Fine to Very Fine" One might be forgiven for paying little attention to the diverse, sporadic and often inconsistent letter punchheons utilised across the tenth Century 'Horizontal Two Line' series of 'All England'. In this instance, the punching of a D for an R, could easily be classified as a die-sinker's error, yet another of many encountered across the seemingly endless varieties of this specie. However it would seem rather more deliberate given the introduction of an enlarged 'annulet' (really an O) punched not once, but twice. This no longer feels an error, but a deliberate attempt to invoke 'Deus' - God himself. This prompts a numismatist to explore the subtle nuances of the Latin language, with the suffix 'DEO' rendering in the dative - the sense of 'to' or possibly 'for God'. Equally it could invoke the ablative case - giving the meaning of 'by', 'with' or 'from God'. In a numismatic canon, this is immediately reminiscent of several later Plantagenet numismatic devices from 'POSVI DEVM ADIVTOREVM MEVM - I have placed God as my helper' popularised by Edward III, to permutations of 'DEI GRATIA' - 'By the Grace of God' utilised by every monarch since 1279 - with the 'Godless' Florin causing an infamous exception upon its release in 1849. None of this interpretation matters, unless one contextualises Eadgar's remarkable life. Eadgar, at barely sixteen years of age, inherited the throne and a fractured England in 959. His political inheritance was shaped almost entirely by the churchmen his father and former co-ruling brother Eadwig had already begun elevating. He had spent his boyhood years, while Eadwig ruled in Wessex, as the chosen king of Mercia and Northumbria under the tutelage of men steeped in Continental monastic reform. Chief among these principals was Dunstan, whom Eadwig had forcibly exiled to the continent, but whom Edgar had recalled and made Bishop of Worcester, then London, and eventually Archbishop of Canterbury in 960. From the outset, Eadgar's kingship was wedded to Dunstan's churchmanship: the young king's early charters are dense with the reforming vocabulary of men like Dunstan, Æthelwold (made Bishop of Winchester in 963) and Oswald (Bishop of Worcester, later Archbishop of York), the triumvirate who together drove the astonishing expansion of Benedictine monasticism across England in this period (one only needs to look at the refounding of the houses at Glastonbury, Abingdon, Winchester, Ely, Peterborough, Ramsey amongst others). More significant, however, than the foundation stone, was the stroke of the ecclesiastical triumvirate's pen. At Winchester, in 973, the Regularis Concordia was agreed at council, a meeting that Edgar described in its own preface as having convened and presided over "like a shepherd gathering his flock." Later medieval writers, and the Concordia's own proem, went so far as to cast Edgar as a second Josiah or Constantine; being a King who used the machinery of Royal power expressly to purify and reorder the Church itself. But behind the shroud of piety, emerges a very different reputation for Eadgar; who would act with a notable lack of personal restraint in his youth, so much so that Dunstan did not simply advise him but actively corrected him. The most vivid account survives from Osbern of Canterbury's Vita Sancti Dunstani. In it, Eadgar either seduces, or more likely abducts a nun sheltering at Wilton Abbey, sometimes naming her as Wulfthryth, mother of the future St Edith of Wilton. In response, Dunstan, as Archbishop, imposed a formal penance on the king for the blasphemous offense - barring him from wearing his Royal crown for seven years. Whatever the precise historicity of the episode, it narrates the powerful fable of a wayward young king brought under the moral discipline of the Church through Dunstan's personal intervention, and emerging from that discipline a genuinely reformed, appropriately humbled Christian ruler. At Bath, in this great display of renewal, King Eadgar undertook a second, deliberately staged Coronation, conducted by Dunstan with Oswald in close attendance, using rites that scholars generally connect to the so-called "Second English Ordo" — a much more elaborately liturgical, anointing-centred rite than earlier Anglo-Saxon practice. Symbolically this event coincided with the completion of Edgar's seven-year penance and the Winchester council. The King was showing that Royal power was ultimately answerable to Ecclesiastical and divine authority, could it be that this very coin was struck to reflect an historic alignment of the English church and state? This small silver denomination belongs to one of the most historically resonant episodes in early English coinage: the "restoration" currency struck in the wake of the catastrophic debasement and collapse of the earlier gold thrymsa coinage, traditionally associated with the crisis and recovery of Kentish royal authority under Wihtred (fl. 691-725). S E Rigold, whose 1960 classification remains the foundation of Sceatta studies, described the primary series as "a 'restored' currency, almost in the Roman sense"; in essence the radiate bust and degenerate "standard" reverse consciously revived imagery inherited, ultimately, from late Roman imperial prototypes via the preceding gold coinage, lending the type a genuine art-historical lineage stretching back to antiquity. Series R itself is best understood as a major East Anglian trading currency, most plausibly minted at Ipswich, and its unusually conservative, slowly-degenerating design over decades suggests a deliberate strategy of building trust and familiarity among merchants trading along the North Sea coasts and inland up the Thames; evidenced by the pattern of domestic and continental finds alike. Its various runic legends remains one of the coinage's enduring mysteries: read by some as a moneyer's name, and more evocatively by others as an invocation of Bishop Eappa of Selsey, a near-talismanic legend rather than a conventional signature. That ambiguity, far from diminishing the type, adds a layer of scholarly intrigue that continues to attract specialist interest.

EMC 2015.0394) ~ Conflicting theories abound for the origins, moneyer and purpose of this issue, that unquestionably was struck at least in support of Stephen of Blois' claim to the English crown. The first regards 1st Earl of Lincoln (1149-1153), Gilbert de Gant, a baron loyal to Stephen and rendered by the artistic G DE GANT enunciated on the reverse. The second interpretation proposed by Martin Allen (from illustrations alone) is the reading of the reverse legend is the product of an otherwise unrecorded Flemish moneyer (Wizso or Wizz of Ghent). As Allen opined, not only had this provided a new type for the local or 'Ornamental' coinage of York in the reign of Stephen, but the name of the first moneyer of this coinage. The obverse copies Stephen type 1 but the reverse design has an arcuate quadrilateral, with a pellet at each angle and pellet in annulet centre, over a voided cross with a pellet between two pellets at the end of each limb (Fig. 32a). This new reverse type, which can be called the Cross Voided and Quadrilateral type, seems to be copied from William I type 2. The reverse inscription can be read as +WIZ. SDE.GDEGANT, supplying the name of a Flemish moneyer, Wizz(o) of Ghent (de Gant). What has perhaps been less explored is the incredibly competent workmanship on display, not least in the noteworthy neatness of the layout, as much as in the hitherto unseen full ligation of the D and E to form a 'buckled D'. This has led the present cataloguer to pay more close attention to what he has described as the 'barbell-S' on exhibition after + WI.... Where Allen saw a Z, Edmund has explored the paleographic records of 12th Century manuscripts. Here he has discovered the cross-barred S as a standardised abbreviation for the latin 'sed', and noted a separate deployment when describing 'soldi'. If such were the intention of die-cutter WI could be equally shorthand for William, leaving only the normal S to be properly explained. Whether such is an appropriate interpretation of the first letters, there remains little doubt as to the reading G DE GANT. In both scenarios, the Flemish 'Ghent' is applicable, either as a moneyer of that name, or as an allusion to the Gant family, who heralded from the Low Countries at the time of the Norman Conquest. Gilbert of Ghent arrived in England in 1069, and appears in Domesday Book as a tenant-in-chief of substance, his honours resting on Folkingham in Lincolnshire and Hunmanby in the East Riding of Yorkshire. Our Gilbert's father, Walter de Gant (d. 1139), founded the Augustinian Priory of Bridlington about 1113, and eventually took the habit at Bardney where he was to be buried. Through his mother Maud, daughter of Stephen, Count of Tréguier, Gilbert was nephew to Alan of Penthièvre, Earl of Richmond, one of the King's most active commanders; his uncle Robert of Ghent served Stephen as chancellor from 1140 until the end of the reign and as dean of York. The house was bound into the Royal interest, and into the ecclesiastical government of the north, before the present Gilbert had any choice to make. He succeeded his father as a young man, probably not long knighted, and within two years stood in the King's line outside Lincoln on 2 February 1141. The Royalist cavalry broke and Stephen, now dismounted, fought on foot until he was overwhelmed, and Gilbert was apprehended alongside him. Given his name appears among the list of the capture encapsulates his profile. What however distinguishes his biography, is his subsequent allegiance whilst others sued for peace. Where Ranulf II of Chester and William de Roumare had between them displaced Royal administration altogether, de Gant's unshakeable fealty endured. The Chesters attempted to