery; sold together with copied research. Census records reveal Ronaldson to be working as a clerk in the stock exchange in 1911 and living with two of his elder brothers, who were working as a tea merchant and a commission agent.Ronaldson earned his Territorial Force Efficiency Medal in July 1913 as a Gunner with the H.A.C., becoming one of only 99 such awards to the H.A.C. from 1909 through to the end of 1914. The following year in January 1914, he was transferred to the Reserve Company. Almost immediately after the start of the First World War, on 3 August Ronaldson was transferred from the Reserve Company back to 'A' Battery with whom he spent the first few years of the conflict. This was a busy time for him, on 14 August he was married by special license - due to the war - to Miss Daisy Blanche Newton at St. Mark's Church in Surbiton. Surrey and they thereafter lived at Sunnycroft in Sunninghill, Ascot, Berkshire; this was to be couple's primary address for the rest of his life.On 29 September 1916 Ronaldson was transferred to the Reserve Officers' School at St. John's Wood, and sometime later was discharged to commission with the 32nd Division of the Royal Field Artillery. Advanced Lieutenant in 1917, he was disembarked at France with his unit on 7 May 1917. Ronaldson was reportedly gassed once during his service overseas. He was not listed as a member of the H.A.C. after the close of the war. Ronaldson applied for his WWI medals on 23 February 1921 and returned home to Sunnycroft where he lived with Daisy and their children. The couple had at least three daughters and two sons, one of whom, Frank Ian Ronaldson, worked for the Colonial Service in Nigeria. After the war he continued his career as a member of the stock exchange, and according to the 1939 Register Ronaldson also worked in the Berkshire Special Constabulary. He continued this Constabulary work during the Second World War, earning a Long Service 1944 clasp to his Special Constabulary medal.Ronaldson lived until the ripe old age of 89 and died on 4 May 1971. Attesting with the Seaforth Highlanders on 5 April 1932 he was still serving with that unit when they were posted to Palestine, later being transferred to the 2nd Battalion with whom he was serving on the outbreak of the Second World War. They joined the British Expeditionary Force in January 1940 they were deployed to cover the Maginot Line when the Germans burst through the Ardennes and avoided the encirclement at Dunkirk. Instead. they were forced back to new positions at St. Valery-en-Caux, there the Germans managed to penetrate their perimeter and with evacuation impossible and the high ground above the court held by the enemy they were forced to surrender. Sutton one of large numbers of British troops who were marched from France to Germany, whilst on his line of march he attempted to escape, his Prisoner of War questionnaire states:'I escape[d] from the line of march in France at Roubaix by falling out and hiding in a wheatfield. My companions were L/C/ Myers and Pte. Mulholland, both of my regiment. I was recaptured by a German Coastal Battery five weeks later at Merlimont. I was fit. My companions were captured at the same time. 'After his recapture Sutton was taken to Hueburg in Bayaria where he remained for three months as the Germans attempted to prepare for the huge influx of prisoners. Moved initially to Stalag 21-CZ he left there in June 1941 being finally taken to Stalag XX-B at Marienburg where he remained until 1945. He was evacuated before the advance of the Red army and taken West with the rest of the prisoners, 'The March' as it was known through freezing weather and with terrible conditions. Fortunately Sutton survived the ordeal and was liberated on the German surrender. Despite his suffering during the war he remained in the army, being advanced Warrant Officer Class II and transferring to the Royal Army Service Corps with whom he served in Cyprus. He was to serve with No. 6 Squadron in Palestine operating as an Air Gunner on Hawker Harts and later Hardys, he flew through 1937-38 on various patrols covering a combination of aircraft recognition, ground recognition and culminating in bombing raids on 14 July 1938 at Wadi Quarn, followed up with an identical Op on the 4 August 1938. With the outbreak of the Second World War Bain was posted to No. 211 Squadron which flew Blenheims based at Qotafiya, Egypt. Flying as an Observer on 9 July 1940 Bain was part of nine crews who were ordered to intercept an Italian cruiser, alas this was not spotted so Tobruch Harbour was bombed as an alternative target.Bain was part of two crews on 12 July 1940 who were tasked with carrying out a bombing raid on Bardia, heavy anti-aircraft fire was encountered, the other aircraft L.8471 became aware the Italians had worked out the height from code that they were flying at, so he altered his height to miss both fighter aircraft and anti-aircraft fire. On 23 July 1940 he was part of a raid on the landing ground south of Derna, all aircraft landed at Sidi Barrani for refuelling before returning to base. He had a second raid on Tobruch Harbour on 3 August 1940 and his aircraft was noted as having direct hits to the jetty. The following day he was part of a raid on M.T. vehicles at Bir-El-Gobi, the bomb burst was not seen however a column of smoke was seen to rise from the target, the aircraft landed at Sidi Barrani. Bain returned to Tobruch Harbour on 10 August 1940 where the bombs fell to the north of the target. On 12 August 1940 he was due to take part in a raid on M.T. vehicles at Derna, however owing to a poor run up it was decided to attack shipping in Tobruch Harbour, his aircraft force landed at Sidi Barrani on the homeward run owing to a petrol shortage. On 27 August 1940 he was part of a raid on Derna and his bombs straddled the breakwater approximately 1/3 from the shore end. 31 August 1940 saw him as one of two crews who raided Ain-El-Ghazala, however no results were observed, aircraft L.4526 however had better luck and bombs were seen to burst among buildings. On the morning of 4 September 1940 he was part of seven crews to bomb El Gazala landing ground, his aircraft bombed in the region of one aircraft in the North East corner of the landing ground. Taking off again at 12:55 later the same day 4 September Bain was on board Bristol Blenheim L8376 which was to carry out a raid on Derna. The aircraft was attacked by a Cr.42 fighter and had one engine taken out of action, it had to force land near Derna after being struck by ground fire. The aircraft crashed wheels up at 15:20 and was later strafed and burned. The crew additionally comprised of Squadron Leader A. R. G. Bax (Pilot) and Aircraftsman 1st Class L. E. C. Wise (WOp/AG).All the crew survived, however Bax suffered a broken leg, and all were taken Prisoner of War. Bain was sent to Stalag 4B at Mulberg (Elbe) and given the number (224676). On his return to the U.K. after the end of the war in Europe he was commissioned to Pilot Officer on 30 January 1947 and made Flight Lieutenant 30 July 1951. This determination resulted in the authorisation and establishment of Detachment A-503, which would assume the responsibilities of A-502. Because of their familiarity with the mission, key members of A-502 were assigned to the new team. the XO (Executive Officer) of A-502 became the CO (Commanding Officer) and Team Leader of the new A-503 team.Released from its original assignment, A-502 was given an even greater mission. It would become responsible for the security of the entire Nha Trang area. Overnight, the team's AO (Area of Operation) and responsibilities became significantly larger. With the acceptance of its new mission, A-502 would also begin to create its history as the largest Special Forces A-Team ever to exist.Relocating in Khanh Hoa Province to the village of Dien Khanh, A-502 establisged its new base in what appeardd to be part of a Hollywood set. The team's new home was the southern portion of an old Vietnamese fort. French forces occupied South Vietnam prior to the involvement of the United States of America. The fort was originally constructed by the Vietnamese under the Nguyen Ahn Dynasty in 1793. It was home to units of the French Foreign Legion's 2nd Colonial Infantry beginning in the early 1940's and could have easily served as a set for an old Humphrey Bogart movie. However, in 1945, the Viet Minh attacked and overran the fort, claiming the strategic location for themselves. After being held by these enemy forces for several months, it was retaken by the French in a coordinated counterattack. Reinforcing units of the 6th Colonial Infantry were landed in Nha Trang. Linking up with General Leclerc's 2nd Armoured Division Task Force, the two units mounted their counter-attack and reclaimed the fort they had dubbed the "Dien Khanh Citadel". The words of his officer Bob Sweeney wrote of the patrol's experiences and in particular their drawing on the tactics of the SAS and their service in Malaya. It would seem likely that he would have drawn on the seperiences of Gordon Gilmore in doing so: 'To accomplish the mission of providing for the defense of Dien Khanh district and for the western defense of the city of Nha Trang, Detachment A-502 (Det A-502) conducted various combat and intelligence gathering operations. The reconnaissance patrolling tactics and techniques employed by U.S. Special Forces in Vietnam came from the British Special Air Service (SAS) experiences gained during counter-insurgency operations that were successfully employed by the SAS when they fought against the communist insurgents in Malaysia 1956-1960. Patrolling, raids, and ambushes, as a guerilla, became a key component of the Unconventional Warfare training taught to U.S. Special Forces at FT Bragg, N.C.. Those jungle fighting and patrolling skills were reinforced by the combat lessons learned from U.S. Special Forces soldiers fighting the Viet Cong/North Vietnamese Army (VC/NVA) in the jungles, mountains, and swamps of Vietnam. With the major buidup of conventional U.S. forces in Vietnam in 1966, General Westmoreland tasked the 5th Special Forces Group to establish an in country "RECONDO" school to train U.S. Army soldiers how to conduct Long Range Reconnaissance Patrols (LRRPs) deep into enemy occupied territory. The fearless all volunteer U.S, students underwent a physically and mentally gruelling 18 - hour pe day, 3 weeks of combat recon

Thereafter, in respect of Dugdale's service and aside from a tour in Cyprus in 1970-72 - it was in Northern Ireland that he rounded off his active service career, the P.W.O. carrying out several operational tours in the troubled region in the period 1969-75 alone. During its first deployment in 1969, the regiment carried out vital patrol work and helped stabilise the situation in Co. Down area, in addition to taking overall responsibility for the security of Londonderry, where three days of rioting in August had all but exhausted the ranks of the R.U.C. During a subsequent emergency tour in Londonderry in 1975, a soldier of the P.W.O. was shot and killed by a sniper while on foot patrol in the Creggan housing estate. Scanlan himself would have been one of the gallant band of just 94 mainly from 'A' Company - to come out of the Battle of Slim River in January 1942, with the majority of their comrades going 'in the bag' at this point. Joined together in late January with the scant few Marines to also live to fight another day, they manged to also take on a few survivors from the Repulse and Prince of Wales to form the 'Plymouth Argylls'. It was a futile act, for they were to themselves go into captivity at the Fall of Singapore, Scanlan recorded as having been captured on 15 February 1942. He was clearly suffering from the effects of a bruising campaign and fell ill. The good solider died of dysentery on 1 March 1942 and is buried in the Kuala Lumpur (Cheras Road) Civil Cemetery. Supply ships needed to sit in deep water and so couldn't come in close to the shore. The harbours were intended to protect the ships from storms and enemy attack. The idea for floating harbours came from several people. Winston Churchill had suggested them as early as 1917. Captain G. Tarling writing in the 969 Port Floating Equipment Company war diary records that they landed on D+1 Day (7th June) at King's Beach (La Riviere) in a very understated fashion, the terrible weather. Detail is given of the extremely violent seas and the utmost danger faced by the incredibly committed teams of Officers and Men. Wilson as a member of 969 would most likely have been involved in the successful construction of the mulberry harbours. Wilson was discharged on 17 August 1944 and died at Bury St Edmunds on 11 July 1975; sold together with copied research and service records, letter from the General Register and Shipping office confirming the medals and Atlantic clasp, not with the group. The aircraft was carrying twelve men and top-secret equipment for Woomera rocket range. Between Ankara and Teheran it used an air corridor which would take it over the middle of Lake Van, Turkey's largest lake, almost surrounded by mountains and situated close to the Soviet-Armenian border.At 08:14, the aircraft passed over Gemerek at FL115 and at 08:59 it passed over Elazig at FL135. The last position report was received at 09:26 over Mus. The aircraft had crashed and was found six days later on Mount Süphan, a little north of Lake Van.A special Royal Air Force mountain rescue team of six men from Nicosia, Cyprus reached the crash site at the top of the mountain some days later and demolished the plane wreckage with explosives after retrieving several important documents. There was unproven speculation that there were nuclear warheads in the cargo. An anonymous source alleged that, some years later, some local villagers who went to the wreck were diagnosed with cancer and died due to high exposure to the radioactive substances. The official investigation into the accident concluded that the aircraft, which had been flying on instruments, drifted north of its normal track because of strong winds and crashed into the mountain. Stronger-thanforecast winds may have been a contributing factor - an accurate bearing could not be obtained at Mus, and the wind forecast at Van had not been checked. In addition to this, sub-normal temperatures would have resulted in a high indicated altimeter reading and calculations on the flight and contacts with beacons were not coordinated and controlled; sold with copied research. Judenbirg [SIC], Stalag 18A. & received very friendly treatment and important B.B.C. news from two persons. One Herr. Blyth, having set out without news from "C" Company, were held up by fire half way up the razor-back approach and were forced to dig in in that very exposed position. Then, at 1500 hrs., "A" Company was warned to take part in a night attack on the feature in conjunction with the K.S.L.I.Accordingly, at dusk, the platoon was withdrawn from their uncomfortable position, and a little later "A" Company advanced up the hill. On arrival at the top the force, under Capt. P. A. Hewitt, found a platoon of K.S.L.I. already there to his left. He immediately organised the defence of the hill on a four-platoon basis. Once again digging in commenced, and once again a ferocious counter-attack was launched from the reverse slopes, organised from the twin hill, which scattered the unfortunate "A" Company in disorder. Capt. Hewitt withdrew his battered force down the hill again. Amongst his casualties were Lieut. Blyth and one of the Company's staunchest men, Pte. Jolley, who was missing with six others. The wounded had to be left behind. Blyth was taken to the British Casualty Clearing Station at Borgo San Lorenzo, near Florence, he was reported to have suffered from a gunshot wound to the chest which had fractured his right rib. The Battalion was initially posted to Serria Leone and then, by way of Egypt, to Palestine. They were there when Rommel began his operations in Libya and swift German victories saw the Battalion rushed back to the front. They arrived in time to cover the retreat from the Hellfire Box and pulled back with the rest of the British forces to Egypt where they were posted to the fortress town of Mersa Matruh. There another serious defeat awaited the British as X Corps found itself surrounded lost almost half its number with the men of the 1/4th Essex forced to attempt a breakout. In the event of the 400 men to make the run for freedom some 260 managed to evade capture, including McCarthy. Unlike most of the mauled Corps the Essex were back in the line for action during the First Battle of El Alamein which halted the German advance. Later taking part in the Second Battle which began the final German withdrawal from the Middle East, a list of posting written by the recipient includes an annotation after the Fall of Tunis noting 'Battle over in Egypt'. The Regiment returned to Alexandria and spent some time in Syria before being post to Italy in November 1943. They joined the 8th Army front in January 1944 and were present at Cassino from 10 February-28 March which would put them there during the Second and Third attempts on Monte Cassino. Taken to Italy via Brindisi Taylor was initially held at Camp 87 until November when he was moved to Camp 78 at Sulmona. He was still there in September 1943 when the Armistice was signed between Italy and the Allies. It was then that Taylor and a group of others escaped, getting through the wire and escaping to the hills, his attempt was described in his escape questionnaire notes that it is the same as Sergeant Prout's (Staff Sergeant Alan George Prout, R.E.M.E.) which states: 'Tpr. Hill and Gnr. Delury were last seen at Piennadimonte one 3 Nove 1942 and are believed to have been recaptured as they tried to get through German positions in daytime.From Sulmona they [Prout and his escapers including Taylor] went to Caramanico, Piennadimonte, Civitello Del Raimondo, Torricella, Castiglione, Sargito, and Torella where they met 48 Canadian Highland Regt. on 10 November 1943. They were helped en route by farmers and the whole journey was made on foot. When crossing the R. Sangro 2 Italian soldiers assisted them. 'Prout's own questionnaire notes Domico Di Monti, of Caramanica as a man who gave food and shelter to the escapers as well as looking after a badly wounded soldier. Whilst in a working camp at Dresden, he was put to work repairing bomb damage but was admitted to hospital for some three weeks whilst there with a severe skin complaint. He had previously been interogated and put in solitary confinement at Frankfurt in order to try and extract information from him. Davison was taken prisoner of war during the initial assault on 20 June and taken to Tarhuna, Libya and his escapee questionnaire notes of his dislike of the camp commandant while there: 'Commandant of P/W Camp at Tarhuna, Libya between June and Oct 1942. His behaviour, while falling short of actual brutality, was particularly anti-British. Transported to Italy on 27 October he was taken first to Campo 65 before being transferred to Campo 132/8 on 1 May 1943. While at a work camp in August Davison injured himself and was taken to Hospital at the nearby city of Barletta. He was there in September 1943 when the Armistice was signed between the Allies and the Italians and the Germans scrabbled to react. Barletta was on the forefront of that reaction and soon came under attack what followed is best outlined in he citation for the Al Valore (Military) presented to the city's garrison after the battle which states: 'On 8 September 1943, the garrison of Barletta, modestly armed, but supported by the spontaneous and effective support of the citizens, wanted to continue on the path of honour and loyalty to the homeland, strenuously opposing the fierce German units and inflicting considerable losses on them. Only on 12 September, after the arrival of overwhelming German reinforcements, the garrison, tried by the losses suffered and under the threat of the destruction of the city, was forced to surrender. The enemy troops occupied Barletta, barbarously slaughtered 13 defenceless citizens in retaliation, who thus united their sacrifice to the valor of the military in a common yearning for freedom. The city of Barletta, a shining example of the virtues of the people of southern Italy, hands over the future generations the witness of the values resulting from the rebirth of the homeland and the conquest of democracy and peace. Barletta 8-13 September 1943. Despite the German forces defeating the Italian garrison they did not assume full control of the area until 24 September. The day before this several of the inmates of the Barletta Hospital escaped, the escapee questionnaire again refers: From Barletta Hospital. Walked south with some companions (names and units of these not known but they were last seen in U.K.). He travelled on foot the whole way, receiving no assistance, and joined the Allied lines south of Barletta. 'Returning to Britian Davison was discharged on 6 March 1946, having his medals issued on 24 February 1949; sold together with copied research and a medal mounting bar. The Regiment was scattered following the Battle of Arras however Walker managed to escape at Dunkirk, being posted with the reformed Regiment to the Desert.He was ill during the Battle of the Knightsbridge Box and as such missed the engagement which saw most of the Battalion taken prisoner. Instead Walker found himself posted to the 7th Battalion and sent to the line to take part in the Defence of Tobruk. The Garrison fell on 21 June and Walker went 'in the bag' one week later at Derna.He was taken to Campo 82 in Italy and remained there until the Allied invasion, leaving the campwhich was unguarded at the time- he travelled to Rome where he remained until repatriated. His P.O.W. card was sent to his nearest family a 'Mr & Mrs Theaker' at Saltburn by the Sea. Upon his return to Britain Walker remained with the Territorial Army, being awarded the Efficiency Medal in 1946. Promoted to Lance Corporal he spent the remainder of the war in the Sub.H.Q. Kit stores in Queensland. Promoted to Corporal he was discharged on 26 October 1945. Adams died on 12 August 2000 and is buried at Colac cemetery; sold together with a copy of his service record. Albert Thomas Blakesley was born at Old, Northampton, England on 12 June 1901 and served in the Great War initially in the Queen's Regiment and later 24th London Regiment. At some point he emigrated to Australia. A chef and baker he enlisted at Royal Park, Victoria on 15 January 1941. He embarked for Singapore on 10 April 1941 and spent most of his time in hospital with various illnesses and was sent to Colombo to recover on 15 January 1942. He left Colombo on the 'Stirling Castle' on 13 March 1942 and was discharged at Melbourne on 6 June 1942, medically unfit for further service. A 'Battle of Kos 1943' P.O.W. group of four awarded to Private J. E. Sayer, 1st Battalion, Durham Light Infantry, who was wounded during Operation Brevity in May 1941 and later wounded and taken prisoner at Kos when the British garrison was forced to surrender in October 1942, a defeat which resulted in the infamous Kos Massacre1939-45 Star; Africa Star; War Medal 1939-45, Efficiency Medal, G.VI.R., Territorial (4456722. Pte. J. E. Sayer. D.L.I.), overall good very fine (4) John Edwin Sayer was born on 11 April 1914 and lived at 2 Short Street, New Shildon, Durham. Working as a coal miner prior to the war he joined the 1st Battalion, Durham Light Infantry on 1 June 1939. This unit was stationed in Tientsin, China when the war began and remained there until January 1940 when they were posted to the Middle East, seeing heavy action there from the off with their inclusion in Operation Compass. They also played a major role in Operation Brevity, a small counter-offensive against Rommel's advancing troops: the plan was to use a mobile column of tanks and jeep-mounted infantry to recapture the Halfaya Pass in preparation for Operation Battleaxe. However the attack failed and Sayer is listed as wounded along with a number of men from his unit on 15 May 1942. The Battalion joined the Malta Garrison in January 1942 but returned to the desert; in June 1943 they were briefly posted to Syria. With the surrender of the Italians in September 1943 British troops needed to guickly garrison as many Italian possessions which they could before German forces arrived to retake them; the 1st Durhams were one of the units selected to do this, scrambling to take the island of Kos. They succeeded in doing so - however the Germans were not far behind...The counterattack began early on 3 October 1943 with landings at a number of points on the island: outnumbered and facing a well-equipped enemy including 'Brandenburger' special forces units, the defenders - composed mostly of the D.L.I. - were on the back foot. By evening German forces on the island numbered 4,000, heavily outnumbering the British who had run out of anti-aircraft ammunition. The Battle ended at 04:00 the next morning with the British capitulating; the last to surrender were the men of 2909 Squadron RAF Regiment who did so on 8 October. It was in the wake of the battle that the German General. Friedrich-Wilhelm Müller, ordered the execution of over 100 Italian officers who would not side with their former allies. He was later to earn the nickname the 'Butcher of Crete' and was executed by the Greek Government for his crimes on 20 May 1947. Sayer was again wounded during the savage fighting of 3 October and was taken prisoner with the rest of his battalion. Taken first to Mulberg IVB prisoner of war camp, he was transferred in December 1943 to Bitterfield work camp. His prisoner of war questionnaire notes an interesting occurrence, stating: I was working in a Brick factory for three or four months at Bitterfield with four more of our boys, although two of them were threatened with a revolver by the man in charge who is a nazi the remainder of us got on very well with him. I got a dose of flu there and was looked after by him. An unusual 'escapers' campaign group of five awarded to Private W. F. Johnson, East Yorkshire Regiment later Leading Observer, Observer Corps, who was taken Prisoner of War in 1942 and successfully escaped from imprisonment in Italy1939-45 Star; Africa Star; War Medal 1939-45; Efficiency Medal, G.VI.R., Territorial, (4344295. Pte. W. F. Johnson. E. Yorks.); Observer Corps Medal, E.II.R. (Leading Observer W. F. Johnson), overall good very fine (5) William Franks Johnson was born on 28 February 1921 and enlisted with the East Yorkshire Regiment, being posted to the 5th Battalion. They were serving with the 50th Division in the Desert during the Battle of Gazala after which the British were forced back through Libya and into Egypt. They later managed to reorganise on the El Alamein line.There the East Yorks went into action near Ruweisat Ridge towards the end of the Battle, when the two sides had been fighting for almost a week. Johnson was taken prisoner of war there on 25 July 1942, he was taken to Italy where he was held at Camp 53 at Macerata, Italy. Escaping on 11 August 1944 he managed to make it back to Allied lines and got away. At the end of the War, he was still a member of the Territorial Army being awarded his Territorial Efficiency Medal in the Army Orders for April 1946. Joining the Observer Corps as Observer on 8 November 1952 while working as a Bus Driver, he was advanced Leading Observer on 1 January 1960. Korea 1950-54, modern issue, very fine (5) Jasper Johnson was born on 19 February 1920 in Bakewell, Derbyshire, the son of Samuel and Margaret Johnson. While working as a lorry driver's mate, he enlisted at Derby into the Sherwood Foresters on 14 Ianuary 1939. He joined the 1 Battalion in Palestine on 3 August 1939. The 1st Battalion moved to reinforce the Garrison of Cyprus in June 1940, where they suffered their first war casualties in an air raid before moving to Egypt early in 1942. Converted to a motorized role while there they joined the 201 Guards Brigade. Unfortunately, after a sharp engagement in the Knightsbridge Box, the Battalion was ordered to surrender when the Garrison in Tobruk capitulated. Johnson attempted to escape but was captured by a German patrol as he tried to break through the perimeter. He was sent to three different P.O.W. camps in Italy but on 9 September 1943 the Sergeant in charge of Campo 63 allowed everyone to escape. Johnson had been working on a farm and had made friends with the local farm workers and as such they guided him to Taranto Railway Station. There he took a train to Tirana and began to walk over the mountains to Switzerland. He met an Italian woman who was also trying to escape and she quided him across the border. After a night on the mountain they arrived safely in Switzerland. Johnson was eventually repatriated and allowed to return home on 22 October 1944.Marrying Muriel Beverley in Sheffield on 12 June 1945 and was 'demobbed' on 27 July 1946 as a Class Z Reservist. In 1950 he was recalled to the Army and posted to the Royal Northumberland Fusiliers. Landing in Korea on 10 October 1950 the regiment fought at Sibyon-ni, Kan-don, the Imjin River and finally at the Battle for Point 217. During their tour in Korea they lost 93 killed, 279 wounded and 45 prisoners. Johnson survived and left Korea on Sunday 29 October with the regiment on H.M.T. Empire Pride, and was released for the second time as a Class Z Reservist on 23 November 1951. He died in Sheffield in December 1984 aged 64; sold together with copied P.O.W. report papers. O'Toole, 56th Heavy Regiment, Royal Artillery, who was taken Prisoner of War in Tunisia in 1943, while serving in the same unit as Spike Milligan1939-45 Star; Italy Star; War Medal 1939-45; Efficiency Medal, G.VI.R., Territorial (770257 Gnr. C. O'Toole. R.A.), light contact marks, very fine (4)Charles O'Toole was born at Edinburgh on 23 February 1908, enlisting on 21 May 1936 he was mobilised on the outbreak of the Second World War with the 57th Medium (Home Counties) Regiment, Royal Artillery, Posted to the 56th Heavy Regiment, Royal Artillery, he was with this unit at the same time as the comedian Spike Milligan, who wrote of his experiences in a two-part biography called Adolf Hitler: My Part in His Downfall.Later arriving in North Africa in December 1942 they saw heavy fighting and, as the war in the desert shifted in favour of the allies, advanced into Tunisia. There O'Toole was one of four members of the Regiment taken prisoner of war on 21 April 1943, not long before to the unit advanced into Sicily. He was taken to Campo 98 in Sicily and from there to Campo 53 at Masaratra, Italy in July. Moved from Italy to Germany in August 1943 he missed the truce with Italy in September which saw mass breakouts throughout the Italian camps. Instead he was moved several times before being settled finally at Stalag VIIIB where he worked as a labourer at Blechammer. Cpl. R. W. A. Noakes. F. F. Yeo.), minor contact wear overall, very fine (5) Robert William A. Noakes served during the Second World War with the 2nd Fife & Forfar Yeomanry. After the German invasion of Europe, fears arose that Ireland could be next on their list of targets. The 2nd Fife and Forfar Yeomanry arrived in Northern Ireland on 23 June 1940 as a response to this threat and became the only Divisional Cavalry Regiment in the country. They soon became part 53rd Division, attached to 159 Brigade. Their main duty was to patrol the border and they prepared to take the fight to Dublin if required. After training in Northern Ireland and other parts of the United Kingdom, the 2nd Fife and Forfar Yeomanry took part in the Normandy landings with the 29th Armoured Brigade in the 11th Armoured Division in June 1944, operating tanks including the Comet. It subsequently saw action in Operation Epsom in June 1944, Operation Goodwood in July 1944, Operation Bluecoat in August 1944. They were approaching Essen on 21 September 1944 when Noakes was wounded in action, the Battalion War Diary for the day notes: "C' Sqn actively patrolled the Canal by SOMMEREN and 'A' Sqn patrolled North to another possible bridge at 5715, but on arrival found it blown, so they worked down the Canal shooting up opposition on the far side. At 1930 hrs the Herefords established a bridgehead across the Canal, supported by fire from 'C' Sqn.'A Corporal at that stage he appears to have remained with the unit as they saw further action in the Battle of the Bulge. H. Ingham. A.A.C.), very fine (6)Herbert Ingham was born on 4 August 1924 at Bury, Lancashire and by the time of the Second World War had volunteered for the Parachute Regiment. He was thrown into the cauldron at the Battle of Arnhem with 156th Battalion and was taken a Prisoner of War on 26 September 1944 (POW Debrief), suggesting that he was 'on the run' before going 'in the bag'. Four men of his unit were captured in perhaps the iconic photograph of the Battle. Held at Fallingbostal and Luckenwald, he was also sent to the Dinklar Sugar Factory from October-December 1944. Whilst there on approximately 12 November 1944, he managed to immobilise the plant for some 8 hours by breaking his mixing machine with bottles. Furthermore, Ingham commented that while on work parties, '...many men were struck by hand and bayonet while being struck an armed guard was always near in case of our retaliation.'Ingham died in 1993.Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. With the outbreak of the Second World War, McCrossen served in France with the 1/6th Battalion, The Oueen's Regiment and was wounded in action. The wounds were so severe that he was classed 'permanently unfit' in August 1940 and then joined the 16th (Bermondsey) Battalion, Home Guard. His campaign awards (1939-45 Star & War Medal 1939-45) were issued to him at 27 Rockley Road, Bermondsey in January 1950, with his Defence Medal 1939-45 having followed sometime after. Rayner, Australian Army Medical Corps, who was lightly wounded during the Bombing of Darwin HarbourSurviving the bombing of his ship the Manunda he was so seriously affected that he took to drink and was Court Martialled for stealing five bottles of brandy from a hospital in 19431939-45 Star; War Medal 1939-45; Australia Service Medal 1939-45, all officially impressed (NX70163 G. P. Rayner), very fine (3)George Philip Rayner was born at Newton, New South Wales on 5 August 1900 and joined up at Paddington, New South Wales on 31 July 1940. The specialist knowledge acquired during his previous job as a Pharmacist saw him posted to 2/1 Hospital Ship, the Manunda. Oddly Rayner is listed as being commissioned Lieutenant on 1 July 1940, possibly an appointment backdated for seniority. He worked as the ship's pharmacist, responsible for the medical stores aboard.Between November 1940 and September 1941 the ship made four trips to the Middle East, it is not clear whether Rayner was aboard for these journeys. However, his service papers make it clear that the medals present with the lot are his full entitlement.Present at Darwin on 19 March 1942 when Manunda was resupplying he was caught up in the Darwin raid. Flyovers by Japanese aircraft the month previously had identified Darwin as an area with poor air defences and a high concentration of Allied shipping. This impression was not aided by the erroneous identification of the seaplane tender USS Langley as an aircraft career. Seeking to prevent Allied interference in the landings at Timor and Java it was decided to launch a raid on Darwin. The attack arrived at 09:58 at which time the orderlies aboard Manunda were undergoing examinations in the wards. As the Air Raid sirens went off they scattered and before long the ship was under fire, a near miss killing four people on the deck. Not long afterwards a bomb fell through the skylight of the 'music room' detonating through B deck and into C deck. The ship was also machine gunned at least once, despite a number of fires aboard the ship the crew manned lifeboats and managed to rescue a number of injured men from the water. Reyner's service papers state he was 'Wounded in action remaining on duty' on 19 March 1942', the report for this injury was apparently made on 6 March 1942. It is highly likely that this date is incorrect and he was actually wounded on 19 February since he was not present in any warzones during this period. Manunda herself sailed to Fremantle the day after the attack and underwent refits at Adelaide before continuing her service. Unfortunately the attack seriously effected Reyner, it was felt that he was no longer fit for service afloat and instead went ashore to serve in a Hospital. He was stationed with 114th Australian General Hospital the next year when he was found to be drunk on duty and arrested. Reyner was charged with theft of Government property and conduct to the prejudice of good order and military discipline. The pre-trial notes states: 'The accused is 43 years of age, married and in civil life was a pharmacist by occupation, having a shop of his own at Bondi Beach.He was appointed to the AIF in Jul 40, when he joined "Manunda" and was on that ship when it was bombed at Darwin on the 19 Feb 42.As a result his nerves were badly affected and up to Jun 42 he received treatment. It was then thought it would perhaps be better if he took up some occupational duty, and as a result he was sent, in Jun 42, as a pharmacist to the 114 AGH Goulburn. At that date he hospital had not long been functioning and there is no doubt that throughout the period Jul 42- Jan 43 he was working under very difficult conditions and without proper assistance. Though Reyner was only accused of stealing 5 bottles worth of brandy it was noted that an amount equivalent to 86 bottles was missing from the stores (although the court notes state clearly that Reyner could not be held accountable for all of that). Working in this role in several camps he was transferred to mining on 2 June 1944 at Cleiwtz. The conditions there were appalling and Smith soon began to suffer with 'boils + ulcers' as a result of the mine conditions. His prisoner of war questionnaire notes the lack of medical treatment, giving the answer to the question 'did you receive adequate medical treatment' by stating: No, Medical Supplies very scarce, British M.O.s Did best they could, but hampered by Germans.'Repatriated after the war Smith settled back in Lincolnshire and died in North Lincolnshire on 30 May 1990; sold together with copied research, an enamelled Lincoln Country Special Constable badge and a Barton-On-Humber A.F.S. bracelet named 'G. It is a sad and somber [SIC] time when friends die suddenly, perhaps more so when defending ones own country. Britain had a long history of fighting wars in foreign countries, but our country and its people were totally unprepared for the murderous air attacks which followed later. When the member for the state seat of Kurilpa in the Queensland Legislative Assembly, Kerry Copley, died in 1949, Moores won the byelection and went on to represent the seat until 1957. He was one of the members of the Labor Party to defect to the newly formed Queensland Labor Party in 1957. As a member of the QLP he was appointed to the role of Minister for Transport in May of that year but lost his seat three months later. The Queensland Parliamentary Debates of 2 August 1983 records a eulogy delivered by Hon. J. Bjeleke-Petersen.'I am sure that all of us were saddened by the deaths of the two former members to whom I have referred. Of course, I knew both of them very well. In the case of Tom Moores, I was associated with him for the whole period of his parliamentary service of eight years. Our association as parliamentarians was to last 13 years. Tom Moores was born in Gympie. He received his early education there and then went on to the Brisbane Industrial High School. He worked in the plumbing industry in England for two years in 1935 and 1936 and later became a manual training teacher at Brisbane's West End, South Brisbane and Dutton Park Opportunity State Schools. He was the youngest trade union leader of the Plumbers Union when he was its president in the early 1930s.Mr Moores served with the Australian Military Forces in World War II, and also on the Queensland Rugby League Committee. He entered the political arena when he was elected alderman for the Brisbane City Council ward of Kurilpa in 1939. He served as an alderman until 1949, when he was elected to State Parliament as the Labor member for the electorate of Kurilpa at the by-election that was held following the death of the Labor member, Mr P. K. Copley. One of the ablest of the Labor backbenchers, Mr Moores had a rapid but brief rise to ministerial rank in 1957, following the resignation of Mr J. E. Duggan from the Transport portfolio in the Gair Ministry. He was appointed a member of the Executive Council and Minister for Transport on 7 May 1957. Following the general election held on 3 August 1957, with other members of Mr Gair's Ministry, Mr Moores resigned as a member of the Executive Council and as Minister for Transport on 12 August 1957. His total period of administration was 43 days, which was the shortest on record in Queensland since the six-day Dawson Labor Ministry in 1899. The 1957 election also ended Mr Moores career as a parliamentarian, as he was defeated for the Kurilpa seat by the Liberal candidate. On behalf of the Queensland Government and, I am sure, all honourable members of this House, I express sincere condolences to his family. Promoted Major on 1 February 1906 he had by that stage transferred to the 79th Carnatic Infantry. They formed up in Egypt and saw action during the Defence of the Suez Canal before being transferred to Gallipoli. Whilst there Harding was wounded in the left foot, appearing on a hospital list in September 1915. After the evacuation there the Brigade was once again reformed in Egypt and joined the Canal Defences, it was here that Harding was 'mentioned' for the first time (London Gazette 21 June 1916). The Regiment left the 29th Indian Brigade from Egypt and was posted to France with the 7th (Meerut) Division. Harding earned another 'mention' the following year (London Gazette 31 October 1917) and was back in Aden in 1918 were he earned the C.M.G. He gained his final 'mention' in 1919 for services in Mesopotamia (London Gazette 7 April 1919), although whether that was due to his services with the 69th Punjabis or on secondment is unclear. Later he served in the S.S. Vinebranch, and upon attaining his certificate as First Mate, he joined the Union-Castle Line as Fifth Officer in the S.S. Norman in 1906. Here, then, the commencement of his long and distinguished career with the Union-Castle Line, an association only interrupted by active service in the Great War, when he was called up from the Royal Naval Reserve, having been commissioned as a Sub. Lieutenant in April 1912. Opening shots And that service commenced at the end of 1914, when, having attended a gunnery and torpedo course at Vernon, he joined the battle cruiser H.M.S. Lion. And he remained likewise employed until removing to the monitor M. 22 as a Lieutenant in early 1918, thereby sharing in Lion's part at the battles of Heligoland Bight, Dogger Bank, and Jutland. At Heligoland Bight on 28 August 1914, the Lion and her consorts engaged the German light cruisers Coln and Ariadne, the latter being reduced to a blazing wreck after three close-range salvos, and the former being finished off as Beatty ordered his squadron to retire. Events at the battle of Dogger Bank in January 1915 proved more challenging, Lion duelling with the Blucher, Derfflinger and Seydlitz and being hit 16 times with resultant casualties and serious damage. Of equal interest in terms of forthcoming events at Jutland was her gunnery: she had loosed off 243 rounds but only four of them found their mark."There seems to be something wrong with our ships today."And so, to Jutland itself, when the battle-cruiser fleets of Beatty and Hipper manoeuvred for position on sighting each other at 1428 hours on 31 May 1916. The enemy were the quickest to find the range and Lion took her first hit at 1551 hours. Less than 10 minutes later, a shell from the Lutzow penetrated Lion's midships' Q-turret, killing or seriously wounding all inside. More significant was the risk of Q-turret's magazine igniting, a matter of great concern. As it happened, that risk had been swiftly dealt