redress later that decade, when Gilbert fell into Ranulf's hands, and was thus compelled to marry the Earl's niece Rohese de Clare. A coerced marriage was a cheaper and more durable instrument than a garrison for binding a Lincolnshire magnate. In this instance it failed entirely: Gilbert remained in the King's peace, and his refusal to be absorbed is the immediate context of everything that follows. When William de Roumare, whom Stephen had earlier recognised as Earl of Lincoln, went over to the Angevins, the King created Gilbert the new Earl in his place. This was a comital title of the wartime kind; in essence a reward for loyalty and a counter-claim to a shire the Crown could no longer properly administer. Between 1149 and 1151, Stephen came close to losing Yorkshire outright, yet still the de Gants were among the very few northern magnates to remain loyal. The possible dating of this coin would fall within this window, and the coin should be read as an artefact of that isolation: a declaration of standing made at the moment when there was scarcely anyone left in the north to make it alongside him. The legends propel this argument by retaining the regular Royal legend + STIEFNE R on the obverse with Gilbert's name apparently 'displaced' to the position the moneyer's name on the reverse. This is quite different from the statements made by other Yorkshire magnates. On the known Pennies of Robert III de Stuteville, the baron's name and indeed even his effigy displaces the King's. The distinction is not a matter of engraving convenience. It is perhaps tantamount to a numismatic representation of exactly the position Gilbert occupied; a magnate asserting a newly granted comital authority within the Royal allegiance. Few English coins could state such an urgent wartime political position so economically. Gilbert died in 1156, aged about thirty, having founded the Cistercian Abbey of Rufford; leaving a single legitimate child, Alice, who married Simon III de Senlis. Henry II did not recognise the Earldom, which lapsed with its holder amid the new King's systematic reversal of the comital creations of the Anarchy, leaving this coin as perhaps the only presently surviving remnant of that remarkable period in English history. In Summer 2025, a related specimen of the so-called 'Wisegnota' series surfaced in Romney Marsh (Kent) (ref. Alongside the wondrous array of 14th and 15th Century Gold Coins recovered were several pieces of jewellery, including a heart-shaped brooch, inscribed: "je suys vostre sans de partier" ("I am yours wholly") Struck in London during the eighteen months bracketed by two of the most consequential events of the Hundred Years' War, this Noble carries the very claim that cost the ill-fated Joan of Arc her life. The obverse legend proclaims Henry VI not only King of England, but also of France. This being the same French crown that Joan of Arc had spent 1429 fighting to secure for the Dauphin, who was crowned Charles VII at Reims that July. Joan was a peasant girl in her late teens who came from Domrémy in North-East France. Having claimed divine visions that apparently instructed her to save France, she managed to talk her way into an audience with the Dauphin Charles at Chinon in early 1429. Given a small force, she went on to lift the English siege of Orléans that May, a victory that turned the tide of a war that England had (up until then) been steadily winning. She proceeded to lead the campaign that brought Charles to Reims for his coronation a few months later, in July. Joan of Arc was captured by Burgundian allies at Compiègne in May 1430 and then sold to the English. She was tried at Rouen, not by a secular court, but by a French ecclesiastical tribunal which was operating under English political control, on charges of heresy which centred on her visions and her wearing of men's clothing. When she was just nineteen years old she was burned at the stake in the Rouen marketplace on 30th May 1431. A quarter of a century later, a posthumous Church retrial annulled her conviction and she was eventually canonised as a saint five centuries later, in 1920. England's response to Reims came at Joan's expense. Her trial and subsequent execution fell at exactly the same time as this gold Noble's minting period. Seven months after her death, on 16th December 1431, a ten-year-old Henry VI was crowned King of France in Notre-Dame in Paris. This was the only such 'counter-coronation' of the whole war, and was the direct answer to Charles VII's anointing at Reims. This rare coin is a rare window into the eighteen-month collision of two rival coronations and one execution. James III for some time had been urged to marry by his supporters. A number of James' court, Charles Wogan, was therefore sent to scour the courts of Europe for a suitable bride. He reported most favourably on Princess Clementina, grand-daughter of the King of Poland, then aged sixteen. A