with by Major Francis Harvey of the Royal Marines, who order the turret to be flooded, even though he was still inside it. He was awarded a posthumous V.C.Nonetheless, some cordite did ignite, and flames flashed down to the switchboard and other rooms, killing dozens. To add salt to his wounds, Beatty next witnessed the almighty magazine explosion that marked the end of the Queen Mary, the second of his battle cruisers lost that day. Famously, he is said to commented to Captain Chatfield on Lion's bridge, "There seems to be something wrong with our ships today." He did however succeed in leading the German battle cruisers towards Jellicoe and the Grand Fleet. In all, Lion suffered 14 heavy calibre hits and extensive damage was caused her main deck, funnel and port side, in addition to that inflicted on Q-turret. And apart from the British ships which were sunk, no other suffered more casualties than Lion, that final, grim count amounting to six officers and 84 ratings killed, and another 51 wounded. Subsequent career knighthoodDemobilised in 1919, possibly after seeing action in the Baltic in the monitor M. 22, Thornton rejoined the Union-Castle Line and was appointed to the Balmoral Castle. After then serving in various ships of the company as Chief Officer he was appointed to the command of the cargo steamer Hansa in 1929. Five years later found him in command of one of the intermediate passenger ships and, late in 1937, he was appointed to the mail service. He had meanwhile - in January 1934 - been placed on the R.N.R.'s Retired List as a Captain. His last ship was the Capetown Castle, of 27,000 tons, in which he served from January 1939 to July 1946. During that period, in February 1941, he was promoted to Commodore of the Union-Castle Line fleet, and in 1944 he received the honour of a knighthood for his meritorious services to the Merchant Navy and, more particularly, for his troopship work. In the period of his wartime command of the Capetown Castle - she had been requisitioned by the Admiralty for use as a troopship - she participated in Operation 'Bolero', the build-up of troops in readiness for the Normandy landings; by the time she was returned to the Union-Castle Line, she had steamed 484,000 miles and carried 164,000 troops.Sir Ernest retired in January 1947, at the age of 63, and settled near Nairobi, Kenya on account of his health. The Court Marshal report relating to the incident notes that he went out along with the Major to a farmhouse which, unbeknownst to them, contained a number of Boers. They were fired upon and attempted to withdraw however one of their horses was shot and they were taken prisoner. Both men were released the with Master returning to the British on 31 July 1900. Seeing further action at Frederickstad from 17-25 October and Wittebergen from 1-29 July he was present for operations in the Transvaal and Orange River Colony, serving until May 1902. After the war Master was advanced Major on 21 September 1904. Still with the Army Service Corps on the outbreak of the Great War he entered the war in France on 16 August 1914. He earned his first 'mention' in 1914, likely for the retreat to the Marne and following advance to the Aisne (London Gazette 20 October 1914). Awarded the D.S.O. the following year Master followed this up with one final 'mention' in 1917 (London Gazette 24 December 1917). His father was Deputy Lieutenant of Monaghan and M.P. for County Carlow, his mother's father was William Henry, Chief Inspector of the Royal Irish Constabulary. He was commissioned with the 4th (Militia) Battalion, Middlesex Regiment on 22 January 1887. Transferring to a Line Regiment in 1889 he joined the Royal Scots and was advanced Lieutenant with them on 28 July 1892. Appointed Adjutant of the 6th Battalion, Lancashire Fusiliers on 1 July 1898 Owen-Lewis sailed with them to Malta in 1900 before proceeding to South Africa. Entering the war on 10 February 1900 he was involved with operations in Cape Colony, South of the Orange River, Orange Free State and Transvaal from March-29 November 1900. This likely includes a stiff action at Luckhoff 28 November October 1900 which the 6th Battalion was involved with against Commandant Hertzog. The Boer's followed their usual tactic of occupying a line of ridges before the British positions and took five hours of rifle and artillery fire. It was clear that the only option was going to be a direct assault into heavy rifle fire, the Battalion performed very well and earned the praise of their commander for the action. Before joining operations in the Transvaal, Orange River Colony and Cape Colony from 30 November. During this time he was appointed a District Commandant, being 'mentioned' for his services (London Gazette 10 September 1901). The Battalion lost a total of 18 other ranks to enemy action and disease over the course of the war. Appointed the Governor of Mountjoy Prison at some stage after the war Owen-Lewis retired in 1904 and was awarded the Honorary rank of Major on 7 January 1907. He was later appointed a Prisoner Inspector by the General Prisons Board for Ireland. On the outbreak of the Great War he returned to the colours with the rank of Captain in the Reserve of Officers, being appointed Staff Officer Grade 3.0wen-Lewis was further advanced G.S.O. Grade 2 on 28 April 1916, while serving as Major. He is noted as serving with Irish Command and Assistant Quartermaster General in France being twice 'mentioned' during this time (London Gazette 25 January 1917, 20 May 1918). His M.I.C. notes the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.Retiring again after the war Owen-Lewis died at 4 Barkstone Gardens, Kensington on 22 December 1926. Upon his death the Sheffield Daily Telegraph noted that he was the founder of the Army Officer's Art Society. James Anderson Brown Robertson was born at Galashiels, Roxburghshire, Scotland on 30 September 1884, the son of William and Janet Robertson. Joining the Royal Navy on 15 July 1902 he passed for Clerk the next year and was posted to Centurion on 3 November 1903 as Clerk Sub Lieutenant. Appointed Assistant Paymaster on Lieutenant 12 June 1905 with H.M.S. Hoque Robertson was further advanced Lieutenant on 30 September 1905. He saw service between the wars with a number of vessels including Hecla in 1906, Bedford in 1909 and Odin in 1912. Joining the company of the scout cruiser Sentinal on 14 August 1914 he saw the first three years of the war with her as part of the 8th Destroyer Flotilla and later the 6th Light Cruiser Squadron. Joining the crew of Ceres on 27 May 1919 Robertson was advanced Paymaster Lieutenant Commander with her on 30 September 1917. This vessel was part of the 6th Light Cruiser Squadron and later travelled to the Baltic in December 1918 as part of Operation Red Trek. Not long later he was appointed an Officer of the Order of the British Empire, the Edinburgh Gazette provides the following citation, stating: For valuable services in H.M.S. " Ceres," 6th Light Cruiser Squadron. Given the timing of the award and the fact that Ceres joined the 3rd Light Cruiser Squadron upon her return to Britain, it can be assumed that the award was for his service in the Baltic. While there he was also granted permission to wear the Persian Order of the Lion and Sun although it is not clear how he came by the award. Robertson was later posted to the Battleship Revenge on 4 October 1920 before joining HMS Julies, the shore base of Constantinople. There he was appointed Secretary to the Temporary Naval Transport Officer, being advanced Paymaster Commander on 30 September 1923 while undertaking the role. Appointed Squadron Account Officer on 1 January 1923 with Warspite he was afterwards posted to Canterbury on 15 May 1924. Robertson's next appointment was as Fleet Accountant Officer with Effingham on 10 February 1925. He was primarily shore based during his career being awarded the O.B.E. in 1919 which he was invested with at Buckingham Palace on 17 March 1920.In 1927 he served as Paymaster Commander to Admiral Sir F.C. Drever when he commanded the Battle Cruiser Squadron from Hood. Promoted to Captain in 1937 he served at Portsmouth and the Admiralty during the Second World War. Edmonds was placed on the retired list on 13 January 1942. Edmonds died at Bognor Regis, Sussex on 13 September 1961; sold together with copied research and his mounted ribbon bar with 6 medal ribbons. In addition to performing his normal duties in an outstanding manner, he has particularly been responsible for the distribution of Medical Stores and Blood for transfusion purposes, and has carried out the detailed organisation of Air evacuation of casualties in conjunction with the RAD and "Q". His work in these particular connections has been outstanding in that on no occasion has he over or under estimated the possibilities, and has never failed to carry out the services that had been arranged with lower formations. On 28 June, 1942, Major Sixsmith went forward to supervise the evacuation of the Medical Stores of 11 Indian General Hospital from Bagush. He found that the enemy had advanced further than had been anticipated, and that transport and labour arrangements had broken down, as they had been diverted to urgent work in connection with ammunition and supplies for the troops engaged in action fighting. Major Sixsmith, assisted by his driver and a few remaining IHC personnel, succeeded in loading all the valuable equipment in small quantities at a time on to passing vehicles, and remained carrying out this work until after the enemy had begun to shell the position, only leaving when all the stores that would be difficult to replaced had been loaded. Not only was a very considerable amount of valuable medical equipment saved, but Major Sixsmith's action while a Headquarters' Officer also set a magnificent example to others and had a most beneficial effect on morale. M.B.E. London Gazette 18 February 1943, the original recommendation states: 'As my deputy and operational Staff Officer the brunt of the preparation for this campaign has fallen upon him. His skilful and untiring detailed planning has resulted in the success of the difficult medical operations concerned with the landings, and the subsequent operations which resulted in driving the enemy out of Sicily. His foresight and quick action in rapidly changing situations has relieved me of much work at a very harassing time. I have confidentially left much in his hands, knowing full well that it would be efficiently performed. His coolness in adversity and his cordial relations with all the staff have enabled everything to work smoothly. He has never hesitated to undertake journeys by air, land and sea, at a moments notice to "tie up" all arrangements; while as a Staff Officer he has been a tower of strength, and when things have looked their blackest he has always cheerfully shouldered the heaviest responsibility. The success of the Medical administration of the Eighth Army in Sicily is undoubtedly due to his skill and energetic handling of many difficult situation. I could not have wishes for a better Staff Officer and cannot praise his work too highly. Hugh Leonard William Sixsmith was born at Cardiff, Glamorgan in July 1911 and educated at the Welsh National School of Medicine, qualifying on 7 October 1930. He was commissioned Lieutenant on 19 January 1940, passing a course at the Army Gas School two months later. He served in the Desert with the 8th Army, being advanced Captain and later Major with which rank he entered the war in Sicily as Deputy Assistant Director of Medical Services. Moving on into Italy he continued in that role as Major, Temporary Lieutenant-Colonel as Assistant Director of Medical Services. Returning to Britain on leave in March 1945 he was given command of 177 Field Ambulance at Slindon, Sussex; sold together with copied research and a large archive comprising:i)Two framed M.B.E. and O.B.E. Joining the S.S. Commission as Captain on 25 February 1949 it was around this time that he was 'mentioned', while still serving in Palestine. Returning to Scotland Hall was appointed a Camp Commandant with Scottish Command on 1 October 1948 serving in the rank of Major at the time. London Gazette 28 December 1973: for services to the community of Muttaburra'.M.I.D. London Gazette 6 March 1947: for exceptional service in the field in S.W.P. area'.Gordon Falconer Gearing Lee was born at Toowoomba, Queensland on 9 November 1913, son of Leonard George Lee and Doris Falconer Sellars and received his senior school education at the Anglican Church Grammar School, Brisbane, he subsequently qualified as a Chartered Accountant.Lee enlisted in the Australian Army at Wooloowin on 5 February 1942. He served with the 2/163 General Transport Company initially at home before being posted to New Guinea on 25 July 1945 serving there until 5 November 1945, he was discharged from the army on 28 November 1945. The war over an enterprising Lee went to Muttaburra where he formed the Somerset Garage and Somerset Agencies to take over as Managing partner of the transport business and mail contracts in the local area. The mail runs proved interesting. There were no graded roads in the area after the war and virtually no machinery. After the wet season the carriers chose the driest track and that became the 'road' for the year. As well as having the Longreach Mail Run (twice weekly £10 a year), Gordon had a weekly run to Prairie. This trip, which went through North Crusoe and back to the main road at Thornton, had 47 gates, which took over 2 hours per trip to open and close. Among the agencies carried by the Somerset Enterprises were that of the Land Rover, which was growing in popularity with the pastoralists, Armstrong Siddeley Motors, a franchise that covered the whole of Northern Queensland from Maryborough to Cairns and West to the Territory border, excluding Blackall, and Volkswagen. During the Volkswagen Dealership, Gordon Lee employed 11 mechanics, 3 electricians, 3 salesmen, a storeman, a bookkeeper and a secretary, as well as operating a branch in Longreach. Somerset Airways was born out of the record wet season of 1950. With the town marooned for 12 weeks, during which vehicles were able to get through on only 2 or 3 days, Gordon's wife had to get to Brisbane urgently and managed at length to get a grazier from near Julia Creek to land on the common and take her out. After that experience, she insisted that to stay in Muttaburra they had to have their own plane. There were problems, as the only way was to make it a charter service, and all charter planes had to be signed out by qualified personnel and checked every 30 flying hours. With the problems solved, the venture took off. The first pilot was Keith Galoway, who later became a senior captain with T.A.A., after two years it became obvious that another plane was needed. Captain Jesse Luxton flew a Praetor 5 from England but damaged it on Sunba Island, thereby missing a certain record for a light plane. He took it to Jakarta by barge, repaired it and then flew on to Longreach where the main office of Somerset Airways was opened. After becoming a Public Company, with eight aircraft, this Muttaburra enterprise sold out to B.P.A. (Bush Pilots Airways) following a disagreement with Captain Luxton and the death of the Manager in the disastrous `King Air crash west of Longreach while on a demonstration flight.Lee writing in 'Muttaburra Saw Us' published in 1984 recalls, One of the great moments I remember in Muttaburra was when I had the honour, in the middle of the 17 years drought and after the awful 1960 credit squeeze, to chair a meeting with the Shire Chairman (Clr. Neill), U.G.A. President (Frank Keenan) and the Minister for Repatriation, representing the Primary Industries Minister. The Memorial Hall was packed and we had prepared and presented a case, which the Minister agreed, having that day-inspected drought-stricken properties, was irrefutable and totally convincing. We got some relief very quickly in the shape of cash grants which helped graziers to pay storekeepers (and garages), and all went in the end. I could ramble on and on with reminiscences, but enough is enough. May I congratulate you on the positive and progressive attitude you have applied to your job there. It must be a tremendous help to the pupils at a time when there is so much variance over subjects, styles and methods - to have as instructor, someone with plenty of ideas and the ability to implement them. In 1972, Lee was hospitalised with a nervous breakdown with stress caused by the business difficulties afflicting the grazing industry. He remained in Muttaburra until 1974 when he moved to Bribie Island with his wife and reverted to being a tax agent. In the 2000 Sydney Olympics Lee was selected as a torch bearer at the age of 86.Further reading about the history of Somerset Airways and Gordon's involvement can be found

He exhibited great energy and enthusiasm in the performance of his work and his pleasant personality enabled him to surmount many difficulties. Edwards, E (Holborn) Division, Metropolitan Special Constabulary, for his gallantry in saving life after the disastrous bombing of Odhams on Long Acre, Covent Garden, 28 January 1918Medal of the Order of the British Empire, Civil Division (J. He was present at most Air Raids as a member of my Ambulance Section, in which he had done excellent work at all times. But it is in connection with the Raid which took place on 28 January 1918 at Odham's that I wish to specially bring his name forward.He was on the scene within a minute or so of the bomb dropping. He at once grasped the situation and with himself, Heffer, Macaulay and others [they] broke open a vard where hand-barrows are kept for hire, and with these were able to remove some seven or eight cases to hospital before the regular ambulance arrived. He was of the greatest assistance to Mr Wallis in extracting dead and dying from the building at very great personal risk, and I am glad to be able to put his services on record.'In the early hours of 28/29 January 1918, a bomb dropped from the giant R-12 exploded n the basement of the Odhams Print Works on Long Acre, Covent Garden, London. The basement was being used as an air raid shelter. Some 38 were killed and at least 85 injured, the largest loss of life from a single bomb during the Great War. Rescue party in Glasgow, who on 14 March 1941 worked for many hours moving and lifting heavy timbers to enable trapped people to be releasedBritish Empire Medal, G.VI.R. (James McKenna), extremely fine B.E.M. London Gazette 30 May 1941. A bomb partly demolished a two storey tenament and persons were trapped. The remaining walls and an overhanging portion of roof were in a highly dangerous condition. Despite this McKenna entered the ruins and worked untiringly and unceasingly moving and lifting heavy timbers and other debris while those trapped were released. The award was recommended by the Chief Engineer of Glasgow'Shortly after 1 a.m. on 14th March, 1941, McKenna's party was called to a tenement at 101, Logan Street, Glasgow, which had been partly demolished by a parachute mine. With Police Constable Archibald Walker, who has been awarded the George Medal for his gallantry on this occasion, he entered the building, the walls and roof of which were in a highly dangerous condition, and until 3 a.m. worked untiringly to release 5 trapped persons. He materially assisted Constable Walker, in conditions of equal danger, in releasing 2 of the 5 persons alive. 'Copy of Police Reports: 'With reference to the Chief Constable's General Order No. 210/3/41 of 14th instant, I beg to report for the information of the Chief Constable, particulars of the actions of Archibald Campbell Walker, Reg. No. H.3., number 293 Constable of the Central Division, following the explosion of a parachute mine in Logan Street at Kilbride Street, about 12.30 a.m. on 14th March, 1941.Constable Walker proceeded on duty at 2 p.m. on 13th March, and reported off duty in accordance with instructions, during the progress of an aerial attack on the City, at 12.20 a.m. on 14th march. Thereafter, while the Constable was proceeding homewards, a parachute mine dropped at the junction of Logan Street and Kilbride Stret, demolishing, among other damage, a portion of a two storey tenement dwelling. The Constable, who had been passing along Polmadie Road, about one hundred yards from the scene of the explosion, immediately proceeded to the incident. An express message was sent out to the Report Centre and the required Civil Defence services were soon on the spot. These included a Rescue Party from number 5 Depot, Titwood Road. A bomb partly demolished a two story tenement and five persons were trapped in debris at what remained of the property at 101 Logan Street. Roof timbers, beams, doors and other heavy materials were bearing down on the trapped persons. The remaining walls and an overhanging portion of roof were in a highly dangerous condition. Despite this, Constable Walker entered the ruins along with James McKenna Rescue Party worker, residing at 70 Greenview Street, Glasgow, and together they worked untiringly and unceasingly till about 3 a.m., moving and lifting and holding heavy timbers and other debris for long periods while those trapped were released. Of the five persons so released, three were found dead and the remaining two seriously injured. I saw Constable Walker and McKenna at work on the incident and in addition to being personally much impressed, Ioverheard several spontaneous remarks of genuine admiration of the Constable's conduct uttered by various Civil Defence workers. David Gilmour, leader of Rescue Party from No.5 Depot, Titwod Road, and Sergeant uncan Campbell, the Incident Officer, from each of whom statements are submitted, both speak in the highest terms of the gallant conduct of Constable Walker and Mr. Gilmour also gives praise to James McKenna of his Rescue party for the outstanding work performed by him.I feel that in acting as he did, Constable Walker set a magnificent example to all other Civil Defence workers present. His conduct, im my opinion, is well worthy of recommendation for the award of the George Medal. With regard to the actions of the Rescue party worker, James McKenna, I feel that while he was only performing his alloted task, his work, at this incident was also praiseworthy and I respectfully suggest that he be considered for a commendation (Sgd.) George McLean Lieutenant.Constable Walker was appointed to this Force on 5th July, 1937. He is a married man, 27 years of age, and has served in the Central Division from the date of his transfer from the Training School. He has a clear record and is regarded by his supervising Offcers as a promising young Constable. I agree with Lieutenant McLean that this is a case well worthy of recommendation for the award of the George Medal.As regards the actions of James McKenna, Rescue Party worker, the part which he played was certainly only what should be expected of a Rescue Party worker, but he appears to have performed his task exceedingly well and displayed exceptional devotion to duty. 