betrothal was arranged, but George I was against the marriage and persuaded the Emperor Charles VI to have her arrested and imprisoned in Innsbruck. The order to detain the Princess and her mother travelled slowly so Clementina's mother spent eight days at Innsbruck where, it is reported, she enjoyed the shopping. In consequence of this delay they were arrested and detained in Schloss Ambras. Diplomatic efforts to secure Clementina's release failed and the Prince turned again to Charles Wogan. The intrepid courtier succeeded in rescuing the Princess, at night, substituting a maid in her place and leaving her mother to offer explanations the following morning. They escaped to Bologna, where James had been waiting, arriving eight months late, but James had already left for Spain. It is interesting to note that this medal was commissioned by Pope Clementine XI, thus implying a continuing papal interest in the re-establishment of Catholicism in Britain.

George II's Coronation medal features a strikingly similar design to that of his father, with Britannia again crowning the King. In part this may have been due to the incredibly brief time that the Royal Mint had to prepare the medal, with a design approved only four days after the Privy Council requested it. Perhaps its imitation was evidence of the strengthening of the new royal house in Britain against the Jacobite tide; the crowning of a second Hanoverian monarch in direct succession from the first, 'by a willing people' as the inscription states. Ironically much like the last Catholic Stuart Monarch - James II - George II also ensured that his Consort, Queen Caroline had a separate Coronation medal produced in her likeness. The medal of George II was distributed at the public expense during the coronation ceremony. It is said that as few as 200 were struck in gold. The procession to the Abbey on Coronation day was vast, and ended up lasting two hours. With so many guests making their way, sometimes the crowd was brought to a halt. One of those held up was Sarah, Dowager Duchess of Marlborough. To the delight of those watching, she took a drum from one of the soldiers and sat on it. Inside the Abbey on Coronation day, there were a total of 1,780 people seated, with scaffolding erected and even seats reserved for those who sold wine, coffee and other refreshments during the service. It was said that Queen Caroline's dress was so encrusted with precious jewels that a pulley had to be devised in order to lift her skirt so that she could kneel at various points of the service. One aspect in particular that was a crucial characterisation of the Coronation was the focus on music's importance. It was the first Coronation for which public rehearsals took place, and the first for which the sheet music was published. A choir of forty and a full orchestra of 160 musicians were housed in temporarily erected galleries above and over the altar. The composer, Handel, was commissioned to write four new anthems for the ceremony, the most famous of which, 'Zadok the Priest' has been sung at every subsequent coronation since, traditionally during the anointing. At the banquet afterwards, the tables were said to have groaned under the mountainous amount of food, with baskets of excess food being passed up to the galleries via a system of hoists. Once the Royal party had left, the doors to Westminster Hall were thrown open and the public ransacked all food and furnishings within just half an hour. Despite the chaos that ensued at the end of the day, the Coronation was widely celebrated. Swiss traveller de Saussure declared "I cannot possibly give you any correct idea of the magnificence and beauty of all these sights" and added that it was "the most solemn, magnificent, and sumptuous ceremony it is anyone's lot in life to witness." This medal was first awarded in 1768, the same year Augustus Henry FitzRoy, third Duke of Grafton (1735-1811), was appointed Chancellor of the University of Cambridge. That October he also became Prime Minister, a post he held until January 1770. Educated at Westminster and Peterhouse, Cambridge, Grafton was descended from the illegitimate line of Charles II and Barbara Villiers. Though widely described as amiable and handsome, his ministry was dogged by controversy, and political pressure forced his resignation in 1770. The medal itself was awarded for excellence in classical studies, continuing a tradition that began in 1752 under Grafton's predecessor as Chancellor, Thomas Pelham-Holles, Duke of Newcastle (1693-1768). Academic prize medals originated in Germany in the sixteenth century before becoming widespread across England and the rest of Europe by the 1700s. This example, typical of the period, depicts a classical figure representing alma mater presenting a medal or laurel to a student in academic dress. Rendered in low relief, it shows the clear influence of classical sculpture on the engraver, the noted medallist and gem-engraver John Kirk (1724-1776). Kirk was a student of James Dasser and his work was acclaimed by the Society of Arts. This medal was awarded to Matthew Feild (or Field) (1748-1796) in 1772. Born in London in 1748 to stationer John Feild, records show he was baptised in the capital on the 22nd March 1748. For his education he was sent to Christ's Hospital. The school has a long tradition of its pupils wearing and being awarded medals as a mark of academic achievement. Silver badges were first worn by pupils in 1673, and the practice was still very much alive during Feild's time almost a century later. Therefore, from an early age Matthew would have been familiar with the concept of academic awards and the social status which accompanied the recognition of academic success. Feild went up to Cambridge in 1767 and matriculated Pembroke College in November of that year. In 1772, the same year he received the Chancellor's Medal, he was awarded his BA. Three years later in 1775 he was conferred his MA from Pembroke. After his time at Cambridge he returned to Christ's Hospital, serving as the lower grammar master between 1776-1796. He also had a long and established career within the church, holding a number of positions throughout his lifetime. He was first ordained as a deacon on 15th March 1772 by John Green, Bishop of Lincoln and again by Green as a priest in June 1775. John Green had also served as Vice-Chancellor of Cambridge University from 1756-1757. Feild went on to hold a succession of livings: curate of Tetford (1772); vicar of Ugley (1785); curate of Berden (1785); rector of St Ann and St Agnes with St John Zachary (1788); curate of St Nicholas Cole Abbey with St Nicholas Olave (1790); Prebendary of Greeting, Lincoln Cathedral (1791); sinecure rector of Corwen (1793); and Prebendary of Ealdstreet, St Paul's Cathedral (1794). These were all positions he retained until his death. In March 1781 he was appointed as domestic chaplain of Charles Fitzroy, 1st Baron Southampton (1737-1797), British army officer, politician and courtier. At this point in his life Fitzroy had been newly elevated to the peerage as Baron Southampton and appointed as Groom of the Stole to the Prince of Wales, later George IV. In this position, Fitzroy acted as a special advisor and head of the household to Wales. Feild's academic duties at Christ's Church are fascinatingly recorded by two of his most well-known students: Leigh Hunt and Charles Lamb. Hunt, the renowned English critic, essayist and poet, writes about Feild in his 1828 work 'Lord Byron and Some of His Contemporaries; with Recollections of the Author's Life, and of his Visit to Italy'. He recounts: "The under grammar-master was the Reverend Mr. Field. He was a good-looking man, very gentlemanly, and always dressed at the neatest. I believe he once wrote a play. He had the reputation of being admired by the ladies. A man of a more handsome incompetence for his situation perhaps did not exist. He came late of a morning; went away soon in the afternoon; and used to walk up and down, languidly bearing his cane, as if it was a lily, and hearing our eternal Dominuses and As in præsenti's with an air of ineffable endurance. Often, he did not hear at all. It was a joke with us, when any of our friends came to the door and we asked his permission to go to them, to address him with some preposterous question, wide of the mark; to which he used to assent. We would say, for instance, "Are you not a great fool, sir?" or "Isn't your daughter a pretty girl?" to which he would reply, "Yes, child." When he condescended to hit us with the cane, he made a face as if he was taking physic. Miss Field, an agreeable-looking girl, was one of the goddesses of the school; as far above us, as if she had lived on Olympus." Charles Lamb, English essayist, poet and antiquarian, best known for his Essays of Elia wrote about Feild in his 1820 essay "Christ's Hospital Five And Thirty Years Ago": "The Upper and the Lower Grammar Schools were held in the same room; and an imaginary line only divided their bounds. Their character was as different as that of the inhabitants on the two sides of the Pyrennees. The Rev. James Boyer was the Upper Master; but the Rev. Matthew Field presided over that portion of the apartment, of which I had the good fortune to be a member. We lived a life as careless as birds...Field never used the rod; and in truth he wielded the cane with no great good will-holding it "like a dancer." It looked in his hands rather like an emblem than an instrument of authority; and an emblem, too, he was ashamed of. He was a good easy man, that did not care to ruffle his own peace, nor perhaps set any great consideration upon the value of juvenile time. He came among us, now and then, but often staid away whole days from us; and when he came, it made no difference to us-he had his private room to retire to, the short