'Frederick Ballard was born at Twyford, Wantage, Berkshire on 20 March 1900. He was a carter before he enlisted into the Royal Marines at London on 5 April 1918, transferring to the Royal Marine Engineers at Chatham the next day and later completing his service on 24 February 1919. He was eligible for a British War Medal 1914-19 for his Great War service.Ballard then joined the Royal Navy on 3 November 1920 and served on Victory II from 3 November 1920, then on Malaya from 15 March 1922 before joinging Columbine on 17 March 1925, then returning to Victory II on 3 April 1925. He was next posted to Fisgard on 7 June 1925, then to Victory I on 19 September 1925, and on to Columbine from 6 January 1926 ahead of rejoining Victory II on 3 January 1928. Ballard then joined Constance on 26 January 1928 before once again returning to Victory II on 7 February 1928.He transferred to Acting Regulating Petty Officer on 19 July 1928, from which time he served on Excellent until joining London on 17 June 1931. Ballard again served on Victory II from 17 April 1934 until 21 August 1937, and during this time he was awarded his L.S. & G.C. on 27 March 1935. However this was deprived, his service papers note him issuing a free railway ticket which is probably the reason he lost the medal.He served on Barham from 22 August 1935 and was then once again to Victory II from 24 February 1937 before joining on Greenwich on 10 April 1937. Returning to Victory II on 16 June 1937, he next served on Coventry from 16 August 1938 before rejoining Victory II on 24 August 1939. Ballard then served on King George V from 1 October 1940 until he was Pensioned on 13 December 1941. Reynolds, Royal EngineersIn his work with 101 & 102 Bomb Disposal Sections, his mastery in tackling novel enemy bombs came to the fore, including on two occasions in August & September 1940, when twice successfully defusing two 250kg devices in and around Bristol - a false move on either occasion would have been fatal - his award being promulgated just a week before the institution of the G.C. itself, he would eventually take his decoration from the hands of the Duke of Gloucester whilst out in India in July 1942; that was to be the first occasion that the ultimate award for civilian gallantry would be conferred in IndiaGeorge Cross (Lieut. Edward Womersley Reynolds, R.E. 17th. September, 1940.), on its investiture pin and in Royal Mint case of issue; Burma Star; Defence and War Medals 1939-45, these last three all in their cases of recent issue, with labels stating 'Maj E Reynolds P/67382', good very fine (4)Exhibited:Lord Ashcroft Gallery, Imperial War Museum, London.E.G.M., latterly 'translated' to the G.C. (V.C. & G.C. Association, refers) London Gazette 17 September 1940: The King has been graciously pleased to approve the following Awards: The Medal of the Military Division of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire, for Gallantry:Lieutenant Edward Womersley Reynolds, 101 and 102 Bomb Disposal Sections, R.E. On 17th August, 1940 [Congresbury, Somerset], a 250 kilo bomb fell in a garden amongst some council houses; it did not explode and Lieut. Reynolds was sent to investigate. On digging down 17 ft., he found that it had a new type of fuse about which no instructions had at that time been received. Finding that traffic was suspended on the road and that inhabitants had had to be cleared out of their houses, he removed the fuse and found that it had a clockwork delayed action. The risk he took was great, and merit of his action was the greater for lack of exact knowledge of the type of fuse he was dealing with.On 3rd September, 1940 [Temple St, Bristol]. - A large bomb fell in a street just before midnight on September 1st, 1940; it wrecked the front of some business premises and was supposed to have exploded. About 16.30 hours on the 3rd September, a 250 kilo unexploded bomb was found in the debris. Lieut. Reynolds was at once summoned, found that it had a clockwork fuse which was still ticking and according to orders applied to Regional H.Q. for instructions suggesting that the sooner it was dealt with the better, and stating that he was willing to do so forthwith. In view of the damage to property that would have been caused by the explosion of such a large bomb in such a congested area and especially of the possible effect on the public morale permission was given and Lieut. Reynolds immediately extracted the fuse and rendered the bomb inoperative. The risk in doing this was very considerable. Edward Womersley Reynolds was born on 27 June 1917, the second son of John and Brenda Reynolds. The family lived in Harborne, his father was the managing director of the family business and also President of the Royal Astronomical Society 1935-37. The grandfather had been Lord Mayor of Birmingham and also Governor of the University, so the young man had much to live up to. Young Reynolds went to West House School, Edgbaston and then to Repton before joining the family firm, which manufactured nails. Joining the Territorial Army, he was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant into the 48th Division and was promoted Lieutenant in April 1939. Reynolds is understood to have served in France with the B.E.F. and was evacuated with pneumonia in February 1940. Having recovered, he joined 102nd Bomb Disposal Section at Barton Stacey. It was to be with that unit and 101st Section that he won his George Cross, had the award been promulgated just a week later it would have been a 'pure' award. Nonetheless, his actions are worthy of the praise which was eventually showered down. Reynolds performed numerous acts of selfless bravery in the face of novel enemy bombs which had been dropped during wartime upon Bristol and its environs. His G.C. was to be presented from the hands of the Duke of Gloucester at Government House, Ganeshkind in July 1942. It was the first occasion that the G.C. had been presented in India.Reynolds was posted out to the Bomb Disposal Training Centre as Commandant at Kirkee in January 1941. Eventually advanced Major, he was released from the Army in June 1946, having been struck down with cerebral malaria in 1945.A lover of hill-climb sports cars, model railways and classical music, Reynolds returned to the fold of the family firm and married Margaret (Meg) in October 1949. The good Major died on 14 December 1955, with issue of one son, who continues to proudly represent the family at the various V.C. & G.C. Association gatherings. He is commemorated via a painting at Repton and upon the board at the Royal Engineers Museum, Chatham. Sold together with his T.A. John Mair was born on 16 October 1883 at Portknockie in Banff, Scotland. He joined the Royal Naval Reserve on 30 March 1915 and commenced his service aboard H.M.S. Helena, with whom he was later rated Skipper. She was a drifter built in 1906 that was requisitioned by the Royal Navy in 1915 after the outbreak of the Great War and served near Banff for the duration of the conflict. Mair served with her for a few years before joining H.M. Trawler W. Elliot, likely in early 1918, as Skipper. She was engaged in the Dover Patrol in the Strait of Dover, and was later sunk during an action with the enemy on the night of 14-15 February 1918. A number of U-boats had been sunk in the Channel due to the combined efforts of mines and a squadron of Royal Navy trawlers and drifters on patrol. The German Imperial Navy in response sent a flotilla of destroyers to the Channel to attack the Royal Navy ships. The large, wellequipped enemy destroyers launched an attack on the Dover Patrol, with the help of U-boats, early in the morning on 15 February. After a period of intense fire the Germans had sunk a total of nine Royal Navy vessels, amounting to seven drifters, a trawler, and a minesweeper. The enemy escaped to the North before they were able to be engaged by British forces. One of the Navy vessels that was lost that night was W. Elliot under the command of Mair. Seven members of the crew were killed during the action, and Mair himself was wounded before escaping the sinking vessel. After the conflict in which his ship was lost, Mair appears to have joined Adventure-Class scout cruiser H.M.S. Attentive III, who during the war was also involved in the Dover Patrol. After just a couple months of service he was invalided in to H.M.S. Pembroke, the shore base at Chatham, for hospital. It is unclear if this was a new injury or due to complications with the wound sustained in the action of February 1918. He was subsequently discharged five days later on 30 May 1918 as a result of his being invalided. His address given upon discharge was 12 Victoria Street, Portknockie.Mair survived his wound and later received an award of over £56 in naval prize money in December 1922, with a further supplementary award of over £7 in September 1923. Majestic'spicket boat in her mission to destroy submarine E15, and survived Majestic being torpedoed and sunk by the enemyDistinguished Service Medal, G.V.R. (1614.E.A. R. R. Patterson. E.R.A. R.N.R. H.M.S. Majestic.), one minor edge knock, very fineD.S.M. London Gazette 16 August 1915.Randal Rothwell Patterson was born on 31 July 1881 in Greenisland, Carrickfergus, in County Antrim. He went on to be educated at the Royal Belfast Academical Institution, King William's College on the Isle of Man, and at Queen's College Belfast.Patterson was a 21-year-old student when he attested at Belfast for the Imperial Yeomanry on 9 February 1901. He was quickly posted to South Africa, where he served as a Private in the 60th Company, 17th Battalion under number 26210. Patterson returned home on 19 November 1902 and was discharged at Gosport soon after upon the termination of his limited period of engagement on 25 November. After his Boer War service Patterson shifted his focus to the seas, completing apprenticeships with shipping companies and earning his chief engineer's certificate. He joined the Irish Lights in 1912 and served as Second Engineer aboard their steamer Alexandra. With the outbreak of the Great War, Patterson enrolled with the Royal Naval Reserve on 31 December 1914. His first posting was to H.M.S. Majestic, the lead ship of the Majestic-class, as an Engine Artificer on 25 January 1915. Soon afterwards, she was despatched to the Mediterranean to serve in the Dardanelles.Patterson received his D.S.M. for his participation in the mission to blow up H.M. Submarine E15, which had run aground by the Turkish Fort Dardanos and needed to be destroyed to keep from being salvaged by the enemy. Fire from the fort prevented larger ships from getting in a hit, and as such Majestic and Triumph sent picket boats on what was likely a suicide mission to strike E15 at a closer range. These two boats were manned by volunteers, despite there being 'very little expectation that those who ventured out on this exploit would ever return' (Deeds that Thrill the Empire, refers). The two picket boats sent off late on the night of 18 April and navigated several miles of narrow channel before being spotted and fired upon by the enemy. Majestic's picket boat, commanded by Lieutenant Claud Herbert Godwin, suffered damage from a Turkish gunner but was able to fire a torpedo and score a hit on the British submarine, albeit under the waterline. Triumph's picket boat rescued the men on board her sister ship, which was later sunk by the enemy. All crew members of the boats, including Patterson, received the D.S.M. for their gallant voluntary service. Majestic continued to serve in the Dardanelles and Patterson was reportedly on board when, on 27 May 1915 off the coast of Cape Helles, she was struck with a torpedo fired from U-21. It took her only nine minutes to capsize, sinking with the loss of 49 men. Patterson, gratefully, was not amongst them and survived this harrowing ordeal. After the sinking of Majestic Patterson was removed to the mine-sweeper H.M.S. Marigold on 25 July 1915. He then served on Dolphin from 10 October, being rated Chief Engine Room Artificer with her on 1 April 1916, later joining Titania in June. He was advanced Temporary Warrant Officer on 1 August 1917 while serving with Vivid, and his final posting was aboard Ajax from 14 January 1919. Patterson served in the R.N.R. through the remainder of the war until his demobilisation on 20 June 1919. Following his First World War naval service Patterson returned to the Irish Lights. He rejoined the Alexandra as Chief Engineer and worked in that capacity until his retirement in 1945. He later died at his home on Malahide Road in Dublin on 14 September 1952 and he was interred at Mount Jerome Cemetery in Dublin.Patterson is further entitled to a Queen's South Africa 1899-1902 Medal with clasps for Cape Colony, Orange Free State, Transvaal, South Africa 1901 and South Africa 1902, as well as a 1914-12 Star trio; sold together with copied research. 'I have the honour to draw your attention to the behaviour of my ship's company, or rather what was left of them. It was simply splendid. I can find no other word for it. When the ship had gone down, and we were all in the water, the men were singing, "Tipperary" and a hail of "Are we downhearted?" drew the usual reply from all hands. When they were not singing, they were cheering ... 'Commander Maurice Blackwood, D.S.O., R.N., late captain of the Qship Stonecrop, pays tribute to his gallant crew, among them C.P.O. Olding.A rare Great War 'Q Ship 1917' D.S.M. group of three awarded to Chief Petty Officer C. W. Olding, Royal Navy who was serving on H.M.S. Stonecrop when she engaged U-151 on 17 September 1917The next day in what became a famous chapter of Q-ship history, some of her crew subsequently survived their ordeal with U-43, after a week adrift in a hastily made raft, a story movingly recalled in the pages of Q Boat Encounters, by Harold Auten, V.C.Distinguished Service Medal, G.V.R. (179704. C.W. Olding, P.O.1cl. Atlantic Ocean. 17 Sept.1917.); 1914-15 Star (179704. C. Olding. P.O.1., R.N.); Victory Medal (179704 C. Olding. C.P.O. R.N.), light contract marks, very fine (3)D.S.M. London Gazette 17 November 1917, the original recommendation states: HMS Stonecrop (Q Ship) action with enemy submarine 17 September 1917. Went away as mate of ship in 'abandon ship' party and assisted Lieutenant Booth in a most able manner'. Charles William Olding was born at Titchfield, Hampshire on 5 September 1877, the son of Charles and Martha Olding. A gardener he joined the Royal Navy as a Boy 2nd Class on 30 April 1894. He had a succession of shore and sea-based appointments prior to the Great War, with promotions to Able Seaman in 1897, Leading Seaman in 1905 and P.O. 2nd class in 1907. Olding was stationed ashore until 5 August 1917. In Peril on the SeaHis next appointment as Chief Petty Officer was aboard the Q-ship Stonecrop, which commenced on 6 August 1917 and ended in heavy loss of life off Ireland on 18 September 1917 when Stonecrop was torpedoed by U-43. Originally the collier Glenfoyle, she was converted for service as a 'Q-Ship' in April 1917 and fitted with one visible 6-pounder gun capable of firing only in the aft direction (as was legitimate defence for a merchant ship) but also with a concealed 4inch gun, 12-pounder howitzers for projecting bombs, and torpedo tubes. Commanded by the 'sometimes fiery' Maurice Blackwood, D.S.O., R.N., Stonecrop had fought a classic Qship action against U-151 the previous day, when she obtained numerous hits on her adversary, an action described at length by Harold Auten in his Q Boat Adventures.On 17 September 1917, when some 300 miles south-west of Co. Kerry, she sighted a submarine (U-151) on the surface at 14000 yards distance. The submarine opened fire and Stonecrop turned away at her top speed of 7 knots, sending out S.O.S. signals. The submarine followed, overtaking and firing, but without making any direct hits. After half an hour of this, Stonecrop lighted her Smoke Apparatus, simulating a very realistic fire, and sent off her 'panic party'. The submarine then submerged but reappeared later and circled the ship at 600 yards. Stonecrop opened fire with her 4-inch gun, scoring several hits. The submarine then moved away, to sink stern-first. She surfaced again briefly before finally sinking. Her conning-tower hatch had not been opened and no wreckage appeared, just oil and scum, but Stonecrop's Captain was convinced that she had been sunk. The Admiralty awarded £1000 to be distributed amongst the crew. Auten likewise describes Stonecrop's final action just 24 hours later, in which she was torpedoed by the U-43. The resultant explosion demolished the bridge, wheelhouse and wireless office and instantly killed five ratings and, within a short space of time, Stonecrop slipped beneath the waves. The surviving crew took to two boats and a raft but because of the destruction of the wireless office it had not been possible to send out an S.O.S. message. Blackwood sent off one of the boats to summon help from land and his own boat, having become separated from the raft in heavy seas, was rescued by a passing steamer on 20 September. The fate of those who took to the raft - three officers and 20 ratings - was less fortunate. As each day passed, with no sign of any help, their numbers dwindled on account of the cold, exposure and lack of water, madness, too. Finally, nearly a week after the loss of the Stonecrop, just two surviving officers and eight ratings were rescued from the raft by a patrol boat. As Auten concludes: 'Out of a total complement of ninety-nine (11 officers and 88 men) that had manned the Stonecrop, four officers and forty men had lost their lives. Olding, one of the lucky ones, was shore based for the remainder of the war being shore pensioned on 10 March 1920 after an eventful period of active service. He died at Portsmouth in September 1933. London Gazette 6 April 1918. William Anderson was awarded the D.S.M. for exceptional merit in performance of his Patrol and Escort Duties aboard the H.M.S. Marmora. Marmora was a 'M'-class passenger ship launched in 1903 but was requisitioned by the Admiralty on the very first day of the First World War for use as an Armed Merchant Cruiser and was refitted with eight 4.7" guns. It is not known whether Anderson was with her on 23 July 1918 when she was struck by a torpedo from German U-boat UB 64, commanded by Otto von Schrader, and sunk off the southern coast of Ireland. There were ten casualties and the survivors were picked up by P67 and put ashore at Milford Haven. Anderson survived the Great War but died soon after of cardiovascular disease on 24 April 1924, at which time he was serving with H.M.S. Rowan. Upon his death his pension was claimed by his 'guardian' Miss Bella Anderson, who resided at 100 Lamb Street, Liverpool, and his medals were claimed by his son. Thomas, Royal Naval Reserve, who was commended in 1917 and earned further laurels serving aboard the drifter Supernal which attempted to protect the monitors Raglan and M28 by laying a smokescreen during the sortie of the German warships Goeben and Breslau in January 1918Distinguished Service Medal, G.V.R. (DA.4484. W. Thomas. 2nd Hd. R.N.R. H.M.S. Supernal. Dardnelles. 