time he staid, to be out of the sound of our noise...Matthew Field belonged to that class of modest divines who affect to mix in equal proportion the gentleman, the scholar, and the Christian; but, I know not how, the first ingredient is generally found to be the predominating dose in the composition. He was engaged in gay parties, or with his courtly bow at some episcopal levee, when he should have been attending upon us. He had for many years the classical charge of a hundred children, during the four or five first years of their education; and his very highest form seldom proceeded further than two or three of the introductory fables of Phaedrus....Boyer...would sometimes, with ironic deference, send to borrow a rod of the Under Master, and then, with Sardonic grin, observe to one of his upper boys, "how neat and fresh the twigs looked."...the remembrance of Field comes back with all the soothing images of indolence, and summer slumbers, and work like play, and innocent idleness, and Elysian exemptions, and life itself a "playing holiday

The original intention was for a common reverse, bearing the inscription 'Victoria Regina Cudi Jussit MDCCCXLI, but in the event this reverse was never used, and early awards were made with the reverse struck from a specially commissioned die, bearing details of the rescue and the name of the recipient. In 1850, owing to the expense of creating a new reverse die for each award, a standard reverse was instituted, with the new inscription 'For Saving the Life of a British Subject'. The medal was approved by Queen Victoria later that year, but was superseded in 1867 by the introduction of the Albert Medal. Curiously there is no trace of Edward Fletcher Esq of Liverpool performing a gallant act or indeed of ever saving a life at sea. From ancestral records his life began and ended rather unremarkably in Liverpool. Born 6 March 1803 to Joseph and Elizabeth Fletcher of Paradise Street, by the 1861 Census, he was recorded as a resident of Toxteth Park, living with his unmarried elder sister Arabella, and a profession listed as 'Wine Merchant'. Tragically he would die only eight months after the presentation of these awards, his will being granted with less than £100 to his name. By sheer good fortune however a remarkable surviving archive of contemporary letters has been consigned alongside the present lots on offer that sheds a fascinating light into the direct interaction of Queen Victoria with her loyal subjects, and indeed the key workings of her newly appointed Keeper of the Privy Purse, Sir Thomas Myddelton Biddulph. Transcribed below are the salient points of the month-long correspondence between Liverpool, Buckingham Palace, and Balmoral that reveal the remarkable exchange of artwork for these very medals at the personal request of Queen Victoria. 31 High Street, Liverpool, Sept. 22, 1866 (Fletcher to Biddulph) Sir, I have held in my possession for many years a picture in enamel of Her Majesty the Queen by a London artist after the picture by [Edmund Thomas] Parris of 1839 ... and another after the artist, the companion picture of his Royal Highness and the late Serving Consort in enamel... both 7 x 5 1/2... Yours Ed. Fletcher Buckingham Palace, Sept. 30, 1866 (Biddulph to Fletcher) [Franked Liverpool, Oct. 2, 1866] Sir, I have the honour to acknowledge your letter of the 22nd inst. which I have submitted to Her Majesty. Her Majesty desires me to express to you her thanks for the kind spirit with which your letter is written and for the handsome offer you make of the two Pictures. Although it is not usually Her Majesty's custom to receive presents, the manner in which these Pictures are offered induces Her Majesty to desire me to inform you that if you will kindly forward them to Buckingham Palace, the Queen will accept of them with thanks. I have the honour to be Sir Your obedient and humble servant Thos. Biddulph 31 High Street, Liverpool, Oct. 5, 1866 [Fletcher to Biddulph] Sir, I beg to inform you that I have this day dispatched to your address, Buckingham Palace, the two Royal Portraits which have been so highly revered by Her Majesty passing acceptance. I think that they will arrive safely and be deemed not material unworthy of the Royal favour. Included are cuttings from the Liverpool [...] Catalogues of 1839 + 1840 with labels to identify the pictures with the artist's name and verify the dates of production. Again thanking you with sincerity for your kindness in this matter Ed Fletcher Buckingham Palace, Oct. 12, 1866 [Biddulph to Fletcher] [Franked Liverpool, Oct. 13, 1866] Sir, I have to acknowledge the safe arrival of the two Pictures which I will communicate to Her Majesty, and I shall have it known of writing to you again. The delay is occasional as you will understand by Her Majesty being at Balmoral. I am Sir, your obedient and faithful servant Thos. Biddulph Buckingham Palace, Oct. 24, 1866 [Biddulph to