20 Jan 1918.), name, number and rank officially corrected, light contact marks, very fineD.S.M. London Gazette 13 September 1918, the original citation states: 'For services in action with "Goeben" and "Breslau" in January 1918'William Thomas was born at Cullen, Scotland on 7 June 1887, the son of Edwin and Anne Thomas. Enrolling with the Royal Naval Reserve on 1 March 1915, he was first posted to Mary Reed before going ashore at H.M.S. Dreel Castle, the auxiliary patrol base at Falmouth, in late 1916. Commended for his services aboard the armed trawler King Arthur in 1917, Thomas transferred to Osiris II the depot ships based at Mudros. He was serving with the Drifter Supernal on 20 January 1918, the day German and Ottoman authorities had decided that the Goeben and Breslau would sortie from Istanbul. They had been transferred to the Turkish navy by this point having been blockaded in the port since 1914. Their intention was to raid elements of the British Aegean Squadron sheltering in Imbros harbour and with the only British Battleship in the area the aging Agamemnon which was far too slow to overhaul the raiders there was little to stop them. The British destroyers present were unable to line up properly on the enemy battleship and the raiders soon zeroed in on the vulnerable monitors Raglan and M28 sheltering in a cove. The Skipper of H.M.D. Supernal was awarded the D.S.C. in the same Gazette edition as Thomas, his citation provides greater detail on the actions of the Drifters stating: 'Skpr. Benjamin George Reynolds, R.N.R., 2114 S.A., H.M. Drifter "Supernal." Remained on patrol in their drifters during the action and made smoke screen in a gallant endeavour to screen H.M. Monitors "Raglan" and "M28," showing great presence of mind and initiative. Both vessels were invaluable in rescuing survivors. Unfortunately, the valiant efforts of Supernal and the other drifter Anchor of Hope II were to no avail and the warships pounded both monitors until they were sinking. Seeing that they had caused enough damage the raiders began to withdraw but the Breslau, renamed Midilli for Ottoman service, hit a mine and began to sink. Goeben (Yavûz Sultân Selîm) went to her rescue but also hit a mine and was forced to withdraw and ran aground whilst under attack by Allied aircraft. In spite of their initial success the raiders had ended up losing one cruiser and severely damaging a battleship, greatly reducing the threat to the Allied shipping in the Mediterranean for some time. Thomas was transferred to the books of Valhalla II, a tender to Osiris II, on 1 August 1918, he remained in the area until the end of the war. Finally transferred to Europa II in February 1919 Thomas was demobilised on 12 June 1919; sold together with copied service papers. Subject to 20% VAT on Buyer's Premium. Impregnable, being advanced to Boy First Class with Ganges the next year. Kennett was later promoted Ordinary Seaman whilst aboard Repulse with whom he was also made Able Seaman. He was with Diadem when he was advanced Leading Seamen in July 1906 and then Petty Officer Second Class the following October. His promotion to Petty Officer First Class came in September 1907 with Wildfire.Kennett joined the newly launched "R"-class destroyer H.M.S. Skilful on 1 April 1917, and with her was advanced Acting Chief Petty Officer and a short time afterwards Chief Petty Officer. Skilful was a member of the Harwich Field Force, and it was for Kennett's services in that capacity for which he was awarded his D.S.M. on 27 March 1919. The publication The Navy Day by Day stated that this E-Boat was sunk however this is not the case. Sheldrake saw further action in the North Sea in March 1943 and May 1944. She was sold out of the Royal Navy in 1946.In addition to the D.S.M. awarded to Bond, a further two M.I.D.s were gazetted on 1 January 1941 to a Petty Officer A. E. Jackson and a Lieutenant H. W. M. Submarines.'The original recommendation states: He has displayed good qualities of leadership and efficiency. He is unsparing to himself and has ability and knowledge superior to his position, as Chief Stoker in H.M.S. Taku, which he is always ready to use for the good of the ship and the Navy. He has carried out patrols in Taku both in the Mediterranean and Norwegian waters during which period five merchant vessels were sunk, one possibly sunk and several large caiques sunk or damaged by gunfire. During these actions, Stoker Petty Officer Shorrocks always displayed courage and devotion to duty of the highest order.'Ronald Goulden Shorrocks was born at Oldham, Lancashire, on 24 February 1913 and entered the Royal Navy as a Stoker Second Class on 29 November 1932. Promoted Stoker First Class on 29 October 1933, on 7 September 1935 he was posted to H.M.S. Dolphin; the Submarine training base at Gosport. On 14 December 1938, he was posted to Submarine H.M.S. H43 as Leading Stoker. Back at H.M.S. Dolphin on 8 May 1939, his next service afloat was with H.M.S. Umpire from March 1941. By now a Stoker Petty Officer, on 19 July 1941 H.M.S. Umpire was sunk when it collided with an armed escort trawler. Of a crew of 31, 22 were killed and since Shorrocks' service record shows his next posting as 20 July 1941, there is no reason to believe he was not one of the 9 survivors. Between 22 October 1941 and 7 May 1944, Shorrocks served aboard Taku (N38), a T-Class submarine with a complement of 59. Arriving in Gibraltar in March 1942, Taku commenced her 14th War patrol (Shorrocks' first with this submarine) on 2 April. During the next two years, in both the Mediterranean and off the coast of Norway, Taku would have a fair amount of success in sinking enemy shipping. This would include the Italian tanker Delfin, the Greek sailing vessels Niki, Lora and a small vessel which was unidentified. She also attacked, but failed to hit the German merchant ship Menes and the Italian tanker Cerere. Reassigned to operate off the Scandinavian coast in 1944, Taku sank the German merchantmen Rheinhausen and Hans Bornhofen, and badly damaged the German freighter Harm Fritzen. In March 1944, she attacked a convoy, but missed her target, the ex-Norwegian Kriegsmarine transport Moshill. On 13 April 1944, during her 25 War patrol, a mine exploded close to Taku, resulting in her to abort her patrol and return to base. This would be the last patrol Shorrocks took part with in this submarine. However for his service aboard her, he would be awarded the D.S.M.On 8 May 1944, Shorrocks joined Trident, serving with this submarine for four months. He served aboard Aurochs from 4 April 1945 and was appointed Chief Stoker Petty Officer two weeks later. Shorrocks was discharged to the reserve on 17 May 1945 and died in Weymouth in 1976; sold togther with a H.M. S/M. cap tally and a Blazer badge. 'Charles Henry Cobb was born at Portsmouth on 28 August 1915, the son of Henry George and Alice Elizabeth Cobb. He married Ella Miller in January 1938 and had 8 children. In the 1939 census he is recorded as a shipyard labourer at Portsmouth Dockyard before enlisting in the Royal Navy as an Ordinary Seaman on 3 February 1941. Sent to Collingwood and Victory for his initial training he was posted to Quebec on 1 August 1941. The navy base, H.M.S. Quebec, was part of the No. 1 Combined Training Centre. Following additional training he was posted to Dinosaur from 1 April 1942-30 April 1943 and then Hamilcar which was a shore base for Combined Operations and Landing in Algeria on 1 May 1943 until 30 September 1943, serving on Landing Craft Tanks, 35, 131 and later 394. He was next posted to Landing Craft Infantry (Large) 102 as its Coxswain on 17 February 1943-20 September 1944 subsequently taking part in Operation Avalanche - Salerno , Operation Shingle -Anzio & Operation Brassard - Elba. The main assault on Elba in June 1944 was carried out by French troops, with the support of R.N. Commandos, and assorted ships and landing craft manned by the R.N. and U.S.N. - among the latter a P.T. Boat commanded by the film star, Douglas Fairbanks, Jnr., who was awarded the French Croix de Guerre. In terms of the D-Day landings in Normandy, which had taken place 10 days earlier, the operation may well have been classed as a 'little sideshow', but in terms of enemy opposition and resultant gallantry it was anything but little - in fact "Operation Brassard" proved to be an extremely costly enterprise, the R.N. Commandos alone suffering losses of 38 killed. As confirmed by Rear-Admiral Troubridge's postoperational report, Allied intelligence had grossly underestimated Elba's defences - rather than 'under 800 Germans, preponderantly Poles and Czechs of low morale and all set for evacuation', the Allied assault was met by a force of '2,600 Germans who fought extremely well', while the local defences were formidable in the extreme, for 'they had excavated caves in the granite cliffs flanking the beaches and installed 155mm., 88mm. and machine-guns in them'. Added to which, 'behind the beaches, exactly ranged on the likely places of disembarkation, were heavy mortars. Because of the shallow waters large naval and transport ships could not be used. The only naval gunfire support would be provided by landing craft, Aphis and Cockchafer. Shore discharged on 24 January 1946. He led a raid against the enemy with great courage and determination. He set a splendid example to his men. Douglas Patrick Hadow was born at St. Chad, Lichfield, Staffordshire on 28 Feb 1898. He was educated at St. Paul's School, London between 1911-13 and served in their O.T.C. for two years. He then studied at Northampton Polytechnic Engineering School between 1913-14 and then served with the University of London O.T.C. for a period of six months during 1915. He was commissioned on 27 April 1916 and made Second Lieutenant with the Northumberland Fusiliers (London Gazette 8 March 1916). He entered the war in France on 16 April 1916 and was awarded his Military Cross for an action at Serre on 14 October 1916. Serre was a strategic point during the Battle of the Somme, positioned North of Beaumont Hamel it was just a small village and had already defied three murderous assaults by the French in June 1915 and it was known that the Germans had made good use of the landscape and the buildings to turn the area into what they hoped was an impregnable fortress. The German soldiers within the village were from the 169th Regiment (8th Baden) and had been familiarising themselves with the area for well over a year. The French assaults in June 1915 had knocked them off the ridge opposite and given the French (and now the British) their current front line, but the French had paid dearly for their meagre gain. Hadow transferred to the Royal Flying Corps on 12 March 1917 and entered the war for the second time again in France on 16 July 1917, joining No. 42 Squadron on the 18 July 1917 where he flew as an Observer on RE8 aircraft. Hadow was permitted to wear the Observer's badge from 8 September 1917 and amassed over 108 hours by the end of March 1918. Hadow then went to No. 1 School of Aviation and was permitted to wear his wings on 23 November 1918. He was transferred to No. 61 Squadron and served in Cologne with the R.A.F. Search Unit. Hadow gained an A1 Instructor's Ticket at the Central Flying School, Upavon and was to be an Instructor at No. 2 F.T.S. at both Digby and Duxford. However on 31 July 1925 he was arraigned for trial by General Court Martial at Digby, Lincolnshire on the following charges: Four charges under Section 16 of the Air Force Act of "behaving in a scandalous manner unbecoming the character of an officer and a gentlemen (sic)", viz. issuing cheques in payment of debts well knowing that he had not sufficient funds at the Bank to meet the cheques. Four charges (alternative) under Section 40 of the Air Force Act of "conduct to the prejudice of good order and Air Force discipline", viz. issuing cheques in payment of debts having no reasonable grounds for believing that the cheques would be honoured when presented at the Bank. He pleaded not guilty to all charges but was found guilty of one of the charges of "behaving in a scandalous manner"; two of the charges of "conduct to the prejudice of good order and Air Force discipline; but not guilty of the remaining five charges; and was sentenced to be cashiered. The finding and sentence was confirmed by His Majesty The King on the 11 September 1925 who was pleased to commute the sentence of cashiering to one of dismissal. The sentence was promulgated at Digby, Lincolnshire, on 21 September 1925, and announced in the London Gazette dated 6 October 1925. He was deprived of his rank but was allowed to keep his medals. Hadow then emigrated to Australia and continued flying becoming an Instructor with the Mount Gambier Aero Club, South Australia, and a Pilot with the Commercial Aviation Company, Eyres Peninsula Airways of South Australia and Goldfields' Air Navigation Company of Kalgoorlie, South Austalia. With the outbreak of the Second World War he enlisted into the Royal Australian Air Force (290355) on 16 October 1939 as a Pilot Officer, becoming a Temporary Flying Officer on 17 December 1939 and acting as a Graded Flying Instructor and was promoted to Temporary Flight Lieutenant on 1 April 1943. He spent his wartime service wholly based in Australia predominantly in Melbourne, however his behaviour with other serving airmen and women was questioned and brought to the attention of the authorities. He was discharged on 4 December 1944 as a result of being permanently medically unfit. Hadow died on 17 August 1948 at Muchea, Chittering Shire, Western Australia and was buried in the Karrakatta Cemetery and Crematorium, Karrakatta, Nedlands City, Western Australia. London Gazette 8 February 1917.Guy Newcombe Bignell was born at Mozufferpore, India on 3 December 1886 and was the fifth son of Mr R. Bignell. He was educated in England at Haileybury School, where he played for the school cricket team. In the summer following his final year at Haileybury, Bignell made two appearances in first-class cricket for Hampshire in the 1904 County Championship against Warwickshire and Somerset during the Bournemouth Cricket Week. After leaving school he proceeded to the Royal Military College in December 1904. The following summer, he made five appearances for Hampshire in the County Championship, scoring what would be his only first-class century against Kent at Portsmouth. In 1905, he also played for the Gentlemen of the South, captained by W. G. Grace, against the Players of the South. Bignell graduated from the RMC in January 1906, as a Second Lieutenant onto the unattached list of the British Indian Army. He became attached to the British Indian Army with the 29th Punjabis in March 1907, with promotion to Lieutenant following in April 1908. Bignell returned to England in 1908, where he made eleven first-class appearances for Hampshire, he also played for a Hambledon XII in 1908, in a commemorative first-class match against an England XI at Broadhalfpenny Down. His next appearances in first-class cricket for Hampshire followed in 1912, with him making 21 appearances, in which he scored 428 runs at an average of 17.12.Bignell served during the First World War with his regiment in East Africa from 1 September 1914 to 31 October 1916, during the course of which he was promoted to Captain in January 1915. He was mentioned in dispatches London Gazette 8 February 1917 and was awarded the Military Cross London Gazette 13 February 1917 for conspicuous gallantry whilst carrying messages under heavy enemy fire, and spent the latter part of the war serving in the Sinai and Palestine campaign from 5 April to 31 October 1918, shortly before the war ended. Following the war, Bignell returned to play first-class cricket for Hampshire, making eleven appearances in the 1919 County Championship; he played during this season under the pseudonym "G. Newcombe". Returning to Palestine, he was appointed Brigade Major of the 30th Infantry Brigade from 25 June 1920 to 29 April 1921 and the 29th Infantry Brigade from 6 May 1921 to 4 September 1922. He was promoted Major in January 1921. He continued to serve with the 29th Punjabis until 30 April 1922, and by April 1923 he was serving with the 3rd Battalion, 2nd Punjab Regiment. His next appearance in first-class cricket came whilst serving in India, with Bignell making a single appearance for the Europeans cricket team against the Hindus at Lahore in the 1923-24 Lahore Tournament. He returned to play four matches for Hampshire in the 1925 County Championship, bringing his total number of first-class appearances for the county to 55. In these, he scored 1,582 runs at an average of 20.54; alongside his lone century, he also made eight half centuries. With his right-arm medium pace bowling, he took 17 wickets at a bowling average of 42.47, with best figures of 3 for 67. Outside of the first-class game, he was a notable club cricketer for the Hampshire Hogs, Free Foresters, and the Marylebone Cricket Club. Bignell continued to serve with the British Indian Army, being appointed second-in-command of the 10th Battalion, 15th Punjab Regiment in October 1930. In December 1931, Bignell was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel and commandant of the 10th Battalion, 15th Punjab Regiment. He held this post until he retired from active service in December 1935. During the Second World War, he was first involved with the Civil Defence Corps from 1940 to 1942 and then was employed with the Ministry of Fuel and Power in 1942. 'No words can adequately describe the appalling misery of that scene. Here were men who had suffered and fought the long months of the siege, although they were gradually starved and were not fit to do a day's march, yet they were being driven across the pitiless waste under a scorching sun, herded along by a brutal and callous escort of Arab conscripts. Limping and staggering along they all finally arrived, some of them being assisted along by comrades, who themselves were in dire need of assistance'. A fellow P.O.W. describing the terrible conditions on the march from Kut, taken from The British Army In Mesopotamia, 1914-1918 by Paul KnightThe Battle of Ctesiphon 1915 D.C.M. group of three awarded to Gunner A. Sylvester, Royal Field Artillery, who earned his award and was further 'mentioned' for gallantry, was wounded in action at the Siege of Kut and taken Prisoner of War, he died likely during the horrific march from Kut, the deplorable conditions of which are noted in the excerpt above Distinguished Conduct Medal, G.V.R. (60922 Gnr: A. Sylvester. 6/A.C. R.F.A.); 1914-15 Star (60922 Gnr: A. Sylvester. R.F.A.); Victory Medal 1914-19 (60922 Gnr. A. Sylvester. R.A.), very fine (3)D.C.M. London Gazette 12 December 1917.M.I.D. London Gazette 13 July 1916. Abner Sylvester was born on 1 August 1892 in Brownhills, Staffordshire, one of six children of Abner Sylvester and his wife Helen. The elder Sylvester was a Lance Corporal in the 21st Royal Scots Fusiliers and had seen service in South Africa. The younger Sylvester lived with his family at Rotherham, Yorkshire where he worked as a miner prior to enlisting with the Royal Field Artillery on 12 January 1910, at the age of eighteen. First serving at home, a few months after the start of the First World War Sylvester was disembarked at the Asiatic Front on 17 November 1914 as part of the Expeditionary Force in Mesopotamia. The British advance to capture Baghdad came to a standstill with the four-day battle of Ctesiphon in November 1915. Here the British, under Major-General Sir Charles Townshend, were vastly outnumbered by Ottoman forces, suffering a major setback and sustaining heavy losses. Lieutenant Henry Gallup of the Royal Field Artillery provides an account of the unit's experience during the battle: 'After several hours' fighting the enemy's chief position was carried and occupied by our troops, and we then turned our attention to their left flank, where our people were not getting on well at all, and were in fact retiring. It was about 3 o'clock in the afternoon that the Turks counter-attacked so strongly. We found afterwards that they had been re-inforced with about 5,000 fresh troops. The 82nd Battery and ourselves were sent forward to try and stop it. I think we managed to do so, for a time anyhow, but it was a very warm time. They then attacked from another quarter and drove our infantry in and we had to limber up and get out as quickly as we could under a most beastly hot fire'.It was in this action that Sylvester earned his D.C.M. 'for gallant conduct and devotion to duty' on 22 November 1915, though the citation did not appear in the London Gazette until two years later in December 1917. The specific citations were unfortunately all lost the following month at the Siege of Kut, but Sylvester's family reportedly believed that the award was earned for swimming across the Tigris River with a life line. His men exhausted and resources depleted following Ctesiphon, Townshend decided to fall back to the base at Kut-al-Amara and await relief. However, leader of the Ottoman forces Lieutenant-General Nureddin Pasha pursued the British to Kut upon learning of their retreat. Pasha's Army besieged the garrison for months, with the British supplies dwindling from February. No. 30 Squadron of the Royal Flying Corps launched the first air supply in history to drop much needed food and ammunition but, even so, disease was rampant and the starving Allied forces ate horse meat to survive.During the Siege, Sylvester reportedly suffered a serious gunshot wound whilst in action on 24 December 1915. Whilst there are no details of his wound, and Sylvester was nonetheless soon back in the field of action as he was Mentioned in Despatches on 17 January for gallant conduct. Records also note that he was dangerously wounded on 24 February, though this may be in reference to his gunshot wound from December and rather reflects the date on which the War Office was notified. Townshend was finally forced to surrender to the Ottomans on 29 April 1916, with the disastrous Siege of Kut being recognised as one of the worst defeats suffered by the Allied forces in the First World War. Sylvester, along with the remainder of the garrison - some 13,000 Allied soldiers - were taken prisoner of war. What followed was a gruelling forced 'death march' to Turkish prison camps, with the prisoners being badly mistreated and whipped by Ottoman troops along the route. The Birmingham Daily Mail described the arduous journey: A correspondent of the "Times" gives particulars of the suffering of private soldiers, British and Indian, who surrendered at Kut last spring. He says they have been driven from Lower Mesopotamia to Anatolia (Western Asia Minor), a distance of nearly 1,000 miles, in straggling detachments. A large batch of them arrived at Konia late in 1916 in a terrible plight. Hunger and destitution have taught the men to what a low level life may sink in Turkey. Their guards have been cruel, and they have suffered countless humiliations. This, coupled with the eyewitness description from another P.O.W. provided in the title, give some indication of the appalling conditions British and Indian soldiers were forced to endure. Sylvester was ultimately reported as having died between 29 April 1916 and 31 December 1916, and the family believed his death to have occurred during the march. This is entirely likely, especially given that Sylvester had already been wounded during at Kut. A third of the 13,000 Allied forces taken prisoner ahead of the march did not live to see liberation. The young Sylvester must have been much missed; upon hearing that his son was taken prisoner of war, his father had sent numerous letters to the authorities to ascertain his whereabouts. The younger Abner Sylvester's medals and effects were sent to his father at 65 Kelvin Street, Dalton Brook, Rotherham, Yorkshire after his death. Sylvester is commemorated on the Basra Memorial in Iraq, and his name engraved on the memorial to the fallen in St Peter's Church in Thrybergh, Rotherham. Easton, 41st Divisional Signal Company, Royal Engineers, who manned a Lewis Gun in an effective and destructive manner, pausing only to replenish the ammunitionDistinguished Conduct Medal, G.V.R. (93882 Sapr J. Easton. 