Fletcher] [Franked Liverpool, Oct. 26, 1866] Sir, In consequence of my absence from Balmoral, I have been presented sooner conveying to you the expression of Her Majesty's thanks for the two Portraits you so kindly presented, and which have been received with much gratification by the Queen. I am now commanded by Her Majesty to ask you to accept of two Medals, one of the Queen and the other of the Prince Consort which you make like to keep as Memorials of Her Majesty's acceptance of the Portraits. I have the honour to be Sir, your obedient and humble servant Thos. Biddulph 31 High Street, Liverpool, Oct. 26, 1866 [Fletcher to Biddulph] Sir, I am deeply honoured by your letter of 24th inst. conveying to me exciting intelligence of her Majesty's approval of the Royal Portraits. I have also to acknowledge the receipt of the express packet containing two very beautiful medals of Her Majesty and the late Prince Consort. I beg that you will be kind enough to express to Her Majesty my warmest gratitude and thanks for this most gracious gift of her favour and condescension [sic]. To me they will soon be a dearly cherished evidence of the Queen's munificent generosity as well as a memorial of the most gratifying incident in my life. In 1811, he was educated at Miss Roper's school house in Islington, a contemporary, albeit 18 months his senior, was future Prime Minister Benjamin Disraeli. He completed his education between 1817 and 1823 at Merchant Taylor's School, Herts before returning to the counting house of his father and grandfather's business. In 1830 he made a tour of Scotland befriending Robert Surtees, with whom he would go on to found the Surtees Society in 1834, whereupon he would act as its first Treasurer. He would later become a Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries of London, committee member of the Royal Literary Fund and founding member of the Camden Society. The portrait sketch of John Gough Nichols and a subsequent rendering for Lucy as a study for this medal is contained within a folio of works housed at the British Museum (ref. BM 2012.7076.58 and 59 - https://www.britishmuseum.org/research/collection_online/collection_object_details.aspx?objectId=3489734&partId=1). The final product was much lauded by contemporaries, with the numismatist Richard Sainthill writing in the Art Journal in January 1869: "Fortunately for the artist, his originals presented a striking contrast, of which he has made the most. Quiescent loveliness and living energy: the broad, smooth brow, topped with its silken shading, relieving the slightly lined forehead, deep-set eye, massy clustered locks and heavy moustache, are all realised in their varied shades with the highest artistic ability". A doctor by training, Busk practised at Greenwich Hospital, and served aboard the hospital ships HMS Grampus and HMS Dreadnought (converted about twenty years after her service in the Battle of Trafalgar). While his primary scientific research was in Polyzoa, a sort of moss-like aquatic animal, like any great Victorian, Busk was a polymath and was keenly involved in all areas of science. The Royal Society's archives show Busk reviewing hundreds of papers for their journal and signing in support of countless applications for fellowship. Darwin's Doctor Unsurprisingly then, Busk was often in contact with Charles Darwin. In a particularly graphic letter, reader be warned, to Darwin c. 27 August 1863, Busk writes the following, "I am very sorry to hear that you are suffering so much... With respect to the flocculent matter you mention as contained in the ejecta I should not be at all surprized to hear that Goodsir detects his Sarcina in it." He goes on to make the very Victorian prescription of "calcined Magnesia, and a little biscuit or dry toast". Beyond treating Darwin's maladies, the two shared a close and supportive academic relationship. In 1864, Busk lobbied his peers and officially nominated Darwin for the Copley medal, awarded indirectly for his controversial Origin of Species, published five years earlier. The Discovery of Neanderthals Busk's most notable contribution to science is his work on the recognition of Neanderthals as a distinct species. After a German scientist, Hermann Schaafhausen, had described unusual remains found in Neander valley, Busk took great interest in the discovery, translating and publishing the paper in his journal Natural History Review. Soon after, Busk travelled to Gibraltar to study the Gibraltar skull, a find not yet recognised as being Neanderthal. Busk brought the skull to England and presented his findings; both Charles Lyell and Thomas Huxley would use Busk's drawings of the skull in their books on prehistoric man. It was thanks to the efforts of Busk that a pattern could be drawn between the two finds, and the argument for a new species instead of scattered individual abnormalities was conclusively made. The X-Club True to his