41/D.S. Coy R.E.), polished and with contact marks, nearly very fineD.C.M. London Gazette 3 September 1918, the original citation states: For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When the enemy attacked in force he volunteered to man the only Lewis gun still in action, and maintained an effective and destructive fire on the enemy masses until they almost overwhelmed him. He withdrew only when his ammunition was expended and the enemy were in the trench he was defending. He retired to a new position and having replenished his ammunition, came into action again with great advantage, until his gun was put out of action the next morning. His fearless courage throughout was remarkable and a fine example to all ranks. James Park Easton was born at Govan, Lanark, in 1895 and was a wheelwright when he enlisted into the Army Service Corps (T4/043865) at Glasgow on 14 January 1915 and saw service with the 41st Divisional Train. He is noted as deserting at Frensham, Surrey, on 30 June 1915 and returned immediately to Glasgow and this time he enlisted into the Royal Engineers on 1 July 1915. His misdemeanour not yet uncovered he entered the war as part of the British Expeditionary Force on 1 May 1916, however whilst walking along the Nieppe-Steenwerch road, the Captain of the 41st Divisional Train A.S.C. J. B. Wheater spotted and recognised him and when questioned Easton confirmed his name and admitted that he was a deserter, his service papers note the following: Fraudlently enlisted into the R.E. whilst in a state of desertion from the A.S.C. held to serve in the R.E. trial dispensed with to suffer same forfeitures & deductions as if he had been convicted by D.C.M. Authy G.O.C. 41st Divn B.E.F.All prior services forfeited on trial by D.C.M. dispensed with Easton however remained in France and eventually returned to the U.K. for leave between 20-30 July 1917. He went to the 138 Field Ambulance between 21-28 May 1918. Easton had a further spell of leave between 24 August-7 September 1918 but on returning to France was admitted to the 3rd Canada General Hospital on 24 September 1918 with the effects of heart strain. However he remained in France returning home on 19 November 1918. He transferred to Army Reserve on demobilization on 20 February 1919 at Chatham, Kent. His Medal Index Card has both regiments with relevant service numbers listed, it additionally states 'Deserted service counts from 28.7.16' this is however crossed out but further note states the medals are restored. A 'Liverpool Pals' Battle of Scherpenberg Great War D.C.M. awarded to Corporal/Lance Sergeant A. R. Russell, Liverpool Regiment, who won his award for taking out a machine gun position and who later died of wounds on 8 May 1918Distinguished Conduct Medal, G.V.R. (57984 Cpl - Sjt. - A. R. Russell. 17/L:Pool. R.), small correction to rank, otherwise good very fineD.C.M. London Gazette 3 September 1918, the original citation states: For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during long operations. On one occasion, when the battalion counter-attacked he went forward alone, put out of action an enemy machine gun, which was holding up the advance, and then led his men forward. His determined courage and coolness set a splendid example to all near him. 'Albert Roland Russell enlisted at London, having previously been part of 324 London Divisional Cyclist Company. He died of wounds on 8 May 1918 and is commemorated on the Tyne Cot Memorial. Russell is entitled to a British War and Victory Medal pair, and his Medal Index Card erroneously has him as 'Arthur' R. Russell. The Battle of the Scherpenberg, 29th April'We left the 17th, 18th and 19th Battalions of the King's Regiment back in their camps on the night of the 26th of April. On the morning of the 27th the G.O.C., 21st Division, visited Headquarters, 89th Brigade, and gave verbal instructions for the relief of the 39th Composite Brigade, then in the line about Voormezeele. During the afternoon the C.O.s and O.C.s, Companies, reconnoitred the line and at night battalions moved up to relieve the 39th Composite Brigade. The relief was completed early on the morning of the 28th. The 18th King's went into the line on the right and the 19th on the left. The 18th took over a line running roughly from Elzenwalle to Ridge Wood: this line was between Voormezeele and Dickebusch Lake. The 19th King's, on the left of the 18th, were apparently between Voormezeele and Kruisstraat-hoek. The 17th Battalion, as far as can be gathered from the diary of Brigade Headquarters, went into the line Convent Lane to Voormezeele defences, i.e. on the left of the 19th Battalion. On the left of the 17th other troops held the line from Convent Lane to Lock 8, Ypres-Comines Canal. During the 28th local fighting took place in the neighbourhood of Voormezeele. At about I p.m. the troops on the left of the 89th Brigade front, i.e. from Convent Lane to Lock 8, were violently attacked and the enemy penetrated the line. For five hours there was a desperate struggle between the enemy and the left of the 17th King's, and the C.O. of the latter ordered his reserve company to make a counter-attack at 7.45 p.m. to restore the situation. But ten minutes before the attack was due, the enemy put down a very heavy barrage and the counter-attack was unable to proceed. This bombardment lasted until 10.30 p.m. and, all hope of making the counterattack having been abandoned, the 17th King's formed a defensive flank on their left. Neither the 18th nor 19th King's were attacked during the 28th, and both battalions were able to turn their attention to the improvement of the defences. Just after 3 a.m. on the 29th a bombardment of exceptional intensity and violence was opened by the enemy, and two hours later a series of strong attacks were launched against the French and British positions from west of Dranoutre to Voormezeele. The narrative of the 17th King's of this attack is brief: their line was forced back to G.H.Q. where "I reorganised and held on to the position". The gallant Third and Fifth Armies had fought a greatly superior enemy to a standstill, so on the Lys in April the First and Second Armies had entirely broken the power of the German advance. In the Lys battles it is well to remember that, of the total twentyfive British divisions employed against forty-two German divisions, seventeen had already taken a prominent part in the Somme operations and were battle-worn and weak in numbers, whereas the enemy's divisions were composed of fresh troops. Never, indeed, had the British soldier fought more grandly than on the Somme in March and on the Lys in April, 1918. The Great War D.C.M. to Serjeant J. T. Curley, Lancashire Fusiliers, who was taken Prisoner of War by the Germans at the Battle of Arras in May 1917Distinguished Conduct Medal, G.V.R. (2872 Sjt: J. T. Curley. 2/Lanc: Fus:), light contact marks, good very fineD.C.M. London Gazette 6 July 1917, the original citation states:'For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. He has performed consistent good work throughout and has at all times set a magnificent example to his men. John Thomas Curley was born on 1 March 1895 in Bolton, Lancashire as the oldest of seven children to Thomas Curley, a tobacco pipe maker, and his wife Margaret. By 1901 the growing family had relocated to Gateshead in Durham, but returned to Bolton by 1911 at which time the sixteen-year-old Curley was working as a cotton piercer. Prior to the outbreak of the Great War, Curley enlisted with the Lancashire Fusiliers on 24 November 1913. He later disembarked at the Western Theatre with his Regiment on 22 August 1914, qualifying for the 1914 Star. Curley appears on the admission books for the 18th General Hospital at Etaples, France for the period 1915-16, but it is unknown for what reason he was admitted there or for how long he stayed. Just months before being gazetted for his award of the D.C.M., Curley was with 'C' Company when he was taken prisoner of war by the Germans at Arras, France on 3 May 1917, reportedly unwounded. He seems to have been first imprisoned at the Denain P.O.W. camp before being moved to the Friedrichsfeld camp. While the date of Curley's release is not known, it is likely that he was held there for the remainder of the War, after which time he was repatriated to England. He was certainly back in England by July 1919, when Curley was married to Mary Ann Carter in Bolton. The couple was to welcome a son Thomas in July 1921 and another son Robert in June 1926, both born at Bolton. Curley was discharged on 11 November 1919 being no longer physically fit for duty, possibly owing to his time as a prisoner of war, and was issued with Silver War Badge no. 341895. The 1939 Register reveals the Curley family to be living at 55 Langshaw Road in Bolton, with the 44-year-old head of the family working as a heavy explosive munition's worker. Curley later died at Salford, Lancashire on 2 December 1869, with his widow Mary Ann claiming his pension. Norman, Royal Ulster Rifles, who, while a Company Signaller, was seriously wounded during an enemy counter-attack but refused treatment and repaired his damaged wireless set maintained communications, being wounded again in the processDistinguished Conduct Medal, G.VI.R. (7018331 Rfmn. F,G. Norman. R.U.Rif.); 1939-45 Star; Africa Star; Italy Star; Defence and War Medals 1939-45, recently mounted court style for wear, very fine and scarce to the Regiment (6)Provenance: J.B. Hayward, March 1971. Spink, April 2009. D.C.M. London Gazette 20 June 1944, the original recommendation states: 'Rifleman Norman was Signal Operator with "D" Coy who occupied positions North of Lorenzo during 18-26 Jan 44. On 24 Jan 44, the Coy was subjected to very heavy mortar and arty fire followed by a strong enemy attack. During the early part of the enemy bombardment the Coy Comd, CSM and one signaller were wounded and another man of Coy HQ killed in close proximity to Rifleman Norman. He himself was severely wounded in the arm and leg and his wireless set put out of action by shell splinters. At once he realised the vital need of maintaining the only means of communication with Bn HQ and crawled from one slit trench to another to get another set. He found this set also out of action from shell fire but crawled back with it, still under heavy fire and calmly stripped both sets until he had made the necessary repairs to get one set in working order again and re-establish communications. During the greater part of this time he was working alone, his arm severely damaged and giving him great pain, the other members of Coy HQ dead or wounded around him but he refused to allow his own wounds to be attended to until he had re-established communication. By his coolness, magnificent courage and complete disregard of personal safety he regained touch with Bn HQ and then calmly passed information of the situation thereby enabling the Bn Comd to take the necessary measures to deal with it. Finally, he was relieved at Coy HQ but on return to Bn HQ seeing there was a shortage of signallers he insisted on remaining at duty there and was again wounded when Bn HQ came under heavy shell and mortar fire. I consider his devotion to duty and gallantry under fire of the very highest order. 'The original recommendation for Norman's D.C.M. gives his name as '7018331 Rifleman Frederick Norman, 1st London Irish Rifles'. The typed 'Frederick' has had a line put through it and 'Eric John' been added in ink. The medal has been named as to Frederick George, as the award itself appears in the London Gazette.Eric John Norman was born in 1910 in Willesden, Middlesex, the son of Harry Wilkins and Alice Louise Norman of Normanhurst, Harlesden Road, London and saw service with the 1st Battalion, London Irish Rifles. With the outbreak of the Second World War, Norman who became a member of the Territorial Army, may well have been present at the Battle of Graveney Marsh in September 1940 which was the last ground combat between a foreign invading force and British troops that happened on British mainland soil when a Company of the 1st Battalion engaged some Luftwaffe men who put up a fight around their crash landed bomber. They went on to serve in Iraq and Italy in 1942, with the 1st Battalion forming part of the 168th Infantry Brigade, primarily within the 56th London Infantry Division, taking part in major actions in Italy at Fosso Bottacetto south of Catania, Monte Camino, Monte Damiano, the Garagliano Crossing, and Aprilia (Anzio). During the Garagliano Crossing the plan for the operation, in the middle of January 1944, was for the 46th Division to attack on the right and capture high ground beyond the river; the 5th Division, which had been transferred from the Adriatic front, was to move on the left; and in the centre, 167 and 169 Brigades were to cross through 168 Brigade, which was to follow them over. On the 46th Division sector the hills rose straight from the river; on the other two sections there was a plain between one thousand and three thousand yards deep before the ground rose sharply. This plain extended for about ten thousand yards from the sea on the west. The German plan, as was learned later, was to hold the low ground comparatively lightly, sow it extensively with deeply buried box mines which consisted of little except wood and explosive, thus giving hardly any response to mine detectors and to hold positions on the high ground behind. From there they could observe the projected crossing places along the river below. Dominated as it was by enemy held mountains and foothills in the background, the plain was barely wide enough to concentrate a large force. In fact no such force was available for the operation. It had been devised by High Command to coincide with the landings on the beaches at Anzio, which were intended to draw troops away from other fronts in Italy. The assault began at 2100 hours on January 18 under the terrible firepower of five hundred guns of all calibres. Under cover of a smoke screen and with covering fire by men of the London Irish and other supporting troops, the Queen's Brigade and 167 Brigade swept across, some of the latter in assault boats manned by men of the battalion. As the British troops neared the opposite bank, German eighty eight's spat viciously overhead or in the river. On the south bank mortars kept up a bombardment in close support; the three inch mortar platoon of the London Irish, under Lieutenant DA Hardy, alone fired over six hundred rounds in less than sixty minutes. The river was fifty to one hundred yards wide, and was running .strongly and fast, owing to the winter rains. It was far too swift on the right, where the banks were precipitous, so that the 46th Division was unable to land. The crossings by the 56th (London) Division and the 5th Division, farther down the river, went according to plan. By dawn on the 19th, a bridgehead had been forced, including the small town of San Lorenzo which guarded the approaches to Castelforte and the valley beyond. On the evening of that day, German reaction developed and the London Irish were suddenly sent across to help make 167 Brigade's landing secure, to occupy San Lorenzo, and to prepare to attack Castelforte at once. Rising above the river in front of the 56th Division was Monte Damiano, with lower spurs running south and east. In the heart of the hills north east of Damiano, was the small town of Castelforte, which was connected to the valley below by two nearly parallel roads. In the valley was a third road along the lower edge of the mountain. Where the roads from Castelforte met this road stood San Lorenzo. The Commanding Officer and his "O" Group, crossing ahead of the battalion established themselves in a farmhouse about a thousand yards from the banks and roughly midway between the river and Monte Damiano. The house was well observed by the Germans, and consequently it was heavily shelled. Several direct hits were made, but it had thick stone walls and suffered surprisingly little damage.Battalion headquarters of the Oxford and Bucks was housed there also, and there was a certain amount of confusion with two staffs in conference at the same time, and with dispatch riders and runners coming and going. There was an animated scene which added to the chaos when an officer discovered he had lost his only pair of blue silk pyjamas and suspected he had been robbed. A search of the building was made, and even the kit of other ranks was examined, but the garment was never found and the officer had to sleep in his pants until such time as he managed to acquire another pair. The main body of the battalion crossed the river and harboured in various farms near the river, waiting for orders to attack Castelforte. They came under shell and mortar fire, and Major H Lofting, commanding 'B' Company, was wounded. Captain

Samuel Parnham was born in 1894 and enlisted into the Sherwood Foresters on 13 February 1911. He entered the war in France on 4 November 1914 serving with the 1st Battalion and soon after appeared on the list of No. 2 Stationary Hospital. Boulogne, dated 30 November 1914, as having 'Frost bite feet'. Despite this he continued to serve and was later awarded the Military Medal for service in France (London Gazette 20 October 1918) with 'C' Company, 5th Battalion, for the raid on an enemy Machine Gun situated at a farm house on the Rue de Bois on the 18-19 June 1918 in the Le Touret-Essars sector. The Report gives more detail: 2/Lieut Moore and 25 other ranks advanced along Light Railway, and found 6 enemy in the trench running alongside of railway. Three of these were shot and killed in the trench, one bayonetted and two attempted to run towards the orchard. These were both killed. An Officer with knapsack also attempted to run from the post, he was shot and dropped his pack and greatcoat. He ran for some distance and then fell apparently killed. The pack and greatcoat are sent herewith, and also papers taken from some of the killed enemy. Several others were seen running into our barrage near the orchard. This party now came under heavy machine gun and rifle fire from the orchard, east of the railway. This was replied to with rapid fire and Officer Commanding "E" party having completed his task, reinforced "C" party, and both parties then withdrew by degrees, each in turn provided covering fire from the other. 'Parnham was discharged on 12 March 1919. He is further entitled to the Silver War Badge (B339529). His Medal Index Card is noted as a 'Shadow Card' dating from 10 September 1985 noting replacement medals, and this is further confirmed on his 1914 Star entry and his British War and Victory Medal pair entry as well where replacement issues were issued on 19 December 1931. In 1917 they were in action during the operations on the Ancre, Occupation of the Commecourt defences and later the attack on Rettemoy Graben, as well as the German retreat to the Hindenburg Line, the attack on Lievin the Battle of Hill 70. Harding working round behind the enemy and heavily bombed them. The suddenness of this attack scattering the enemy who were shot down by a Lewis Gun in their efforts to escape.Cpl. Harding captured 2 prisoners and 2 machine guns. The fine dash and energy of this N.C.O. removed a difficult obstacle and enabled communication to be established between the two battalions without further trouble. Bertie Joseph Samuel Harding was born at Ulan, New South Wales in 1898, the son of Joseph Harding of Riverstone, New South Wales. Educated at Ulan Public School he enlisted as soon as he was able on 8 February 1916, listing previous service with the Cadets. Posted to the 19th Battalion he embarked on 25 October 1916 as part of the 17th Reinforcement.Entering the war in France he saw heavy fighting with his unit however it was off the field that he received his first wound, suffering an injury to his thumb from an accident with a grenade on 9 July 1917. Returning to the Battalion after recovering he was caught up in the fighting during the Spring Offensive where he was gassed on 18 April. Once again returning to his unit he was with his unit at the opening of the Battle of Amiens, the start of the Hundred Days Offensive where they were in the line near Rainecourt. There Harding performed his gallant deed however at that stage he had less than a month to live. The Battalion was at the head of the Australian line during the Battle of Mont Saint-Quentin on 31 August 1918 when Harding was killed in action, his service papers give first hand testimonies including one from his commander stating: We were in action at Mont St. Quentin. Harding was killed outright by Machine Gun fire. The body was found the next day, when the burial took place on the spot. The Battalion cross was placed over the grave. I was at the burial. Harding was in my Platoon, "A" Company. 