talent of connecting and advancing the scientific fields, and of organising, Busk produced a very lengthy CV - President of Greenwich Natural History Society, the Royal College of Surgeons, the Ethnological Society, and the Anthropological Institute; Hunterian Professor of Comparative Anatomy and Physiology; editor of the Quarterly Journal of Microscopical Science and the Natural History Review. Busk also founded a regular scientific dinner, with a name that would perhaps better suit a 1950s comic - 'The X-Club'. The nine members of the club held so much combined scientific prowess and influence, that a contemporary was overheard describing the situation thus, "well they govern scientific affairs, and really, on the whole, they don't do it badly". For nearly 40 years, he governed (along with his elder brother Rudolf August) in a co-regency that was unusual even by the standards of the fractured German princely landscape - a partnership that endured until Rudolf's death in 1704, that allows Anthony Ulrich to reign alone for the final decade of his life. By the time this medal was struck in around 1701, Ulrich was already somewhat of an elder statesman of German politics, a survivor of the endless realignments of alliance and enmity that characterised the age of King Louis XIV. His modest duchy actually occupied a strategically important position in Lower Saxony, and he proved himself to be an adept diplomat and dynast, arranging marriages that would tie Brunswick-Wolfenbüttel into the great ruling houses of Europe (most famously securing his granddaughter Elisabeth Christine's marriage to the future Holy Roman Emperor Charles VI). This makes Ulrich the great-grandfather of Maria Theresa. He was equally known as a man of culture and taste. He wrote novels, founded the Herzog Anton Ulrich-Museum's collections, and built the great Wolfenbüttel library. This dual identity, soldier-diplomat and philosopher-prince, was very much the model of the Baroque ruler. This medal was engraved by Heinrich Paul Groskurt, one of the principal medallists working for the Brunswick-Wolfenbüttel court, known for portraiture favouring faithful likenesses over idealised flattery. Ulrich appears firm, albeit weathered, a man unmistakably in his latter years and experience rather than a youthful, idealised prince. The reverse of this medal has the Latin DURABO at the top, translating as 'I will persevere' or 'I shall endure.' The imagery of the ship could be read as one of a statement of stability in a storm, the vessel that has safely come through rough water. Ulrich, throughout his life, had navigated literal storms of the Baltic and North Sea trade routes, vital to his duchy's finances, but also the figurative storms of imperial politics, shifting alliances, and a somewhat strained co-regency with his brother. This motto and allegorical design read as a summation of a long and hard-won reign - endurance itself being the achievement rather than a single military or political action. Less propaganda and more a piece of personal reflection, this medal is characteristic of the kind of humanist self-fashioning that princes of his generation favoured. Lady Elizabeth Mary Murray (18 May 1760 - 1 June 1825) was a British aristocrat whose life was shaped from its very beginning by remarkable international circumstances. She was born in Warsaw, Poland-Lithuania, the daughter of David Murray, 2nd Earl of Mansfield, by his first marriage to the German Imperial Countess Henrietta Frederika von Büнау. Her Polish roots were entirely the product of her father's diplomatic career, it was while he served as ambassador to the Elector of Saxony in Dresden that he met the Countess Henrietta, and the couple were married on 16 August 1759 in Warsaw. Notably, many English aristocrats at the time mistakenly assumed her mother to be Polish, when in fact she was German; even the writer Horace Walpole held this misconception. After the tragic death of her mother in March 1766, Elizabeth was brought back to England and placed in the care of her father's uncle, William Murray, 1st Earl of Mansfield, and his wife at Kenwood House in Hampstead. It was there that her most celebrated bond was formed. Lord Mansfield soon also took in Dido Elizabeth Belle (c. 1761-1804), the illegitimate daughter of his nephew Sir John Lindsay and Maria Belle, an enslaved African woman. The two girls grew up together at Kenwood, and their close bond was noted by the American visitor Thomas Hutchinson when he visited in 1779, around the time their joint portrait was painted by David Martin. Though the two were raised in the same household, Elizabeth received a yearly allowance of £100 while Dido received £20, a disparity likely reflecting both Dido's illegitimacy and her race. In December 1785, aged 25, Lady Elizabeth married George Finch-Hatton in a love match. The couple would go on to have seven children, before George's death in 1823.