'Harding was later reburied at Peronne Communal Cemetery Extension, his father gave further details in the roll of honour stating: 'Was a well known boy athlete in Mudgee and Forbes districts. Won several Schools Athletic Championships. Took a prominent part in Sunday School work at Forbes, also acted as lay reader in the English Church at Forbes for some months prior to enlistment.'Sold together with copied research and a photograph of the recipient's grave. His remarkable daring and fearlessness in overcoming a serious difficulty was a noble example. Horace Smith was born on 30 May 1880 at Bristol with the name William Llovd Gudridge. He enlisted with the British Navy when a child and served until 1913 deserted at Sydney, going under the name of Horace Smith. Enlisting at Sydney on 25 July 1916 he was posted to the Australian Imperial Force and arrived Devonport on 28 December 1916. He was posted to the 19th Battalion in France on 1 April 1917, just prior to the action at Hangard Wood which saw Lieutenant Percy Storkey win the Victoria Cross. They were present for the Spring Offensive and then formed part of the spearhead of the Allied advance during the Hundred Days. Smith was present for the attack on Hill St. Quentin, earning plaudits for his bravery on 31 August. He suffered a gunshot wound to the head the next day and taken to the 53rd Casualty Clearing Station. Dying of wounds on 2 September he was buried at Dourlers Communal Cemetery Extension. This was changed in the vicinity of the enemy and having done so, he succeeded in making his way through further small arms and machine gun fire from which his Gun and Tractor, were hit in several places. By his initiative and calmness under very hazardous conditions, he brought his vehicle, Gun and detachment through the enemy lines to the New Zealand Div Aea, from which position it was again used against the enemy.'Robert Kenneth Kirby enlisted on 27 April 1939 and served with the 64th Medium Regiment, Royal Artillery, seeing action in North Africa. This involved an all night approach march finishing with a very steep and difficult climb of 1200 feet, during which Gunner Moore was carrying a No. 11 set. Just before first light the party approached the summit, which it found held in force by the enemy. They were forced to withdraw half way down the feature, where they were pinned to the ground by very heavy Mortar and MG fire with the enemy in front and on both flanks, and in addition enemy patrols in rear. In spite of the difficult situation, however, Gnr Moore immediately established communication with the battery, which enabled repeated enemy attacks to be engaged and driven off. The enemy mortar and MG fire became so heavy that it was considered necessary to change the position of the OP three times. Gunner Moore only changed his position on definite orders to do so, as by this time the wireless set was the only means of communication for the whole party, the infantry set having been knocked out, and Gnr Moore was afraid that, if the position was changed, communication might be lost. Gnr Moore however, regained communication each time, enabling fire to be brought down on the enemy again and again. Owing to Gnr Moore keeping communication the party was eventually able to withdraw under cover of darkness. Even then Gunner Moore kept his set open to the last possible moment. His devotion to duty, his bearing, and his complete disregard of personal safety under these most difficult conditions, were a continual source of inspiration to all who saw him. M.I.D. London Gazette 11 January 1945 (Italy). The Battle of Medenine, Tunisia, began on 6 March 1943 and forced the Axis forces out of and on to higher ground north and west of Medinine. Rommel left North Africa on 10 March and left General Arnim in command.On 19 March 1943, XXX Corps commenced Operation Pugilist. The 50th (Northumbrian) Infantry Division managed to penetrate the line held by the 136th Armoured Division "Giovani Fascisti" near Zarat. Rain and the nature of the terrain prevented the deployment of tanks, aircraft or anti-tank guns, which left the infantry isolated. A counter-attack by 15th Panzer Division and the "Giovani Fascisti" on 22 March recaptured much of the bridgehead, 35 British tanks and 200 prisoners. British forces held their positions until darkness. On 24 March all the British attacking forces were recalled. XXX Corps prepared a new attack towards Tallouf, in which the 4th Indian Infantry Division would make a night attack on 23/24 March around the inland end of the line, coinciding with a wide left hook manoeuvre by Montgomery. The 4th Indian Infantry fought with distinction in the Tunisia Campaign, right through to the fall of Tunis in May 1943, gaining a particular reputation for its prowess in mountainous country. The division had the honour of capturing General Arnim in Tunisia, bringing an end to the war in North Africa. His Military Medal was sent on his instruction to a Mrs C. Lea, Rawtenstall, Ross, Lancashire; sold with a letter from The War Office dated 24 May 1946 and a photograph of him in uniform in Desert uniform. Escaping though the wire, he was again apprehended and taken to Aquila Camp. Once more he regained his freedom when a member of a wood carrying party. For the third time he was arrested by the Germans near Terni, and made to accompany them on their retreat. Realising that British forces could not be far away, Smith broke away from the column as it was passing through a village. For a few more days he lived on the Mountain side, returning to Terni to report to Allied forces on their arrival. John Smith listed his address as 7 Mayfield Avenue, Moss Estate, Macclesfield, Cheshire. Joining 7th Battalion, Green Howards on the outbreak of the Second World War Smith joined them in the North African campaign. Surviving the Battle of Gazala Smith was one of the British force which attempted to halt the inexorable Axis advance at the Battle of Mersa Matruh. The action was a disaster for the British who had a real change to deal the Germans a heavy blow however instead some 6,000 British troops were taken prisoner, including Smith. While in Italy he made regular attempts to escape, finally succeeding and making it back to Britain, a newspaper article provides further detail stating: 'Escaped From GermansHome on leave after escaping from a German prison camp in Italy is Private John Smith, aged 29, son of Mrs. and the late Mr. Smith, 7, Mayfield Avenue, Moss Estate, Macclesfield. This was Private Smith's fourth attempt at escape, and on each of the previous occasions he had been recaptured. Private Smith has been in the Services for four years, and was captured at El Alamein [SIC] in 1942. He was formerly employed by Messrs. The 'Coastal Command 1942' D.F.M. awarded to Flight Sergeant G. Butterfield, No. 203 Squadron, Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve, for his daring attack upon an enemy convoy which saw an enemy aircraft silenced and a merchant ship attackedDistinguished Flying Medal, G.VI.R. (938357 F. Sgt. G. Butterfield. R.A.F.), nearly extremely fineD.F.M. London Gazette 7 June 1942, the original citation states: 'In March 1942, Flight Sergeant Butterfield attacked an enemy merchant ship which was escorted by a destroyer and an enemy aircraft. Flight Sergeant Butterfield's aircraft was engaged by the enemy aircraft and in the ensuing combat which lasted for 15 minutes, the enemy's front gunner was silenced. Although Flight Sergeant Butterfield's aircraft was hit, he pressed home his bombing attack. This airman has previously bombed an enemy destroyer and attacked a float plane. For shadowing enemy warships under difficult circumstances, he was commended by the Commanding Officer of his Wing.'Guy Butterfield was born at Grimsby on 25 July 1916, the son of John and Helena Butterfield. He was living at 36 Augusta Street, Grimsby on 11 July 1939 when he was awarded his aero club certificate (No. 19030). Joining the Royal Air Force he was flying sorties with No 203 Squadron in 1942 when they were launching missions over the Eastern Mediterranean from Egypt, equipped with Blenheim IVs. The Blenheim flown by Butterfield was responsible for an reconnaissance flight on 9 March 1942 as part of the effort to locate the Italian Fleet. The Squadron Operations Record Book provides further information, stating: 'Blenheim "O" (F/S. Butterfield, Sqt. Lee, Sqt McLelland) was airborne on special search and locate the Italian Fleet, leaving Bir Amud at 16.50. At 19.40, the Italian Fleet was sighted in position 33\* 49'N. 19\*29'E. Co. 050, speed 12 knots. No individual ships were distinguishable in the darkness, but eight wakes were observed. W/T. failed so the aircraft at once set' course for Bir Amud landing there at 22,05. Commissioned Pilot Officer on 6 June 1942 with No. 203 Squadron he was further promoted Flying Officer on 6 December 1942. Finally advanced Flight Lieutenant on 6 June 1944 Butterfield was flying Beaufighters with 143 Squadron out of Manston, Kent. Still there on 2 September 1944 his aircraft was lost engaging e-boats of the French coastline.Butterfield is commemorated upon the Runnymede Memorial; sold together with copied research. The Second World War immediate D.F.M. awarded to Sergeant A. Kenvon, Royal Air Force, who was decorated for his gallant deeds as a Flight Engineer in No. 419 (R.C.A.F.) Squadron, when he nursed home his heavily damaged Lancaster on two engines following a strike on Bottrop, Germany, in September 1944Distinguished Flying Medal, G.VI.R. (1515049 Sgt. A. Kenyon, R.A.F.), good very fineD.F.M. London Gazette 9 January 1945, the original recommendation states: Sergeant Kenvon has taken part in 21 day and night operations against the enemy, in which his efficiency, coolness and resource have been amply demonstrated. During a daylight attack on Bottrop on 27 September [1944], the aircraft, in which he was Flight Engineer, was very badly damaged while orbiting the target. The port inner engine was put out of action and the port outer caught fire and had to be feathered. The hydraulic system was rendered unserviceable and some of the controls were damaged to such an extent that two crew members had to assist the pilot to control the aircraft. The bombing run was completed but, when leaving the target, the starboard inner engine started to lose power and it was found that this engine also had been badly damaged. Sergeant Kenyon successfully nursed this engine to give 50% power during the return trip to this country, showing great ingenuity and resource in doing so.I consider the outstanding ability and coolness in danger shown by Sergeant Kenyon fully merits the immediate award of the Distinguished Flying Medal. 'Alva Kenyon was born on 2 February 1922 and was a student at Balshaw Grammar School, Leyland, Lancashire, on the eve of hostilities. He would have been flying in a Lancaster at the time of the above incident, his unit - also known as 419 (Moose) Squadron - having converted from Halifax aircraft at R.A.F. Middleton St. George in April 1944.It is worth speculating whether one of Kenyon's earlier sorties was that flown against Cambrai on the night of 12 June 1944. If so, it was the same sortie in which Pilot Officer Andrew Mynarski, also of 419 (Moose) Squadron, won a posthumous V.C.Kenton returned to his Lancashire roots after the war and died at Leyland in March 2002; sold together with copied research and a large original archive comprising, 3 newspaper clippings, A Telegram of congratulations from the Commanderin-Chief of Bomber Command along with 3 other letters and telegrams of congratulations and the Medal slip of issue named to 'Sergeant Alva Kenyon, D.F.M.'. The 1944 D.F.M. group of five awarded to Flight Sergeant J. Cosgrove, Royal Air ForceDistinguished Flying Medal, G.VI.R. (1572208. F/Sqt. J. Cosgrove. R.A.F.); 1939-45 Star; Air Crew Europe Star; Defence and War Medals 1939-45, mounted for wear, minor pitting and polishing, very fine (5)D.F.M. London Gazette 13 October 1944, the original recommendation states: 'As rear gunner this airman has participated in a large number of sorties and has displayed great keenness and devotion to duty throughout. His constant vigilance has enabled his pilot to avoid combat on many occasions, and successfully complete many missions. He has proven to be a cheerful and willing worker with his fellow men in the gunnery section. For his airmanship an intense loyalty, this N.C.O. is strongly recommended for the Distinguished Flying Medal. John Cosgrove was born at Glasgow in 1924 and enlisted with the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve in 1942. Posted to No 432 (Royal Canadian Air Force) Squadron, a unit based at Skipton-on-Swale, Yorkshire they transferred to East Moor in February 1944. Re-equipped with Halifax MkIII bombers Cosgrove flew his first sortie with them on 4 March 1944 as rear-gunner. Seeing five operations in eighteen days through March however he had a near miss while on a training flight over Yorkshire on the night of 14-15 March. Thei aircraft was misidentified and targeted by flak guns over Hull, suffering what they- at the time- believed to be a near miss. It was not until they made it back to base that the ground crew discovered a large hole in the leading edge of the port fin, the miss had been far nearer than they imagined. Cosgrove received a short break after their raid over Frankfurt on 18 March before starting to fly again in April with a raid over Paris which hit the Villeneuve-Saint-George Station. He was part of the major 300 aircraft raid the Squadron launched over Dusseldorf on 22 April which set fire to five square miles of the city. Navigator has completed 28 successful sorties against such enemy targets as the Synthetic Oil Plant near Merseburg, Ulm, Nuremberg and Munich. His work has been characterised by an unfailing sense of devotion to duty and determination to play his part, enabling his aircraft to reach its target and bomb it through any opposition. Calm and confident in his manner, he is cheerful and a magnificent example to his crew and the whole squadron. His high standard of courage, great determination and outstanding devotion to duty well merit the award of the Distinguished Flying Medal. Frederick Frank Fish was born at Sydenham, London on 25 October 1922, attesting with the Royal Air Force on 20 November 1941 he was mobilised on 27 April 1942. After training he was posted to the newly reformed 153 Squadron based in Lincolnshire. The unit was equipped with Avro Lancasters and Fish flew his first mission as a navigator with them on 14 October 1944 to Duisberg, the first 1,000 bombers Daylight Raid codenamed Operation Hurricane. He flew four more missions that month, one to Essen and three to Cologne with the last proving extremely eventful. Fish had a near miss on 31 October 1944 on approach to Cologne when their aircraft suddenly heeled over starboard. It was assumed that they had been clipped by a flak burst but Flying Officer 'Whizz' Wheeler got them back under control and the managed to get through and drop their bombs. In fact a stick of bombs dropped by the a Lancaster above them had struck the wing: It was shortly after leaving the target that the Flight Engineer noticed a large hole in the starboard wing! After a brief exchange of four letter words, the W/Op (who usually, when over the target stood in the astrodome, looking upwards, to act as look out against over-flying aircraft) was asked why the 888 he had not shouted a warning? His reply was memorable and accurate "I was too paralysed to speak". Clearly the sigh of a stick of bombs hurtling towards one would be enough to petrify anyone. He went o to say that the had hoped the bombs would miss them- but one did not. Although the starboard aileron was ineffective, and other problems had to be mastered, Whizz nursed the crippled aircraft back to make a good landing at Scampton. Later examination revealed a jagged hole. About three feat square, virtually through the roundel. About two inches away was the pink outline of the outboard petrol thank and the main spar. Fortunately the bomb had not reached its "explode on impact" point, so that damage was limited to that caused by a solid, inert 1,000lb mass weight going through the one part of the wing it could do, without fatal consequences. A close shave indeed. 18 days later, "A" was back on operations. This was not to be his last close shave with Fish's diary for the next mission over Dusseldorf on 2 November noting 'Bags of Fighters & S.L.' and just two days later 'attacked by FW190- Hit in S. Wing'. That month saw further aerial combats with Fish's entry for 18 November over Wanne-Eickel stating: fired on me410 - Did a corkscrew- all engines cut temporarily'. The Squadron was not just undertaking bombing raids against German cities, they also undertook air support missions with one occurring in support of French trips over Freiburg on 27 November. As the year wound down they undertook several minelaying missions, including one abortive mission over Kattegat on 26 January which saw one Lanc shot down by a fighter and 3 others downed by flak. Fish's final mission saw him downed on 30 January 1945, several direct hits saw them forced to land at Eindhoven, Holland. He returned to Britian by Dakota, it was his final combat mission. He remained in service after the war and married Aircraftwoman Class I Alice Harden of Boston, Lincolnshire on 1 January 1949. Fish joined the Squadron association in 1986 having worked as a Chartered Accountant at Newguay, Cornwall after leaving the R.A.F. He died on 19 May 2003 in Bexhill. 

Notably whilst there Cubitt was listed as of the men thanked in the Daily Routine Orders by the Squadron Commander on 17 April 1940, this with the rank of Orderly Sergeant. As the country fell the Squadron including Cubitt were pulled back to Saint-Nazaire where they were ordered aboard the passenger ship Lancastria.Loss of the LancastriaMuch has been written about the disaster that occurred off St. Nazaire on 17 June 1940, but by way of summary, the following extract is taken from Charles Hocking's Dictionary of Disasters at Sea: 'On 17 June 1940, the Cunard White Star Line's S.S. Lancastria, Captain J. Sharp, was lying off St. Nazaire takin on board British troops who were being evacuated from France. The embarkation began at 8 a.m. and continued until 4 p.m., by which time the liner was ready to weigh anchor. In addition to the soldiers there was a small party of about civilians, and their wives and children. As far as can be ascertained there were 5,310 persons on board, of whom 300 were crew. The first attack by aircraft came about 2 p.m., followed after a short interval by a second raid. In these attacks the Orient liner Oronsay was hit and damaged but still remained seaworthy. At about 4.30 p.m., in a third attack, the ship was struck by a salvo of bombs, one of which passed right through the dining saloon and burst in the engine room. The damage to the Lancastria was vital and she took a heavy list, and although the boats were got out with all possible speed it was evident from the outset that there was no hope of rescue for thousands of those on board. Only two lifeboats managed to get away, the others capsizing owing to difficulties with the falls or through being overloaded. Tugs and other small craft were quickly on the scene and picked up hundreds of men in the water. The Lancastria remained afloat for barely 30 minutes, turning gradually over to port so that those still on board were able to walk upon her side as she lay. After floating in this position for some time she capsized completely and went down by the head. Meanwhile the German airmen occupied themselves by firing from their machine-guns at the men in the water, and by firing incendiary bullets which set fire to the oil floating on the surface. Of those on board 2.477 were saved, including Captain Sharp, who was picked up some hours later, and most of the civilian passengers. There was also a small number of people who came ashore singly or in very small parties, some of whom were captured and interned by the Germans. 'Cubitt was one of the former group managing not only to make it back to Britain but was appointed Flight Sergeant and later earned a 'mention' for his actions; sold together with copied research. He arrived at Camp 66 (Capua, Bay of Naples) on 30 November 1942, undertaking forced labour as a farm worker. He was transferred to Camp 70 (San Giorgio) on 11 February 1943 and Camp 62 (Bergamo) on 6 May 1943. Bergamo lies close to the Swiss border, and this was to be Garside's salvation. He escaped from Camp 62 on 10 September 1943. "He worked with actors such as Paul Scofield, Laurence Olivier, Trevor Howard, Alec Guinness, Douglas Fairbanks, Jr., and Errol Flynn, often acting as Flynn's stunt double in movies.Mr. Crean first came to the Ontario Stratford Festival in 1962 to be fight arranger for Macbeth, directed by Peter Coe. While Mr. Crean initially told friends he wasn't fond of Canada, after his second season at the Festival in 1963, he fell in love with Stratford and decided to make the Ontario city his home base, according to the festival obituary information. He worked as the Festival's fight director until 1983, when he arranged the fights for another Macbeth, directed by Des McAnuff. Among the dozens of Festival productions for which he arranged the fights and swordplay, his 1968 production of The Three Musketeers, directed by John Hirsch, received great acclaim for its stage action. Mr. Crean returned from retirement in 1988 to assist fight director Jean-Pierre Fournier for The Three Musketeers directed at the Festival Theatre by Richard Ouzounian."Paddy changed the way fights were done in the theatre," said John Brogan, a fight director who worked extensively with Mr. Crean in his later career. "Paddy's rule was that the fight action had to come from the context of the play, and he also personalized it to suit the actor: he had a very safe approach, and his guidelines on how to handle swords ended up being adopted as the guidelines used around the world." Those guidelines were codified through the Society of British Fight Directors, for which Mr. Crean was a Fight Master. He was also Fight Master with Fight Directors Canada as well as an Honorary Member of The Society of American Fight Directors.Mr. Crean continued to work as an actor, sometimes taking on smaller roles within the shows for which he had done fight arranging and also performing his one-man show about Rudyard Kipling, The Sun Never Sets, at the Avon Theatre in Stratford in 1970. Crean had published his autobiography More Champagne, Darling in 1981. He died in Toronto, Canada in December 2003. He was later promoted Captain and then Major.Browne entered the Great War as an Adjutant, disembarking at France on 20 January 1915. During the war he was mentioned in depatches no less than four times, and for his distinguished service during the campaign was made a Chevalier of the French Legion of Honour in 1916 and a Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George in 1918. After the end of the Great War, then Lieutenant-Colonel Browne served in the Russian Relief Force in southern Russia. For his work in Russia he was again mentioned in despatches. Browne at some stage returned to India, where he worked as Director Survey of India and his medals were sent to the Surveyor General of India at Wood Street in Calcutta. He later died at Madras on 30 August 1929. Browne is further entitled to a 3rd Class Order of St. Michael and St. George; Companion's Distinguished Service Order; India General Service Medal 1895-1908, clasp Waziristan 1901-02; 1914-15 Star trio with M.I.D. oak leaves; France, 5th Class Legion of Honour, and possibly Russia, 2nd Class Order of St. Anne. 



From 1939 he then served as a legal assistant in the Lord Chancellor's Department, becoming Deputy Clerk of the Crown in Chancery in 1944. That same year Coldstream joined the British War Crimes Executive as a member, for which he watched footage from Nazi concentration camps and prepared files for the Nuremberg Trials through 1946. A few years later, having divorced his first wife, in 1949 he married the widowed Sheila Whitty, whose husband Lieutenant-Colonel J. H. H. Whitty, D.S.O., M.C., The Queen's Own Royal West Kent Regiment, had been killed in action at Monte Cassino in 1944. Coldstream succeeded Sir Albert Napier on 4 June 1954 as Permanent Secretary to the Lord Chancellor's Department upon the latter's retirement; he was to hold this position through four Lord Chancellors until 1968. In this capacity, he had a hand in important legislation including the Life Peerages Act 1958, the Peerage Act 1963, the Royal Assent Act 1967, and the Law Commission Act 1965 which established the Law Commission. During his tenure he also oversaw a number of influential Law Lords appointments, including those of Lords Denning, Devlin, Diplock and Wilberforce. Coldstream received his appointment as Knight Commander of the Bath in 1955. He was made Knight Commander of the Royal Victorian Order in 1968, the year of his retirement as Permanent Secretary. Afterwards, he retained his position serving on the Royal Commission on Assizes and Quarter Sessions until 1970, when he became chairman of the Council of Legal Education, a role in which he sat until 1973. Educated at Repton and later Cambridge he joined the 4th (Militia) Battalion, South Wales Borderers on 7 May 1904. Transferring to the Essex Regiment with the rank of 2nd Lieutenant on 3 September that same year he was still with them on the outbreak of the Great War in August 1914 and entered the war in France in October 1914, remaining until September 1915Transferring to the Indian Army on 26 October 1915 with the rank of Captain Lloyd was to serve with the Supply and Transport Corps at Gallipoli until January 1916 and thence in Mesopotamia. Remaining here he was awarded the Military Cross with them in 1918 and was advanced Major on 1 August 1918. An article in the The Carmarthen Journal and South Wales Weekly Advertiser on 30 August 1918 also states that he served as 'O.C. Divisional Troops Transport in Mesopotamia. Last August he was mentioned as "deserving special mention". He also served as Temporary Lieutenant-Colonel for at least some time although returned to the rank of Major after the war.Remaining in the east after the end of the war Lloyd served as Senior Supply Officer 18th Division, being in Iraq in 1919. As a result he was present for the Kurdish revolt that presaged the Iraq Revolt the next year. Lloyd's role as Supply Officer would doubtless have been a vital one as British forces attempted to garrison the country in the wake of the Great War.Remaining a part of the British Army Lloyd appears to have served in India for much of his military career, being promoted Lieutenant-Colonel in 1930. Retiring with that rank in 1935 he settled in Kenya as a Farmer and occupied himself be being a Founder Member and Debenture Holder of the Karen Club upon its foundation in 1937. Returning to Service on the outbreak of the Second World War Lloyd served from 1940-41 in East Africa. London Gazette 23 June 1915.Dictionary of Irish Biography gives the following: Thomas Joseph Crean (1873-1923), rugby player, military doctor, and VC holder, was born 19 April 1873 in Morrison's Hotel, Dawson Street, Dublin, the second son and fifth of the eight children of Michael Theobald Crean, barrister of the Irish land commission, and his wife, Emma, née Dunn, whose parents owned Morrison's Hotel. The family lived at Esker House, Upper Rathmines Road, and then at 7 Pembroke Street.A fine student, Crean was educated at Clongowes Wood College, Co. Kildare, before studying medicine at UCD, and St Vincent's Hospital, Dublin. It was at Clongowes that his exceptional rugby ability was first noted and developed. A natural forward, he was big and fast, which, combined with good football skills, made him an outstanding prospect. When he moved to Dublin to study he joined Wanderers RFC, with whom he won a Leinster senior cup in 1894, and his displays for Wanderers led to selection for Ireland in 1894. In his debut year he was an ever-present and essential member of Ireland's first triple crown winning side. In 1895 Ireland were hotly tipped to repeat their success of the previous year, but they were defeated in every game, Crean again playing in all three games. Despite this setback the Irish team won the championship in 1896, beating England and Wales and drawing, surprisingly, against the weaker Scottish team. In all he won nine caps for Ireland and scored two tries, in a short but brilliant international career. In 1896 Ireland earned recognition from the Great Britain selectors when nine Irishmen were chosen for the squad to tour South Africa, including Crean; this was the first Great Britain touring team in which players from Ireland were selected. Crean made a considerable impact: he scored five tries, captained the side to victories in the first and third tests and several provincial matches, and played in all the tests. His height, bulk, speed and football skills made him very hard to stop and he became one of the 'personalities' of the tour, and a firm favourite with the local crowd. Indeed such was his popularity that he decided to remain in South Africa when the touring side returned home. Robert Johnson, a fellow tourist, friend and clubmate of Crean, also remained in South Africa. Crean set up a lucrative practice at the Johannesburg hospital. He was feted for his bravery throughout his life. In 1891 he was awarded a medal for saving a man from drowning in the sea at Blackrock. When the Boer war broke out in 1899 he enlisted as a trooper in the imperial light horse and took part in the relief of Mafeking and the relief of Ladysmith. In March 1900 he was made a captain, but resigned his squadron rank in June 1901 to become a surgeon-captain. In December 1901 he received the VC for bravery for tending to injured soldiers at Tygerskloof while under fire and wounded, and only ceasing when he was badly wounded a second time. His friend Robert Johnson had joined the imperial light horse and was also awarded the VC during the war. In 1902 Crean was made an honorary fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons. He was a captain in the royal army medical corps (RAMC) from 1902 (when he won the Arnott gold medal) until 1906, when he left to practise medicine in Harley Street, London. On the outbreak of the first world war he rejoined the RAMC as surgeon-captain (later promoted to captain), serving with the 1st cavalry brigade until 1915, and being awarded the DSO. He was wounded several times and mentioned twice in dispatches. In 1915 he was promoted major and became the officer in charge of the 44th field ambulance, British Expeditionary Force, in France. In 1917 he returned to England to take charge of the hospital established in the royal enclosure at Ascot. While at Ascot he saved the life of a jockey who had been thrown from his horse, by removing portions of the bones of his skull using a hammer and chisel. The strain of his military service left him in poor health, and after the war he struggled to continue his Harley Street practice. He ran into financial difficulties and in June 1922 was adjudged bankrupt. On 25 March 1923 he died from diabetes at his residence, 13 Queen Street, Mayfair, London, and was buried in St Mary's cemetery in Kensal Green, London. Throughout the whole of the operations his courage and his example of selfsacrifice were worthy of high praise."Territorial Decoration London Gazette 4 February 1930.France, Croix de Guerre London Gazette 14 July 1917.James Alwin Colville Scott was born in Gateshead, Durham on 24 December 1886, the second of three children born to James Scott and his wife Anna. Scott Junior attended Durham University from 1904 to earn a medical degree, for which he received a scholarship, and he later received his qualification and registered as a Doctor in 1912. In 1914 Dr. Scott was commissioned Lieutenant in the Royal Army Medical Corps and was attached to the 9th Battalion Durham Light Infantry, and went on to serve as their medical officer throughout the Great War. That same year he was married at Gateshead to Ada Margaret Winship with whom he later had a son in 1919, Robert Scott, who would later follow in his father's footsteps to become a 2nd Lieutenant in the 9th Battalion Durham Light Infantry. Scott first entered the war in France on 19 April 1915. While serving in France, Scott became one of only 168 soldiers of the war to earn the Military Cross with both a second and third award bar. In his act of gallantry which earned him this third bar, he was wounded to the face by shell fire. Scott was again wounded in right arm and leg in 1918, which was reportedly severe enough to warrant his being sent home. After the First World War, Scott was re-appointed as the battalion's medical officer in 1920 and continued to serve in this capacity until 1939. He returned to France with his Regiment upon the outbreak of the Second World War and served in No. 6 Ambulance Train. After a brief period of leave at home, he returned to France to discover that his train had been captured by the Germans, and he narrowly avoided capture himself. Having safely escaped back to England, Scott was finally retired in May 1924 having reached the age limit and left the Army with the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel. On 24 July 1948 he was issued with a 1939-45 Star and a War Medal for his service during the Second World War, both of which were delivered to him at 20 The Crescent, Gateshead, Durham. Outside of his military career, Scott was a keen swimmer and water polo player and at one point was Master of the Shipcote Lodge of Freemasons, having had been initiated in 1917. He was also a member of the Gateshead Council, was made a Justice of the Peace in 1928, and was involved with the St. John Ambulance Brigade for which he later earned a medal for services rendered. After the war Scott continued his medical practice until his retirement in 1956, and he later died at the age of 73 in January 1960; sold together with copied M.I.C., short biography, and copied newspaper clippings. 'Edmund Clarence Martin was born at Eastbourne, Sussex in 1878. At the relatively advanced age of 36, Martin enlisted as a Sapper with the Royal Engineers on 28 January 1915, having served as a member of the Sussex Royal Engineer Volunteers for eight years. At the time of his enlistment he was working as a carpenter and living at 90 Plymouth Place, Leamington Spa, Warwickshire with his father Alfred and his mother Jane. He was reportedly qualified as a skilled joiner when he enlisted.Martin's skillset must have been well-suited to the Royal Engineers indeed, and he quickly rose through the ranks. He was advanced Lance Corporal in February, Corporal in March, and Corporal in May. He landed in France with the 126th Field Company, 21st Division B.E.F. on 12 September 1915. A few months later Martin received news that his father died of cancer on 19 November, which must have been a serious blow.Nonetheless, Martin's aptitude for the Royal Engineers progressed and he was promoted Sergeant in December. The following year, he received a divisional commendation from the Major-General in command of the 21st Division, noting he 'distinguished [him]self in the Field on the 10th to 15th December 1916'. His commendations did not end there, and Martin's award of the Military Medal was gazetted on 10 February 1917. He was further promoted Warrant Officer Class II on 29 May 1918, at which time he was also appointed Company Sergeant Major. Martin added the D.C.M. to his laurels, appearing in the Gazette first on 3 June 1919 and again later on 11 March 1920. Returned home to the UK with his unit on 17 April 1919, he was transferred to Army Reserve Class 'Z' on 27 May. Martin received his D.C.M. and his M.M. shortly after his return home in August 1919, his 1914-15 Star in April 1920, his British War Medal the following year in March 1921, and his Victory Medal that May. 'Cecil John Rhodes once said that he had only met two creators in South Africa: Himself and James Douglas Logan, the Scottish-born founder of Matjiesfontein. Representative in many ways of a grasping late nineteenth century cowboy capitalism that came to reshape and dominate the subcontinent, while holding aloft the flag of 'fair play', 'civilisation' and 'empire', Logan was in the vanguard of an accelerating expansionism at a time when the British bore few doubts about their historic mission. Empire, War and Cricket in South Africa, Logan of Matjiesfontein, by D. Allen, refers.The named dress miniature Queen's South Africa Medal worn by Captain the Honourable J. D. Logan Matjesfontein District Mounted Rifles), edge nicks and edge bruise, attractively toned, otherwise good very fineProvenance:Terry Sole Collection, Spink, July 2019 (Lot 487), his full-size award sold as the preceeding Lot.James Douglas Logan was born at Reston, a small Berwickshire town close to the English border, on 27 November 1857. His father, James Logan, worked as a ticket clerk for the North British Railway at Reston Station and, following an education at Reston House School, Logan Inr. was encouraged to follow in his father's footsteps and contribute in what were economically challenging times for the family. Robert Toms, writing in Logan's Way, describes a happy yet 'resourceful' childhood, recounting how the Logan family income was supplemented by poaching - something to which the young James proved more than adept: 'Mr. Logan's family in Reston were rabbit trappers,' recalled a local man many years later, 'and I remember that Mr. Logan apparently got into trouble with the police and was due to appear in court on charges of poaching. He disappeared before court proceedings and went to South Africa.'An apocryphal story, perhaps, but an early indication of the controversial nature of a man whose destiny lay elsewhere. A life no longer 'cabined, cribbed and confined' Feeling confined by the strict norms of the prevalent Victorian society of the times, and hearing stories that in the Colonies there was no aristocracy and no social class - indeed rather there was money for the making for the steadfast of heart - young Logan travelled to London to ponder his next move. As the gateway to Empire, the City introduced him to stories of the rapidly expanding settlements in the Antipodes and he took work as an apprentice aboard the 437-ton sailing vessel Rockhampton on 12 February 1877, bound for Queensland with a general cargo and a number of emigrants. Fate deals its cards The voyage was not a smooth one. Rounding the Cape of Good Hope the ship took a battering from powerful winds and high seas, the condition known locally as 'revolving storms' - with the direction of wind changing frequently, often in an extremely erratic manner. Forced to take refuge in Simon's Town for running repairs, the enforced delay proved frustrating for Logan, more so with no specific time and date for commencement of the voyage. Ashore and contemplating his next step, it is likely that he was quickly swayed by the prosperity on show in the region, not just from the traditional primary industries of copper mining and agricultural endeavours, including wine and brandy, but also that associated with newfound gemstones, especially diamonds. Ever since Erasmus Jacobs, a farmer's boy, found a small, brilliant stone on the banks of the Orange River in 1866, the area had been a focus for those seeking to make their fortune, but things had become even more interesting in 1871 when Esau Damoense, a cook for a prospecting group, chanced upon further deposits and took them to the de Beer brothers for evaluation. This sparked a 'New Rush' of eager prospectors, the area taking the name New Rush in consequence - later changed to Kimberley. With people and wealth came a need for infrastructure, in particular the requirements for an effective communication and transport system. Having negotiated an official discharge from duties aboard the Rockhampton, Logan found employment with the Cape Province Railway Service on 5 shillings a day and likely used his knowledge of the railways to achieve rapid advancement. Promoted to the clerical department at Salt River Station, he soon found himself serving as Station Master at Cape Town Railway Station, before being promoted to Railway Superintendent between Hex River and Prince Albert. There was just one caveat: his appointment in the remote hinterland of Karoo required him to be married within three months. Finding a wife in such a 'dry and desolate area'Undaunted by the challenge, Logan set about finding a wife, and within three months had met and married Emma Haylett, a descendant of one of the most respected Dutch families, the de Villiers of Villiersdorp. Aged just 21 and 19 respectively, the couple moved to Karoo on 5 August 1879 where land was cheap, and Logan purchased 2,888 hectares for £400. In 1883 he decided to resign from his role with the railways, and in 1887 he began to invest in the water industry knowing that every locomotive required 250,000 litres of water to cross the Karoo. As the population increased, so the demand for water rose, with consequential conflicts between domestic and industrial or agricultural precedence. Having invested in boring machines, Logan inaugurated 'Water World' in November 1889 to significant fanfare, not just delivering the security of supplying Matjiesfontein with a surplus 50,000 litres per day, but also offering a party to hundreds of guests, mostly important dignitaries. Inaugurated by Lady Sprigg, wife of the then Cape Prime Minister, Sir Gordon Sprigg, the local media reported, 'the luncheon served in a decorated railway shed would have done justice to a first-rate London hotel. The Great and the Good come to visitBy the mid-1890s, the man who had taken his first footstep on South African soil with only £5 in his pocket had come a long way and was now a wealthy man. Conjuring up a little segment of his native Scotland in the desert, people vied with each other to visit this arid place where Lord Randolph Churchill 'picked bluebells in the hills,' and Olive Schreiner - the first great South African author who wrote under the pseudonym Ralph Iron - served dinner to Cecil John Rhodes in a little cottage which still stands. Richard Horatio Edgar Wallace wrote a poignant piece on the death of Queen Victoria whilst staying there, whilst General Haig gave parties in a small mess which had once been a laundry. Other notable visitors included the Duke of Hamilton, His Highness the Sultan of Zanzibar, Lord Carrington, Admirals Nicholson and Rawson and the astronomer Sir David Gill. Made J.P. in 1888 and a member of the Legislative Assembly for the constituency of Worcester, Logan was now a prominent figurehead. The emergence of cricket in South AfricaCricket first came to the African continent with the military between 1795 and 1802, in the earliest days of the British regime. Members of the garrison that occupied the Cape in 1806 found time to play cricket and two years later the first reference to a cricket match being played in South Africa appeared in the Cape Town Gazette and African Advertiser. As elsewhere, cricket's imperialists viewed the spread of the game as an indicator of a colony's cultural and social development. Indeed English cricketers were seen as purveyors of the 'enlightening' process in far flung corners of the Empire, including South Africa. Sir Pelham Francis Warner, M.B.E., affectionately and better known as Plum Warner or

The Prince's long military career saw its beginning in the fight against Napoleon I, against whom he fought at the Battle of Hanau in October 1813 when he was just eighteen years old. The battle was a tactical victory for Napoleon, opening a line of retreat for the French army. The young Prince was made general of a division after the battle and with them took part in the Campaign of 1814 against the French Emperor in the final months of the War of Sixth Coalition. The Prince temporarily retired from service in 1822 owing to disagreements with Bavarian Field Marshal Karl Philipp von Wrede. He resided in Munich, where he morganatically married Marie-Anne-Sophie Petin on 1 October 1823 and with whom he went on to have issue of three daughters. Upon von Wrede's death in 1838. Prince Karl was appointed Field Marshal of the Bavarian Army by his brother King Ludwig I. In 1866 Bavaria sided with Austria during the Austro-Prussian War and the Prince acted as commander-in-chief of the Bavarian corps which fought in the conflict. These troops comprised about 52,000 men and fought in the Main Campaign, suffering heavy losses particularly at the Battle of Kissingen on 10 July where they were soundly defeated by Prussian forces. Prince Karl left the service after the defeat of the allied Austrian forces. He died at Tegernsee on 16 August 1875 when he was killed instantly upon falling from his horse while riding at the age of eighty. 

Sergeant Smith's gallantry in action was in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflects great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army. Citation for the Bronze starMaster Sergeant John S. Smith, 722-05-3262 United States Army who distinguished himself by outstandingly meritorious service in connection with military operations against a hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam. The 4th Battalion had the mission of relieving the intense pressure an NVA regiment was placing on Dak Seang Special Forces camp. While deploying his men into its portion of the battalion perimeter, Sergeant Smith's company came under intense mortar fire from elements of that same NVA regiment. During twentyfive minutes of constant mortar fire Sergeant Smith dauntlessly crawled from one wounded man to another, rendering emergency treatment to nearly twenty-two men hit by mortar fragments. When a Marine accidentally fell into deep water while disembarking from a landing craft with a broken ramp and, encumbered by his equipment, was being dragged seaward by the surf, Private First Class Loney unhesitatingly swam from the beach where he was serving with the shore party to the drowning man's aid. Although struck and stunned by a boat backing off the beach, he still managed to support the incapacitated Marine until further aid could be obtained. His outstanding courage and devotion to duty at a time when the beach was under enemy fire was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service. Citation for the Bronze Star:During the battle for the island of Saipan in the Mariannas, many small units of the enemy Japanese were by-passed in isolated caves and rocks. These groups while at large and of their hostile nature were a continued threat to the rear of the advancing Marines and to the security of the lines of supply. The task of hunting out and destroying these fanatic groups was assigned to the Second battalion, Twentieth Marines "Engineers" of which PRIVATE FIRST CLASS LONEY was a member. Despite the hardships and heavy casualties suffered by his unit PRIVATE FIRST CLASS LONEY was active on patrols for eleven days and nights from 1, July, 1944 to 12, July, 1944, and was repeatedly cited for his outstanding actions during that period. Carrying a light machine gun and acting in lieu of an automatic rifleman, PRIVATE FIRST CLASS LONEY, on numerous ocasions voluntarily exposed himself to enemy fire to gaurantee the successful completion of his mission, was credited with a large number of enemy dead and captured. Although originally assigned to the shore party for the operation, PRIVATE FIRST CLASS LONEY'S, training in this type of warfare enabled him to participate in the successful annihilation of many of these fanatical groups of the enemy, sworn to fight to the death. PRIVATE FIRST CLASS LONEY'S devotion and complete dis-regard for his own safety in the execution of the most difficult of duties against such a determined enemy was in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service. Theodore Harper Loney, a native of Emporia, Kansas, entered the United States Marine Corps on 22 September 1943. He first served overseas on 5 March 1944. He saw engagements on Saipan and Tinian in the Marianas and Iwo Jima in the Volcano Islands. He was awarded the Silver Star and Bronze Star, Purple Heart with gold star, Presidential Unit Citation (Navy) with two Stars, Naval Unit Commendation, Victory Medal WW2, Expert Rifleman. He returned to the U.S.A. on 18 October 1945, with the rank of Private 1st Class and was discharged on 7 November 1945 and became a student. He was later commissioned for service during the Korean War and remained in service after the conclusion of the war. He courageously witheld his fire until he achieved the maximum tactical advantage. He then fired an accurate and devastating hail of fire which completely routed the enemy. Although wounded in the encounter, he elected to remain in his position for the rest of the night to thwart additional attacks. His professionalism, courage under fire and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."Citation for the Navy Commendation Medal: For heroic achievement while serving with friendly foreign forces engaged in armed conflict against the North Vietnamese and Viet Cong communist aggressors in the Republic of Vietnam. On the night of 24 December 1969, Petty Officer BERNHARDT was serving as boat captain of a river atrol boat set in waterborne guardpost on the Vinh Te canal when his boat came under attack. The first attack occurred after the arrival of United States Navy helicopter gunships which he had called to reconniter the area when he detected enemy troop movement near his position. The gunships were taken under fire and at the same time, the enemy attacked Petty Officer BERNHARDT's boat. At his command, his crew delivered an accurate, supressing fire as he directed air strikes on a fast retreating enemy. After having successfully thwarted the attack, he elected to remain at his location to block the enemy's infiltration route. A few hours later, his boat once again came under intense automatic weapons and rocket fire. He again calmly and professionally directed the return of a devastasting barrage of fire which supressed the enemy attack. Petty Officer BERNHARDT's efforts were instrumental in preventing an infiltration attempt by a company size Viet Cong force. His professionalism, courage under fire and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service. George Franklin Bernhardt was from Pennsylvania and enlisted in 1954, he saw service around the world including Antarctica and was to serve in Vietnam where he was wounded on 14 October 1969. He carried out 216 patrols and was under enemy fire in 8 of those patrols.
